Bobbins From Bob Mail Box Damage a Federal Offense

I was pleased to hear that the Oakland County Sheriff's Department has been keeping a close watch on the buoys at Deer Lake. A young man found hanging on to a buoy was hauled out of the water by an officer during the weekend. The talk he received may or may not have sunk in. I hope it did!

During a visit to Deer Lake, Monday afternoon I was alarmed to see at least five youngsters playing on the buoys. Some of them were over the drop off. Parents should warn their children of the dangers of this lake.

Sure is a small world. After getting our camping trailer set up on a sight in the State Park in Ludington I started for the checking in office. Four sites from ours I was halted down by a Clarkstonite and his family, Doug Cowdin.

During our stay, traveled to Silver Lake about 20 miles from Ludington and rode a Dunes Car over the dunes that separate Silver Lake from Lake Michigan. Although the kids, and I enjoyed the exciting ride immensely, wife Sonja, who I might add, is expecting, felt it was a bit daring and bumpy for anyone in her condition.

No, we didn't forget part of your paper this week. It's just that on our yearly vacation week the paper is apt to suffer a bit as it did this year. A shortage of advertising and time to gather such, left us with four pages.

Don't forget the circus, parade and fireworks which will be part of the big 4th of July celebration in Clarkston this weekend.

With the approach of the Fourth of July holiday season a warning is in order to those who are tempted to blow up rural mail boxes with firecrackers, cherry bombs, etc. Any depredation upon a rural mail box, or any mail receptacle, including theft of the box, is a Federal law violation as well as a state or local law violation. A fine of up to \$1000 and/or a prison sentence of up to three years is stipulated by Sec. 1705 of Title 18 of the United States Code.

The Oakland County Sheriff, the State Police, and the various local law enforcement officers, as well as the local postal inspector in Pontiac, have already been flooded with a rash of complaints of rural mail box damage by explosives, or by just plain malicious vandalism. All local law enforcement agencies, in cooperation with the postal inspector, will be particularly alert during the holiday period and will patrol troubled areas to the extent of manpower and equipment available. Any depredators apprehended will be prosecuted, regardless of their age, in either Federal or local court.

Citizens, who are really the victims of these depredations, can help much in identifying and apprehending the perpetrators by reporting the description and, if possible, the license number, of any suspicious car filled with young people. Parents can also do much to prevent depredations by proper instruction and control of teenagers, who seem to be so attracted to mail boxes. An additional word of warning, the possession of fireworks is also a violation in Michigan, as well as the possession of beer and liquor by minors.

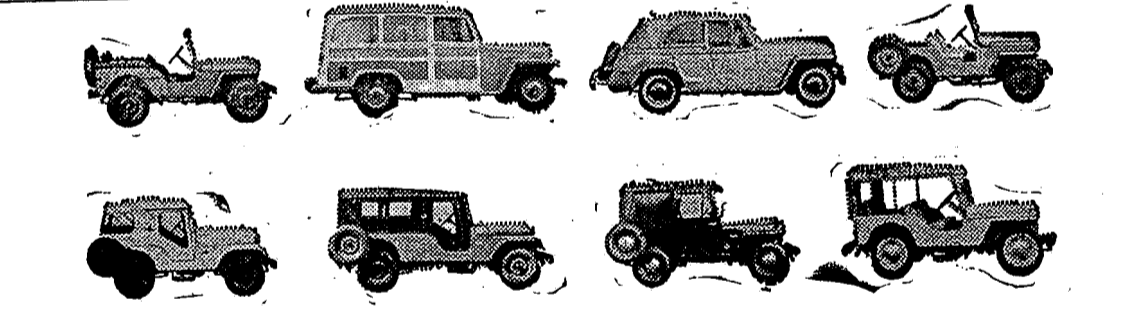

The Planning Commission of Independence Township, Oakland County, Michigan, will hold a Public Hearing on July 28, 1964, 7:30 P.M., at the Township Hall, 90 N. Main Street, Clarkston, Michigan, to consider a proposed amendment to Ordinance No. 2, the Township of Independence, Zoning Ordinance, as having been proposed that said Ordinance No. 2 be amended by the addition of the following to-wit: SECTION 16. SIGNS

SECTION 16.1 There shall be no flashing, oscillating or intermittent types of illuminated signs or displays in any Residential-1 or Residential-2 district or within 300 feet of the boundary of any Residential-1 or Residential-2 district.

SECTION 16.2 In Residential-1 district the only signs permitted are as follows, to-wit:

(a) One unlighted sign not larger than 10 square feet pertaining to the sale, rental or lease of the premises upon which the sign is located.

(b) One unlighted sign not larger than square feet giving the name of the occupant of the premises upon which the sign is placed and his business or profession.

SECTION 16.3 In a Residential-2 district the only signs permitted are as follows, to-wit:

(a) One unlighted sign not larger than 10 square feet pertaining to the sale, rental or lease of the premises upon which the sign is located.

(b) One unlighted sign not larger than 2 square feet giving the name of the occupant of the premises upon which the sign is placed and his business or profession.

(c) Signs not larger than 2 square feet denoting the entrance and exit of any parking area.

SECTION 16.4 In an agricultural district and suburban farms district the only signs permitted are as follows:

(a) One sign not larger than 24 square feet pertaining to the sale, rental or lease of the premises upon which the sign is located.

(b) One sign not over 80 square feet pertaining to the sale of commodities raised upon the premises upon which the sign is located.

SECTION 16.5 In recreational districts signs emitted shall not exceed 240 square feet each, and shall pertain to the use of the facilities located upon the premises upon which the sign is located.

SECTION 16.6 In commercial districts, manufacturing-1 and manufacturing-2 districts, signs not exceeding 400 square feet may be placed upon the premises.

SECTION 16.7 Wherever Houses of Worship are located, they may erect bulletin boards which may be illuminated, and shall not exceed 12 square feet in size. Houses of Worship may also, place exit, entrance and directional signs not exceeding 2 square feet in size.

SECTION 16.8 Height Limitation. No sign shall be placed in any district which shall exceed a height of 25 feet above ground elevation.

SECTION 16.9 Signs in Areas of New Development: Signs will be permitted on the site of new developments in any district, advertising the said development. Such signs shall not exceed 240 square feet and shall not be allowed for a period in excess of one year.
