Mrs. James Cowen, Independence area chairman, reported that solicitations totaled \$5572, or 137 percent of the goal for Independence township. Since that time, additional donations have brought the figures to \$5635.25 or 149 percent, making the Independence area highest over quota.

"The women who gave so graciously of their time and efforts, especially with a temporary work stoppage in effect in some automotive plants, are to be highly commended for not only their ultimate result but for the wonderful team spirit, cooperation and enthusiasm which they showed. I am most grateful to everyone who participated in the campaign, both worker as well as donor," Mrs. Cowen said.

The women's business team, under Mrs. James Hart, solicited 60% over the quota. Mrs. Richard Johnston and Mrs. Harry Horsch, Area I co-chairmen, reported 25% over goal. In Area II, with Mrs. Philip Stenberg as chairman, solicitations totaled 30% over the goal, and in Area III, in which Mrs. Glenn C. Bernor served as chairman, 39% over quota was collected.

The junk car problem has become increasingly apparent in recent months. It is partially due, we

suppose, to the low price of scrap metal and the consequent low price paid for junk cars.

We believe that there is nothing that can deteriorate the appearance of a community as two or three junkers parked in every block or twenty or thirty parked at one of several gas stations throughout the community.

We hope that this judgement will give our enforcement officials a needed lift in their efforts to improve our area.

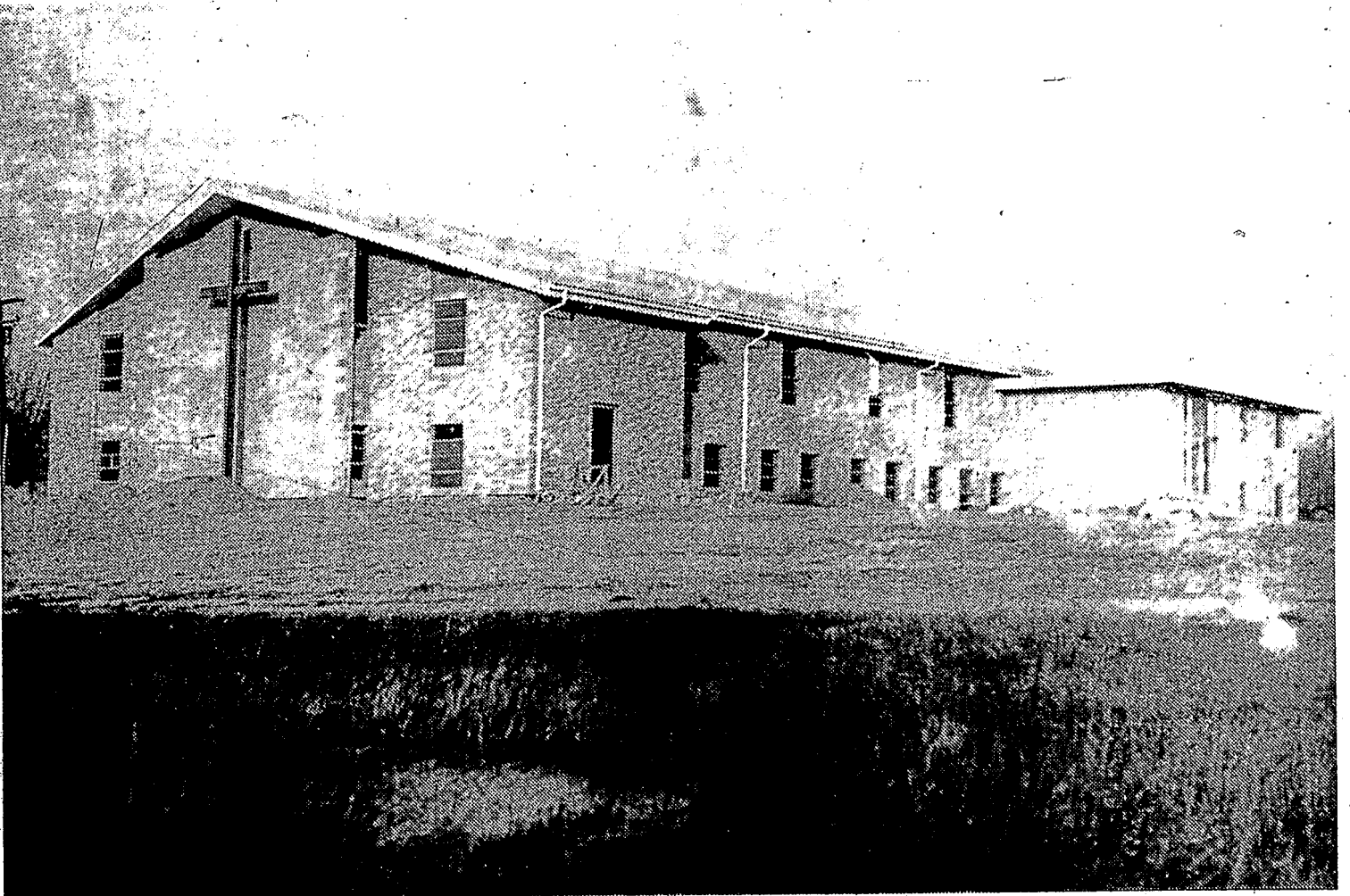

## School Announces Plans for Winter

With the possibility of severe weather in the next few months, Clarkston Community Schools recently announced the procedure they will follow in regard to the running of the buses.

Each morning the roads are checked for safe driving conditions. A decision as to the operation of the buses is not made until just before 6:30 A.M. If it is necessary for the schools to close, arrangements have been made with the radio stations WWJ, WPON, and WJR to announce the closing over their 6:30 to 8:30 a.m. news programs.

If it is possible for the schools to remain open, the buses will travel those roads on the regular routes that are passable, and will try to maintain their time schedules. Students living on snow-blocked roads should walk out to the nearest cleared road for transportation, so as not to delay picking up other students who are waiting.

It is best not to telephone because the incoming calls load the school trunk lines and prevent the school from keeping contact with the buses. However, if a call is necessary, please call Mr. Vincent, Maple 5-1126, after 7:00 A.M.

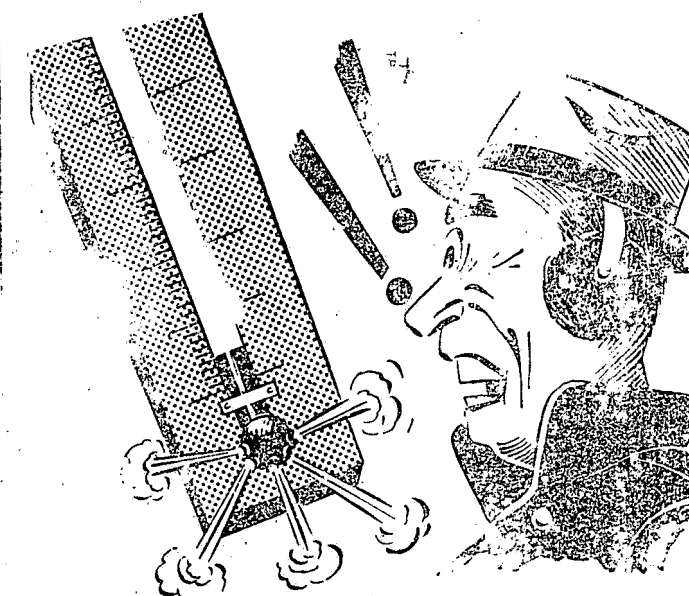

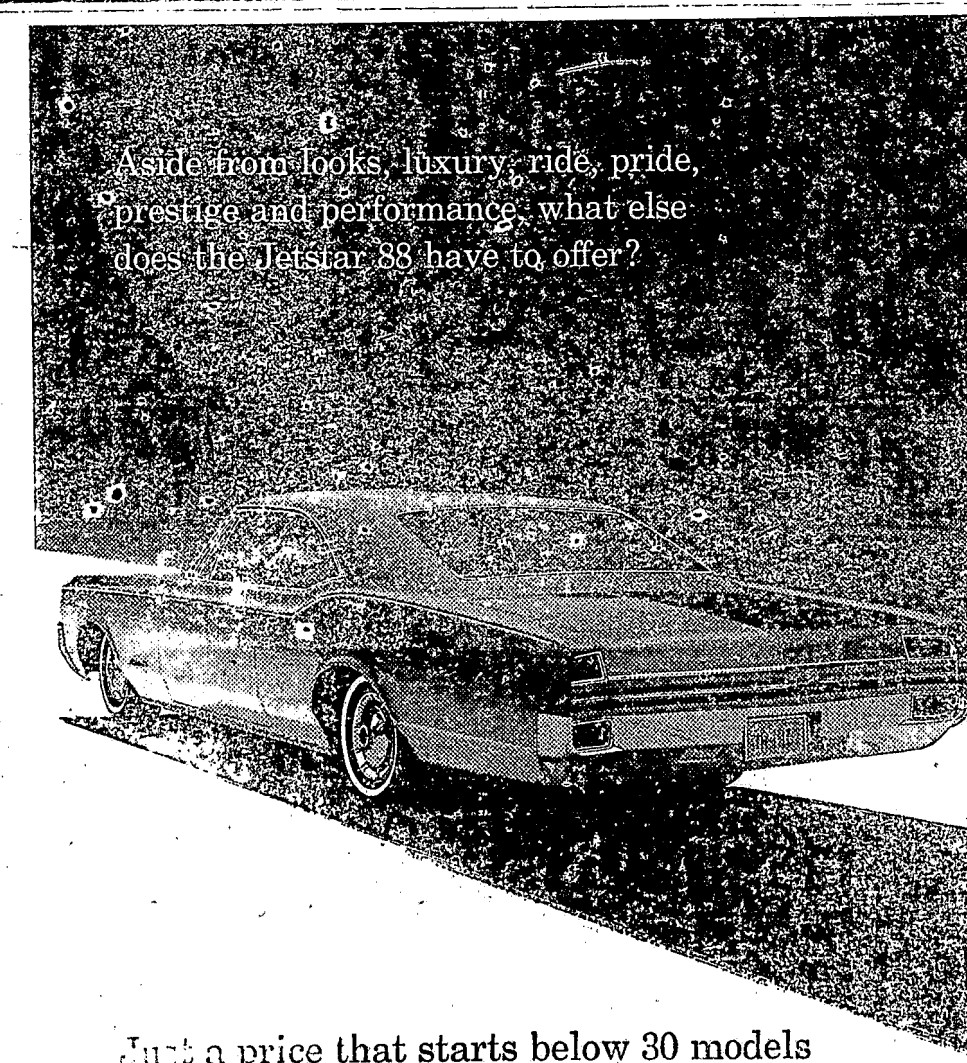

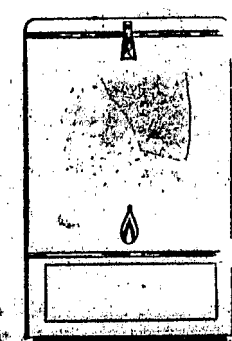

## Know Your Michigan Law

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

With the holiday season approaching, it is appropriate that prospective purchasers be cautioned concerning the bargains they will be reading and hearing about in the next few weeks. While the vast majority of advertisers are scrupulously honest, there are always a few, particularly at this time of the year, who rely upon misleading and deceptive representations in their quest for the "consumers' dollar."

One of the most commonly used forms of bargain advertising is to offer a reduction from the advertiser's own former price for an article. If the former price is the actual price at which the article was offered to the public on a regular basis for a substantial period of time, it is a legitimate basis for advertising a price comparison. If, on the other hand, the former price is not genuine, the "bargain" being advertised could be just the seller's regular price.

Another commonly used form of bargain advertising is to offer goods at prices lower than those being charged by others for the same merchandise in the area served by the advertiser. If the "higher" price is, or has been for some

time, the prevailing price in that area, the "bargain" offered is probably a real one. Otherwise, the "bargain" could be simply a figment of the advertiser's imagination.

Frequently "comparable" or "competing" products are offered at a price much lower than that charged for established or similar merchandise. In such instances, the buyer must decide whether the other merchandise is comparable or competitive and the higher comparable price attributed to it is, in fact, true.

Another advertising approach that should be eyed warily is the one which offers something "free" or "2-for-1" or "half price sale" or the "1c sale." Many of these offers are genuine; a few are not. There should be no reason why the terms and conditions of these offers are not made clear at the outset of any transaction.

It is important for all consumers to remember that a person who, with the intent to sell merchandise or service offered by him to the public, advertises his wares in such a way that the advertisement contains any assertion, representation, statement or illustration, including statements of former sale price or value, which are untrue, deceptive or misleading, might be engaging in false advertising. Such instances should be brought to the attention of the proper local authorities or to the buyer's personal attorney.

## Electronic Brain to Aid Traffic Safety Officials

Michigan's war against traffic accidents, being waged on many fronts, has a new recruit ready to spring into action around the first of the year... an electronic genius weighing 4-tons and able to store several billion isolated pieces of information in its brain center... the GE-415 Computer.

The new computer which costs nearly a half-million dollars will provide an automated system of keeping driver records... especially on problem drivers... Secretary of State James M. Hare said in announcing the acquisition which will be housed and operated by the Department of State.

Hare said he expected the computer would be installed this January in a newly established processing center in his department. In addition to handling the traffic safety program and other data processing of the Secretary of State, it will also serve the Corporation and Securities Commission and Teachers' Retirement.

The computer file on problem drivers is expected to be a "real boom" in the areas of safety, Hare said. "We'll be able to keep close tabs on persons who get into constant trouble with their driving and to take remedial action much more quickly and effectively."

Hare said the plan for the com-

puter is to convert all problem driver records by next July... about 300,000 of them. The computer will be able to completely update the file daily... posting accident records, convictions, and other data... in a mere 84 minutes. The new procedure is built around maintaining driver records on magnetic tape, which is readable by the computer.

"For the first time, we'll have access to detailed data on which to base safety decisions," Hare said. "This information is not available now because we simply don't have the manpower to ferret it out of the files."

The kind of information we'll expect the computer to provide should go a long way in helping us to determine what kind of over-all safety program will work best in Michigan, Hare said.

"We'll be able to tell what kinds of persons get into accidents... on what types of roads accidents happen most often... the percentage of persons who have had driver training that get into accidents... the correlation between the sex, age, and type of persons who get into the most accidents along with the types of vehicles involved... whether problem driver parents pass their problem driving on down to their children... along with other information which is not now

available." According to Hare, computer-produced statistics will be made available to the State Safety Commission, the National Safety Council, the Traffic Safety Center at Michigan State University, and other universities and organizations studying safety problems.

Currently, the Secretary of State's department maintains files on nearly 5-million Michigan drivers. And although only from seven to 10 percent of the total motorist force comprises the category known as "problem drivers," the data in the files on these drivers comprises about 20 percent of the entire total.

"To start out with, the state will put only the problem driver file on the computer. But later on, we may be able to convert our entire file on the computer," Hare said.

The state's files include such information as the driver's age, height, weight, birthdate, all past convictions, accident reports, suspensions, driver education records, restrictions, and pertinent medical data.

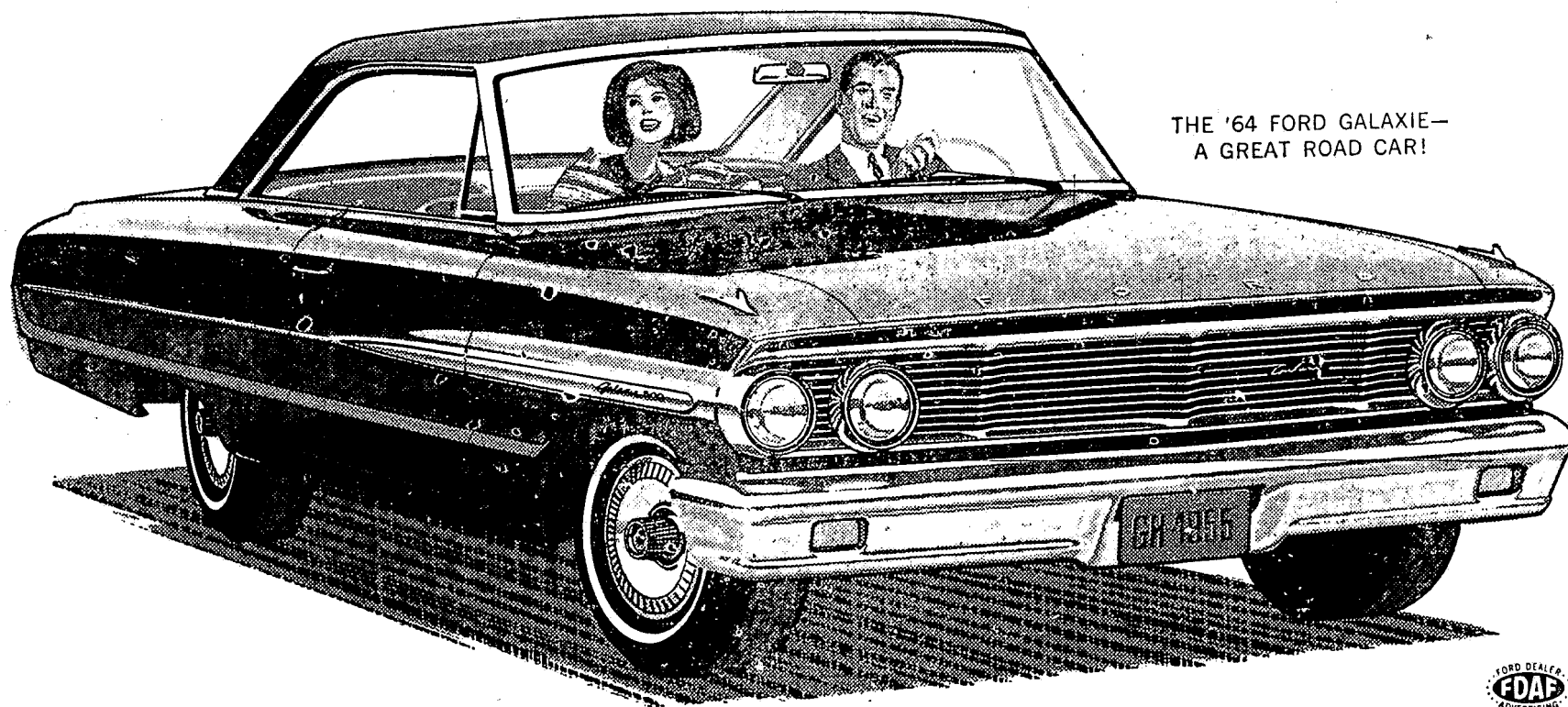

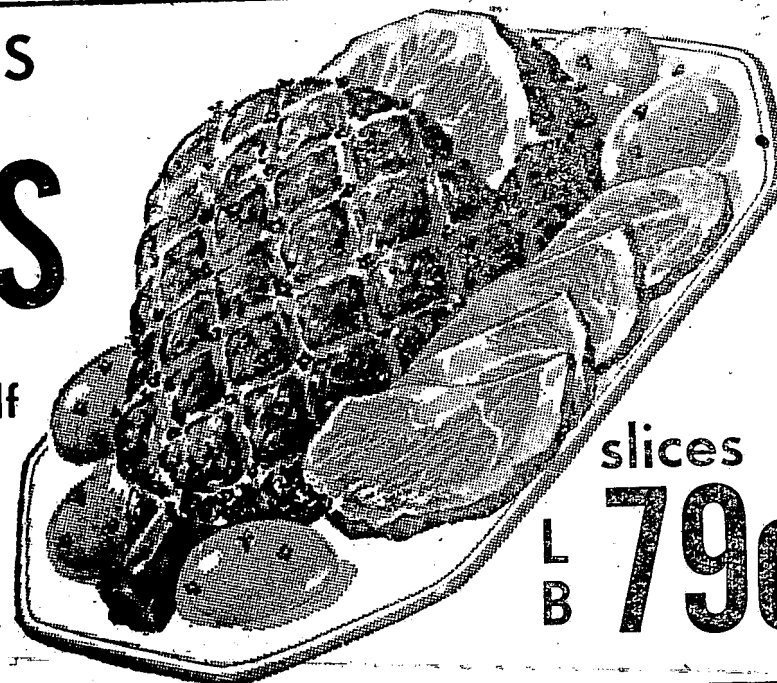
