WITNESSES REMEMBER DEATH OF CHRIST
The Drayton Plains Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses will commemorate the death of Christ at 7:00 p.m., Friday, April 16, at Kingdom Hall, 4400 Walton Blvd., Drayton Plains.

The Memorial service will begin with the discourse, "The Lord's Evening Meal", to be delivered by Mr. Joseph LaBarge, a minister from the local congregation.

Mr. LaBarge explained, "On the 14th day of the 1st month of the Jewish calendar, known as Nisan, AD 33, Jesus Christ provided a sacrifice for believing mankind."

"On the night beginning that date the Lord held a sacred evening meal with his apostles. He commanded them to 'keep doing this in remembrance of me'."

"Nisan 14th this year falls on April 16, after sundown, or after 6 p.m., standard time."

"According to the account in Matt. 26, a loaf of unleavened bread representing Jesus's body and red wine symbolizing his blood were passed among those present at the first evening meal."

Friday, unleavened bread and red wine will be used as emblems in the 24,000 congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses earth wide.

Sunday at 3 p.m. the special activity for the week will conclude with the public talk "Judgment Day — What It Means to Mankind."

A wealth of musical performing talents with vast professional experience awaits the students who will attend Oakland University's newly formed Meadow Brook School of Music this summer.

Oakland seeks 101 top instrumental students, and 250 students of voice for its unique credit-granting program beginning July 6 combining the talents of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, its conductor Sixten Ehrling and the noted associate conductor of the Cleveland Orchestra, Robert Shaw.

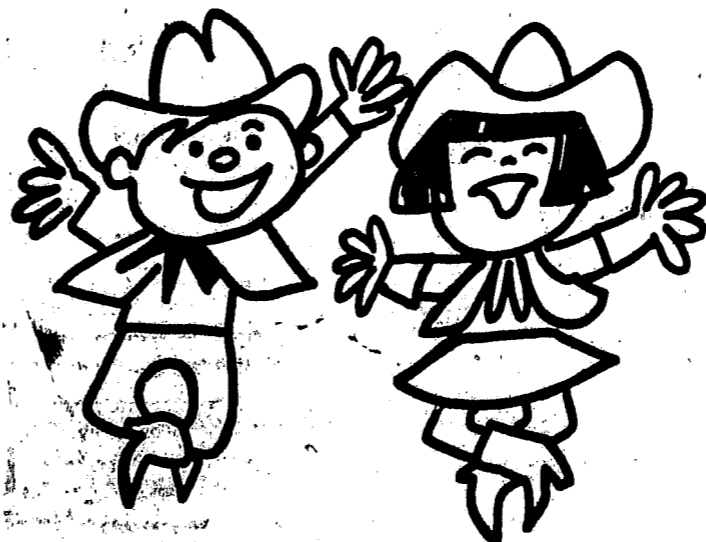

Word was received this week that Mrs. Elizabeth Ronk has been appointed temporary post mistress of Clarkston, replacing Floyd Andrew who has been Postmaster for the past twelve years.

Mrs. Ronk is a graduate of the Clarkston High School and is not only well known here but is well qualified for this position.

Telephone Co. to Install Dial System in Clarkston

Clarkston is to be provided with a new telephone central office of the dial type to reduce the manual office which has been operated under difficulties since April 4 when

fire partially destroyed the building at 40 Washington St. that houses the switchboard and other equipment.

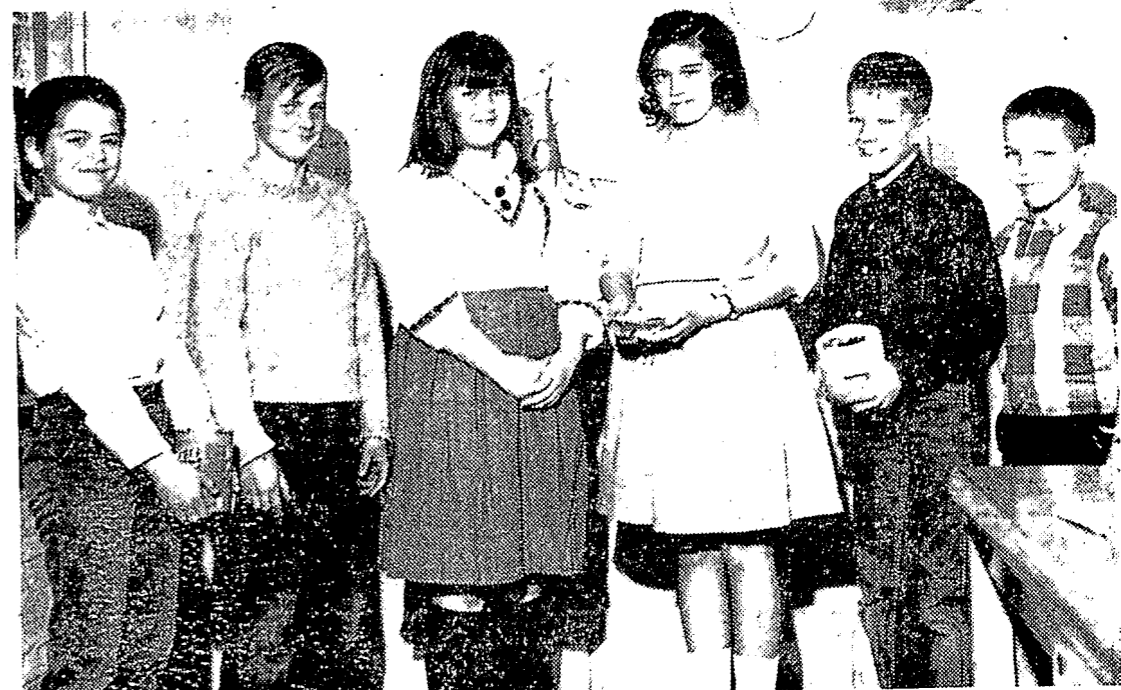
