

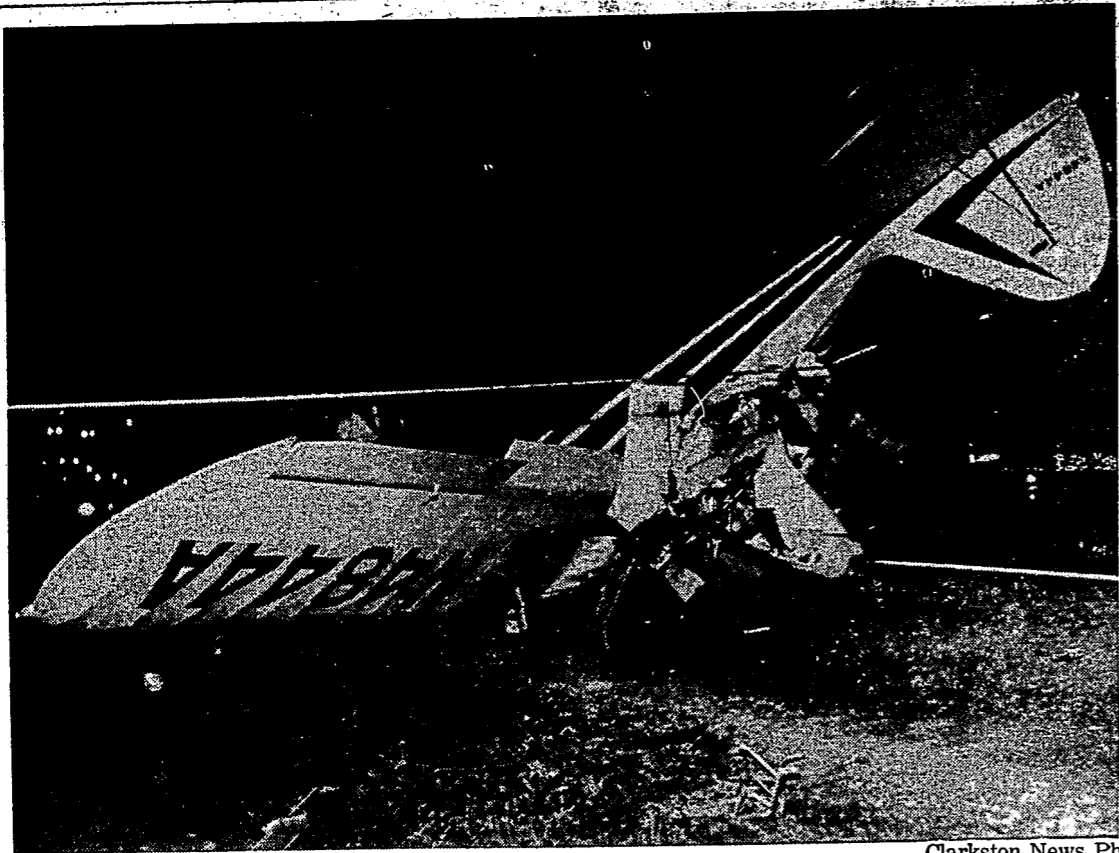

TWO INJURED IN CRASH

Knocks Electricity Out; Starts Grass Fire

An attempted dead stick landing on Dixie Highway caused a Piper PA 22 150 plane to lose its left wing, hit a car and crash in a ditch upside down Sunday evening, November 17.

According to police reports, the plane, piloted by 23 year old Ronald P. Morgan, had evidently run out of gas and was attempting a landing on Dixie Highway south of White Lake Road as the left wing was severed by high tension wires. The plane then hit a northbound car driven by Margaret Hammond of Flint. Mrs. Hammond stated that

the plane came in front of her car, hitting and scraping the hood. The plane then was reported to have hit the ground, flipping on its top into a ditch by Lakeview Cemetery.

Mr. Morgan of 362 Rivera Dr., Pontiac, and his passenger, Edward John Erickson, 28, of 4013 Mortway Dr., Pontiac, were unconscious when police arrived to help them from the plane. Both men were taken to Pontiac General Hospital where they are being treated for injuries sustained in the crash.

Witnesses on the scene were Mr. Peter Wilford of N. Main St., Clarkston and Mr. Ray Butler of Pontiac.

The Mary Chase comedy, BERNARDINE, will be presented by the Clarkston Senior Class in the High School Little Theatre at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, November 22 and 23.

The play, directed by Mr. Lee M. Moore, is happy mixture of Real life with the dream world. It concerns on the one hand the mischievous antics of a gang of teenage boys and, on the other, considers with remarkable insight the serious question of the barrier of understanding between the teenager and his parents.

A highly entertaining feature of the production is the set changes, made by the gang to their own accompaniment of "song and dance".

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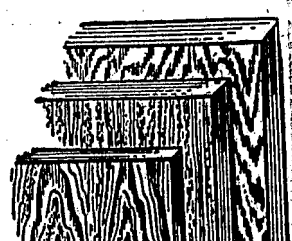
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P-T-A Views Films
