### Defeat Clarenceville

Clarkston Varsity and Junior Varsity teams still have identical records of 7 and 0. The varsity score was 62-28 and J.V. score was 63-39. Neither game was particularly interesting to watch. The J.V. team won by 24 points, but they played a rather ragged ball game, and in the varsity game, the intention of the Clarenceville team was to simply hold down the score. Coach Leary commented after the game, "It was foolish to run with Clarkston, this method might win the game!"

With this type of play exhibited by the Clarenceville team, it seemed to upset the smooth rhythm of the varsity team, even though Clarenceville was losing by a wide margin.

they still were content in holding down the score. This bothered Miskin, Craven, Bray and Pearson.

Miskin had three baskets nullified due to various infractions, Craven and Pearson were off in their shooting. Bray was in foul trouble in the 1st quarter, Miskin worked like a demon all night, scored only nine points, but worked for 25 points. Craven was high with 15 points, but missed many easy baskets, as well as free throws. Again Mike Bray was instrumental in Clarkston's fast break, for it is Mike who clears the defensive boards and starts the fast break which was so evident in the 2nd half when Clarkston scored 40 points. Freshman Dan Fife was almost high point with 14 points. Ron Lippert came off the bench to replace starter Pearson (how important it is to have bench strength), and playing one of his finer games by scoring 9 points.

With Clarenceville content in stalling the game, Coach Mauti had to employ a full court press, and with fine defensive work of Fife, Miskin and Craven it paid off with rich dividends.

Three teams have tried to slow down the Wolves with their ball control tactics, Clarenceville, Bloomfield Hills, and Brighton, so far they have been beaten by a combined score of 191-106. It will be interesting to note the strategy of the Northville coach this Friday.

Clarkston J.V. expected an easy game against Clarenceville, as a Clarenceville J.V. team hasn't defeated a Clarkston J.V. team for at least the past 6 years. They received more than they bargained for, with Clarenceville leading in the 1st quarter and Clarkston only leading by seven points at half time. With a tougher zone press in the 3rd quarter, they finally broke the game wide open by scoring 18 points. The reserves took over in the 4th quarter and played the remainder of the game.

The J.V. was off in their shooting, by making only 22 shots out of 81 attempts, for a percentage of 25, 33% is only average. They stole many passes, rebounded well, but in turn they returned the ball back to them by committing the same mistakes, which resulted in a ragged ball game.

Rod Allen played his first game by scoring 19 points and grabbing 14 rebounds. Tom Allen scored 9 points, 5 for 5 at the free throw line, but made only 2 out of 21 attempts from the field. Bob Gray scored 8 points; Jim Shannon scored 8 points, with 10 good rebounds. Mike Madison scored 7 points and had 8 rebounds.

Clarkston J.V. team will have their hands full when they meet the fine J.V. team from Northville this Friday. Northville will be doing their very best to knock Clarkston from the unbeaten list!

Clarkston's outstanding young man of 1963 will also be announced. He will be presented with a Distinguished Service Award plaque.

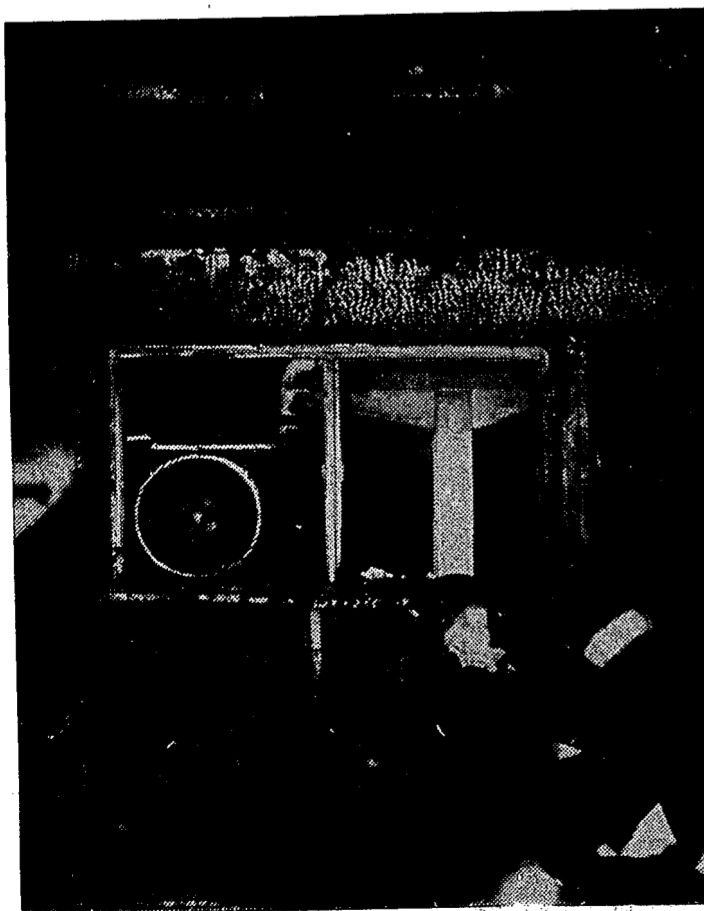

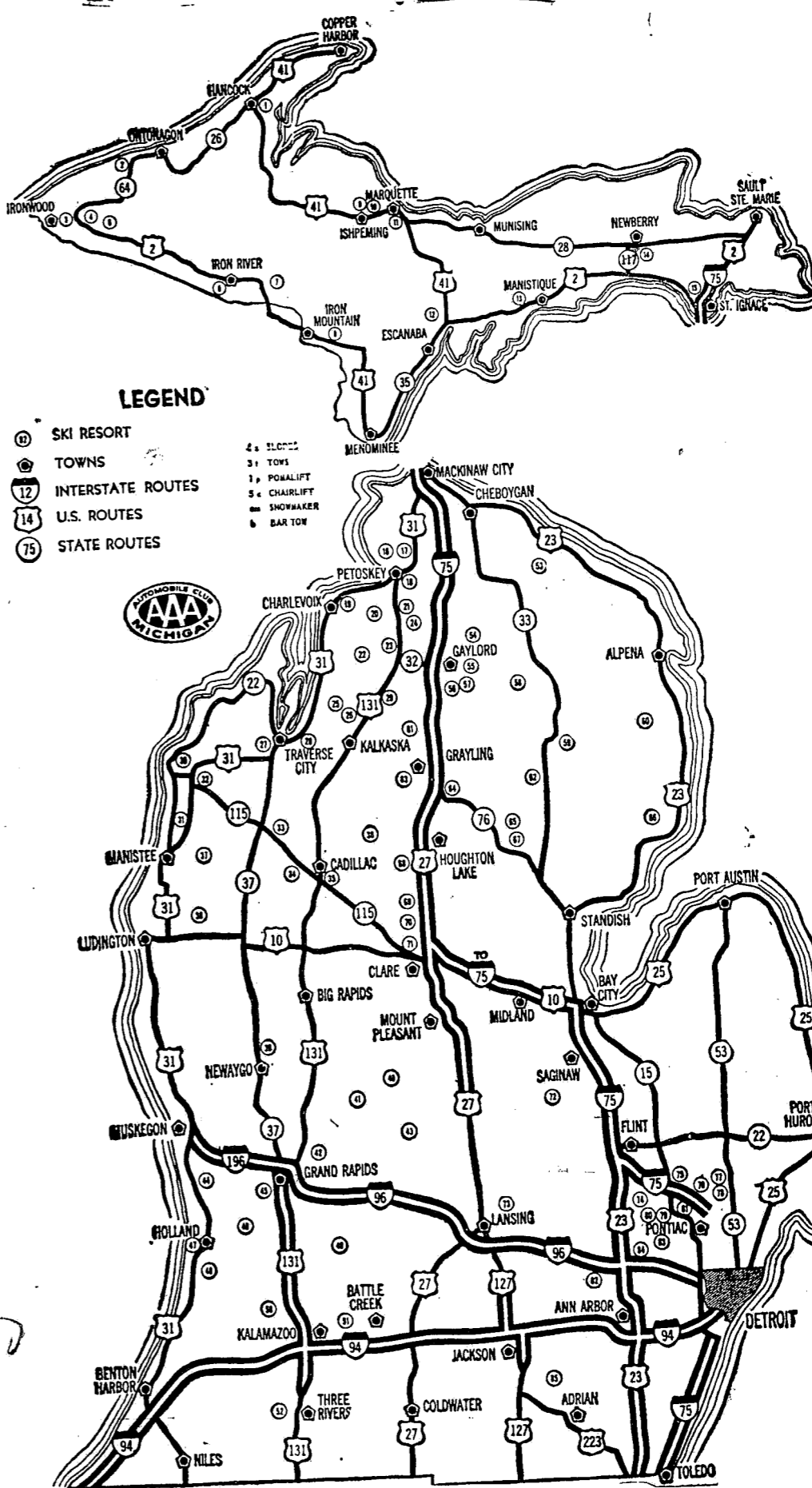

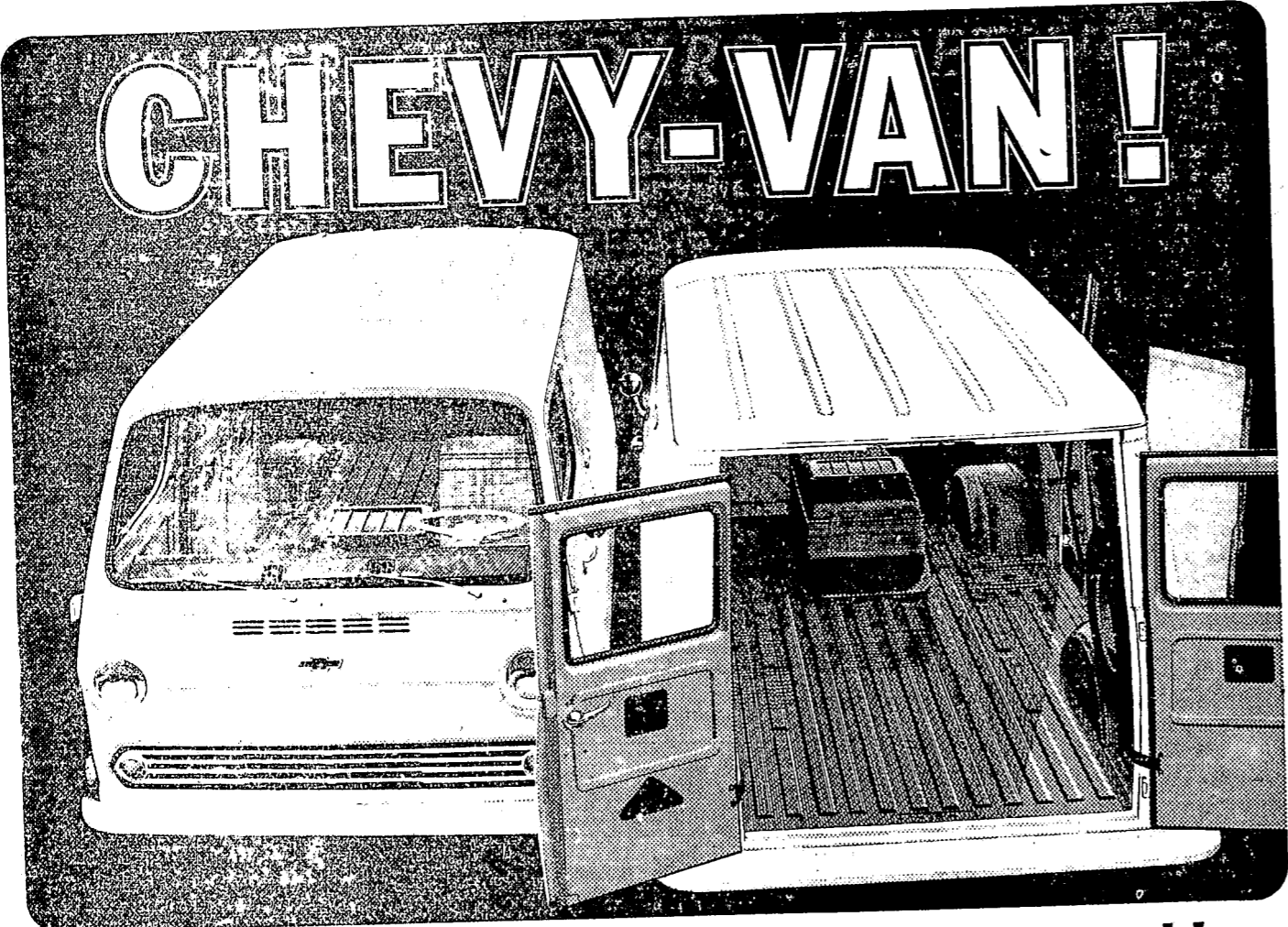

## Teachers To Learn Six Ways To Read

Local primary teachers will have a chance this winter to hear proponents of six different ways of teaching reading explain their methods.

Dr. Harry T. Hahn, director of instruction for Oakland Schools, has announced that experts working with the 44-letter Initial Teaching Alphabet, programmed learning, individualized reading, as well as the basic textbook plus phonics approach are included in a series of conferences entitled "Better Beginnings".

The first, scheduled for 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, January 14, will feature Philip Hilaire, who is instructional supervisor for a Ford Foundation

Research project with the Initial Teaching Alphabet. Hilaire has worked in Great Britain where the 44-letter alphabet devised by Sir James Pitman has been used successfully with five and six-year olds. Hilaire was formerly a reading consultant on the Oakland Schools staff.

No basal readers will be advocated in the second conference. Dr. Walter Barbe, professor of education at Kent State University of Ohio, will explain how first graders can be taught with each child having his own reading materials and his own personal time with the teacher. Dr. Barbe will meet with teachers at 3:30 p.m. in the Bloomfield Hills High School, 4200 Andover Road on Friday, January 17.

### KAY'S KITCHEN KAPERS

Hello Again!

Here is a favorite recipe of mine. It can be prepared in advance and freezes very well. I often make a very large amount and freeze it in clean milk cartons (staple tops).

It is then a simple matter to heat it, cook rice and make a salad on busy days.

#### BEEF STROGANOFF

Cut 2 pounds round steak across the grain into very thin strips. Flour lightly and brown in butter or oleo use a heavy deep pan or electric fry pan add 2 large chopped onions and 1 clove garlic minced cook till onions are transparent. Add a little water cover tightly and simmer for one (1) hour. Blend 1 pint commercial sour cream and 1/2 cup tomato juice. Use 1/2 can tomato paste or tomato sauce if you prefer in place of the juice. Add two cans drained mushrooms and 1 tbs. horseradish. Pour over meat and simmer until fork tender. I prefer fresh mushrooms. If available, these should be browned with the meat and onions.

\*Serve over rice or noodles. With green beans a salad and warm dark rye bread you have a mighty fine meal for six.

#### FEATHER DUMPLINGS

1 1/2 cups flour  
5 tsp. Baking powder  
1 tsp. salt  
Parsley flakes  
Sift above ingredients together  
Beat together  
2 eggs  
2/3 cup milk  
Add to dry ingredients. Drop on hot stew cover tightly cook 15 minutes Don't peek!  
P.S. Dip spoon in stew every time for no sticking.  
I usually arrange to have extra gravy to serve over these dumplings.

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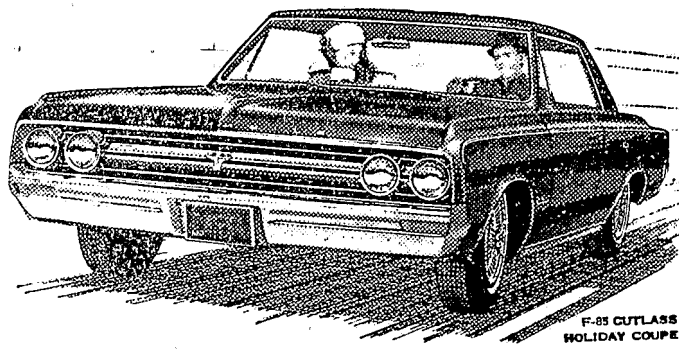
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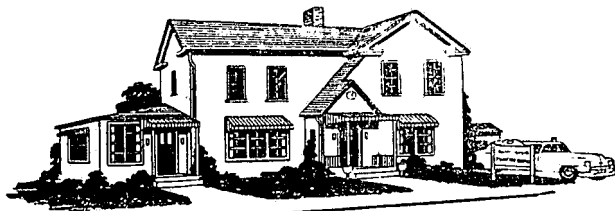


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
