Water Association Will Hold Meeting at Township Hall

The North Oakland Water Association will hold its third official meeting at Independence Town Hall, Clarkston, Michigan, Thursday, December 17th at 8:00 p.m.

N.O.W.A. was organized to protect and plan for the water resources of North Oakland County which are being threatened by the Genesee Valley Water Authority who recently applied for a Federal grant from the Home and Housing Finance Agency in the amount of \$231,000.00 to exploit the underground water resources of Oakland County. The Genesee Valley Water Authority is planning on sinking wells in North Oakland County and pumping water into Genesee County for the use of residents in that area.

Local Student in U of W Chorus

Suzanne Larkin, 160 N. Holcomb, Clarkston, is among the students of the University of Wisconsin at Madison who this semester make up the University Chorus which on Sunday and Monday, December 13 and 14, will perform "Magnificat" by Pergolesi and "The Christmas Story" by Ron Nelson in Music Hall auditorium on the campus at 8 p.m. each night.

Past Christmas-time concerts by the Chorus have been so popular that the School of Music has found it necessary to schedule performances on two successive evenings, and to issue free tickets. These are available in the office of the School of Music in Music Hall.

The Chorus will be assisted by Prof. Richard Church, narrator, Prof. John Harvey, organist, and faculty vocalists Junia Reimann, soprano; Marcia Lewis, alto; Roger Scanlan, tenor; and Rodney Stenberg, baritone. The University Brass Ensemble will also take part.

The 146-voice Chorus includes 37 sopranos, 50 altos, 20 tenors, and 39 basses, all selected by tryout. Prof. Paul G. Jones, director of the Chorus for the past several years, is an alumnus of the University who has been a member of the music faculty for many years. Beginning as a student, when he accompanied the Men's Glee Club on piano and organ, he has worked with each of the University's four choral groups.

The application for Federal funds has spurred NOWA into action. Sen. Philip Hart, Rep. William Broomfield and Rep-elect Billies S. Farnum have been advised of the situation and have been invited to attend the meeting in Clarkston. Supervisors John L. Carey, Springfield, Duane Hurstfall, Independence, Earl Rhinevault, Groveland, and Seeley Tinsman, Holly are in-

ving all other Supervisors, and their Boards, in the North Oakland County area that will be affected by this robbery of underground water resources, to attend. The meeting will be open to all interested people who are dependent, for their existence, on underground water in North Oakland County.

Direct and decisive action is required to protect the water resources and NOWA has been formed to do this. It is a group of citizens devoted to the protection of North Oakland County against the proposed raiding of the underground water supply by the Genesee Valley Water Authority.

Local Superintendent Tells of Immediate School Need

The ultimate saturation point in the school district is approximately 30,000 school enrollees. Though this concentration of pupils may never reach fruition, it is imperative that the possibility of such an enrollment be taken into account in future planning.

The immediate projections reveal that a most conservative estimate would peg the enrollment at approximately 7,000 students by the fall of 1969.

Jaycees Ask for More Toys

Co-chairmen Dave Skillman and Bob Krick appealed today to local residents to help the Jaycees in their toy for every child project. Christmas Eve Jaycees will leave their own families to deliver toys Clarkston Area. Last year Jaycees gave toys to over 140 children and this year's program seems to be getting bigger. Jaycees would like to thank the Thursday Afternoon Ladies Bowling League at Howes Lakes for the many beautiful toys which they again donated this year.

A box has also been placed in the lobby of the Clarkston State Bank which may be used by local residents who wish to assist in this worthy program. If possible toys should be wrapped and labeled for sex and age and either new toys or those in good condition will be appreciated. This anticipated growth, interpreted in terms of classroom needs, means that the school district must provide some 55 elementary rooms, as well as a minimum of 16 secondary rooms.

Research of recent school construction costs, at both state and national levels, indicates that it costs approximately \$34,000 per classroom for elementary construction and nearly \$50,000 per secondary classroom at today's market index. His minimum classroom requirement, interpreted into dollar costs indicates a need of \$2,670,000 for building costs alone. Land purchase fees, equipment, site development, etc., will cost an additional 12 per cent. Thus, it will require \$3,000,000 to provide the

minimum school facilities needed in the next five years.

A review of the district's current financial position shows that the school district can float a bond issue in the amount of \$3,000,000 without changing the present debt tax levy. This year, the school district spread a tax of \$11.00 per thousand of state equalized valuation. The district can absorb the additional \$3,000,000 bonded indebtedness without an increase in taxes because of increased valuation and decreased bonded indebtedness since the passing of the last bond issue in 1958.

Immediate construction of additional elementary facilities and additions to the Senior High School must be begun if children are to be retained in school full time and educated in the manner in which the Clarkston School District public wants and expects.

One Child In Four Found With Disorder

Ann Arbor — A detailed survey of nearly 750 youngsters who received professional attention at The University of Michigan Pediatric Outpatient Clinic during two separate weeks this year shows that about 24 per cent suffered from four major disorders.

Heart defects, congenital anomalies, convulsive disorders, and mental retardation are the most common conditions which require medical attention among patients seen in the U-M clinic.

Of the children surveyed 171 were in one of these four diagnostic groups.

However, more than 200 children, including those seen for routine medical check-ups, were in good health, with no significant physical

or emotional problems, the survey results indicate.

The study was conducted by Dr. Patricia Ann O'Connor of the U-M pediatrics department and Richard J. Hinds, assistant director of University Hospital, to determine the extent and types of services rendered in the Pediatric Clinic.

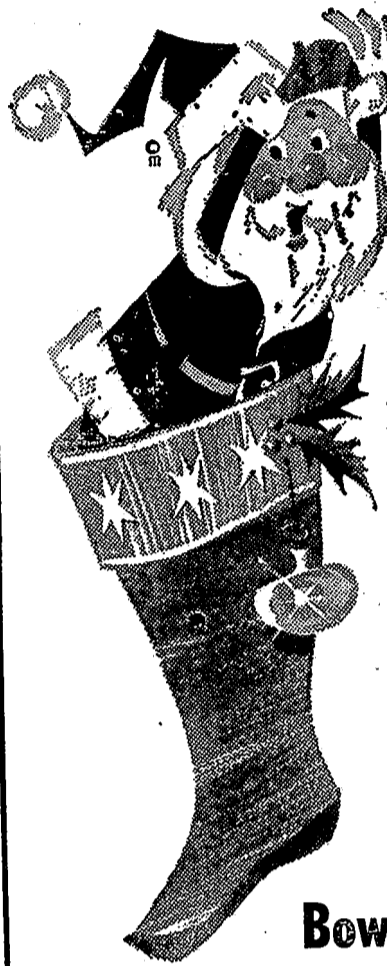
One week in January and one in July were analyzed. No significant seasonal changes were apparent from the survey results.

Dr. O'Connor said the results found at University Hospital do not pretend to show the percentage of these disorders in the total population. She explained that the Hospital serves as a referral center, and, therefore, the distribution of diseases and disorders seen in the Pediatric Clinic would be expected to differ from the distribution found in the office practices of private pediatricians and family physicians.

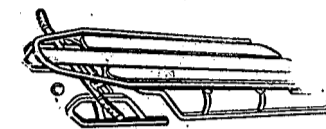

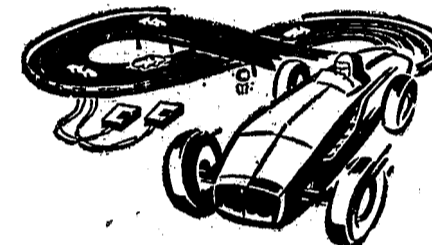

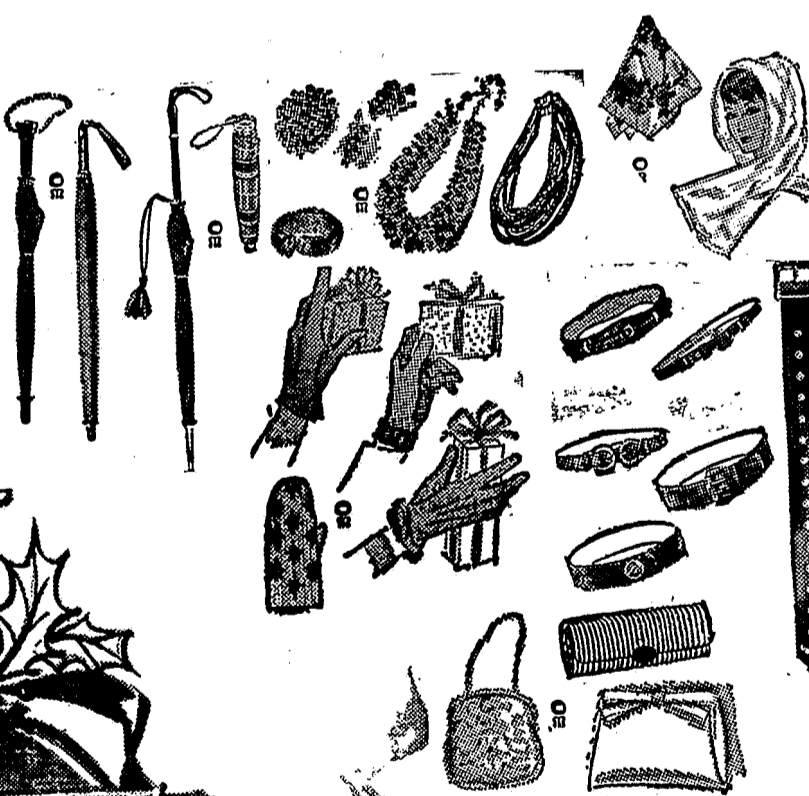

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Clarkston Wolves Lose to Brighton and W. Kettering

In the first cliff hanger of the season, Clarkston is nosed out by Brighton 71-68. A tough one to lose and a great one to win for the up and coming Brighton team. At the end of the 3rd quarter, Clarkston still led, but only by one point, 56-55. Fife returned the game and responded with 2 buckets as did Lippert. Clarkston led until 3 minutes to go when Fife fouled out, then Brighton hit on 4 straight free throws to take the lead and eventually won it by 3 points.

Clarkston took 65 shots, hitting on 31, for a shooting percentage of 48, but they couldn't overcome the 23 free-throws by Brighton.

The J.V. team won their first game by the score of 46-41. Coach Jim Davidson resorted to the zone press, this was instrumental in gaining the victory.

Mark Erickson led the team in scoring with 12, Randy Niason had 10 and improving Mike Schweitzer had 8.

Waterford Kettering defeated Clarkston 50-36.—This is the first time in the history of the school that they defeated Clarkston.

The first half was close, as Kettering led 25-20. Only three players from Clarkston scored any points

in the 1st half. Fife had 13, Wilberg 7 and Palladino 3. Clarkston had trouble hitting the basket and hit on 27 percent of their shots.

In the 2nd half Kettering slowly pulled away from Clarkston and at one point led by 18 points. Coach McGrath tried various combinations in an attempt to find a winning five, but all of them were as cold in their shooting as Gary Pearson. Pearson owned the bucket at Brighton, but he couldn't buy one in the Clarkston gym. In the 2nd half Clarkston hit on only 13 percent of their attempts. Dan Fife led the team in scoring with 18 points, Wilberg was next with 7 points, all in the 1st half.

The J.V. team defeated Kettering J.V., 46-38.

Clarkston's J.V. team continues to improve with each game. Coach Jim Davidson has his boys playing a hustling brand of ball.

The transfer student from Indiana, Randy Nicolson, scored 21 points and freshman Mark Erickson contributed 13.


