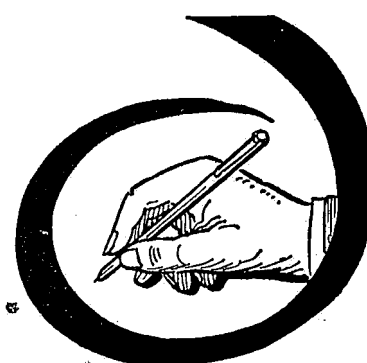

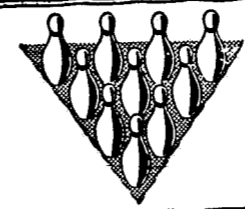

Hal Dobratz had high game of 247-601. Ray Kasat had high series with games of 217-210 for 615.

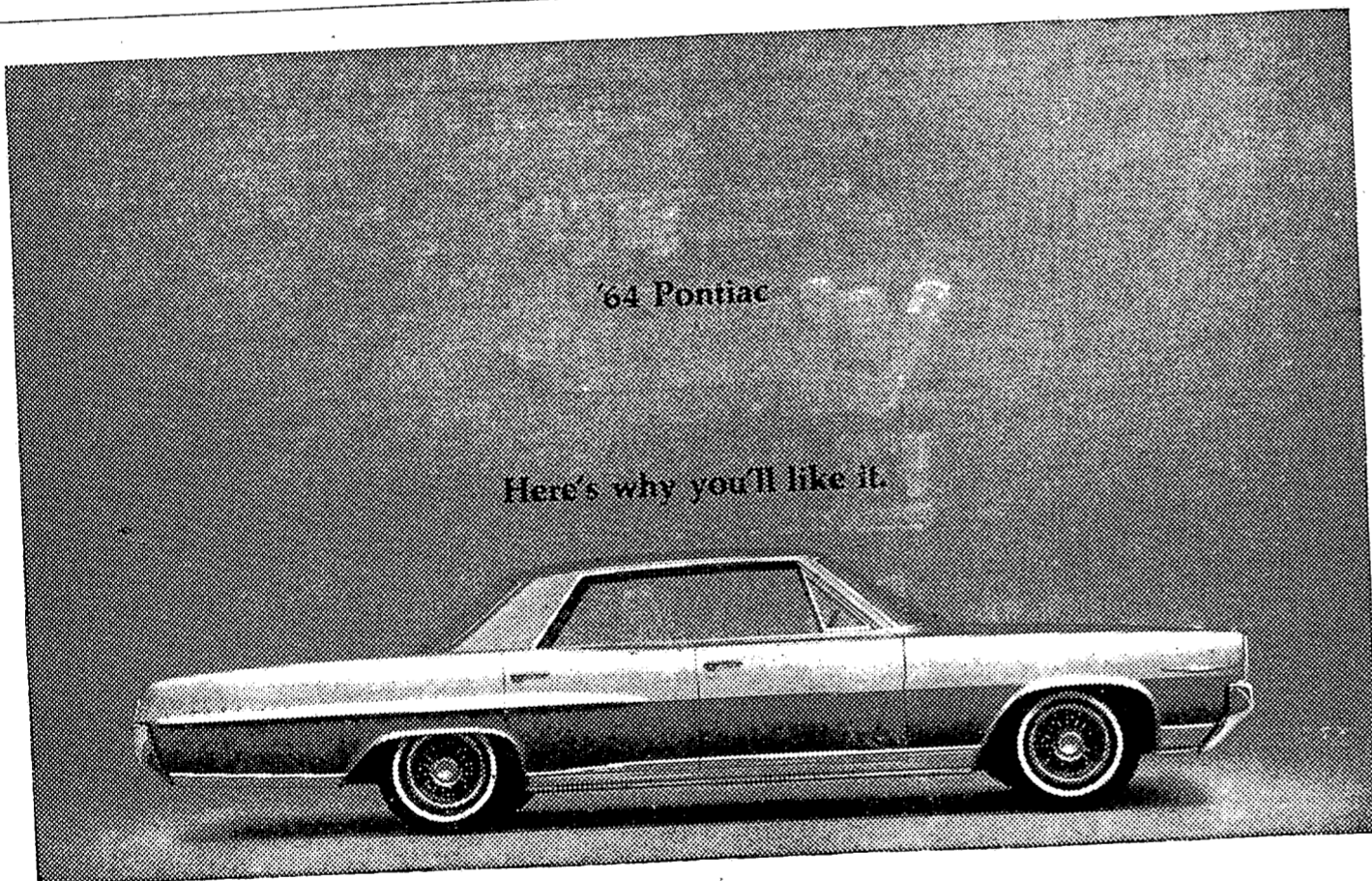
