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## Clarkston Shuts Out Brighton for Homecoming

Coach Ralph Kenyon's Wolves rolled over Brighton for their fifth win. They have only lost one game. There was never any doubt as to the outcome of the game; the only question one would ask was how many points Clarkston would score.

Clarkston's coach Kenyon let his reserves play almost the entire second half. It was a fine gesture on Kenyon's part.

In the first half and part of the third quarter, quarterback Dan Craven engineered five touchdowns passing for two touchdowns to his

favorite target Ken Miskin and sending Randy Armstrong, John Williams and Dan Jenks on runs of 4 yards, 4 yards and 10 yards respectively.

Craven completed 3 passes for 66 yards. Williams ran for 114 yards while Jenks ran for 103 yards and Armstrong for 52 yards.

In the second half, little Richie Palladino took over the quarterbacking duties for Clarkston. Richie engineered an 88 yard drive for six more points for Clarkston with Palladino sneaking over for the last yard. On the drive he passed once to Mike Madison and Gary Pearson for sizeable yardage with Wooley and Seath eating up yardage with their fine runs.

Frank Miller and Jon Gary were outstanding linemen for Clarkston.

Also in for a word of praise are Lenard Bullard and Dave Coulter.

Outstanding in the backfield for Clarkston was Johnny Williams with his fine runs around the ends, and Dan Jenks running up the middle of the line for almost 10 yards per carry. Also in for a bit of praise was Randy Armstrong. This is the best Randy has run all year. He has never been faster (Randy had two long runs nullified because of penalties).

Those who saw the game were looking at one of the finest lines in the county. The line of the wolves is coached by Dave Jones.

The Clarkston line will have their hands full when they meet Bloomfield this Friday as both teams are tied for 1st place in the league. This will be one of the toughest games of the season for the Wolves. So I am sure the coaches Kenyon, Jones and "Bud M'Grath" will have the Wolves up for the big kill.

A State Highway Department crew has started surveying for an \$80,000 safety rest area on I-75 just north of Clarkston in Oakland County.

The rest area, located between Davisburg and Ely Roads, will serve northbound traffic. It will be the first northbound safety rest area on the freeway north of Detroit.

The area will be between eight to ten acres in size and will have parking for 50 automobiles and 24 trucks. Also included in the area will be drinking water, picnic tables and stoves, an informational bulletin board and telephones.

Work is scheduled to start on the area early next spring.
