

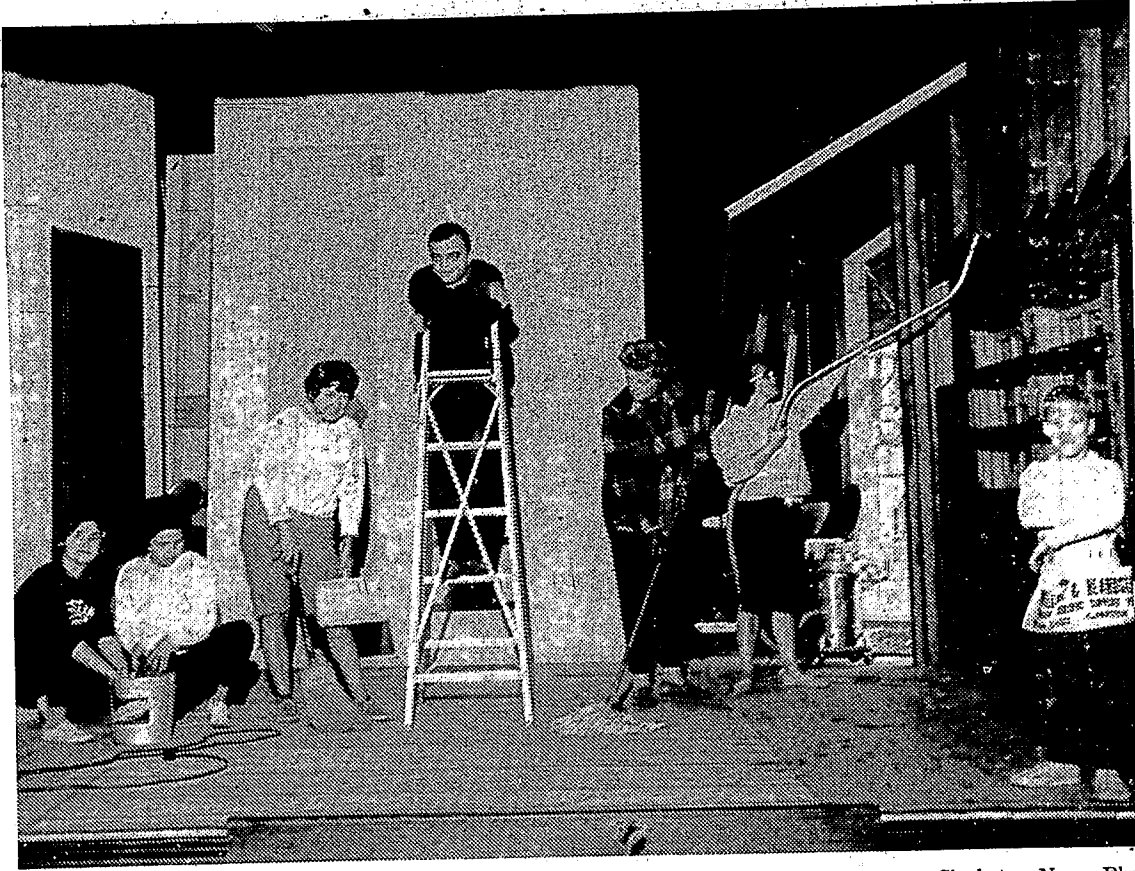

Clarkston Subdues Clarenceville 13-0

Clarkston won the first game of the season by hammering out a 13-0 verdict. Before a Homecoming crowd of 1500 spectators Clarkston unloaded a new offense and some new faces on the offensive and defensive team to record a victory in the win column.

Coach Kenyon inserted John Wilberg in the backfield and he responded with some fine running. Clarkston has been missing a big rugged ball carrier, and maybe Wilberg can fill the shoes as a bruising fullback. Playing in the offensive lineup for their 1st game were Gary Pearson, Dave Osgood, Marshall Gratz, Paul Hinkley, Cecil Caverly and Dan Fife. All did well, especially effective were Hinkley (filling in for injured Bailey) Gary Pearson, (caught a touchdown pass) and Dan Fife. Fife entered the game in the 1st quarter when Rich Palladino was injured. One would have to put a plus factor after Fife's name for his steady performance at quarterback. Also due for some points is the defensive team for containing Clarenceville's running attack. Mike Budrow, John Wilberg and Mike Golembeski were stand-outs.

Clarkston scored in the 2nd quarter on a 65 yard drive. Most of the yardage was gained by Randy Armstrong and John Wilberg. Armstrong was running with deception and determination as he gained close to 100 yards. The last yard was covered by Fife on a quarterback sneak.

Clarkston's 2nd touchdown was set up on a blocked punt by Dave Coulter. Then Fife reeled off his scoring pitch to Pearson. In the 4th quarter Clarkston failed to score when Rod Allen missed a pass all by himself and they were on Clarenceville's 4 when the game ended.

Coach Ralph Temby of Clarenceville was a dejected coach as his boys failed to hang on to the pass.
