Can Clarkston's Eleven Repeat As League Co-Champs?

Many coaches around the league feel Clarkston will be near the top in the W. O. when the season finishes in November.

Why the high rating? Last year's J. V. team had only one loss and many boys will be playing varsity ball. Clarkston has 9 returning letterman to form a strong nucleus. Among them tri-captains Randy Armstrong, who will be at starting half back for his third year, and Dave Coulter and John Wilberg who will be starting their 2nd and 3rd year as defensive ends. Some coaches feel they are the finest ends in the league.

Other letterman are Dan Jenks, his 3rd year as a half-back and leading ground gainer on last years team. Frank Miller one of the outstanding tackles in the league. Gary Pearson at an end position, Rick Wilson at tackle and extra point specialist. Dennis Sommers at a line backer post, and Bill Bailey at center, if his knee responds to surgery.

Non-lettermen who will play a vital role on the team are diminutive Rich Palladino, who could wind up at the No. 1 quarterback. Rich didn't letter last year, but he could be the sleeper on the team Paul Hoxsie will be a linebacker position. Paul played very well as J. V. member. Rod Allen will see action as a slot back. Paul Allen will play defensive half back, Dan Williams at end, Tom Moore a fine prospect from our Lady of Lakes will be on the defensive team, Rick Blimka is an excellent prospect at half-back, he tore up the J. V. league in last year's competition and Dan Fife who will take over the quarterback job if Palladino falters.

Coach Kenyon reports the defensive line averages 205 lbs. They are big and fast, plus more depth at each position. Depth is a definite factor on any team. Kenyon also reports, a turnout of over 80 boys for football.

Clarkston lost some great players in Ken Miskin, Dan Craven, Jon Gary, John Williams, and Len Bullard, but we can summarize why Clarkston could pick up all the marbles in league play.

- 1- Three outstanding captains,
- 2- 9 good returning letterman
- 3- Two good prospects at quarterback
- 4-A defensive line that averages 205 lb.
- 5-Depth at every position
- 6- A fine J. V. team from last year
- 7- Over 80 prospects out for football.

Clarkston opens the season this Friday against Oxford. One can expect to see another battle between these two well coached teams. The game starts at 8:00 pm. on Clarkston field.

Clarkston is coached by Ralph Kenyon. Coach Kenyon is beginning his 6th season as a football coach, his 3rd as a head coach. Last years

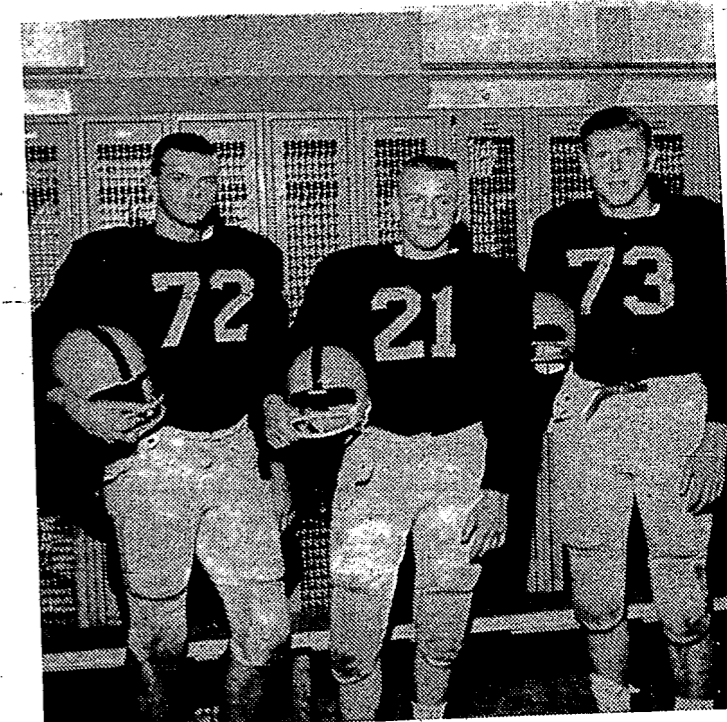
team comprised a record of 6 wins 1 loss and 1 tie, missing a perfect record by only three points. Kenyon is a graduate of Albion College.

The varsity assist are Bill Hanson who had 11 years head coach at Middleville High School and is starting his 3rd year at Clarkston. Coach Hanson is a graduate of Michigan State and earned his masters at Western Mich. University.

Pete Thompson also assists on the varsity level. Coach Thompson is a graduate of Central Mich. University and Clarkston High School. This is Thompsons 3rd year as a football coach. Thompson and Hanson coached the fine J.V. team at last year.

The new J.V. coaches are Bill Mackson and Jim Davidson. This is Macksons 3rd year as a football coach, 1st at the J.V. level. Davidson is a graduate of Milford High School and Eastern Mich. University. This is Davidsons 2nd year as a football coach.

Clarkston's fine line coach of last year, Dave Jones has accepted a head coaching position as Okemos High School. Good luck to you coach Dave Jones on your new endeavor.

Know Your Michigan Law

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

ment of their property. This is the time when you can raise your objection. The board is to take such action as in its judgment will result in making all assessments within the taxing district relatively equal and just.

If you disagree with the decision of the board of review, you may appeal in writing to the State Tax Commission. A letter addressed to the Michigan State Tax Commission, Stevens T. Mason Building, Lansing, Michigan, stating that you desire to appeal the assessment of your property as confirmed or altered by the board of review, is sufficient to get your appeal filed. A new law which will take effect in 1965 provides that the appeal to the State Tax Commission must be deposited in the United States mails no later than the first Monday in May.

During the months of January and February, these officials prepare an assessment roll which lists all the taxable property in their respective districts, the person who is deemed the taxable owner, and their best estimate of its value. This assessment roll is submitted to the local board of review which meets on the Tuesday following the first Monday in March for its first session and a week later its second session.

At its first session, the board has the duty of examining the assessment roll to see that it is made in compliance with law, correcting any omissions of property, and correcting any apparent errors as to the value or description of property.

At its second meeting, the board of review must hear property owners who wish to protest the assess-

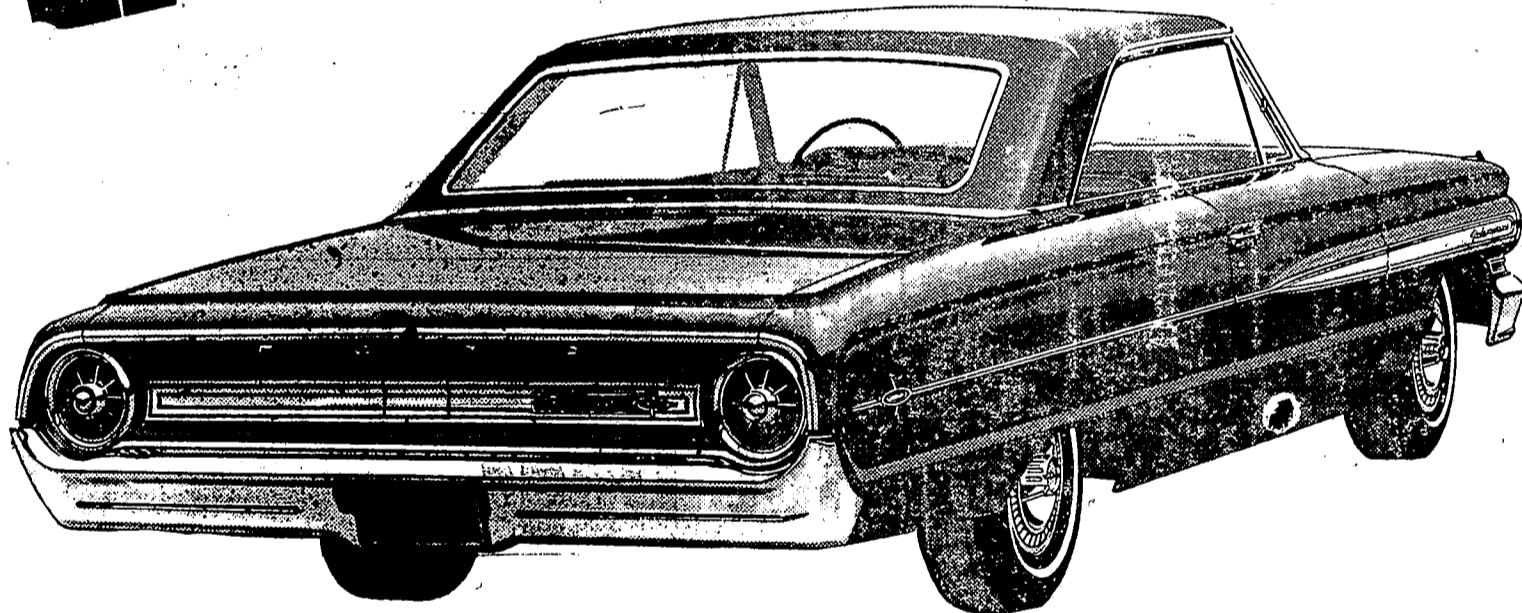

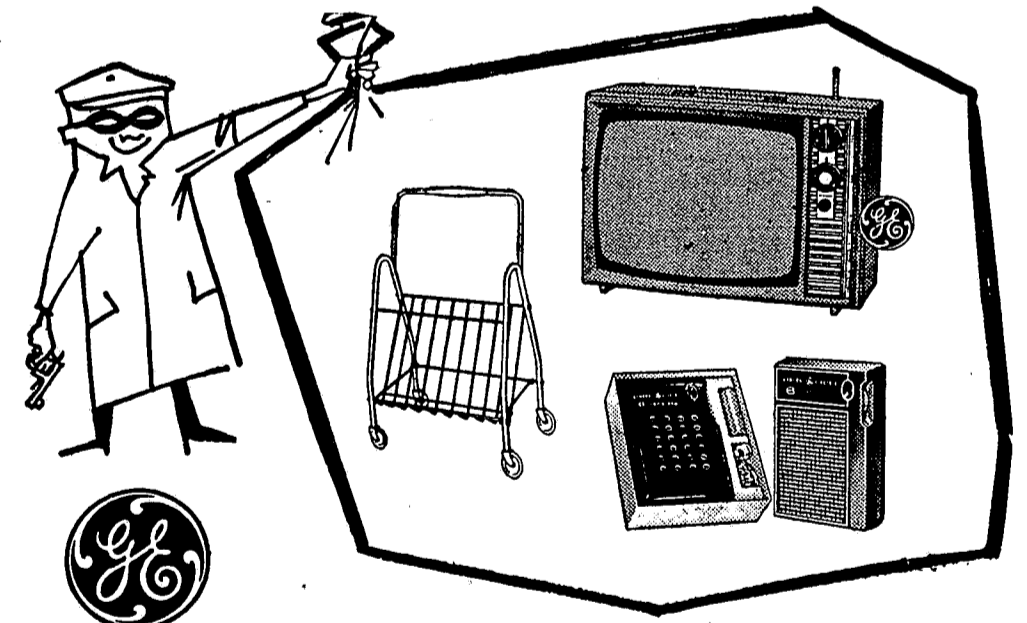

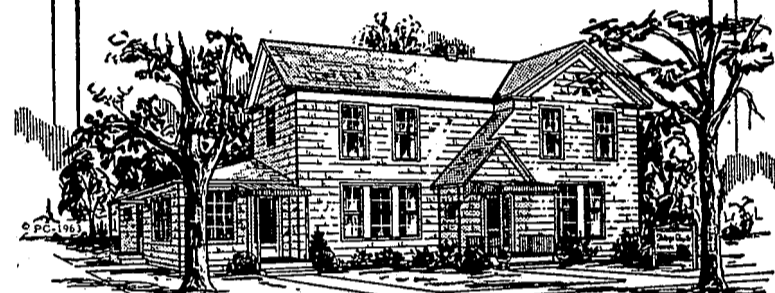
