This is the seventh year of competition for Clarkston in cross country. They ended up with 8 wins and 11 losses, and finished in 4th place in the W.O. County Meet. Many coaches forecasted a much lower standing in the league, but led by their captain and most valuable runner Mike Turek, the Wolves upset the apple cart by coming in 4th place.

Mike led the Wolves by taking an average of 3rd place in all dual meets.

Neil Stacker was Clarkston's 2nd man with an average of 6th place, Bob Cobb was 3rd man with an average of 9th place, Chris Turr was 4th man in 9th place, Bob Kriss 5th man in 11th place and Bob Gray 6th man in 12th place. Dave DeLongchamp was 7th man in 14th place with Rick Funk 8th man, Ron Lippert 9th man and Bob McGurrick 10th man all also in 14th place. Jack Frost, a freshman, was Clarkston's 11th man with an average of 17th place.
