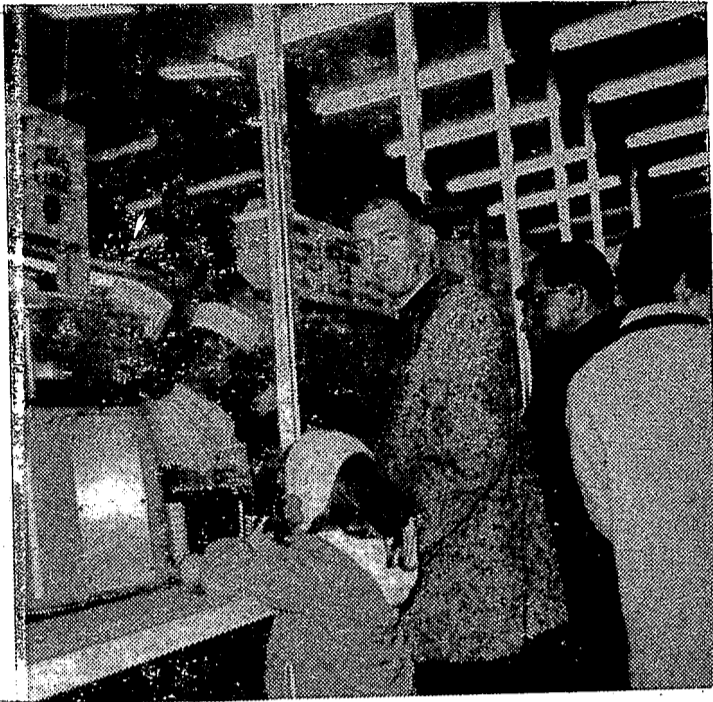

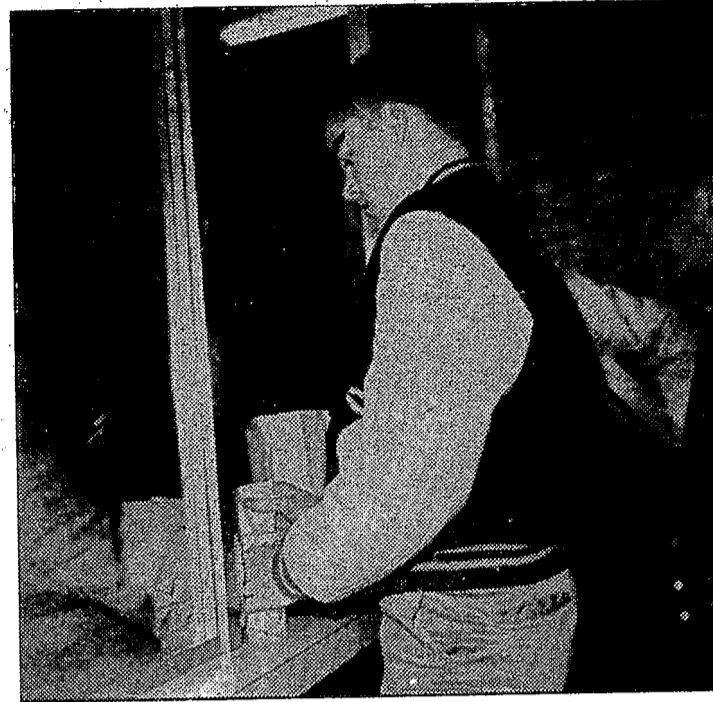

Junior Varsity Score Round-up

Clarkston J.V. ended their season with 14 wins and 2 losses. This is the 3rd J.V. Basketball title in 6 years. Clarkston scored 911 points to 750 points for the opponents. The J.V. took 1102 shots and made 354 for 31%. The J. V. attempted 420 free throws and made 201 for 49%.

Dave Osgood was the top scorer with 178 points. Dave ranks 4th in all time scoring for J.V. Basketball. Rod Allen scored 148 points. Rod also led the team in rebounds with 144. Rod ranks 6th in all time rebounding in J.V. Basketball. Tom Allen led the team with 59 steals and 46 assists. Bob Gray led the team in field goal percentage with 22 out of 47 for 47%. John Holcomb was 2nd with 42%. Chris Torr had best free throw percentages, 9 out of 12 for 75%. Dave Osgood had 63% and King Robinson 62%. Tom Allen played in 58 quarters, Rod Allen 55 and Mike Madison 51. King Robinson, Mike Madison, Tom Allen and Rod Allen played in all 16 games.

Dan Fife played 4 games on the J.V. and scored 93 points, 20 rebounds, and 25 steals. Dan had a 136 for an average of 24.

Seven J.V. Basketball players had the opportunity to play against the Freshman All-Stars. They defeated them three times, by the scores of 54-35, 55-36, and 44 to 42. The All-Stars were coached by

Ralph Kenyon, Jim Davidson, Dave Jones, and Bill Hanson. The J.V. boys were Dan Williams, Bill Ellsworth, John White, Chris Torr, Royce Hyatt, Phil Moon and Dan Addis. Phil Moon led the team in shooting, with 13 out of 25, for 52% Bill Ellsworth led the team with 52 plus points. Dan Williams scored 31 points to lead in that department. Also scoring points were Bill Ellsworth with 28, Phil Moon with 27 Royce Hyatt with 23, Chris Torr with 22, Dan Addis and John White had 9 apiece.

'Bobbins' from Bob

In view of much local concern over possible rezoning of certain parcels of land in the Village of Clarkston, the following information, taken from the Village zoning ordinance, may prove to be of interest to many residents.

Districts zoned 'Residence A' may be used for (1) One family dwellings; (2) Churches and Temples (3) Public and parochial schools and colleges; (4) Libraries; and (8) In any one-family dwelling not more than one room may be rented for use by not more than two persons unless permission is granted by the Board of Appeals to rent two rooms for use by not more than two persons for each room.

Districts zoned 'Residence B' may be used for (1) Any use permitted in 'Residence A' District; (2) Apartment Houses; (3) Multiple Dwellings; (4) Boarding and Rooming Houses; (5) Hospitals, etc.

Twenty-seven students will participate in Clarkston High School's Spring forensics program under the direction of Mr. Lee Moore! The local contest will be held in the Clarkston Little Theater, Tuesday, March 24, beginning at 8:15 a.m.

Forensics includes competition in the speaking areas: Original Oration, the student's own speech delivered without notes; Declamation, the memorization of a speech given by someone else; Extemporaneous, the writing and presentation of a speech on a subject not specifically known until shortly before delivery; Humorous and Interpretative, the reading of a dramatic selection from poetry, drama, novel, or short story.

Competitions to be heard this year are: Interpretative, a scene from Shakespeare's 'Macbeth', Dickens' 'Tale of Two Cities', Benet's 'John Brown's Body', Harper Lee's 'To Kill a Mockingbird', and 'The Diary of Anne Frank'; Humorous, Mark Twain's 'The Local Interviewer',

Marc Connelly's 'Green Pastures', John Patrick's 'Teahouse of the August Moon', Richard Armour's parody of 'Romeo and Juliet' and 'Hamlet', and a selection from Jean Kerr's 'Please Don't Eat the Daisies'. Also a brother, John Pohl of Auburn Heights, a sister and 21 grandchildren.

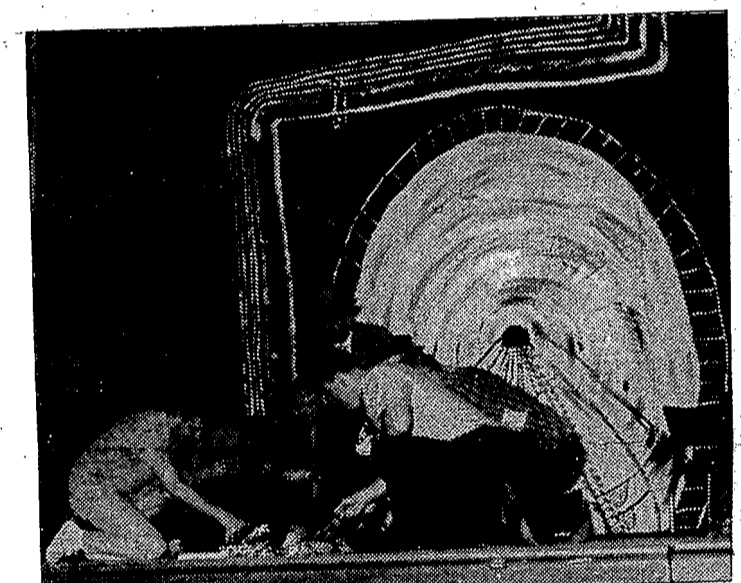
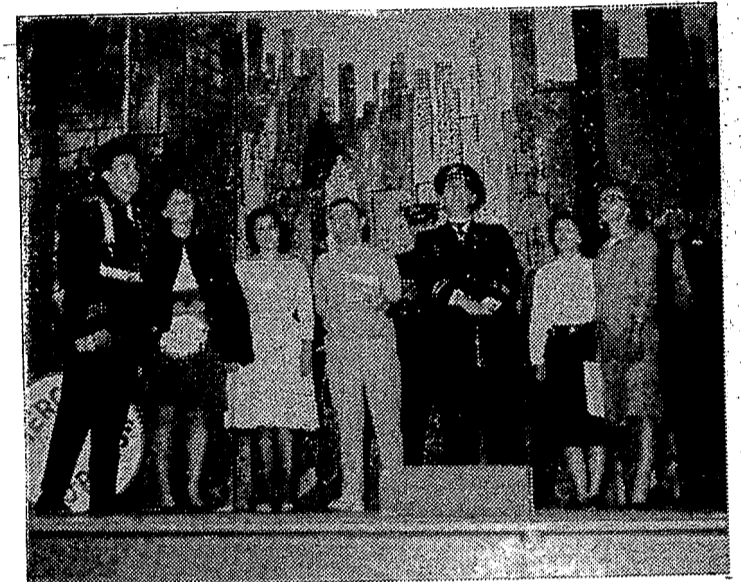
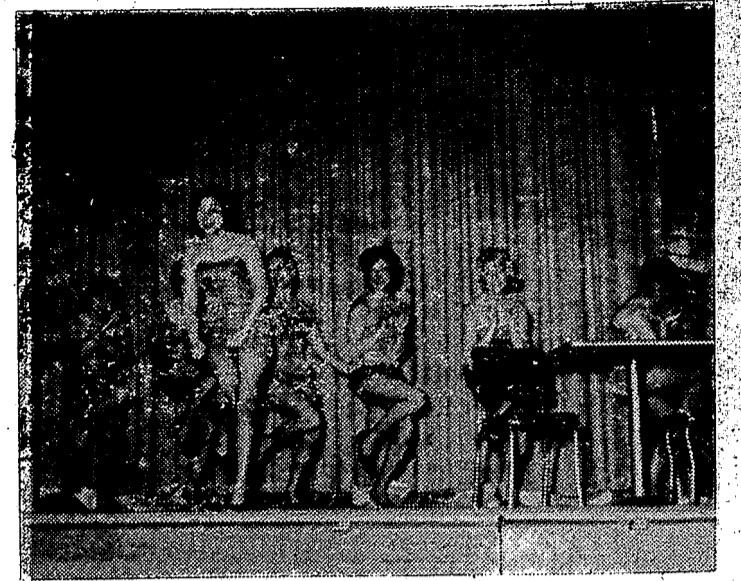

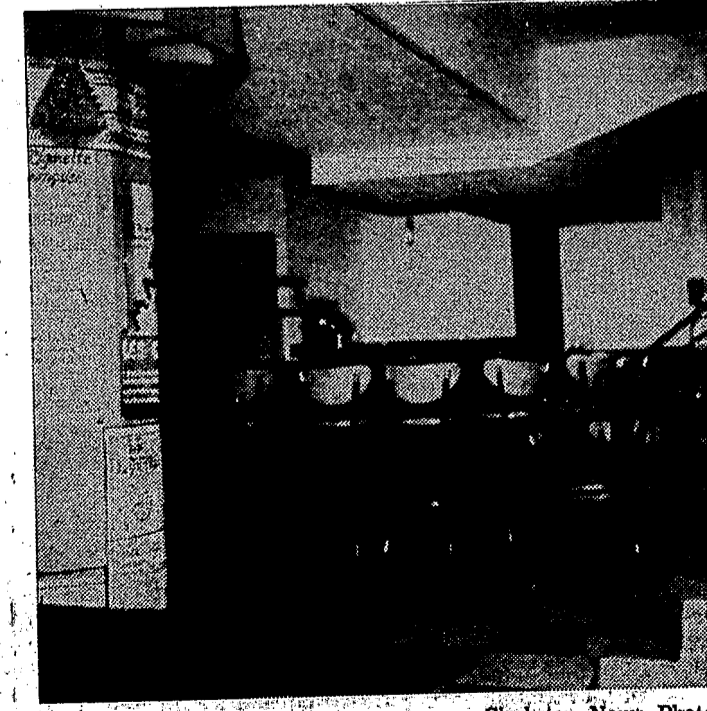

PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE COUNCIL OF CLARKSTON, March 9, 1964

Meeting called to order by President Pro Tem Terry. Roll: Goyette, Terry, Radoye, Beach, Witherup, present. Huttenlocher, absent.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Moved by Goyette, "That the members of the Board of Review receive \$8.00 compensation plus meals."

Moved by Witherup, "That the members of the Election Board receive \$12.00 compensation plus meals." Seconded by Beach. Roll: Goyette, yea; Beach, yea; Witherup, yea. Yeas 4, Nays 0. Motion carried.

Moved by Beach, "That the salaries for the elected village officials for the year 1963-1964 be as follows: Trustees to receive \$5 for each regular meeting attended with no compensation for special meetings; President to receive \$10 for each regular meeting attended with no compensation for special meetings; Treasurer to receive \$400 annually; Clerk to receive \$500 annually; Assessor to receive \$300 annually."

Moved by Beach, "That the Village Engineer take steps to properly mark areas in village that need drain corrections." Seconded by Beach. Motion carried.

A representative from the Oakland County Department of Public Works was present to discuss the Clinton Oakland Sewage Disposal System.

The Village Engineer was instructed to inspect the apartment building under construction on Holcomb Street to verify that it was complying with regulations.

Moved by Beach, "That the following resolution be passed: RESOLUTION DECLARING STREETS AND LANES IN CLARKSTON ESTATES SUBDIVISION, PUBLIC STREETS.

WHEREAS, virtually all the parties of interest, as shown by a title search dated January 23, 1963, prepared by Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation, have executed and delivered "Releases" to the Village of Clarkston, a Municipal Corporation of Oakland County, Michigan, of all their right, title and interest in and to the streets and lanes designated as Middle Lake Road, Overlook Road, Princess Lane and Park Lane, contained within the confines of Section 29, T4N, R9E, Independence Township, Oakland County, Michigan, according to the Plat thereof as recorded in Liber 48 of Plats Page 3, Oakland County Records, for the purpose of making said streets and lanes public; AND WHEREAS, there has been public use of said streets for a

great number of years, and it is to the interest of the public and the Village of Clarkston, that said streets and lanes be made public;

BE IT RESOLVED, that said "Releases" be accepted by the Village of Clarkston, for such purpose, and that the streets and lanes designated as Middle Lake Road, Overlook Road, Princess Lane and Park Lane, contained within the confines of said Clarkston Estates subdivision, be declared forthwith public streets of said Village of Clarkston."

Seconded by Goyette. Roll: Beach yea; Goyette, yea; Radoye, yea; Witherup, yea. Yeas 4, Nays 0.

Motion carried. Moved by Goyette, "That the meeting be adjourned." Seconded by Radoye. Motion carried.
