





# Know Your Michigan Law

By Attorney General Frank J. Kelly (This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney. You may have seen detective

Under the plan, the greatest deviation from the average district population of 411,790 would be 2,090 persons above the average and 1,485 persons below the aver-

Thus the greatest population variance between the smallest district and the largest would be 3,575 persons.

Of the 19 districts, 12 are within 1,000 persons of the average population, and two are within 10 persons. Percentage - wise, the greatest deviations from the average would be 51/100ths of one per cent above the average, and 36/100ths of one per cent below the average. The plus and minus total deviation is less than one per cent.

In addition to being virtually equal in population, the districts are configuous, and they are as compact and as regular as possible while still maintaining primary allegiance to the principle of equal population as directed by the Constitution and the courts.

Again, with equal population as the primary gulding force, the proposed districts disrupt existing districts as little as possible. But the main theme is equal population and not preservation of existing districts.

The lines of local units of government have been respected as closely as possible too, but not at the

expense of equal population. Although congressional districting is a complicated subject, it deserves the closest consideration of every citizen interested in what kind of voice he has in the nation's affairs.

In real life we all know the situation is not this simple. In countrics controlled by the Communits an arrest by the police may very well mean that the percon arrested will never be seen or heard of again. This cannot happen in this country and the "writ" mentioned in these detective stories is one of the important reasons why it cannot happen. It is corfectly known as a writ of habeas corpus and is often referred to as the "Great Writ of Liberty." It truly deserves this title ..

The writ of habcas corpus guarantees to every person, regardless of why he may have been arrested or taken into custody, an absolute right to be taken before a Judger where the police or the person holding the person must show a lawful reason for depriving the person of his liberty. If the police or whoever is holding the person cannot show that they have lawfully detained the person, the Court orders the person released.

Under Michigan law anyone who believes that a person is being unlawfully held by the police may apply to a Judge for a writ of of habeas corpus.

# Symptoms Of Gallstones

In the upper night part of the abdomen is a small pouch called the gall bladder. It is a temporary storage center for bile, and is a part of the digestive system. Sometimes lumps of solid matter composed of bile pigment and salts form in the gall bladder or in the ducts leading to it. These are called gallstones.

There may be only one small gallstone, or there may be hundreds. They can be so tiny that they look like sand or they can be as large as a golf ball. Gallstones occur more often in women than in men. and more ferquently in persons past 40.

Eaxctly why we get gallstones is still somewhat of a puzzle. They are generally thought to be the result of changes in composition of the bile,, or stagnation of the bile. or infection. Poor eating habits may be a factor.


Gallstones often lay quietly in the gall bladder or bile ducts. But if a large stone starts to move, you'll know immeliately that something's wrong. The pain will be severe, and will cause the sufferer acute agony. The attack may be over in a few minutes or it may last for days. Sometimes it becomes mildly chronic and may be interspaced with acute episodes.

Of course, not all sharp pains in the upper right abdomen are from gallstones. Only your doctor can tell with proper diagnostic techniques.

Gallstones sometimes are called a penalty for living the good life. as they may be associated with rich foods and fats in the diet. Doctors often recommend plenty of water and outdoor exercise, such as golf and gardening.

You can't diagnose gallstones yourself. Your abdominal pain may or may not originate in the gall bladder. Let your doctor decide, and recommend treatment.
