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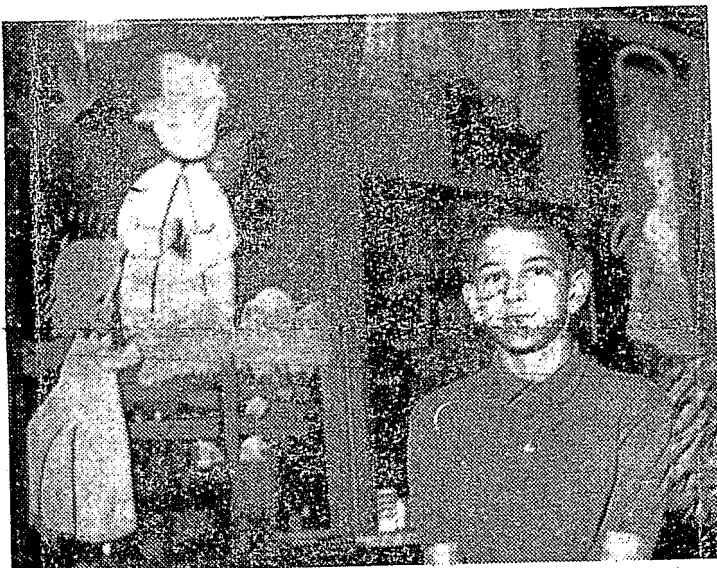

## Jaycees Concerned About Available "Smut Publications"

Dear Editor:

I am writing the Clarkston Area Jaycees advised me that they were planning a publication which they are bringing to the counter of stores throughout the country.

The publications which we saw were brought within the Pontiac area. We were appalled at what we saw. All of us were aware of the so-called "Smut" publications, but what we saw was frightening.

### Know Your Michigan Law

Continued from a series of public service articles explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their affairs should consult a private attorney.

The law contains many provisions. It did not require in collection of debts. Following the finding by a court that a particular defendant does indeed owe money to a plaintiff and the entry of a judgment for the amount by the court, a creditor may proceed in several ways to collect from the debtor.

Among the collection means available to a creditor who has a judgment are garnishment, attachment and execution. These methods, however, do sometimes cause a wage earner embarrassment and inconvenience.

Regarding this, the law also contains provisions which permit a wage earner who has a judgment entered against him in circuit court to petition the court for an order permitting the judgment to be paid in installments. The wage earner defendant must establish to the court's satisfaction that he is unable to pay the judgment with funds other than those earned by him as wages.

If the court enters an order providing for the payment of a judgment in installments, the effect of the order is to limit the use of garnishment and to suspend the running of the statute of limitations until other orders of the court.

A similar provision applies to justice courts.

The Clarkston Area Jaycees believe that all parents should be made aware of this type publication. We believe that if you investigate some of the magazines at your local stores, you will be amazed at what you see just as many of us were. Please look inside these magazines as many of the covers are made to appeal to young people, but the cover, in many cases, has nothing to do with the stories or advertisements inside.

The Clarkston Area Jaycees support the move to eliminate this "smut" type literature from the store counters. We welcome the community committees which are being formed throughout the country. We shall do whatever is necessary to wage a successful campaign against moral degradation in whatever form it may appear.

## Clarkston Defeats West Bloomfield by Narrow Margin

Clarkston defeated West Bloomfield 48-44 in an exciting ball game. The game was close from start to finish, with Clarkston having the largest lead of 6 points during the 3rd quarter. Clarkston led throughout the game, with West Bloomfield gaining the lead at the 1:10 mark of the 4th quarter when Hepinstall canned two free throws for 44-43.

lead. Hepinstall had another one and one free throw situation, however he missed and Clarkston grabbed the rebound. On the ensuing play Rod Allen drove the base line for a reverse lay-up for a two pointer, then Fife and Lippert iced the contest by sinking three free throws.

Rod Allen, a member of the bench brigade, was the key factor in the win for Clarkston. Rod was ready to take the place of a

failing player. He responded with 6 points in the fourth quarter.

In the 1st quarter Clarkston concentrated on a man-to-man defense and had good results. Ron Lippert did a stalwart job on Rich Hacht of West Bloomfield by holding him to 3 points in the 1st half. Hacht has been hitting on 20 points per game. Lippert is gaining respect as a top defender with his ability to be an effective defender too. The defense held West Bloomfield to only 21 points.

Coach McGrath's team had a zone defense in the 2nd quarter and had the same result. The 1st half in holding West Bloomfield to only 23 points. The game was tied 44-44 at the end of the 2nd quarter. West Bloomfield's offense stopped almost a Clarkston stop.

Dan Fife led the scoring with 16 points. Gary P. also scored his scoring touch and contributed 11 points.

The J.V. team contributed to their winning victory by scoring 54-48. Mark Erickson was the high scorer with 17 and Pandy N. on added 15 for the Clarkston wolves.

### Auto Excises Tax Removal Sought

Washington — An end to \$2 Billion in Federal auto excise taxes will be sought in January by Congressman William S. Broomfield (R-Michigan), he announced today.

Broomfield said he will sponsor a bill to remove the excise taxes on passenger cars, parts and accessories and will ask Chairman Wilbur Mills of the House Ways and Means Committee to include them in the "tax cut package" to be presented to Congress early next year.

The tax on new cars yielded \$1,745,960,000 the last fiscal year. Taxes on parts and accessories amounted to \$228,762,000.

Broomfield said the excise taxes have "forced up the cost of new cars and parts to the consumer and have acted as a definite brake upon our Nation's economy in the past."

"If we should suffer another business setback, one of the main reasons would be because these unfair and crippling taxes on automobiles have continued long past their usefulness."

Auto excise taxes originally were enacted during war time to discourage the purchase of new cars. "These taxes long ago outlived their usefulness," he said. "But we haven't been able to get them removed."

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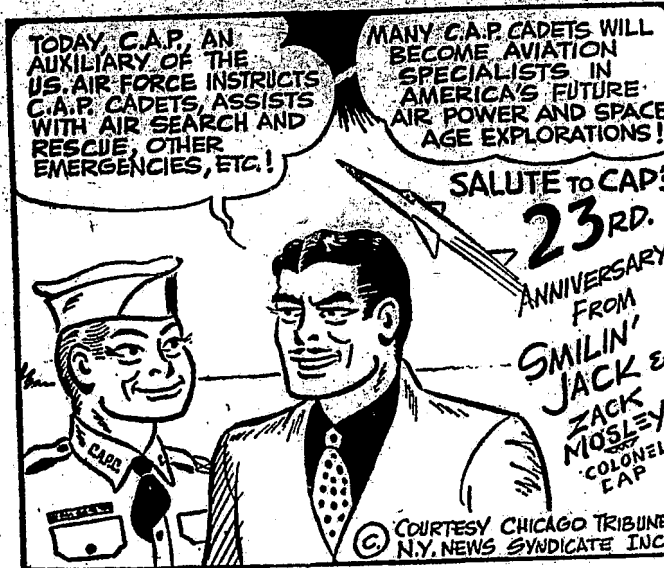

## Carbon Monoxide The Cause Of Many Deaths

Because of the number of deaths that have occurred, car drivers and passengers are again being reminded by the State Police that fresh air from open windows while driving or parked is a "must" protection against the killing carbon monoxide gas contained in car exhaust. Already this year the gas is reported as the cause of the deaths of at least 35 persons who were sitting in parked cars with windows closed and engines running. State health department records show that gas claimed the lives of 49 persons in stopped motor vehicles last year in Michigan.

Nine deaths this fall included five members of one family making a roadside stop, a couple watching a drive-in movie, and another couple sitting in a parked car.

State Police point out that the gas can do its lethal damage unsuspectingly because it is odorless and colorless. Drowsiness is one of its first symptoms which may be but is not necessarily followed or accompanied by ill feeling, nausea and vomiting.

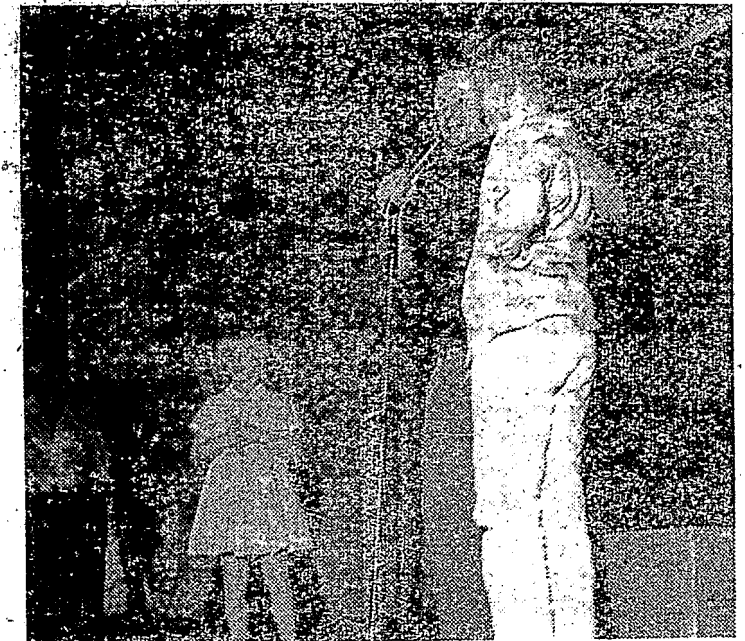

## HIGH SCHOOL

in physics to the boy who needs help with subtraction; from the girl who plans to attend one of the exclusive women's colleges to the girl who must work after school to pay for her high school textbooks.

In order to serve the varied needs and interests of its students, the American high school has broadened its curriculum to include courses in vocational training, homemaking, and social and cultural development. These additions haven't replaced the basic subjects; they have supplemented them.

Today's high school must prepare its students for tomorrow's world — it can't afford to neglect either the bright or the slow student and it must provide a good solid education for the vast group in the range between.
