State Police Monthly Report

Michigan State Police officers made 14,513 arrests in February, 13,324 for traffic offenses and 1,189 on criminal complaints, according to the department's monthly activity report.

In addition, 292 juvenile traffic offenders were arrested and 287 delinquent and one wayward minor apprehended.

Troopers assisted 4,952 motorists, investigated 8,386 cars, issued 19,025 oral warnings to drivers, and made 15,571 property and 2,528 liquor inspections.

Department vehicles traveled 1.507,193 miles, of which 937,666 were on traffic patrol and 569,527 to investigate criminal and other com-

plaints. The identification bureau received 10,214 sets of fingerprints, of which 5,647 were criminal and 4,567 noncriminal. Sixteen wanted persons were identified.

Of 1,661 applicants for permits to carry concealed weapons, 192 were identified with criminal records

through their fingerprints. Two unknown dead were identified

by the same means. The scientific crime laboratory conducted 628 examinations, including 411 on questioned documents. 109 on firearms, 32 on tool marks, 29 microscopic, 21 botanical and 26 miscellaneous.

Laboratory assistances included 65 to State Police posts or other departmental unit, 53 for municipal police, 15 for sheriffs and seven for other state or federal agencies.

The fraudulent check section received 155 bogus checks for processing and identified 61 of them through name or previous speciman record.

Record Year For Registrations

A \$10-million increase in revenue collections over 1963's previous high mark was reported by the Michigan Department of State for last year.

According to Secretary of State James M. Hare, total collections from vehicle licenses, titles and registrations, driver licenses, and other sources rose from a peak of \$164-million in 1963 to another alltime high of \$174.4-million last year. Vehicle licensing accounted for \$74.1-million of the total amount.

Sales and use tax revenue collected by branch offices of the Secretary of State amounted to \$89-million to account for most of the other revenue handled by the Department

In 1964, total vehicle registrations were over the 4-million mark for the second straight year. The 4,257,621 licenses issued represented more than a quarter-million increase. This included a high of 3,323,151 passenger car licenses, a rise of more than 175,000 over the previous year and the third year passengers ran over 3-million. A total of \$6.060,141.3 was collected in Oakland County with the total

number of plates listed at 397,759. Tax revenue collected by the Department of State, Hare said, is used on the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund and for the construction and maintenance of roads and in the state's general and school aid funds.

Trustees Bill Up For Vote

The House of Representatives last week passed Representative Robert J. Slingerlend's bill, which if passed by the Senate and signed by the Governor within 10 days, will make it unnecessary for Oakland County to hold an election to elect a new Board of Trustees, even before the first student has attended a class.

The bill also provides that, when a new board is elected at the time of next year's school elections two trustees will run for a two year term, two for four years and two for six years. This will insure continuity on the board while still allowing for change.

Besides extending the terms of office of the current trustees until July 1, 1966, Slingerlend's bill would allow the territory of more than one intermediate (county) school district to combine to form a single community college district. It would also allow individual, contigous school districts to join with a community college district. It was pointed out that this could avoid splitting school districts if they happen to straddle county lines.

The bill has the support of Dr. John Tirrell and the Board of Trustees of the Oakland County Community college. Also in support is Representative Clifford Smart, of Walled Lake, one of the former trustees' of Oakland Community

Completing the General Fund disbursement total of \$26,999 were parks and recreation, \$150; Election expense, \$100; sidewalk construction, \$100 and fees of \$60.

The CLERK'S FILE by Howard Altman

The township may be referred to physically as an area of land 36 miles square with X number of lakes, streams, roads, etc. or a political subdivision of the State, or a local unit of Government, but we are trying to convey that township government is "grass roots" and somehow "grass roots" suggest something fundamental and basic, a source of beginning, and township government is your government and it begins principally with you.

Before elaborating further on the construction of our Township Government, the general responsibilities of the humerous boards

and commissions that were listed last week -- let's make a last brief observation of Township Government as it may be properly referred to in a broad sense.

Former Michigan Governor Cass once said, " in proportion as Government recedes from the people they become liable to abuse". Whatever authority can be conveniently exercised in primary assemblies may be deposited there with safety". And the words of Thomas Jefferson were equally, important to the sturdiness of township government. He said, "these wards called townships are vital principals of Governments and provide themselves the wisest convention ever devised by the wit of man for the perfect exercise of self government and for

The basic structure of Township Government was first projected by the Public Acts of 1827 and with little change remains the same today. In 1850 the constitution provided for the mandatory election of certain township officers, (the supervisor, clerk, treasurer, 4 constables, highway commissioner, etc.) whose powers and duties were prescribed by law. The ex-officio school inspector, high-way commissioner and justice of the

peace are some township offices which have been "done away with" by succeeding State Constitutions or amendments, (school inspectors were eliminated in 1908) and in 1943 an amendment increased the elected township officials term from 1 to 2 years.

The new Constitution, as adopted by the people on April 1, 1963, provides that each organized township shall elect for terms of not less than 2 nor more than 4 years a supervisor, clerk, treasurer and not to exceed 4 trustees whose legislative and administrative powers and duties shall be provided by law. Note: The only constitutional offices

Administratively the township organization has changed but little since the early days. However, the functions of the township board, though perhaps leaving something to be desired in our changing society and demand for more and more services, have kept pace to a large extent. Until 1947 townships could organize only under the constitution and general law. In 1947 the Charter Township Act (Charter Townships will be discussed at a later date) became law and townships having H Population of 5000 or more or

for townships are the members of townships bordering on a City of 25,000 and having a population of 2000 or more had the power by referendum to incorporate as a charter township and thereby became a

municipal corporation. The Supervisor, Clerk, Treasurer and 2 Trustees constitute the township board under present law. However, in townships having a population of 5000 or more or having, 3000 or more registered electors there may be 4 Trustees serving on the

The principle powers of the township board are mainly to raise taxes ordinary and continued expenses and special purposes, create

Clerk Writes-Township Government Begins With You! debt; issue by-laws and ordinances regulating township affairs; provide a community center building such as our township hall and acquire and hold real and personal property for public use. In recent years township Government has been required to meet more and more demands for services and utilities, consequently legislature has given the township general and broad powers to meet these increased demands.

Today, for example, townships are able to provide such essential utilities and services as water, sanitation and storm sewers, fire and police protection, parking facilities and traffic control. There utilities provided are parks and recreation: road construction and improvement side walks, street lighting, health control measures (such as cemeter) operation and ordinances to assist in protecting the welfare of the inhabitants). This is not to mention the many statutory obligations of assumed responsibilities that the township must perform.

This form of government is finance ed primarily by funds returned to the township from sales, taxes, in tangible tax, liquor licenses, fee and other sources of revenue as may be gained from real and personal property tax, as well as asses ment, tax and miscellaneous in comes such as permits, maps, real and service lees:
