Arkansas Travelers to Play Clarkston's Faculty



"The Greatest" is a pet phrase Sportswriters and fans everywhere use in appraising Hazel Walker's Sensational Players, who've demonstrated their ability from coast-to-coast 15 years against the better men's teams in the nation. Board of Education Studies For Future Building Needs

Clarkston Schools, since 1951, have experienced a continuing growth in enrollment. 1964 is an exception only in that the growth was bigger than anticipated. The enrollment increase of 493 students is largely Elementary even though it was the High School that experienced the greater percentage growth.

The enrollment by grades is distributed:

K, 488; 1, 461; 2, 493; 3, 480; 4, 413; 5, 413; 6, 397; 7, 347; 8, 358; 9, 328; 10, 291; 11, 284; 12, 226; Sp. Ed., 51.

Existing school buildings are already filled beyond designed capacity and study projections show a minimum increase of 37% in enrollment by 1970.

Listed are the present buildings with their designed capacity and their 1964-65 enrollment figures. Andersonville Elementary, 470-593; Bailey Lake Elementary, 510-588; Clarkston Elementary, 690-737; Clarkston Junior High (sixth grade), 0-105; Pine Knob Elementary, 750-764; Sashabaw Elementary, 390-381; Junior High (seventh and eighth), 800-716; Senior High, 1000-1145.

A most conservative projection shows a student enrollment of 6800 in the next five years, or an in-

crease of 1132 Elementary children and 639 Secondary pupils.

The Board of Education is actively engaged in studying the problem caused by growth of this magnitude and working to determine the amount and kind of new facilities necessary to correct existing area shortages as well as to house an increase of some 1700 students.
