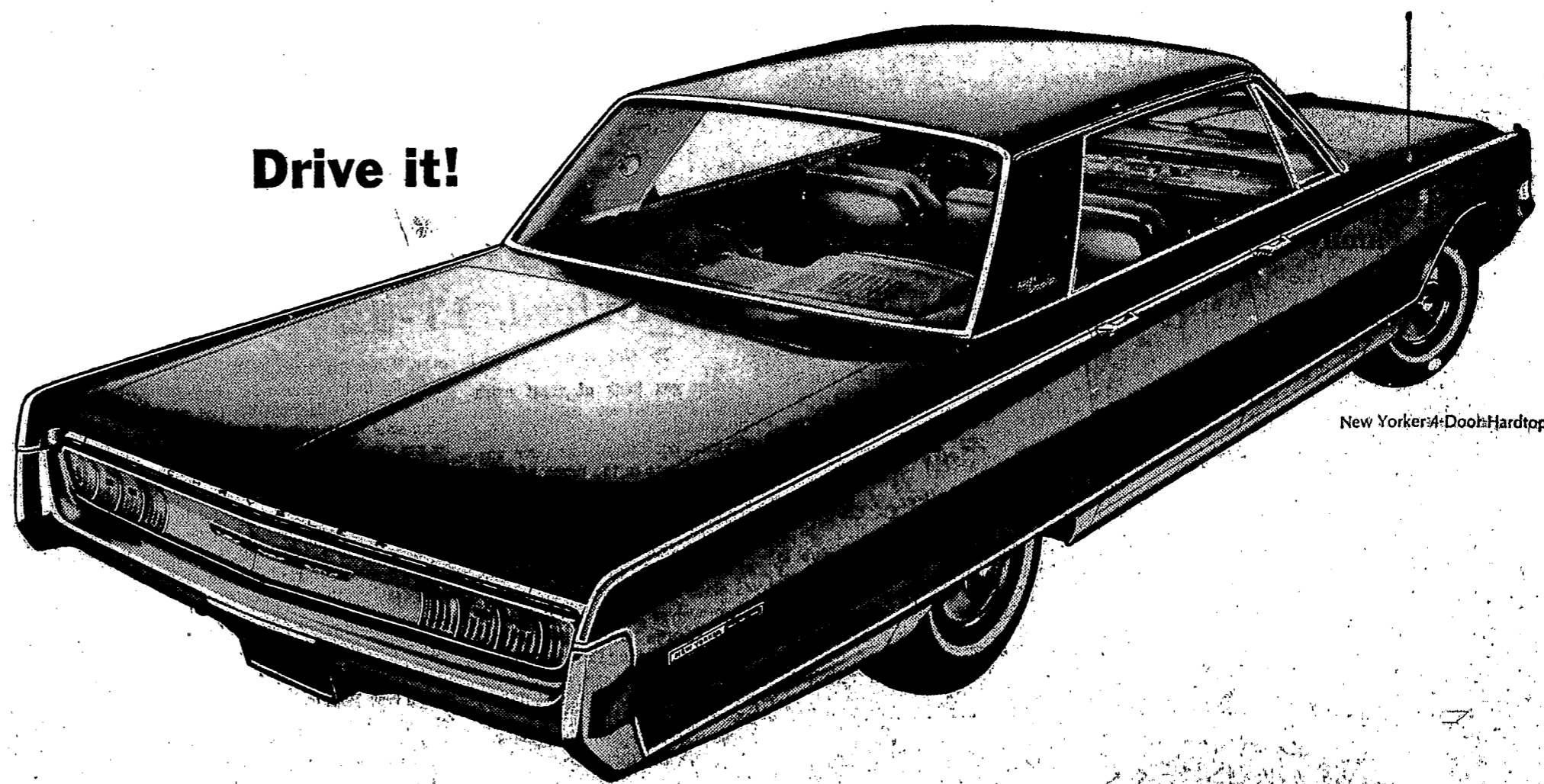

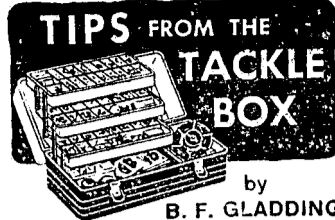

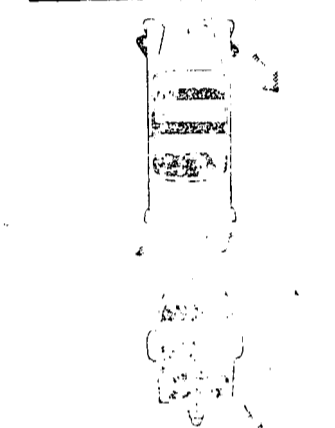
Trailing Pike Trick
WHEN A BIG NORTHERN PIKE trails your spoon right up to the boat, don't try the oft recommended stunt of swishing your lure through a figure eight with the rod tip. Since you're visible to the fish, your body motions will spook him nine times out of ten.

Instead, sit completely motionless and release the handle of your casting reel - or open the bail if you're spin fishing. Your spoon will promptly head for bottom on a free line, and it will start and flutter on the way down. The pike, if you haven't frightened him, will usually follow it down. As the sinking spoon picks up speed its darting motion will increase accordingly, which will be duly noted by the watching pike. When the lure's action becomes sufficiently pronounced the fish is likely to rip in and belt it.

Setting the hooks under these circumstances calls for hair trigger reflexes, so stay alive! You'll see a sudden flash when the pike pounces, and that's the signal to snub down and prod it to fish. But don't make the mistake of trying to hold him close. When you hook a big northern on only a few feet of line you promptly have a mighty rambunctious critter on your hands, and if you refuse him line when he takes off something is sure to bust.

TIPS FROM THE TACKLE BOX

by B. F. GLADDING

Hot Weather Tactics
ONE OF THE SLICKEST ways to fool fussy fish in hot weather is to rig up for dry fly fishing with the lightest flies - then use very small natural baits. A fly rod, matching Aerofloat tapered line, knotless tapered leader of Glad-ding Platyl and some No. 14 hooks add up to an outfit that will get fish in the creel. Whenever you can get them, use caddis fly larvae. You'll find them clinging to rocks in streams, where they look like sunken bits of twigs. Strip off the wooden case, and each "stick" will hold a tiny whitish larva. Thread this carefully on the tiny hook, and you have one of the deadliest baits you can drift through a pool. If you can't find caddis larvae, turn over sunken rocks and use any live nymphs you find clinging to the under side. Lacking even these, pinch the tail from a common angleworm - just a dab - and bury the No. 14 hook in it. The trick is to fish these tidbits with a natural drift. Use no sinker, and cast upstream. Let the bait drift back toward you on a slack line. In ponds and lakes, let the bait settle and then inch it in ever so slowly with a hand twist retrieve. Why so dainty? Because you can't fish large offerings convincingly in the low, clear water of late summer. Fish spook at the first splash, which usually means with your first cast. But with tapered line, fine tapered leader and tiny hook you can tempt them with items that create no more disturbance than a drifting leaf. It's delicate work, all the way, but it will take fish when the fishing is supposedly "dead." Surprisingly large fish will snap up these tiny baits, so strike gently and play fish with a light hand. It takes skill to land them on such light tackle - but that only adds to the fun.

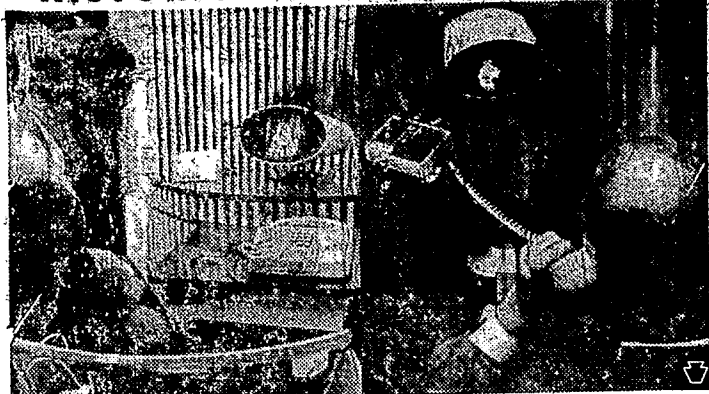
Ichthyologists have known for some time that fish respond to sonic oscillation (sound) between 50 and 300 cycles, and to light waves. Both have been combined in this compact unit.

The sound waves, though only moderately audible to the human ear, travel some 200-300 yards through the water and attract the fish directly to the source. From then on it is up to the skill of the fisherman to get the fish to bite. (The TR-Sonic Fish Call does not give a fisherman unfair advantage of a fish any more than a duck call gives a poor shot any advantage.)

The dial allows selection of five different variants of sound waves. In addition to the sound selection, the unit is also capable of producing light waves for maximum attraction of all species of fish.

HISTORIC PICTUREPHONE CALL



The first Picturephone call made by a European airline was placed recently between the balcony of Grand Central Terminal in New York, and the lobby of the Prudential Building in Chicago. The new Picturephone permitted, for the first time, persons to see each other as they talked by telephone. The historic call was made from spacious booths with telephones having push-buttons instead of conventional rotary dials. Images of the calling and called parties were projected on nearby screens.

On the left above, Henri G. Marescot, Air France's General Manager in North America, places the Picturephone call in New York. On the right, is Robert Dupont, Air France's Midwestern Regional Manager in Chicago. They spoke first in English, then in French. It was the first time that French had ever been spoken on the Picturephone.

The parties spoke of modern developments in the fields of communication and transportation. Mr. Dupont held a photograph of the 1,450 mile-per-hour Concorde supersonic jet, which appeared on the Picturephone screen in New York. The airline executives briefly discussed Air France's first Concorde supersonic jet flight scheduled for 1970.

GOVERNOR ROMNEY REPORTS



It has long been my belief that all citizens should have a healthy respect for the law. Laws apply to all people alike. Laws do not exempt some and apply to others, nor are laws meant to favor some and discriminate against others.

I believe in applying the laws heartily, without fear or favor, to all groups. This belief has been a part of my state administration from the beginning. I do not believe in applying the laws recklessly, then sitting back and "letting the chips fall where they may". I have applied the laws fairly and honestly.

The impartial application of the laws was evident in the Essex wire Corporation strike in Hillsdale earlier this year. I favored neither side in that dispute. But law and order had to be maintained and

the property rights of these not involved had to be protected.

Recently, several incidents have arisen involving efforts by the National Farmers Organization (NFO) to discourage non-member Michigan farmers from delivering livestock for sale at various stockyards and livestock auctions.

I have instructed the Michigan State Police to honor requests from local law enforcement agencies for whatever assistance is necessary to maintain law and order at stockyards and livestock auctions anywhere in the state.

The NFO has several national chapters, and is organized in several Michigan counties as well. Incidents involving NFO members have been reported in Owosso, St.

Johns, Charlotte and in some other Michigan counties.

These two points must be remembered:

(1) Members of the National Farmers Organization certainly have the right to peacefully picket stockyards and certainly may pursue peaceful persuasion to tell their story; but they must also respect the rights of others.

(2) Farmers desiring to take stock to market certainly have the right to travel public roads without obstruction, and certainly have the right to be safe from attacks on either their persons or their property.

I have asked the State Police to apply the law to everyone alike, without fear or favor. Any infringement on the personal and property rights of anyone in these incidents will be met by strict enforcement of the law.

Know Your Michigan Law

By Attorney-General Frank J. Kelly

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

Can you put a sign on your property barring entry and enforce it against everyone?

Contrary to popular belief, landowners in this State do not have absolute right over the access to their property.

Many people are unaware that highway personnel, who are making surveys, can encroach on private property without violating the law.

The State Legislature enacted a

law in 1957 which authorizes state and county highway personnel to enter any land and waters in Michigan to make necessary surveys, soundings and borings for the planning, construction and maintenance of state trunkline highways and county roads.

The act, however, makes the state and county authorities fully liable for any actual damage done to the premises by the surveyors. Fences, trees and shrubbery cannot be removed for survey purposes without the written consent of the property owner.

Thus, the property owner is amply protected by the law and is guaranteed against financial loss, while the state is permitted to perform its service to the public.

Park Your Boat, Mister?
