Romney Reports

Many readers may already be aware of some of the things the state is proposing to do for the mentally retarded, but I am sure many of them do not realize what all of these programs add up to.

In terms of its scope, of its size, and of its departure from past approaches to the problem, the program for the mentally retarded which is now under consideration by the Legislature the most extensive in the history of the state. The size of this program is fully

justified by the size of the problem. As of now, more than 1,800 patients are waiting for admission to state facilities for the retarded. Although hospital space for the

retarded has expanded in past years, it has not expanded fast enough to keep pace with the demand for service. If Michigan is to meet the chal-

lenge of serving its retarded children, the challenge must be approached on several fronts. The program I have presented to the Legislature accomplishes this. First, I have asked the Legisla-

ture to appropriate \$269,000 to finance eight outpatient clinics at each of the eight hospitals now caring for the retarded. These clinics at each of the eight hospitals now caring for the retarded. These clinics will provide diagnostic and evaluation services for the retarded and their families.

Secondly, I have proposed the establishment of a network of field workers operating in communities throughout the state. Their primary function would be to provide immediate emergency service to all

newly identified cases of mental retardation Third, I have recommended estab-

lishment of a network of day care centers to provide training to severely retarded patients at the community level. This would provide a workable alternative to sending children into permanent exile from their families.

Fourth, I recommended that we move toward the establishment of a series of community mental retardation centers located in the larger urban centers. These would provide a program of intensive diagnostic services and short-term in-patient treatment aimed at the correction of immediate physical or intellec-

Already approved by the Senate are projects totaling \$4,020,000 which will add 920 beds for the care of the retarded. They include a 200-bed toddlers' unit at Mt. Pleasant, two toddlers' units, an outpatient wing. habilitation unit, a building for the blind, a laboratory building and other units at the Plymouth Home and Training School.

In addition, the House has increased from \$12 to \$14.5 million the amount of state aid which can be earmarked for special education. The impact of this increase will be very great when you add to that sum the matching funds which will be made available for these pro-

Altogether, these programs represent the largest amount of money ever recommended for the care of the mentally retarded.

But beyond that, they comprise a bold departure from the "out-ofsight, out-of-mind" philosophy which has dominated the care of the mentally retarded for years.

Know Your Michigan Law

The advent of the supermarket has carried with it a tremendous increase in the sale of prepackaged foods. As a result, the housewife in purchasing the groceries for her family must rely upon the advertising and labels of the seller as to the contents of each item. Unfortunately, what is indicated as being inside a particular package is not always so.

Recently, a businessman, with the idea of giving his family a treat, purchased several frozen turkey dinners at the neighborhood market. The label on the outside showed three large slices of white meat embedded in delicious looking dressing, with gravy, potatoes and a vegetable. After heating this according to the directions on the package and sitting down to what they suposed would be a most enjoyable meal, each found that instead of a large portion of white meat each package contained one very small thin slice of white meat, a similar slice of dark meat with no dressing, and no extra portion

Fortunately for the public, this particular individual was acquainted with the pure food laws and immediately brought this to the attention of the Foods and Standards Division of the Michigan Department of Agriculture. An immediate investigation was launched and, as a result of a sampling taken throughout the state, 60,000 cases of this particular brand of frozen turkey dinners were confiscated. As a result the processor has since changed his label to conform with the contents and thus truthfully inform the public

The lesson to be learned is that the buying public need not feel that they have nowhere to turn should they believe that they are not receiving their "money's worth." The Consumers Fraud Division of the Attorney General's Office and the Foods and Standards Division of the Michigan Department of Agriculture are set up specifically for the purpose of protecting the public from frauds and cheats.
