The Village of Clarkston Ordains: Section 1. That Ordinance No. 34, as above entitled, together with the map attached thereto, be and the same is hereby amended to rezone from Residence "B" District zone use to Residence "A" District zone use, as set forth in said Ordinance No. 34, as amended, the following described premises:

Lots 1 through 10 inclusive of "Supervisor's Replat of Northwestern Addition" and part of Original Plat being a subdivision of part of the South 1/2 of Sec. 20, T4N, R9E, Village of Clarkston, Oakland County, Michigan, as recorded in Liber 52, Page 19 of Oakland County Plats.

Lots 1 through 35 inclusive of "Supervisor's Plat No. 1" being a subdivision of part of Sec. 20, T4N, R9E, Village of Clarkston, Oakland County, Michigan, as recorded in Liber 52, Page 20 of Oakland County Plats.

Lots 5 and 6 and that part of Lots 7, 8, and 9 lying within the Village limits as recorded in "Brookshire Downs Subdivision" a subdivision of part of the NW 1/4 of Sec. 20, T4N, R9E, Village of Clarkston and Independence Township, Oakland County, Michigan, as recorded in Liber 89, Page 9 of Oakland County Plats.



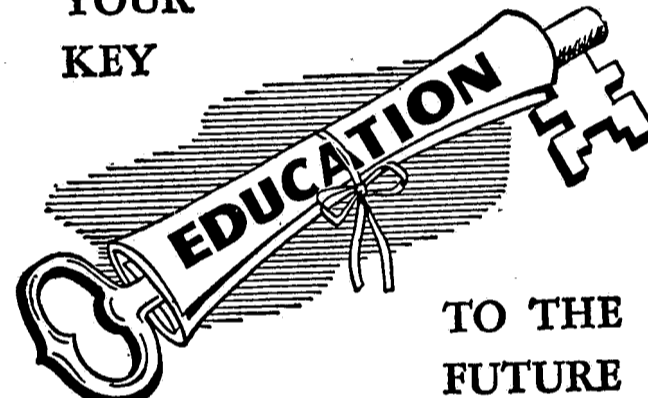

Ronald T. Young, builder first class, USN, son of William Young of Maceday Lake Road, Waterford, was graduated April 17, from the Naval School, Explosive Ordnance Disposal, on the U.S. Naval Propellant Plant, Indian Head, Mo.

This school is the only U. S. Armed Forces School providing training for specially selected officers and enlisted men of the Navy, Army, Air Force and Marine Corps in the recovery and disposal of all types of explosive weapons, both foreign and domestic. It includes explosive ordnance dating from the cannon ball and wooden key mine of the Civil War to the present day guided missile with its atomic or thermonuclear warhead.

Young has received orders to the Naval School, Explosive Ordnance Disposal at Indian Head, as an instructor.

He entered the Navy in June 1955.

Robert J. Vargo, shipfitter fireman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Julius Vargo of 5424 Cecelia Ann, Clarkston, visited Naples, Italy April 25-30 aboard the attack transport ship USS Fremont operating with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.

She is scheduled to return to Norfolk, Va., in mid-June.

Don't Be Another

Water Statistic

The summer swimming season is here again. If past averages hold, somewhat more than 6,000 Americans will die. Most of these drownings could be avoided.

The basic rules of water safety should be well known to everyone old enough to read; they are repeated each season by health and safety organizations throughout the nation. And yet most drownings occur when someone has violated one of the safety rules.

There are the fundamentals -- Never swim alone; Don't swim just after eating or when overly tired; Don't overestimate your ability and endurance; Swim at protected pools or beaches under the supervision of a trained lifeguard; If a boat overturns stay with it and don't try to swim a long distance to shore; Never dive into unknown waters.

Know about artificial respiration and how to apply it. The mouth-to-mouth method is explained in the First Aid Manual of the American Medical Association. It's not very difficult -- Start immediately, the victim can survive without oxygen to the brain for only a few minutes; Put the victim on his back, pull the chin well up, make certain the windpipe is clear; Put your mouth over the victim's mouth, pinch shut his nose, and blow hard; Repeat 12 to 15 times per minute; Keep it up until medical help arrives.

Private pools are gaining rapid favor in the United States. If you have a pool, or use a neighbor's, there are certain safety fundamentals -- Is the pool kept clean and the water chemically purified? Walk, don't run, about the pool, and be careful with horseplay; Fence the pool and keep the gate locked to keep out small children; Keep rescue equipment such as long poles and ring buoys handy; Keep bottles and glasses away from the concrete pool deck.

Are all in your family or household good swimmers? If not, arrange lessons at the YMCA or somewhere else in which qualified instructors conduct classes. Many drownings occur among non-swimmers fine sports that are drawing fresher course even for good swimmers.

Record Dean's List

Reported For Winter Term

More than one third of the 1,279 students enrolled at Oakland University during the Winter Term achieved honor grades.

Among the 476 students on the Dean's List were 145 freshmen, 43 sophomores, 81 juniors and 207 seniors.

Classification of grades placed the honor students in one of three categories. University Scholar -- grade point average of 3.9 or higher, with no grade below 3.0. Student of Great Distinction -- grade point average of 3.50 to 3.89, with no grade below 3.0. Student of Distinction -- grade point average of 3.0 or higher, and completion of three or more courses.

There were 13 freshmen, two sophomores, 12 juniors and 35 seniors named University Scholars. Students of Great Distinction included 30 freshmen, seven sophomores, 21 juniors and 69 seniors. In the Stu-

dents of Distinction class there were 102 freshmen, 34 sophomores, 48 juniors and 103 seniors.

There were four on the Dean's List from the Clarkston area, and three from the Orionville area.

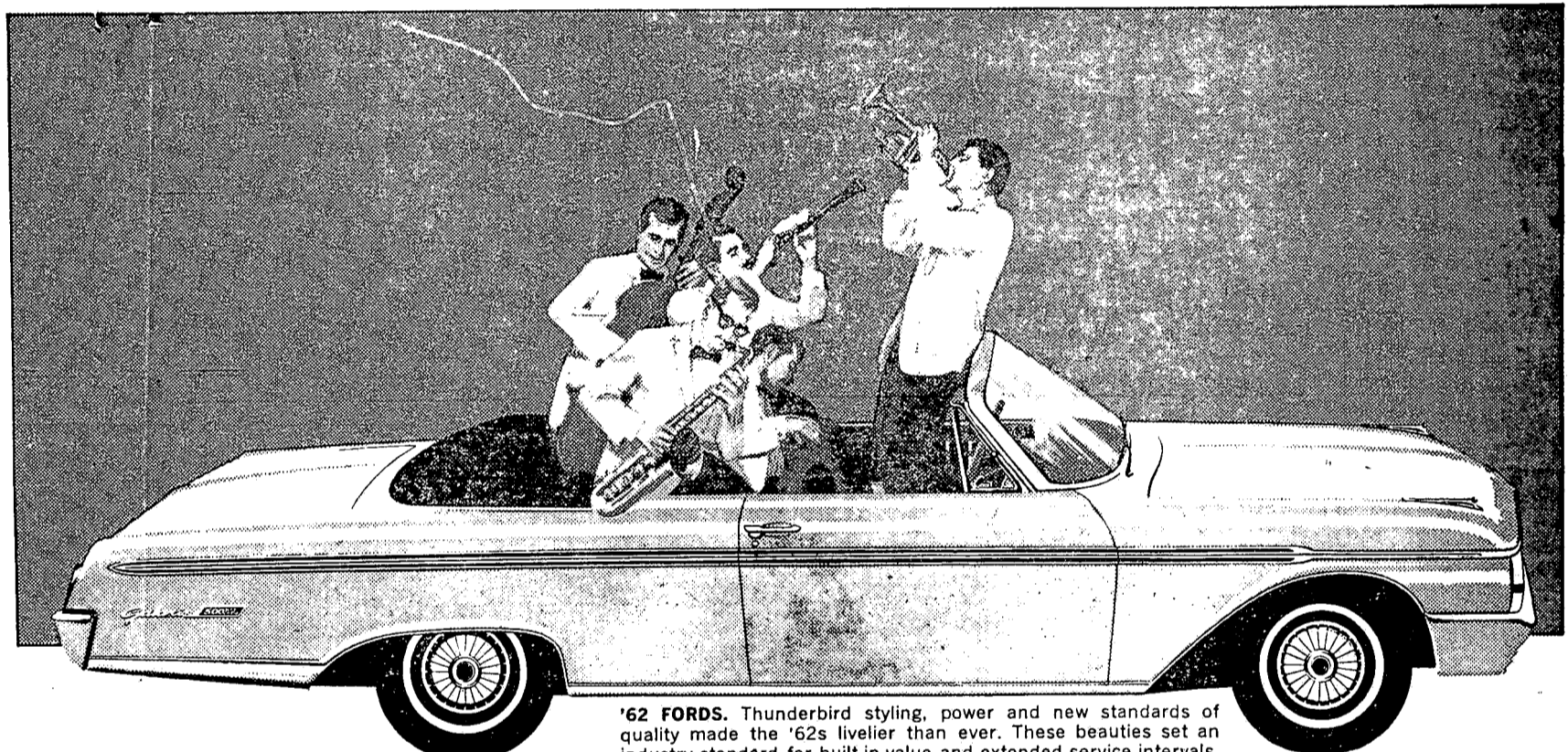

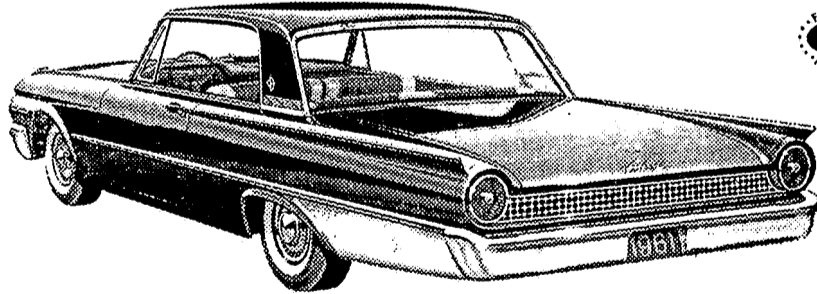

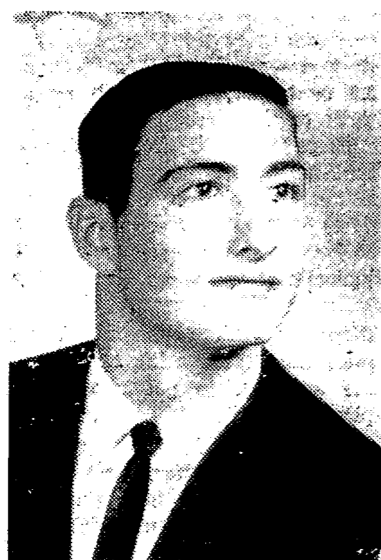
C. DeLorge Receives Four Honors Senior Citizens Honored
