Here at Clarkston the call will have to be, "wait until next year". This call has been repeated for many a year for the Holly game, but one has high hopes for next seasons game with Holly.

Clarkston played a good offensive ball game against Holly, as coach Ray Figg of Holly was very impressed with Clarkston's ball club. This is the most points scored against Holly and as Figg stated, "his ball club is very proud of their defense" and they were doing their best to shut out Clarkston. He was pleased to hear that seniors Armstrong and Wilberg will not be facing his ball club anymore — but in his next breath he realized that quarterback Dan Fife is only a sophomore so Figg will have a couple of more chances to see this up and coming quarterback perform.

Head coach Ralph Kenyon and assistant coach, Pete Thompson were pleased with the offense, but they wanted to know, "what happened to the defense?" Golembeski,

and Coulter and Hoxie played well on defense for the wolves. Coach Figg thought Clarkston hit as hard as any team on the league and couldn't understand why Clarkston had only one win to their credit.

Holly scored three quick touchdowns and it appeared Holly was on their way to a 60 point contest. After Holly's three scores, Fife took a cue from Holly's fine passer Tom Fagen and junked the running game. He started to throw the pigskin all over the field with amazing results. Fife had two scoring tosses to John Wilberg. Fife completed 10-18 for 163 yards. Dan Jenks sneaked over from the two

for another score. Most of Clarkston's scoring was set up by the great running of Armstrong and receptions by Wilberg and Armstrong. This is the 2nd straight ball game the Armstrong has shown good poise, balance and determination, with these 3 qualities he gained close to 150 yards.

If Clarkston can continue their offensive showing, if the defensive team plays defense, if Fife can continue as a thinking quarterback, if Armstrong can continue as a carrier, if Wilberg can continue as a two way player, and if West Bloomfield continues their shoddy play — Clarkston should be the victor over West Bloomfield.
