## Local Seniors Participate in Student Teaching Program

A record number of Western Michigan University seniors are currently preparing for careers in the teaching profession, according to Dr. A. L. Sebaly, director of student teaching and professor of education at the university. Nearly 750 are now taking part in the student teaching program in southwestern Michigan schools during the spring semester.

Under the direction of experienced teachers in the cooperating school systems, the WMU seniors are getting on-the-job practice in their subject specialties. The full semester of training, Dr. Sebaly noted, permits the students to find out which phase of teaching interests them most before signing contracts. He pointed out that an ever-increasing number of students are taking training in special education, which includes the teaching of crippled and homebound children, emotionally disturbed, mentally handicapped and those with speech defects.

Dr. Sebaly extended a special note of appreciation to public school administrators and teachers who are assisting in the student teaching program. "Their help is invaluable to our future teachers," he said.

## Methodist's Launch Campaign

Dr. Carl A. Bergsten of the Division of National Missions of the Methodist Church, Department of Finance and Field Service, Philadelphia, Pa., has arrived in Clarkston to conduct a Crusade for Christ in connection with the raising of funds for debt retirement on the recently constructed edifice and for the purpose of constructing an educational unit as an addition to the present building. Dr. Bergsten spoke at both services of the First Methodist Church in Clarkston on Sunday, his topic being "The One Place You Dare Not Fail." He will speak again on Sunday, April 26th, on the subject "God Loveth a Hilarius Giver."

Dr. Bergsten has been a minister of some of the leading Methodist Churches in Connecticut, New York and Missouri. He was born in Kansas, is a graduate of Central Methodist College in Missouri, has his B.D. degree from Yale University Divinity School and his D.D. from

Central Methodist. He has also studied at Edinburgh University, Scotland. Dr. Bergsten has traveled to and visited missions in Europe, Asia, North Africa and South America. In 1951 he was an ecumenical exchange minister in Great Britain, returning again in 1961 to preach while enroute to the World Methodist Conference in Oslo, Norway. He has attended three such conferences as an official observer or a delegate.

Dr. Bergsten is a member of the Masonic Order, Rotary International and an advisory member of the Salvation Army. Harold J. Bauer of Middle Lake Road has been named Chairman of the Fund Drive. He will be assisted by the Reverend Louis Sutton, minister of the church, the Building Fund Committee and others totaling about 200 persons. The goal has been set at \$125,000 and is to be paid over a three year period. Committees and the various

groups will be meeting throughout the week. A high-light of the Crusade will be the Prayer Vigil which will begin at 12:00 Noon on Saturday, April 25th, and continue until 6:00 P.M. All members and friends of the Methodist Church are invited to participate in the vigil which will be conducted in half hour intervals.

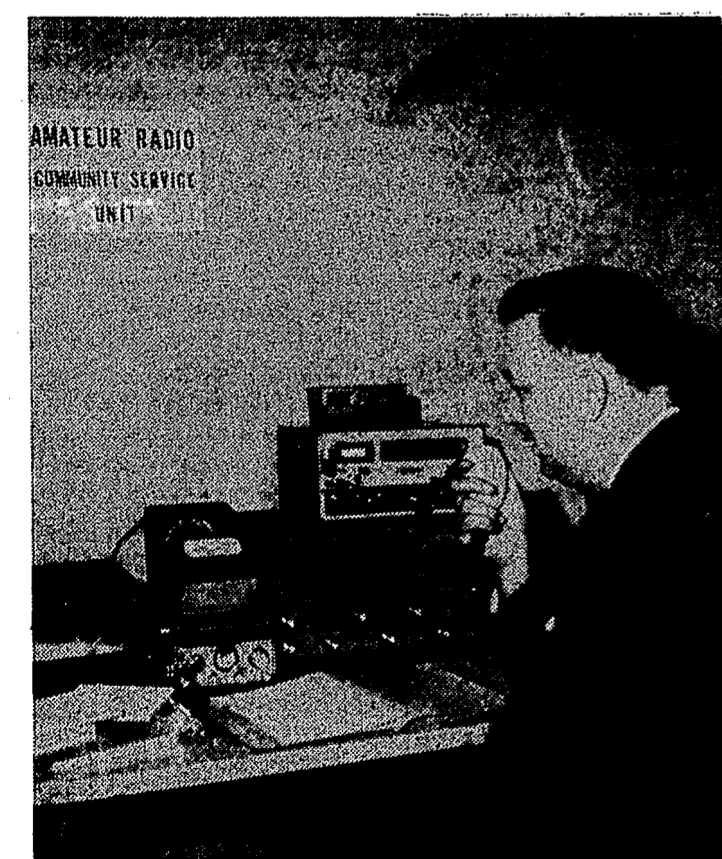

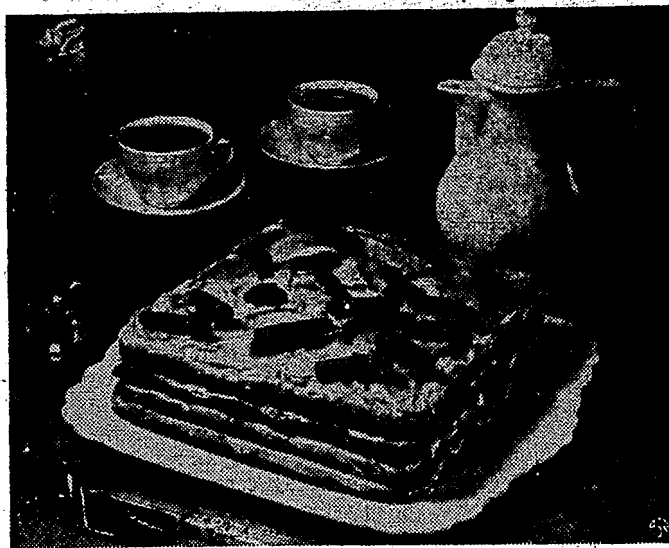

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**Chocolate Pastry Cake**

2 packages (4 oz. each) Baker's German's Sweet Chocolate  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
1/2 cup water

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
1 package (10 ounces) pie crust mix  
2 cups heavy cream

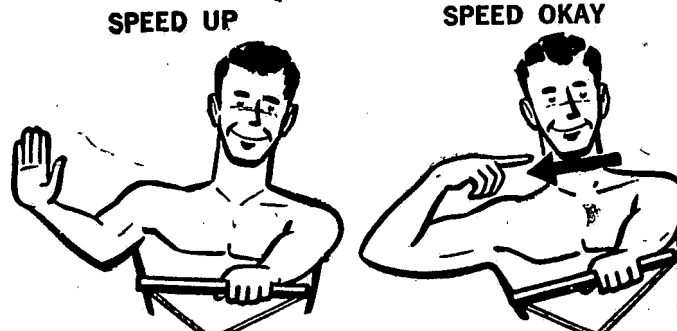
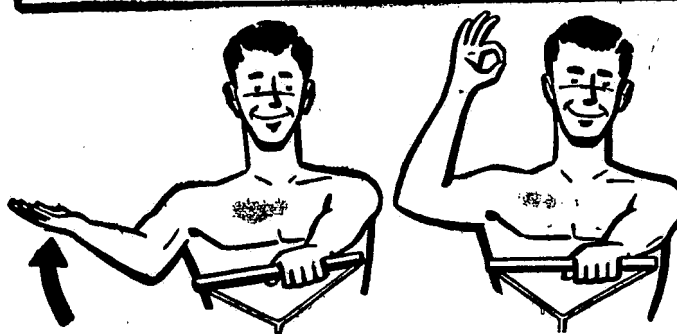
Remove wrapper from one end of a bar of chocolate. Using a vegetable peeler, dipped in hot water frequently, shave 8 squares of chocolate into curls or shavings. Set aside to use as garnish.

Break up remaining chocolate and combine with sugar, water, and cinnamon in small saucepan. Cook and stir over low heat until sauce is smooth. Remove from heat; add vanilla. Cool to room temperature.

Then blend 1/4 cup of the chocolate sauce into the dry pie crust mix; divide into 4 parts. Press or spread each part over the bottom of inverted 8- or 9-inch square pans to within 1/4 inch or more of the edge. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 6 to 8 minutes, or until pastry is almost firm. Remove from oven. If pastry has spread over edge of pan, trim with a sharp knife. Cool pastry layers just until firm—about 5 minutes. Then carefully run knife under layers to loosen from pans. Place on racks to cool thoroughly.

Whip the cream just until soft peaks will form. Fold in the remaining chocolate sauce. Spread between and over the top of layers. Garnish with the shaved chocolate. Chill at least 8 hours or overnight, or store in freezer. Makes 12 to 16 servings. Note: To freeze cake, place in freezer uncovered until firm; then cover and store in freezer. A few hours before serving, place cake in refrigerator to thaw.

**Boating Tips...**



Since much of the fun of water skiing depends on the boat driver's skill, the Mercury outboard people offer these suggestions to tow boat skippers: 1) Watch for worn or tangled tow lines and check all ski equipment periodically for damaged parts. 2) Know the skier's hand signals: moving hand in lifting motion, palm upward, indicates "faster," downward, "slower." Thumb and forefinger forming a circle means the speed is right. Hand up, palm outward, means "stop." Slashing motion across the throat means "cut the ignition." 3) Have an observer with you in the boat to watch the skier and relay messages (this is the law in some states). 4) Night skiing is dangerous and many states prohibit this practice. 5) When the skier is preparing for a takeoff, he will call "Take it up slow." Proceed very slowly, taking up the slack in the tow rope. When he calls "Hit it!", accelerate steadily, but not too fast, until the skier is up and planing. 6) When picking up a fallen skier, shut off the motor. 7) To put the rope back in the hands of a fallen skier, drive around him in a half circle and let the rope drift into him.

**Campaign on to Reduce Traffic Fatalities**

Emphasizes traffic safety!

With the death toll on the highways continuing at a pace that may make it the worst in Michigan's history, the traffic and safety committee of the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police has urged all chiefs to join in an emergency "Emphasis Traffic Safety Program" to hold down accidents.

In a communication to Chief of Police Robert Phillips of Clarkston, Chief Arthur Pears, of Niles, association president, has asked for

wholehearted cooperation in a state-wide traffic law enforcement and education campaign to reduce the toll.

"We are eager to take part in the program," Chief Phillips said, "and in addition to our officers exerting every effort possible in the enforcement of the violations that are causing the accidents, we are calling upon the public to be alert to the situation we are confronting and be more vigilant than ever in driving safely."

"Our effort goes along with that being made by the State Police. The State Police have already been put on a six-day week by Commissioner Childs for the month of March, following a request by Governor Romney, who is gravely concerned about the situation. He has called it a traffic accident emergency.

"Accidents cannot be halted unless the enforcement efforts of the police are supported by civic organizations and the citizens generally. For this reason I enlist the aid of every civic organization in our community to present programs on traffic safety and am asking drivers for complete cooperation in reducing this terrific toll."

Chief Robert Phillips pointed out that State Police Analyst Orrin Lucas has said that traffic fatalities in the state are already 41 per cent higher than they were at the same time last year. If the present trend continues Lucas estimates that 2,625 persons will be killed on Michigan highways this year, approximately 750 more than were killed on Michigan highways this year approximately 750 more than were killed in 1963, and the worst death toll in the state's history.

Hogson arrives on the scene looking for his daughter. He doesn't speak French and the interpreter and the inspector don't speak English. How will he ever find his daughter.

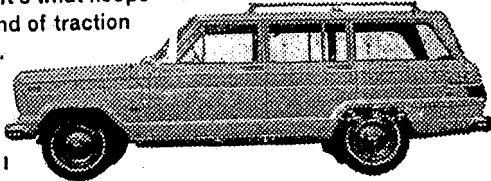
