

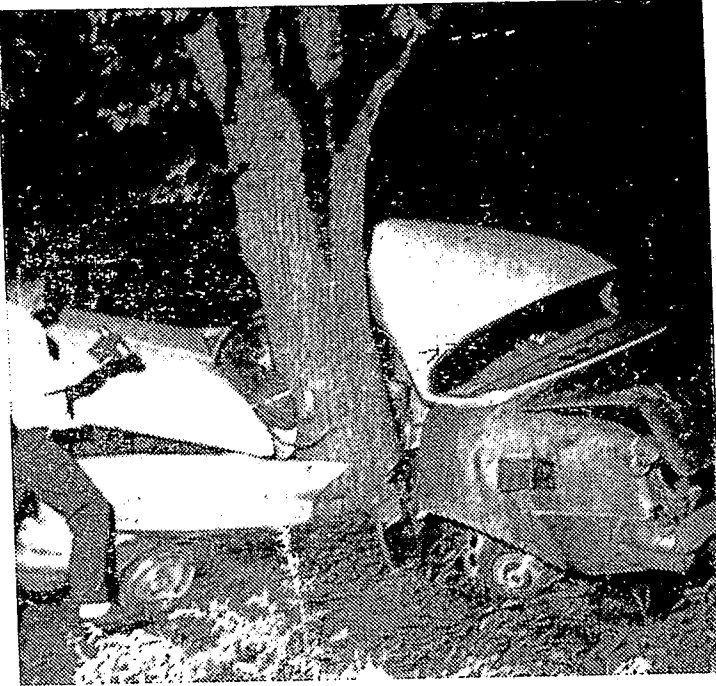

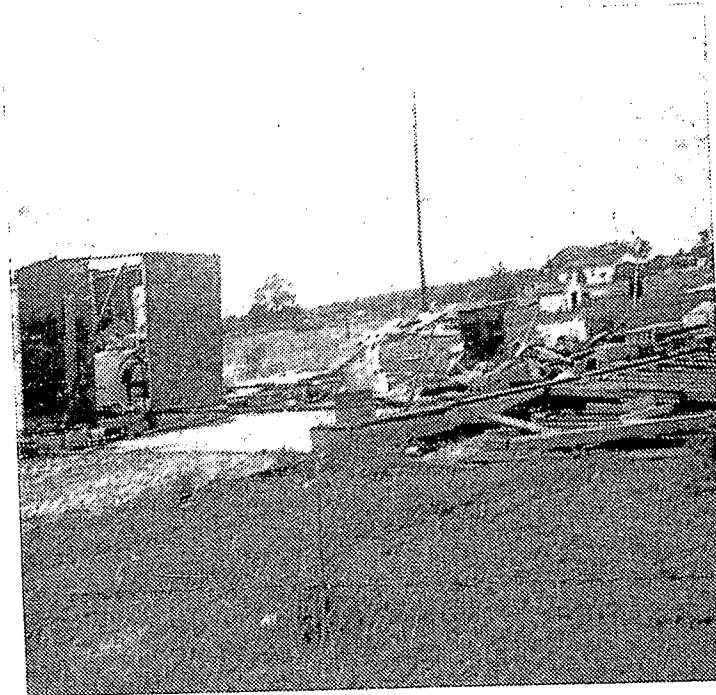

High Winds Raise Havoc In Local Area



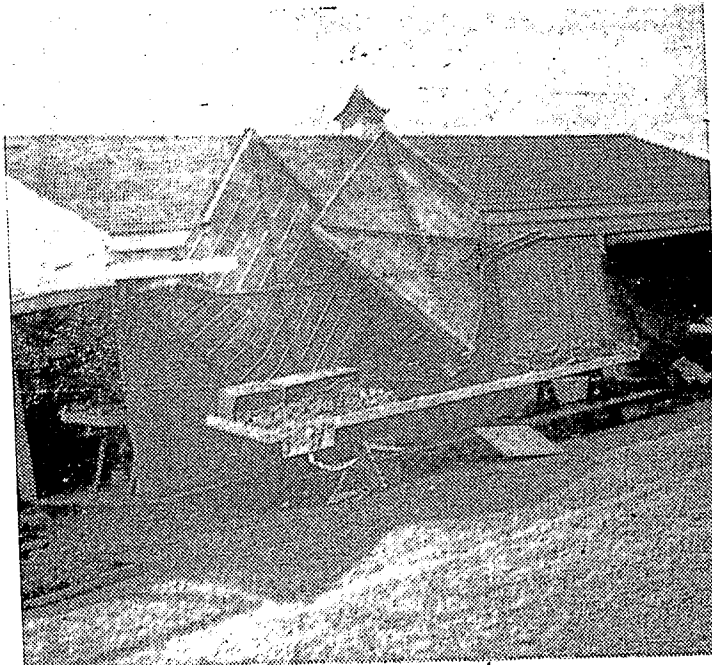

Will the young swimmers who have been moving the Joycee marker barrels on Deer Lake be satisfied when someone drowns because of their pranks? Moving the barrels out beyond the treacherous dropoff that has claimed so many lives can't really be classified as kid stuff. One would have to have a pretty twisted mind to carry out this sort of prank.

I am sure the parents of the children whose lives you are endangering would not look lightly on this situation should one of their loved ones drown due to lack of knowledge as to where the drop-off is located. If there is another drowning this year, as there has been for the past 7 years, you might well be to blame.

The Clarkston Junior Chamber of Commerce has gone to a lot of expense and put a lot of man hours into making Deer Lake a safe place to swim.

This year they installed 13 buoys to mark off the swimming area as required by law. Already these have been damaged. The barrels were then placed so as to keep swimmers from the drop-off. These have been moved. The emergency telephone has again been installed and undoubtedly will suffer some sort of abuse.

During a recent Independence Township Board meeting residents of Waldon Road who were in attendance were assured by Supervisor Hursfall that Waldon Road will be paved to Sashabaw Rd. within the next year and a half. Mr. Hursfall pointed out that because Waldon was a secondary road, paving expenses must be half paid for by the Township and the other half by the County Road Commission.

To pave Waldon Road the Township must appropriate \$40,000. Of this amount they have already squeezed \$30,000 out of the budget with \$10,000 yet to go. According to Mr. Hursfall the road should be paved by the fall of 1965.

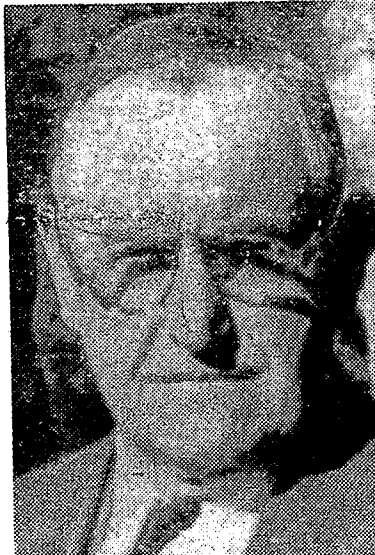

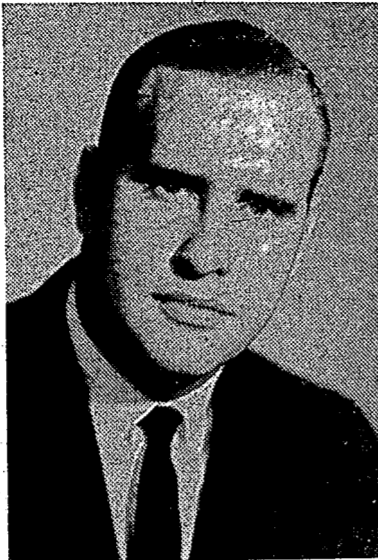

TITLE: AN AMENDMENT, to amend the Zoning District Map of Ordinance No. 2, as amended, of the Township of Independence.

THE BOARD OF INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP OF THE COUNTY OF OAKLAND, STATE OF MICHIGAN, ORDAINS:

Section 1. The Zoning District Map of Ordinance No. 2, The Independence Township Zoning Ordinance, amended, is hereby amended as follows:

(1) To rezone from Agricultural district to suburban farms the North 1/2 of West 1/2 of Northwest fractional 1/4, and East 1/2 of the Northwest fractional 1/4, Section 6, Independence Township, Oakland County, Michigan.

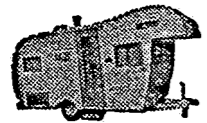

GOVERNOR ROMNEY REPORTS



Last week when I spent two days in the Upper Peninsula, I was privileged to participate in two of the finest examples of citizen participation and community effort I've seen in a long time.

Following a Conference on Economic Opportunity in Marquette, I took part in two dedication ceremonies, one for a chapel in Marquette Prison and the other for a school for retarded children in Escanaba. Both were excellent examples of community pride and achievement.

The John W. Rice Chapel, built to serve the inmates of Marquette Prison, was named in honor of a man who had a warm and friendly concern for all with whom he came in contact.

Jack Rice published a newspaper at Houghton. He loved the Upper Peninsula and the resourcefulness of the people who live there. Long interested in prison rehabilitation and retraining programs, Mr. Rice served continuously on the Michigan Corrections Commission from its establishment in 1953 until his death this year. He was widely known and respected.

He believed in his fellow men and believed that every opportunity should be given to prisoners to straighten themselves out and to once again take their rightful place in society as conscientious

citizens. His methods were sincere and motivated by a deep sense of understanding and trust.

The chapel erected in his honor is a fitting memorial to a man who gave unstintingly of his time and efforts to live.

The dedication in Escanaba was for the new John F. Kennedy School for Retarded Children. This new school resulted from a thrilling citizen campaign, headed by the "Project Pride" Committee, to meet a growing community need and to serve nearby communities as well.

The "Project Pride" Committee is comprised of public-spirited men of the building construction field in Escanaba. Contractors, architects, organized labor and trade unions are all represented on this committee.

The Committee raised the money, contributed labor and materials and planned and supervised the construction of this school. The people of the community gave donations and contributions to help finance the school. The result was this new building, a community-inspired and completely community-financed project, an outstanding tribute to individual personal initiative.

It was obvious that the community was proud of this achievement, and rightly so. This was
