## Local Teams Win -- Have Same Records

Clarkston squelched West Bloomfield's title hopes by 20-13. Only Northville stands in the way of the league championship for the Wolves. Both schools have identical records 6 wins and 1 loss.

Clarkston's last football championship was in 1954 when former coach Ed Hintz (now assistant superintendent at Flint Hamady) coached the Wolves to a 5-2 record in the league play.

West Bloomfield scored first on a pass from their all-state candidate Dan Greig to end Jim Smith. Earlier in the game, West Bloomfield was on Clarkston's one yard line, but failed to score due to the tremendous line play of the Wolves.

Clarkston came right back with quarterback Dan Craven scoring from the one. The drive for the touchdown was highlighted by a 40 yard run by John Williams. Clarkston scored in the second period with only 40 seconds left in the first half. The drive covered 88 yards, with Williams running the last seven yards. The drive was aided by a 19 yard run by Dan Jenks. Jenk's total rushing yardage for the game was a vital 54 yards gained in 16 tries. However, the key play in the 88 yard drive was a 40 yard pass from Craven to end Ken Miskin. Miskin caught the ball with a Laker defender crawling all over his back. (Miskin earlier in the game caught a 50 yard pass, but was called back due to a penalty.) Miskin also caught a 27 yard pass in the game.

The third quarter was a defensive struggle marked by many penalties. These included two touchdowns by

John Williams which were called back.

In the fourth quarter, a Laker drive stalled on Clarkston's 28 with John Wilberg making his 2nd key tackle to stop a West Bloomfield drive when they appeared to have the momentum to score six points. After the vital stop by Wilberg, Clarkston marched 72 yards for their third touchdown.

Williams ran for 7 yards, but had to leave the game due to an injury. Randy Armstrong gained only 14 yards for the entire game, but this time on a third down situation, Randy ran for 12 yards for a first down. Dan Jenks ran for a total of 16 yards. Dan Craven ate up most of the yardage on roll outs and eventually scored on a roll out with a fake pitch-out to Williams. Rick Wilson missed the try for the extra point, but was successful on his first two tries.

Leading the stout Clarkston defense was outstanding lineman Frank Miller with seven tackles to his credit. Dan Clement made five tackles, Dave Coulter made three, and Bill Bailey made two. Linebacker Len Bullard led the team with 10 tackles and Jon Gary garnered seven tackles. The defensive secondary was led by Dan Craven with 8, Randy Armstrong with 7 and Ken Miskin with 4. These three, plus John Williams, did a remarkable job in holding the vaunted passing attack of West Bloomfield to only 81 yards.

Those who witnessed last Friday's game saw one of Clarkston's finest football teams. They defeated the sixth ranked team in class B in the state of Michigan. This is not a fluke

team. They are a well-coached ball club which plays a sound, fundamental brand of football.

This Friday Clarkston will play Northville for the league championship. We know head coach Kenyon and assistants Jones and M'Grath will want this win very much to make up for the defeat by Northville last year.

### CLARKSTON JV'S DEFEAT BRIGHTON

Clarkston's JV football team has the identical record of the Varsity squad-six wins and one loss. The only loss was at the hands of Bloomfield Hills 19-12.

The Clarkston JV's are coached by Pete Thompson (a graduate of Clarkston) and Bill Hanson (a former coach at Middleville High School).

In the Brighton victory, Clarkston's passing arm of Dan Fife, pass catching of Scott Galbrith, Rod Allen and Dan Williams and the tremendous running of Ricky Blimka, won the game.

So far this year, Dan Fife has attempted 61 passes and completed 36 for an average of 60 per cent completion. Dan has thrown 12 touchdown passes.

Dan Williams has caught 17 passes for 280 yards and Ron Allen has caught 16 passes for 339 yards.

Ricky Blimka leads the team in rushing with 541 yards and an average of 10.1 yards per carry. Mervin Cox has rushed for 463 yards, with an average of 6.8 yards per carry. Leading the defensive team in tackles is Paul Hoxie with 40 and Cecil Caverly has 33 tackles.

The leading point getters for Clarkston are Ricky Blimka with 39, Rod Allen 30, Merv Cox 27 and Dan Williams 24.

This is a very fine JV football team. They play an exciting brand of football. There is a lot of fine passing and pass catching by the ends and halfbacks, plus fine running provided by Blimka and Cox. So come to the last JV football game on November 5th. It will be Dad's Night and the Junior Wolves will be fighting out with the Junior Mustangs of Northville.

Another accident Sunday evening, October 27, at approximately 6:30 p.m., took place on M-15 south of Seymour Lake Road injuring 4 persons.

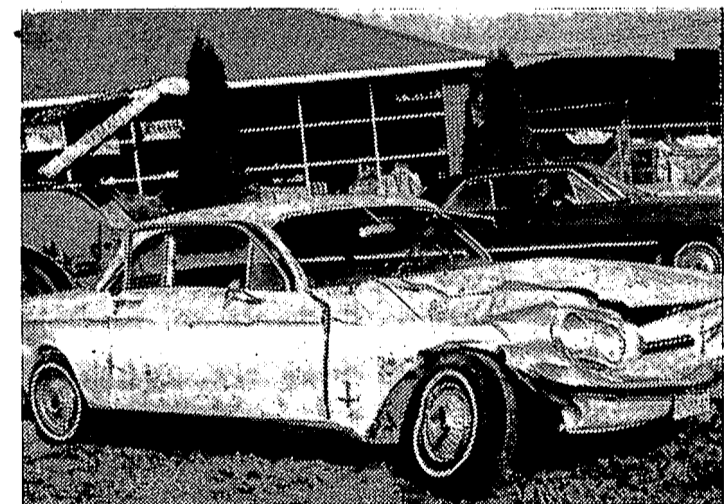

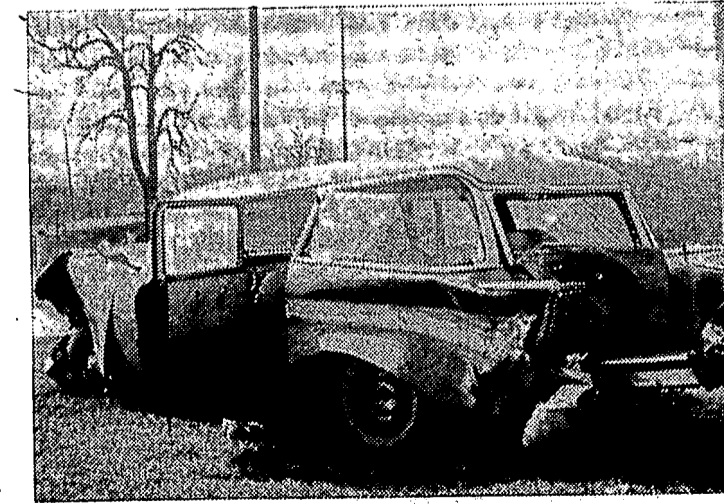
Considerable damage was done to both cars according to police records.

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



**Are Funerals Too High?**

The Michigan Funeral Directors Association has refused to become alarmed over the recent publicity which according to its members "is not representative of funeral service in Michigan."

In a formal statement issued this week, James Sullivan, president of the 800-member state association, called upon funeral directors "to continue to serve your people with honesty and integrity."

"Every profession, in its own time, is subject to periodic review, if not criticism, through the public press. Each profession has been attacked. And each has survived to continue to serve its people," he said.

"Like a doctor or a lawyer, the funeral director must render advice and service which he feels is professionally proper and which meets the needs of his clients," he said, "claims to the contrary notwithstanding."

"We will continue to serve our people to the best of our ability, and when the storm has passed, funeral service in Michigan still will be an individual service directed by a responsible individual."

"Our critics tend to make broad generalized statements which may make for interesting reading, but which too often are not based on facts," he said, and he referred to one author who quotes a 1960 Department of Commerce survey in alleging that the average cost of funerals today is \$1,400.

"No such study was made by that department in 1960," Mr. Sullivan said. "When this has been pointed out to the author, she has casually dismissed her collection of twisted statistics by stating that she is a writer, not an economist."

In 1962 a reputable business firm conducted a study which showed the average adult funeral in Michigan cost \$749. This figure did not include welfare or charity funerals," he said.

He pointed out that the survey covered 98,000 funerals across the nation and was not conducted among specific groups or in any confined geographic area.

"Most of our critics base their attacks on the situations in other states," Sullivan said. "What is true of the west coast, for example, is not necessarily applicable in Michigan, and almost invariably these critics with carefree abandon lump cemetery expenses and flowers in with the cost of funeral service."

"The funeral director as a professional man has no more control over these charges than the doctor has over the cost of the medicines he prescribes. These charges are

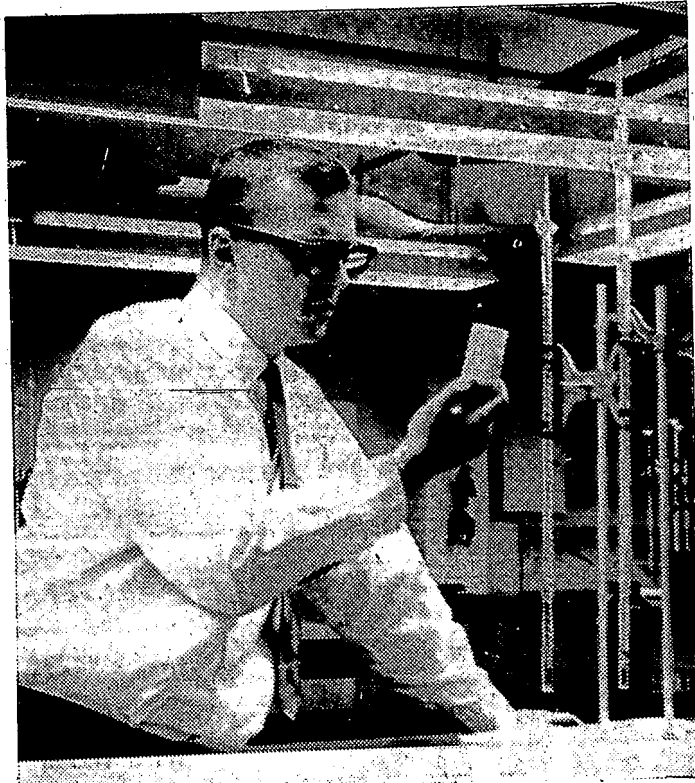

## Fruit Flies for Fish? Sounds Fishy!



Fred Howard

Most homemakers reach for the spray can at the first sight of a fruit, but not attractive Mrs. Fred Howard whose husband raises millions of them in jars in his basement hobby room. Mr. and Mrs. Howard are enthusiastic partners in the unusual business of selling live wingless fruit flies, to aquariums, pet shops and tropical fish fanciers all over the United States and in several foreign countries.

Mr. Howard, who is president of the Flint Aquarist Society, has been a tropical fish hobbyist for many years. At present he is concentrating mainly on the raising of guppies, having about twenty tanks of them. Some of his fish have been irradiated and he is conducting experiments in induced mutations in shape and color.

He started raising live food to feed to his own fish and was convinced of its superiority and of the possibility of selling the food and having his hobby pay for itself. The commercial venture was started in July, 1963.

Calling themselves "Aqua Engineers", the Howards inserted ads in national magazines offering for sale their specially developed live wingless fruit flies, microworms and minute white worms. The response was gratifying. In fact, the business immediately became almost more than they could comfortably handle and, wishing to keep it only as a sideline, they no longer advertise.

Several pet shops in Flint (Rettke's, Marger, Burton Aquarium, Aquarium Center) and others in Ann Arbor and Detroit are Mr. Howard's customers. Pet shops across the coun-

try have affiliated with Aqua Engineers and order live fish food exclusively through them.

A Canadian company, Aqua Engineers, Ltd. has been formed to supply Canadian hobbyists. This will relieve the Howards of the burden of securing special permission from the plant quarantine branch of the government to ship the live food out of the country. They have shipped cultures as far as Argentina.

The fly cultures are grown in cornmeal in small bottles. The flies develop in stages: eggs, larvae, pupae, adult flies. The flies will mate in ten hours after they emerge from the pupae; eggs are laid by the females. Larvae often appear in three to five days, pupae by the seventh. About the tenth day, flies appear. In just a few weeks, one female may produce hundreds of offspring.

A teacher of technical writing and literature at Flint General Motors Institute, Mr. Howard has recently had two articles published in the "Tropical Fish Hobbyist", printed in New Jersey, the leading tropical fish magazine with a circulation of 97,000. His articles, "Indigenous Fish of Michigan" and "Making of a Successful Tropical Fish Society" have won favorable comment from other hobbyists.

On November 2nd Mr. Howard will go to Lake Orion at the invitation of the Frost Pet Shop to talk to a group of 100 persons from Pontiac, Lake Orion, Oxford and Birmingham who are interested in forming a tropical fish society. Mr. Howard, who has conducted a survey and learn what makes a successful club, is well qualified to advise them.

The first item of business to be pressed by the group will be to investigate the possibility of erecting billboard type signs at either end of Ortonville to encourage customers to shop in the downtown area.

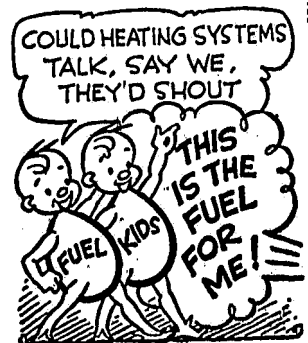

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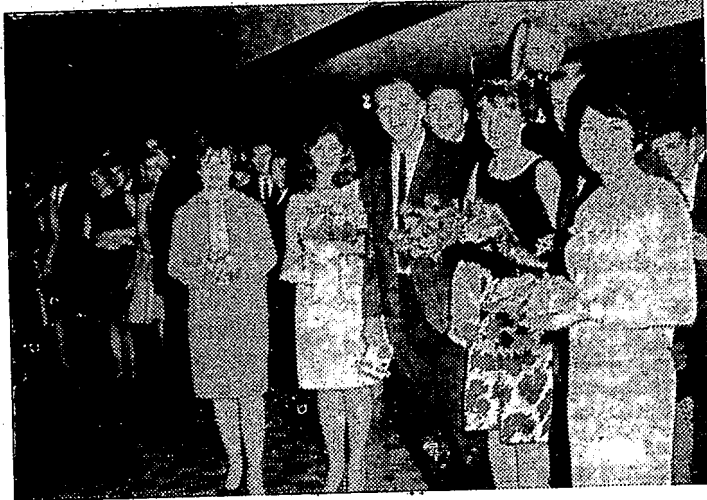

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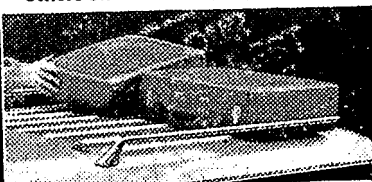
