Review Possible Twp. Problems

Holding its first, yet informal, meeting since its establishment in December of 1963, the Independence Township Planning Commission listened to, and asked questions of, Mr. Donald Skinner of the Oakland County Planning Commission Monday evening.

Attending the meeting and asking many interesting questions of Mr. Skinner was seven of the eight board members.

Mr. Skinner pointed out that Independence Township has a real potential for development facing it.

"Unfortunately I can't hand out any magic wands tonight," remarked Mr. Skinner. "It just takes hard work. There are immediate decisions to be made and also many long range decisions.

"Ask yourselves - what are the

problems facing the township now and what problems are on the horizon," he informed them. "Anticipate a problem before it hits you!"

The Planning Commission is, as the Zoning Board was, an organization formed to consider questions in zoning, planning, etc., and to study the township as a whole and recommend to the township board changes which they feel will benefit the township.

New roads, drainage, re-zoning, policing and sewage are only a few of the problems that may, in time, come before the commission.

Duane Hursfall, Independence Township supervisor, who plans to attend most of the PC meetings, pointed out that the commission has been organized at a good time population wise.

The PC met again Wednesday evening for their first regular meeting to elect officers and to act on a request for rezoning.

Those present Monday evening and their term of office were: Fred Turek - 2 yrs., Irving Fleming - 2 yrs., Harold Bauer - 3 yrs., Gerald Anderson - 1 yr., Del Lohff - 1 yr., Frank Reynolds - 3 yrs., and Joe Rhoades - 3yrs. Not present was Ken Thayer - 2 yrs.

Township officials attending a portion of the meeting were Duane Hursfall, Howard Altman and Ken Johnson. Also in attendance was Howard Kieft of Kieft Engineering.

Local March of Dimes Chairmen Announced

The Independence area 1964 March of Dimes campaign will be headed by Kelly Burnette, 74 E. Washington, Clarkston, area chairman, and Mrs. Constance G. Grubaugh, 8045 Ortonville, according to Al Kaline, campaign chairman. Both he added, are repeating services of past years.

Workers are desperately needed in the Walters Lake and Pine Knob areas. Anyone interested in helping please call Mrs. Grubaugh at 625-0051.

Mrs. Grubaugh commented, "I have been helped a great deal by the March of Dimes, and feel working for it is one small way I can repay the

organization for what it has done for me.

"In the last ten years I have seen many of the wonderful things that have been done by MOD - I just hope I am capable of doing the kind of job that is necessary to support it as it should be done."

In making the announcement of the chairman, Kaline reminded everyone of the even greater need for public support. The March of Dimes has seen the near-complete defeat of polio, and is now launching vast research programs against birth defects and arthritis. New treatment centers, already in operation, and others planned for the near future will provide patient care.

"We are supported entirely by public contribution," Kaline said, "and without continued support, we can offer nothing to the victims of these cripples."

The Independence area has six active patients, with another 11 who are eligible for Oakland County Chapter aid. During the first 10 months of 1963, \$24,264 was spent to assist polio victims in the county.

From My Kitchen To Yours

Dear Homemakers

We thought perhaps the women in this area would like a new recipe occasionally. Here are a few of mine. Soups this week. They are family favorites. Should any of you have a family favorite you would like to share please send them to the Clarkston News, care of Sonja Wilson.

Helpful Hint
Those of you who own tank type cleaners with the oblong disposable bag (hole in the middle) will agree with me, I'm sure, that they do fill up so rapidly. I found that I can use the same bag several times by doing the following:
Cut one of the sealed ends of the bag. Empty contents and re-seal with masking tape. This works fine.

QUICK EASY SOUPS
French Onion Soup
1 Stick Oleo
4 Large Onions sliced
Brown and cook gently
Let cook down be careful not to burn.
Add 2 cans beef consommé
2 or 3 beef bouillon cubes
2 cans water
Simmer
Serve with croutons sprinkle with grated parmesan cheese, or you may add tiny dumplings or floating tiny meat balls.

Soup Kettle Wonder
(no meat)
1 cup dried navy beans
2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 qts. cold water
1 cup dried carrots
1/4 cup shredded green pepper
1 cup canned tomatoes
2 lbs. flour
1/4 cup cold water
2 tbs. butter
2 cups milk
Soak beans overnight. Add salt and simmer until almost tender. Add remaining vegetables simmer 30 minutes, add flour mixed with water,

cook until thick, add butter and milk. Bring to boil and serve at once.

Easy Hot Potato Soup
2 lg. potatoes
2 tbs. onions
2 tbs. butter or oleo
2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. fresh ground pepper
2 cups milk
Peel and slice potatoes and onions, barely cover with cold water add remaining butter, salt and pepper, simmer until tender. About 15 minutes. Mash well with a potato masher (do not drain off water use it).
My family likes a grainy texture, thus the masher instead of sieve. Add milk bring to boil serve at once. Sprinkle with parsley.

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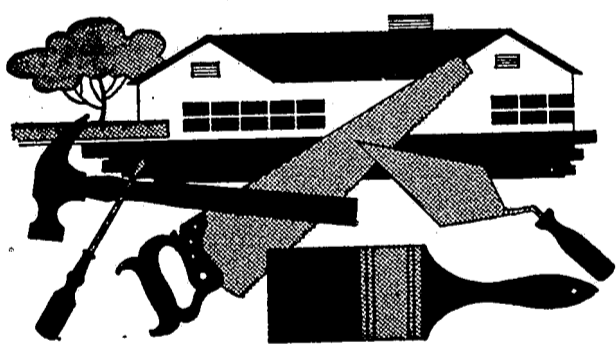
