Souvenir Piece Believed to be A First at Inaugural

Two talented Michigan State University artists, both staunch fans of Governor Romney, have designed a distinctive medallion to commemorate Michigan Inauguration Day, 1965.

The bronze souvenir piece, which will be three inches in diameter, is the creation of Dirk Gringhuis and Val Berryman, members of the MSU museum staff.

The front (obverse) side of the medallion features a profile of the Governor, his signature and the date of the inauguration.

The reverse side features the slogan, "Water Winter Wonderland", a map of Michigan, a star symbolizing the state capitol and a super-imposed herring gull.

The medallion is being produced to give dignitaries and other guests a tangible keepsake of the 1965 inauguration, disclosed Harold M. McClure, Jr., general chairman of the event.

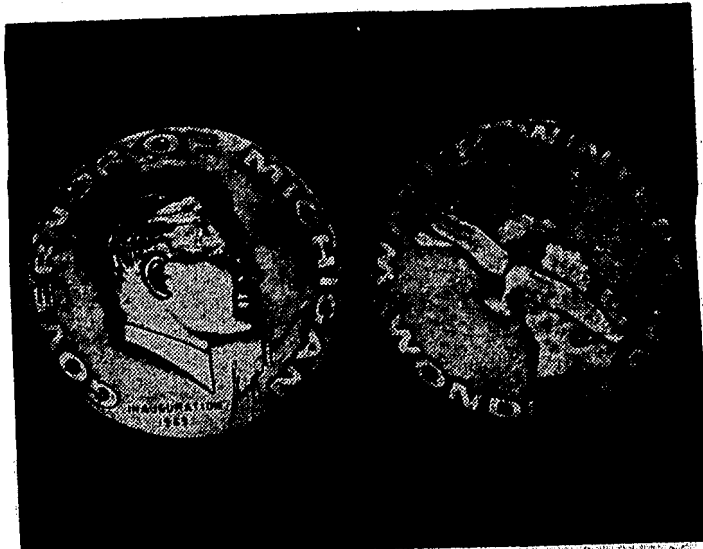
"We hope to have the impressive souvenir medallion available at a nominal price," the committed chairman added, "and the advance response reveals a heavy public interest in the item."

McClure believes the medallion is the first souvenir piece ever created for a Michigan inaugural celebration.

"In all likelihood," he observed, "it could become a collector's item in the years ahead."

The inaugural chairman said his privately-operated committee is financing production of the medal. "We hope the sales will enable us to break even on the venture," he asserted.

"We're extremely fortunate that the MSU creative team donated all their services. If we had to pay for the work at a standard commercial rate it would have meant an additional \$1,000 expense."

For New Years Week-end

With Michigan near the end of its worst years for traffic deaths, Commissioner Joseph A. Childs is appealing for all-out driver and policeman co-operation in good safety practices to help special State Police patrols hold down accidents over the 78-hour Christmas and New Year holiday week-ends.

The 33 persons killed in the 30-hour periods a year ago — 17 at Christmas, 16 at New Year's — gave Michigan two of the highest hourly death rates for these holiday days in recent years.

The Christmas rate of one death every hour and 48 minutes was topped only by that of 1955 when 59

were killed in 78 hours, an average of a fatality every one and a half hours.

The New Year rate on one death every hour and 52 minutes topped the previous high mark of 1959-60 when 36 were killed in 78 hours, an average of one death every two hours and 12 minutes.

Records show average tolls for the last five 78-hour holiday periods are 35 for Christmas and 18 for New Year's.

State Police patrols will be in effect on the New Year period from Thursday, December 31, to midnight Sunday, January 3.

Maximum patrol coverage will be provided from 1 to at least 9 p.m. each day. Principal attention will be devoted to state trunkline highways and primary county roads having high accident experience and high traffic volume.

Detectives where available will take over desk assignments to re-

lieve uniform officers for patrols.

Patrol officers have been instructed to be especially alert for persons driving under the influence of intoxicating liquors because of the high incidence of drinking during these holidays.

Assisting the State Police will be 106 members of the Michigan National Guard who will serve as second men on two-man patrols or on point control.

Household Cleansers can be very harmful

A 37 year old Boston housewife cleaned her kitchen floor one evening just before dinner time with a mixture of household cleaners, commercial bleach and vinegar. Shortly after dinner the entire family became ill, with nausea, headaches, dizziness and coughing. Fortunately, everyone recovered.

What happened? In mixing the bleaches and the vinegar, this lady inadvertently released some chlorine gas in her small, tightly closed kitchen.

The moral is simple. Be very cautious about mixing two or more powerful cleansers, such as are used for ovens and toilet bowls; mixing them with each other or with household ammonia or vinegar. Just because each cleanser is relatively safe when used alone doesn't necessarily mean it's also safe in mixtures.

The strong cleansers often are tricky to use. The package labels on can, bottle or carton include explicit directions for proper and safe use. The labels point out the potential dangers. The problem is that many householders have become so familiar with the common cleansers that they no longer bother to read the labels.

The danger of mixing household cleansers is not a major health problem, but as serious enough to warrant attention. A recent report in a medical journal showed that during a period of sixty days in the winter of 1963, 45 calls were

received at the Boston Poison Information Center regarding adult poisoning. Four of these were for inhalation of gases produced by homemade cleaning mixtures.

The most common homemade mixtures, said the Boston report, are those using sodium hypochlorite and ammonia or vinegar. Sodium hypochlorite and vinegar react and produce chlorine gas. Mixed with ammonia, sodium hypochlorite gives off irritating gases.

Such incidents occur more frequently in winter, when houses are closed and ventilation is at a minimum, but they can and do occur any time. Clearing any poorly vented space, such as an oven, carries a certain risk.

Of course, millions of housewives can testify that there's no harm in adding a chlorine bleach to laundry detergents and soap in doing the family wash. However, like other household chemical, chlorine bleach should be used strictly according to the directions on the label.

The problem of the dangers of mixing various cleaning agents has only recently come to the attention of the health authorities, and do not include specific warnings. To be completely sure, don't mix, unless you're absolutely certain that you understand enough elementary chemistry to know what you're doing.

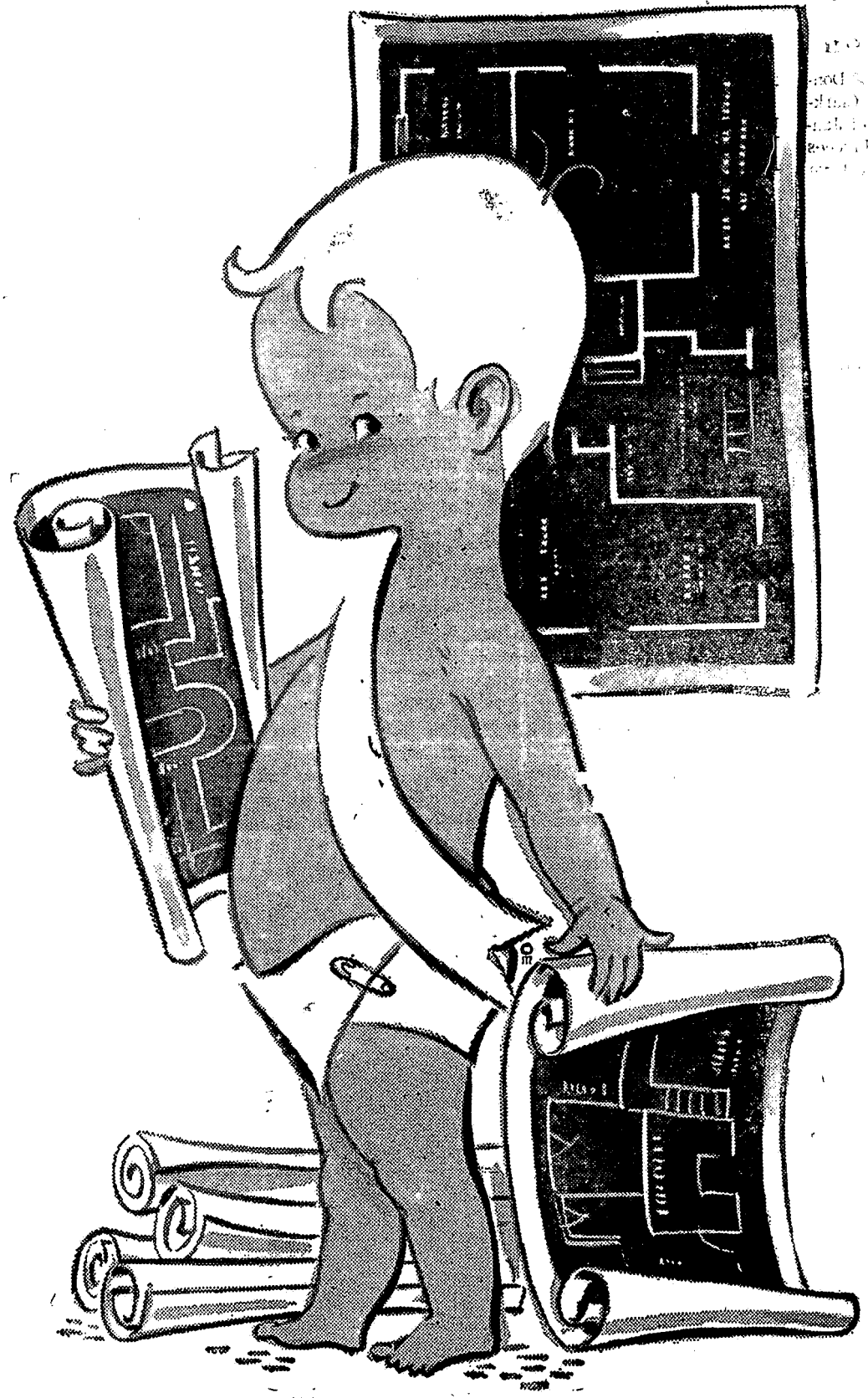
