Information on Candidates For Township Trustee

(Editors note: A letter was written to each candidate asking for this information and this is their answer word for word.)

MERLE BENNETT

To want the privilege of representing the people of Independence Township as Trustee, Merle Bennett feels that a man should have gained certain qualifications. The most basic being that he know the people and be thoroughly acquainted with community needs and problems. To accomplish this he must be active in civic affairs. Business and political experience are other attributes helpful to the Trustee in performing his duties.

A World War Veteran, he was educated in Michigan schools, and received a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering from the University of Michigan. He was employed for many years by one of Detroit's largest downtown office buildings in a managerial capacity and as Chief Engineer in charge of

For the last sixteen years he has owned and operated a furniture business known as Piety Hill Pine. In 1950 he moved his family and business to Independence Township. His three sons graduated from Clarkston schools and his wife has taught in the Clarkston school system for the last ten years.

Since moving here, Mr. Bennett has been engaged in such local activities as the Independence Township United Fund (Trustee of Pontiac Area United Fund), the American Red Cross, First Methodist Church Finance Commission and is presently on the Independence Township Zoning Board of Appeals. Township Library Board he has at As a member of the Independence Township Library Board he has attended district Library meetings and appeared before the CON-CON Committee in Lansing to seek support for Township Libraries.

Independence is one of Oakland County's fastest growing townships; therefore, the office of Trustee is very important. As Trustee for the past four years, Mr. Bennett has attended every important meeting on the Township, County and State level in an effort to keep well informed on all township matters and has supported all measures advantageous to the majority of the people.

As a resident and taxpayer for fourteen years and Trustee on the Independence Township Board for four years, Mr. Bennett has seen the problems attending the rapid growth of our community. Ivory Coast Missionary To be First Baptist Church Speaker

The frustrations of reducing an African dialect to writing will be revealed as the Reverend James Gould, missionary from the Ivory Coast, speaks on August 30th at the First Baptist Church of Clarkston, Michigan 11:00 A.M.

Gould will tell of early work on a primer to teach the illiterate villagers to read and of his plans to translate the Bible for them.

Since being appointed missionaries by the Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society of Wheaton, Illinois, in 1959, Gould and his wife have been in continual language study. They spent 15 months in Paris learning French, the official language of the Ivory Coast. Since 1961, the Goulds have been in Ivory Coast seeking to analyze and learn the Nyarafolo dialect of the Senuto language. Nyarafolo has never been written before.

Working with patients at the Ferkessedougou hospital in Ivory Coast has claimed most of the Goulds' non-language hours. Patients find spiritual counsel as well as physical relief at the hospital.

The people with whom Gould works are animists and are deeply superstitious. Among the tribal rites which Gould has witnessed is the initiation of a sorceress to her duties of appeasing the wicked spirits.

Gould is a graduate of Bryan college, Dayton, Tennessee, and of Dallas Theological seminary, Dallas Texas. The Goulds will return to their work in the Ivory Coast following a year of furlough in the United States.

Should Your Boy Play Football?

(Editors Note: This is the Eighth in a series by Bill Hanson, Line Coach at Clarkston High School.)

For the past several weeks, we have brought you thoughts about the contributions of athletics to the development of young men. In the past years, while dealing with young men of high school age, we have seen these forces at work. We have seen many examples of how some athletic event has kept young fellows from slipping down the wrong side of the hill, so far as their high school career was concerned. It has happened before and will happen again if young fellows will but give athletics a chance.

With the above brief conclusion, we bring this series of articles to an end except for the following definition. We have enjoyed working up each week's article and hope that the News readers have found them worthwhile copy.

While sorting through some football material, I ran across this definition of a football player. Who the author is, or where I picked it up, I have no idea, but I thought you might enjoy it as I did.

What is a football player? Between the innocence of boyhood and the dignity of man, we find a sturdy creature called the football player. Football players come in assorted weights, heights, jersey colors and numbers, but

all have the same creed: to play every second of every game to the best of their ability.

Football players are found everywhere — underneath, on top of, running around, jumping over, passing by, twisting from or driving through the enemy. Teammates rub them, officials penalize them, high school girls adore them, alumni tolerate them, students cheer them, kid brothers idolize them, coaches criticize them, and mothers worry about them. A football player is courage in cleats, hope in a helmet, pride in pads and the best of young man hood in mole skin.

When your team is behind, a football player is incompetent, careless, indecisive, lazy, uncoordinated and stupid. Just when your team threatens to turn the tide of battle, he misses a block, fumbles a hand-off drops a pass, jumps offside, falls down, runs the wrong way or completely forgets his assignment.

A football in a composite — he eats like Notre Dame, sleeps like Notre Dame, but more often than not, plays like Grand Canyon Grade school. To an opponents scout, he has the speed of a gazelle, the strength of an ox, the size of an elephant, the cunning of a fox, the agility of an adagio dancer, the quickness of a cat and the ability of Terry Barr, Paul Hornig,

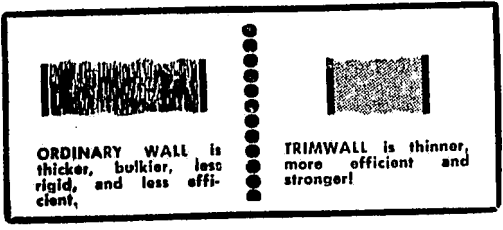
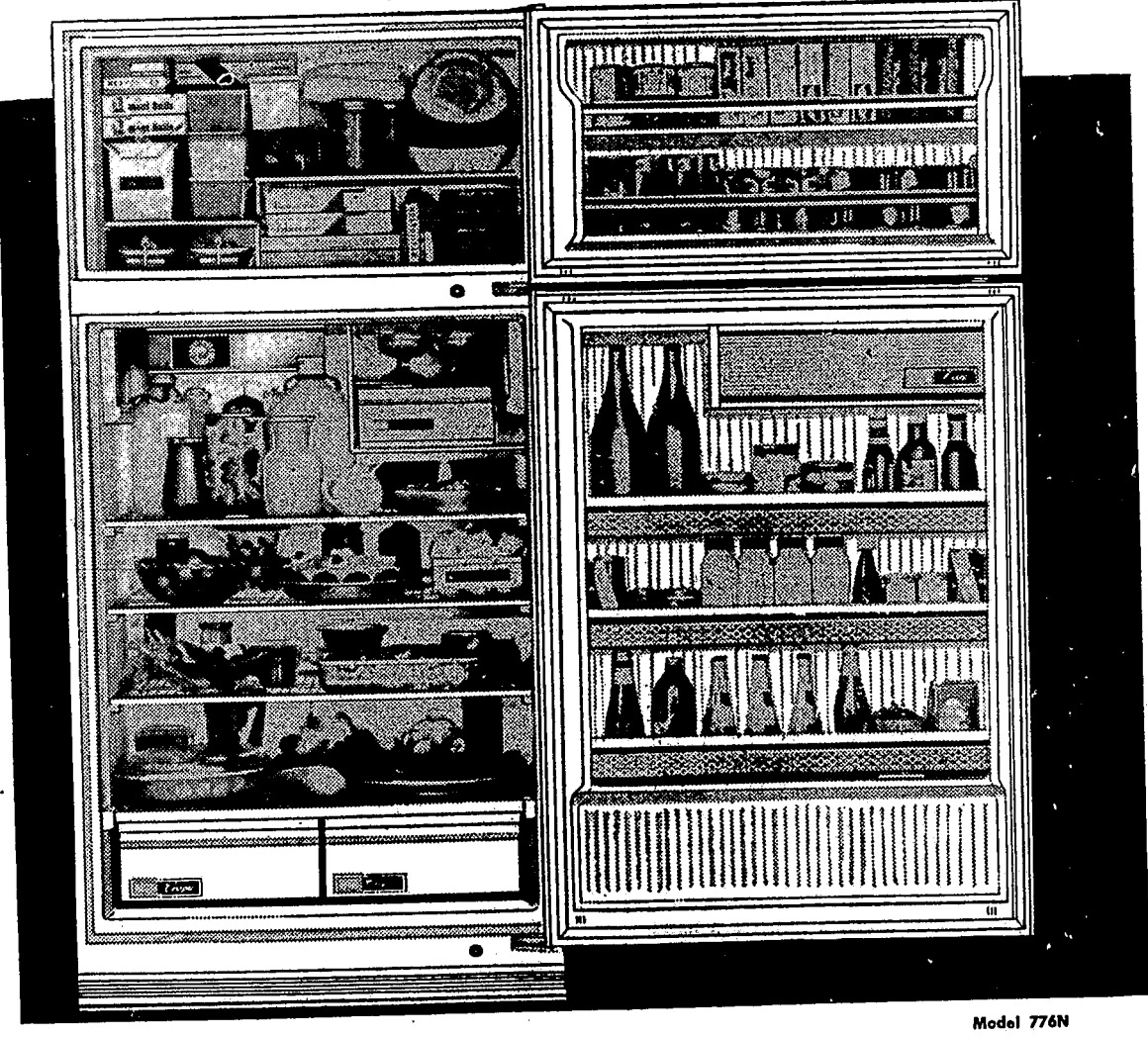

Amendment to Independence
Township Zoning Ordinance No. 2,
Adopted August 18, 1964, Effective
September 25, 1964.

Title: An amendment, to amend
the Zoning District Map of Ordinance
No. 2, as amended, of the
Township of Independence.

The Board of Independence Town-
ship of the County of Oakland,

State of Michigan, Ordains:

Section 16. The Zoning District
Map of Ordinance No. 2, the Inde-
pendence Township Zoning Ordinance,
as amended, is hereby amended
as follows:

SECTION 16. SIGNS

SECTION 16.1 There shall be no
flashing, oscillating or intermittent
types of illuminated signs or displays
in any Residential-1 or Residential-2
district or within 300 feet
of the boundary of any Residential-1
or Residential-2 district.

SECTION 16.2 In Residential-1
district the only signs permitted are
as follows, to-wit:

(a) One unlighted sign not larger
than 6 square feet pertaining to the
sale, rental or lease of the premises
upon which the sign is located.

(b) One unlighted sign not larger
than 2 square feet giving the name
of the occupant of the premises
upon which the sign is placed and
his business or profession.

SECTION 16.3 In a Residential-2
district the only signs permitted are
as follows, to-wit:

(a) One unlighted sign not larger

than 10 square feet pertaining to
the sale, rental or lease of the
premises upon which the sign is
located.

(b) One unlighted sign not larger
than 2 square feet giving the name
of the occupant of the premises
upon which the sign is placed and
his business or profession.

(c) Signs not larger than 2 square
feet denoting the entrance and exit
of any parking area.

SECTION 16.4 In an agricultural
district and suburban farms district
the only signs permitted are
as follows:

(a) One sign not larger than 24
square feet pertaining to the sale,
rental or lease of the premises
upon which the sign is located.

(b) One sign not over 80 square
feet pertaining to the sale of commodities
raised upon the premises
upon which the sign is located.

SECTION 16.5 In recreational districts
signs permitted shall not exceed
240 square feet each, and shall
pertain to the use of the facilities
located upon the premises upon
which the sign is located.

SECTION 16.6 In commercial districts,
manufacturing-1 and manufacturing-2
districts, signs not exceeding
400 square feet may be placed
upon the premises.

SECTION 16.7 Wherever Houses of
Worship are located, they may
erect bulletin boards which may
be illuminated, and shall not exceed
12 square feet in size. Houses of
Worship may also, place exit,
entrance and directional signs not
exceeding 2 square feet in size.

SECTION 16.8 Height Limitation.
No sign shall be placed in any district
which shall exceed a height of
25 feet above ground elevation.

SECTION 16.9 Signs in Areas of

New Development: Signs will be
permitted on the site of new develop-
ments in any district, advertising
the said development. Such signs
shall not exceed 240 square feet and
shall not be allowed for a period in
excess of one year.

A football player is a wonderful creature — you can criticize him, but you can't discourage him. You

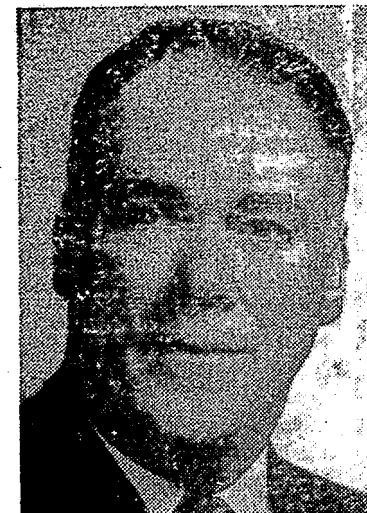
can defeat his team but never his spirit.

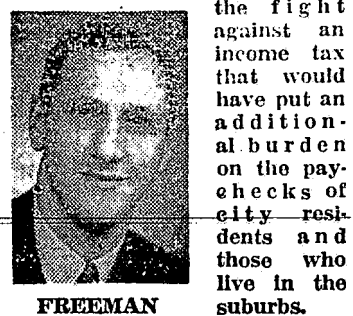

Judge Freeman's entire career has been marked by his fighting for the rights of the average consumer and voter.

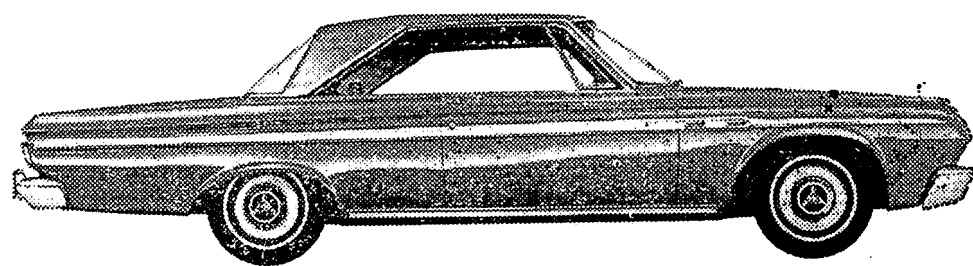
He has been a constant foe of consumer frauds and juvenile delinquency, and has been honored for his work in both fields.

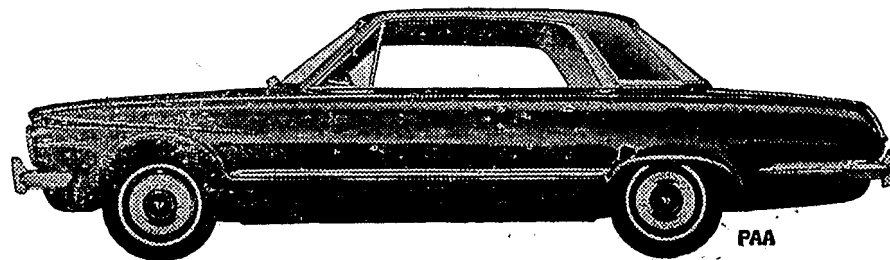

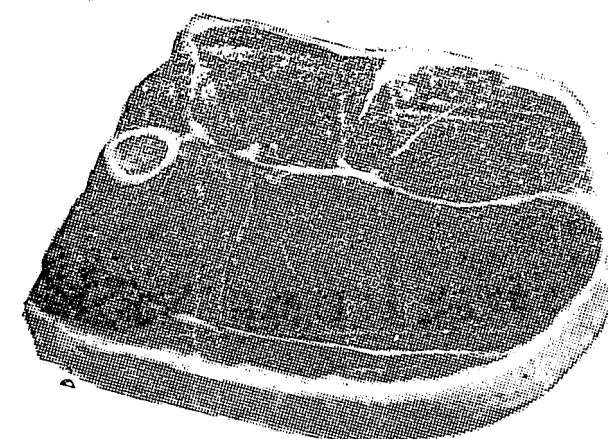
