Senior Citizens Slated For Tax Relief

Senior citizens who qualify under a new state law stand to receive at least a 25 per cent reduction in property taxes by as early as next year.

Under the law, homeowners 65 years of age or over are allowed a \$2,500.00 deduction from the state equalized value of their home providing:

1. Their income does not exceed \$5,000.00 a year.
2. The state equalized value of their home does not exceed \$10,000 (All homes with an assessed true cash value of \$20,000.00 would be covered, but higher-priced homes may be included depending on local assessment practices.)
3. The applicant has lived in Michigan for at least seven years immediately preceding the day of filing and resides in Michigan at least six months in each 12-month period.

The law will become effective October 29 under the present adjournment schedule and will apply to the 1966 tax rolls.

O.U. Receives

\$150,000 Grant

Oakland University has received a \$150,000 grant from the Kellogg Foundation to establish a counseling center for mature women under its Division of Continuing Education.

The announcement was made last week by Chancellor D. B. Varner at the last in a current series of conferences on alternatives for women.

The Continuum Center for Women, made possible by the grant, will be located on the OU campus at Rochester and will offer a four-part counseling service to women of the southeastern Michigan area.

Part one of the counseling service will be a psychological testing and counseling course required of all registrants at the Continuum Center. The other three parts of the service will be educational counseling, volunteer placement and employment counseling, thus encompassing all the avenues open to women outside of the home. Emphasis in the three E-V-E counseling areas will be on helping the woman whose children have left home to find her optimum role either in society or at home, meshing the demands of job, college, or volunteer work with the demands of the home and obligations to her family.

Oakland's proposal to the Kellogg Foundation was made on the basis of experience with women's conferences held in May 1963 and 1964. These conferences were expanded to four conferences this month with the help of the new Mott Center for Community Affairs at Oakland.

Women of the age the Continuum Center will serve, representing many volunteer and professional organizations in the area, have been involved in conference planning under the direction of Mrs. Priscilla Jackson, director of conferences and assistant director of the Mott Center. Out of the earlier conferences evolved the testing and counseling course designed by the University's clinical psychologist, Dr. Kenneth Coffman and Dr. David Lowy.

The Continuum Center will offer the following services beginning in fall 1965 to assist women in determining their own goals.

Voters will decide June 14 whether or not there will be a half-mill tax increase for Oakland County special education. The proposal will appear on the annual school election ballot.

Primary reason given for the requested tax raise was the need to expand Oakland Schools' perceptual development and adjusted study units. Various school superintendents of the county have asked for 17 additional perceptual development and nine adjusted study classes. These two newest departments of the special ed program are for children of normal intelligence who are lagging behind their classmates, according to Oakland Schools' officials.

He also is a member of the State Bar Association of Michigan, the Oakland County Bar Association and the National Association of Claimants Counsel of America. In 1960 and '61 the new justice of the peace was an Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for Oakland County. He lives with his wife and four children at 6505 Waterford Hill Terrace, Clarkston.

Drayton Residents Injured In Car Accident

A fire blow out coupled with high speed was listed as the cause of a May 26 accident in which two persons were injured.

Involved in the accident were seventeen year old Anthony Troy of 4500 Island Park, Drayton, (driver of the vehicle) and Shelby Meredith of 7389 Sashabaw, a passenger.

Both occupants were treated at Pontiac General Hospital for injuries sustained in the 10:35 p.m. accident. The vehicle was demolished according to Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

Youngsters placed in perceptual development classes, started four years ago on an experimental basis, have trouble understanding word sounds, whether reading is done from left or right and in distinguishing foreground from background. Adjusted study classes have been established for the emotionally disturbed child who has developed a behavior problem. The objectives of both programs is to prepare children for places in regular classroom study.

The Oakland County Special Education program, established in 1954 on a county wide basis, paved the way for youngsters with physical, mental or emotional handicaps to gain a more complete education. State subsidy pays approximately two-thirds of the total cost with the remaining third being met by revenue from local taxation. The proposed tax increase, expected to yield \$1,100,000 next year if passed, will cost property owners with an equalized valuation of \$3,000 an additional \$2.50 per year.

The current special education program available in Clarkston school district includes four classrooms for the mentally retarded, three for the primary level for elementary, junior high and high school. Because there are not enough students to warrant local facilities at this time, area physically handicapped are sent to Pontiac. Students with hearing and vision problems are also served out of the county office.

Two speech correctionists are used in the local program. The special education program, and coming referendum, is endorsed by Clarkston Board of Education members who urge residents to give their support.

Efforts to Revive Drowning Victim Prove Futile

A drowning accident Monday at Wildwood Lake, North of Clarkston, claimed the life of nineteen year old Lee Porter Pickens of Ferndale.

Minors Subject to Point System

The state's point system for convictions of traffic violations has been extended to cover 16-year old drivers.

Two companion bills, approved by the governor on May 25, set up the legal machinery for a probate court to forward records of its findings to forward records of its findings regarding cases where minors have violated traffic laws. The same point system that applies to motorists 17 years of age or older would then apply to 16-year-old traffic offenders. In the past, the probate court has been prohibited from reporting traffic offenses committed by 16 year olds.

Under the point system, the state can suspend a driver's license upon the accumulation of 12 points in a two-year period. In 1964, 16-year-old drivers were involved in 10,346 accidents resulting in 39 fatalities. Overall, 16-year-old drivers represented only 2.2 per cent of the number of drivers involved in accidents in Michigan last year, according to the Michigan State Police.

Jacobus of 9591 Cornell, Clarkston. There were no personal injuries according to the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

Prof. Lissner Dead at 57

Funeral service for Wayne State University Prof. Herbert R. Lissner, 57, of 7800 Dixie, Clarkston was Tuesday at the First Baptist Church. Burial was in Lakeview Cemetery.

Prof. Lissner, who died of a heart attack last Thursday was chairman of the Wayne State University Engineering Mechanics Department and was an engineering consultant for General Motors Corporation. He joined the University faculty as an instructor in 1938 and was founder and co-ordinator of the Biomechanics Research Center. The professor also pioneered in the study of skull fractures in collaboration with Dr. S. Gurdjian of the University's School of Medicine.

Active in numerous professional engineering and biological societies, he also found time to author over 50 papers and books.

Two degrees from the University of Illinois, a bachelor of science awarded in 1930 and a master of science in 1934, were held by Lissner. He was a former chairman of the mechanics division of the American Society for Engineering Education. Surviving is his wife, Helen, and three sons; David A. of Minneapolis, Robert E. of the U. S. Army and Frederick G. at home. Other survivors include his mother and a sister.

Memorial contributions may be made to the Inter-Varsity Wayne Christian Fellowship Building, Fund at Wayne State University.

Funeral arrangements were by the Lewis E. Wint Funeral Home, Clarkston.

Scouts Honor Local Man

Jack Frost, a local Clarkston man, was honored for distinguished service at the Huron Valley Council Boy Scouts of America's 46th Annual Meeting recently. Receiving the Silver Beaver Award along with Mr. Frost were William Fortier, William Genette and Lester McKinney. The four adult-volunteer leaders stacked up a combined record of 84 years' service in Scouting.

Frost, associated with Henry G. Thompson and Sons, has been active in Scouting since 1936 when he became a Cub Scout in Niagara Falls, N.Y.

He was a former district Scout executive of Troop 126, sponsored by First Methodist Church, in Clarkston.

Frost also is chairman of the board of trustees of the First Methodist Church. In addition he has been active in the Lions Club, Masonic Order, Ferndale Elks Club and the P.T.A.

The Clinton Valley Council, one of the largest Scout councils in the mid-west area, comprises four districts. It is responsible for bringing the Scouting program in all its multiple facets to more than 11,500 boys and 3,700 adult-volunteer leaders in 75 communities in a 1,150-square-mile area consisting of 90 per cent of Oakland and Macomb counties.

T.B. Test for Pre-Schoolers

Parents of some 200,000 children -- the number expected to enter public and private schools this fall -- will be able to obtain tuberculin tests for their youngsters under a new law passed by the Legislature.

Passed unanimously by the Senate and House and signed by the Governor, the law requires parents of pre-schoolers to submit a signed statement in one of three fashions indicating:

1. That the test has been administered by a private physician.
2. That the parent requests the local health department to administer the test.
3. That the parent objects to the test on the basis of religious grounds. Such children need not take the test.

While the incidence of tuberculosis is not high among school children, the State Health Department says the tests will detect those children who have been exposed to the T.B. germ, thus providing a good index of the reservoir of tuberculosis among the population. According to spot samplings, the Health Department estimates that less than one-half of 1 per cent of the parents will object to the test. The T.B. test pre-requisite was added to the present law that sets up the procedures for immunization against Smallpox, Diphtheria, Tetanus (Lockjaw), Pertussis (Whooping cough) and Polio.

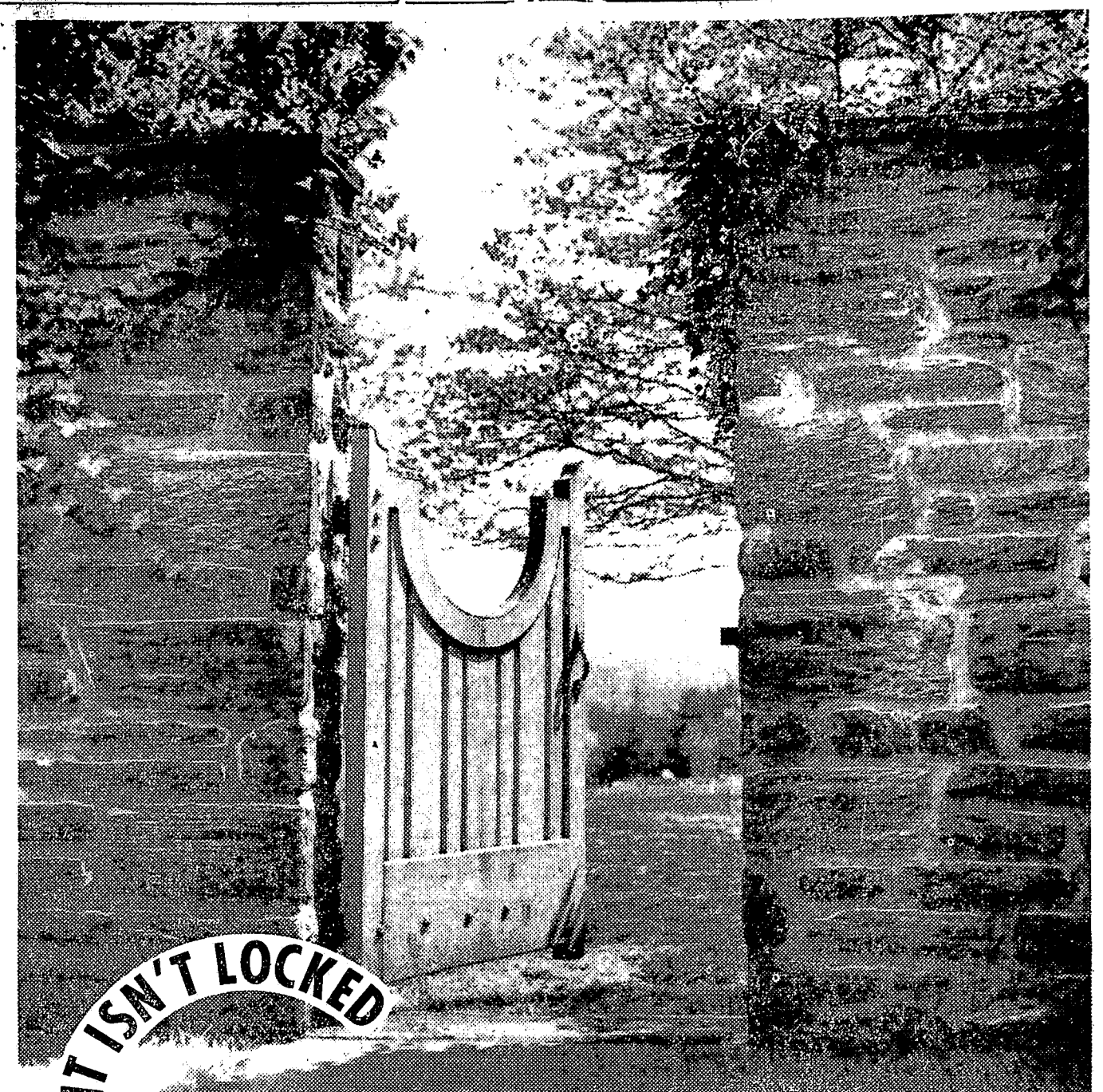

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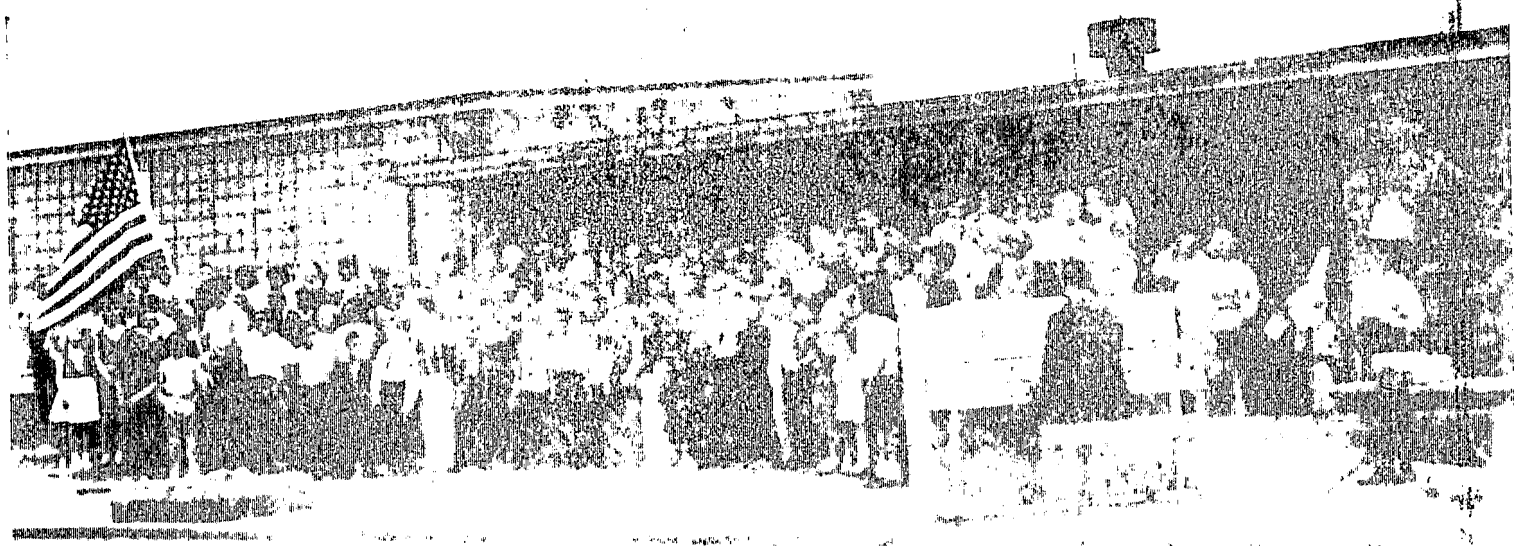

State Legislature OKs Fifty Bills

The Michigan Legislature is working at top speed to meet pending bills.

Legislation has passed more than 50 bills this session. As of May 27, the legislature has signed 43 bills and has 17 bills pending with a variety of subjects, including education, health, and other problems of a general nature.

An enrolled bill is the final version passed by the legislature. It becomes law as soon as the governor signs it. The legislature gave the bill immediate effect. All other bills approved by the governor become effective October 29, under the current schedule. The 43 enacted laws represent only a small percentage of the anticipated number that will become public acts this year. In the last decade, an average of about 250 bills have become law each year ranging from a low of 163 in the 1960 session and a high of 315 in 1957.

4. A clearing house for information on educational opportunities available to women in southeastern Michigan to qualify them for their chosen roles.

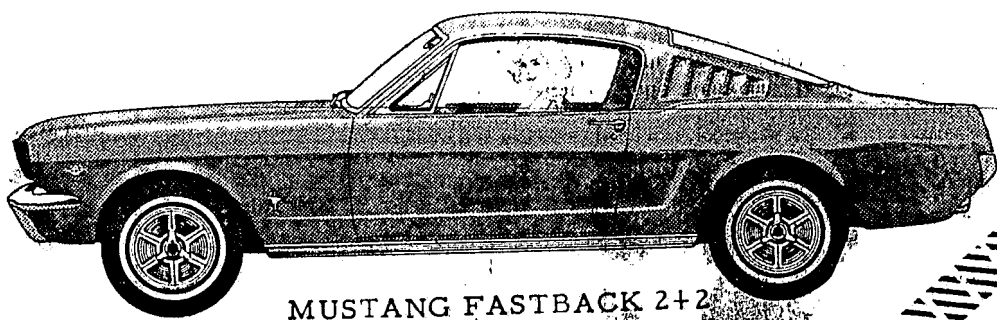
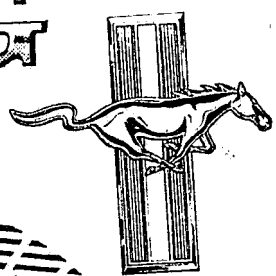

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Know Your Michigan Law

Each year many people become involved in the purchase of a business. One of the tax considerations often overlooked is whether the business in question is subject to the Employment Security Act and, if so, whether it is delinquent in the payment of its taxes to the Michigan Employment-Security Commission.

Under the law, a purchaser of a business which is subject to the Employment Security Act thereby becomes a subject employer himself. He is known as a successor employer. He may be held responsible for any unpaid unemployment taxes which have accrued against the business which he has purchased.

Anyone who plans to purchase a business which has been operating within the state should therefore make inquiry of the Michigan Employment Security Commission as to the employer liability status of such business and as to whether any unemployment taxes are due from such business.

Under the law, any purchaser who has not less than 10 days prior to such purchase, requested from the Commission in writing a statement certifying the status of contribution liability of the previous employing unit must be provided with such statement. Under such circumstances, the purchaser will not be liable for any amount due from the previous employing unit in excess of the amount of liability certified by the Commission.

Thus, knowing beforehand what your rights and obligations are, under the Employment Security Act, can save a great deal of disappointment, time and money at a later date.

This precautionary measure is in addition to the need to check with the federal and state authorities for tax liabilities. The proper state agency to check with is the Michigan Department of Revenue.

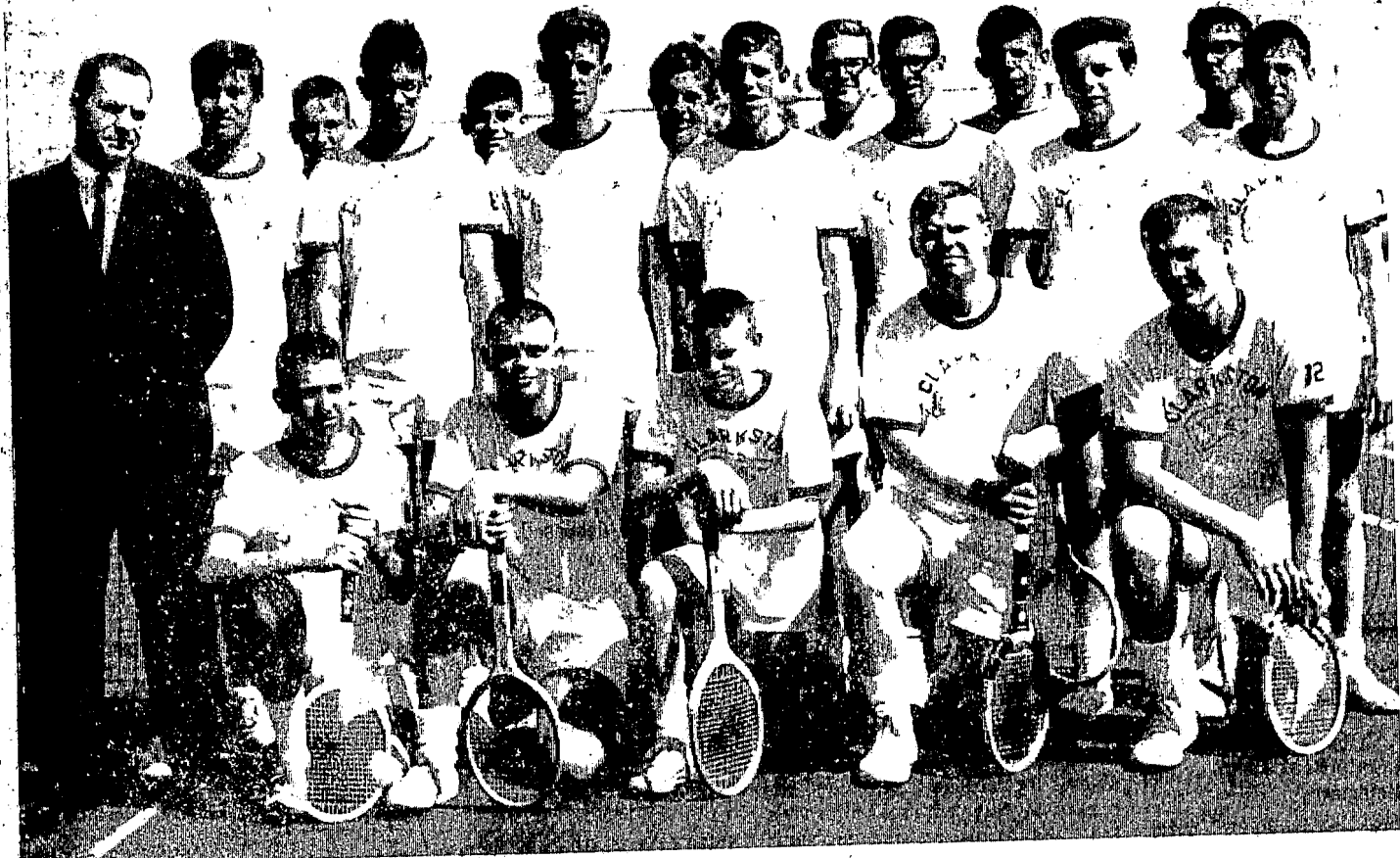

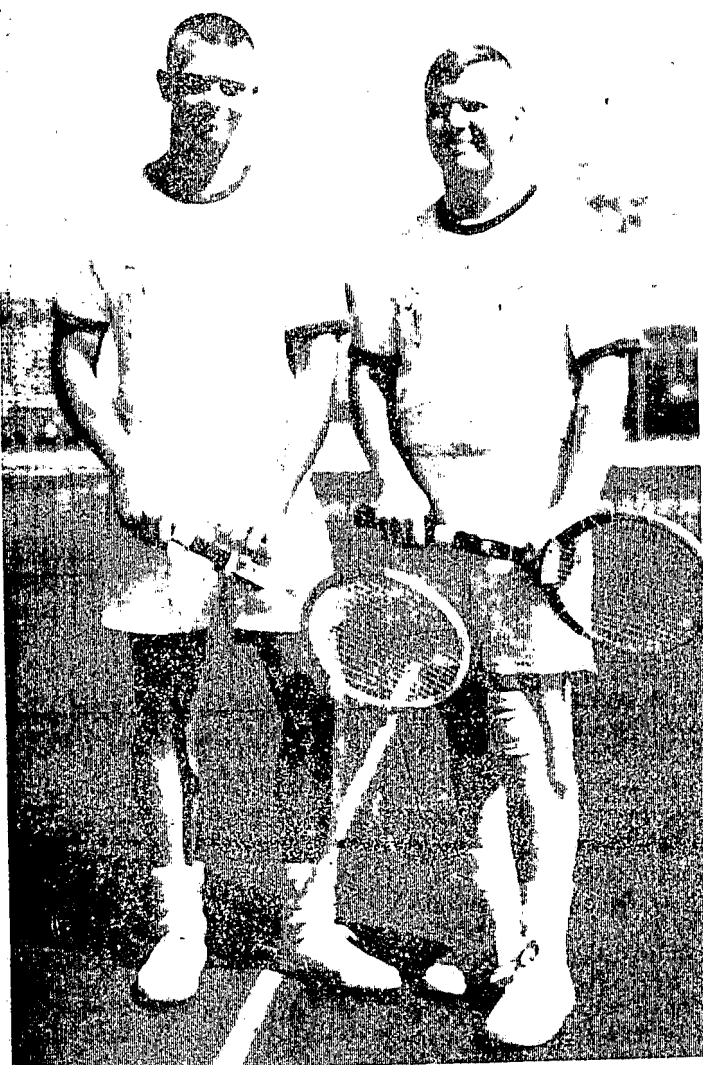

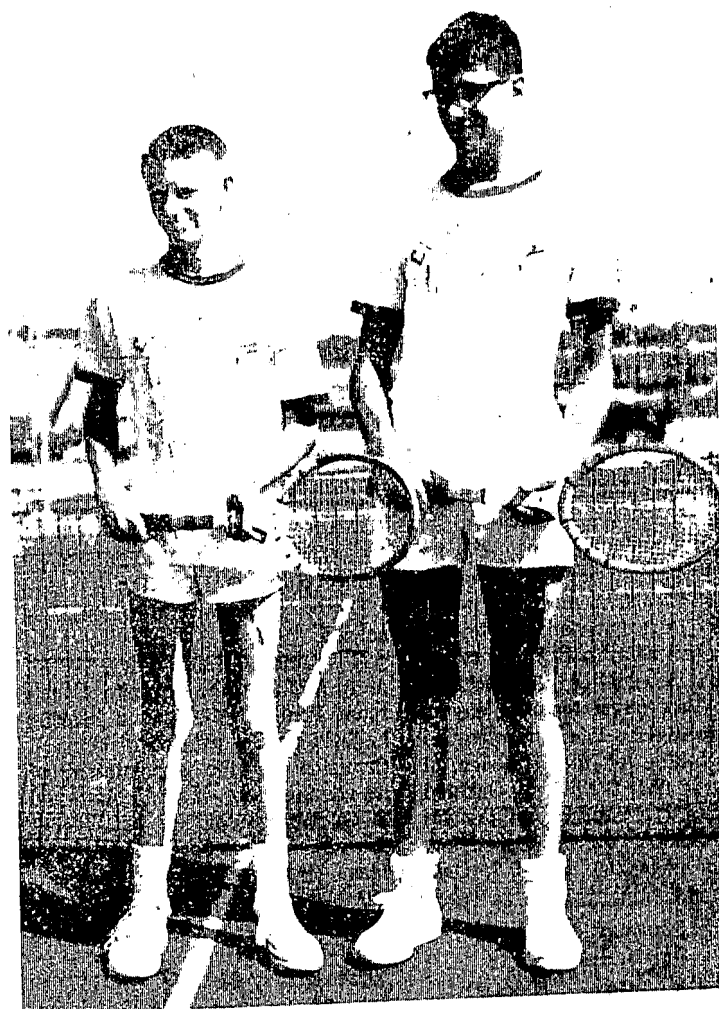
Rick Wilson, leading golfer on the Clarkston team, averaged less than 39 strokes per match this season.

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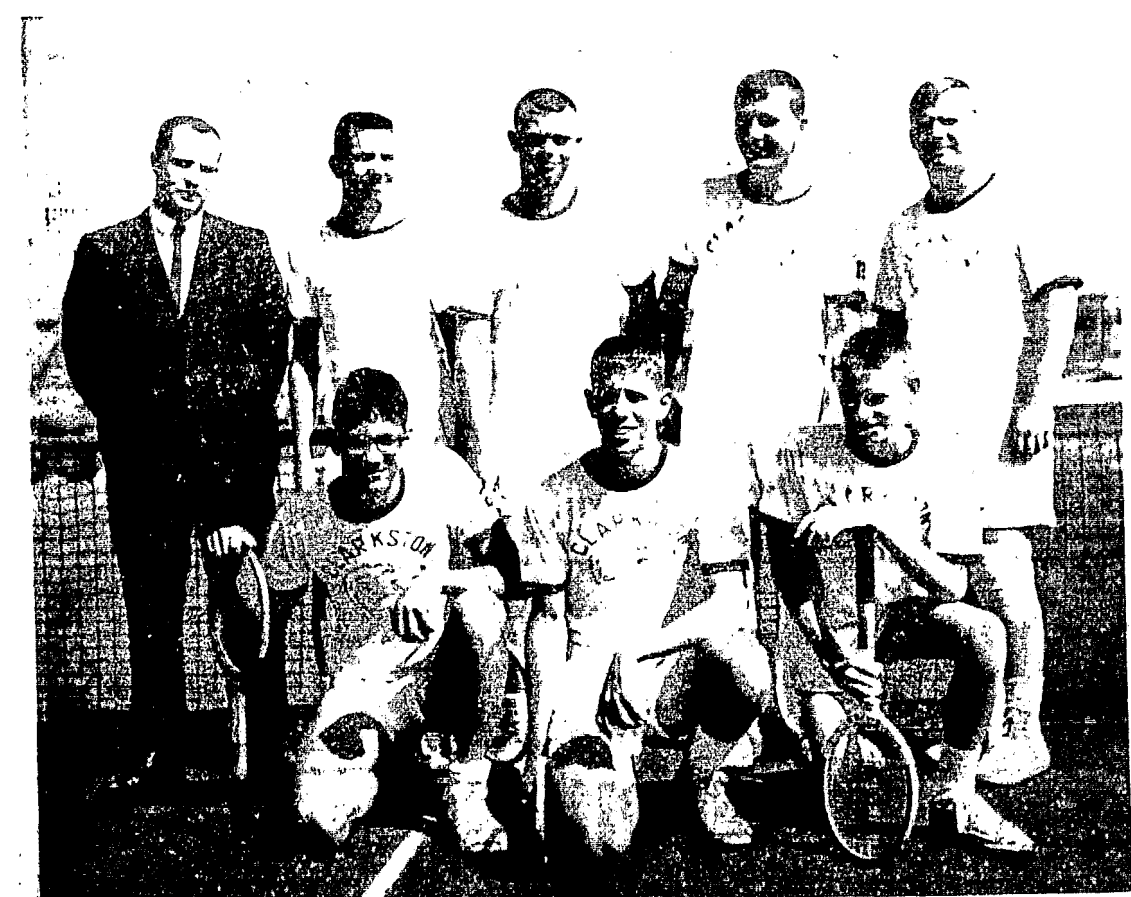
