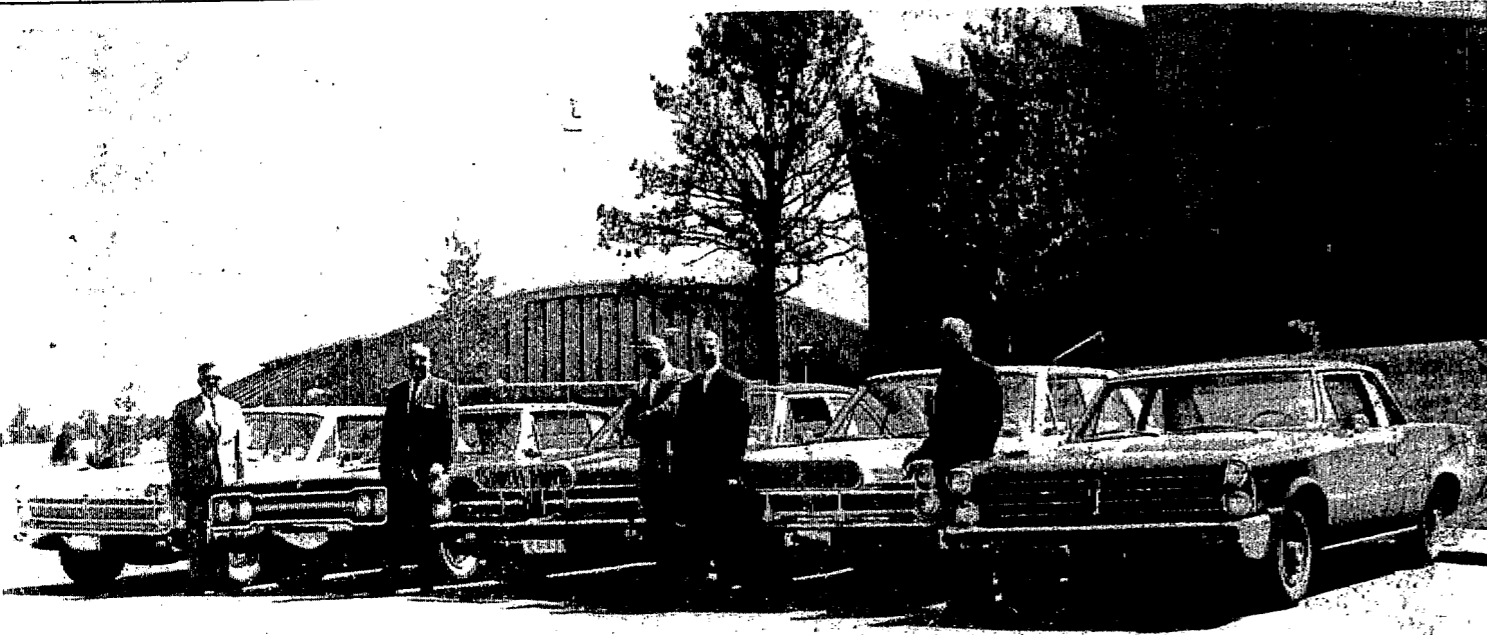

Drawings Approved for School Additions

Working drawings for the Bailey Lake Elementary School addition were approved Monday by Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education. Architect Richard Prince, handling the construction project, was directed to let the plans out for bid with an 8 p.m. July 15 deadline.

Other board action was the approval and signing of a purchase agreement for a future school site located on Maybee Road. Following consideration the board also directed that the administration exercise the option on the Bailey Lake school site for an additional 3.48 acres of property.

A request to transfer certain properties in the Clarkston School district, known as Pleasant Knolls, into the Holly school district was denied. The denial was made on the basis that it was not in the best interests of Clarkston school district.

Area Accidents Drop for Week

Two accidents were reported this week by Michigan State Police, one on M-15 south east of Allen Road and the other on Dixie north of Andersonville Road.

Personal injuries were sustained by Jack Lee Sloan 24 and John Sloan, 21, of 760 Bald Eagle Lake and Robert Burgard, 18, of 1881 M-15 last Saturday when their auto skidded sideways 280 feet and struck a building.

According to driver Jack Sloan, he lost control of his car when another vehicle turned in front of him. The injured were taken to Goodrich Hospital.

Six people were involved in the June 11 two car accident on Dixie. The driver and passengers in one auto were Thomas Trombley, 22, of Davisburg and Homer Bonecutter, 22, and Jack Hood, 28, both of Drayton Plains.

Riding in the second car were Armen Boyagian, 39, and his son Owen, 10, of Detroit and Thomas Zakarian of Dearborn. According to police, Trombley, who had only one headlight, drove to the left of the centerline and struck the Boyagian auto.

Summer School Open to Clarkston Students

Waterford Township Elementary, Junior and Senior High School summer program, available to all youngsters living in Clarkston school district, will begin class sessions June 28. Registrations for the six week course may be made until June 24 from 1-4 p.m. at Waterford Township High School, 1415 Crescent Lake Road. Registrations by mail is also acceptable.

In addition to making up credits lost during the past year, the summer session offers students an opportunity to explore areas of special interests enrich their educational background by taking a course they would not have time for during the regular school year and to assist in developing a saleable skill.

Rotary Celebrates 25th Anniversary

On June 24, 1940, the Clarkston Rotary Club was formed. The club will be celebrating its 25th anniversary at a "Ladies Night" banquet at Howe's Lanes on June 21st. Rotary District Governor John Farrel of St. Clair Shores, and Governor Elect Proctor Dick from Chatham, Ontario, will be present.

In an interview, Rotary President Keith Hallman had the following to say in regard to the event.

"This occasion is significant not just because we have survived 25 years, but because it gives us an opportunity to pay tribute to our founding pioneers, to point with pride to our accomplishments, and to dedicate ourselves to the tasks of tomorrow."

"This occasion gives us an opportunity to explain group functions to those who do not know what Rotary is. Fundamentally, Rotary is a world fellowship of business and professional men who accept the ideal of service, individually and collectively as the basis for success and happiness in business and community life."

In Rotary, thoughtfulness of others is regarded as the basis of service and helpfulness to others as his expression. Together they constitute the Rotary ideal service. To attain this ideal, Rotary helps men develop their abilities to render service in their vocations and their communities.

Rotary is not a secret organization. It does not seek to supplant or to interfere with any religious or political organization. It assumes that its program of service is in accord with all religions, and it does not concern itself with a Rotarian's politics. Rotary expects him to be faithful to his religion and loyal in his citizenship.

Rotary was born out of a lonely man's hunger for friendship and fellowship. From that beginning, the Rotary ideals of friendship, fellowship and service to others have spread through six continents. They have been accepted by men of practically all nationalities - with different political and religious beliefs - by more than half a million business and professional executives in 125 countries throughout the world.

Rotary's membership plan is unique. To make the Rotary Club a true cross section of the community's interests and activities, its membership is selected on the basis of the election of one active member from each recognized business and profession in the community. In this way, each member of the club is looked upon not only as a representative of his own business, but also of his vocation; that is, the entire business or professional field of which he is a part.

Rotary differs from other organizations in that the establishment of a Rotary club links it's community to a world encircling chain of cities and towns where other men have organized Rotary clubs to give expression to their desire to serve. Their affiliation with other Rotary clubs in an international organization, their balanced programs and activities, their financial solvency, and unique basis of membership, give Rotary clubs permanence and stability."

Councilmen Donald Cooper and Robert Wertman were appointed to arrange a meeting with township officials concerning the joint operation of Deer Lake beach, now owned and operated by the Village. A special council meeting was set for June 28 to discuss the results and recommendations of the proposed meeting.

To Attend Institute

Seventy junior and senior high school science teachers representing 23 states will be on the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology campus June 28-August 20 to participate in chemistry and geology institutes co-sponsored by the college and the National Science Foundation. Attending from Clarkston will be William O. Parker.

The summer institutes - 40 participants in chemistry and 30 in geology - will be directed by Dr. Willard Martin, professor of chemistry, and Dr. John Mickelson, an associate professor of geology and geological engineering.

The summer institutes are special programs designed by the National Science Foundation and conducted by over 400 colleges throughout the United States. The programs are intended to insure a high standard of science education throughout American schools by high standard of science education throughout American schools by increasing the instructors' knowledge and experience in that field.

Dump Problems Discussed

Officials of Independence, Brandon and Groveland Townships met Monday evening to discuss future procedures of the jointly operated dump located on M-15, north of Oak Hill Road.

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Incumbent Defeated by Close Margin

Tallied votes, following Monday's annual school election gave Frank G. Ronk and Richard L. Funk seats on Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education. Incumbent Harold L. Hicks was defeated in seeking a second term of office by

a margin of seven votes.

The boost of one-half mill to One Mill tax, for Oakland County special education was passed by a vote of nearly 2 to 1, in the election which saw only 12% of the school district's 5,500 eligible voters turn up at the polls.

Total figures gave Hicks 253 votes, Funk 260 and Ronk 293. The special education proposal was passed by 266 to 141.

Votes, according to precinct, were as follows: Precinct One, 137; Precinct Two, 47; Precinct Three, 78; Precinct Four, 130; Precinct Five, 33 and Precinct Six, 22. There were no spoiled votes. The total overall number of votes cast in all six precincts was 447.

Ronk and Funk will each fill a four year term of office beginning July 4. They will fill the vacancies left by Hicks and retiring Board of Education President Keith Leak.

Following his victory Monday, Ronk stated, "I would like to thank all the voters in the school district for my election and the trust they have placed in me. I will work to the best of my ability to fulfill that confidence." Funk, the second winning candidate, commented, "I wish to express my appreciation to those who voted for me and will endeavor in the next four years, to justify the trust placed in me. I would like also to say that I was pleased to see the passage of the one-half mill tax for special education."

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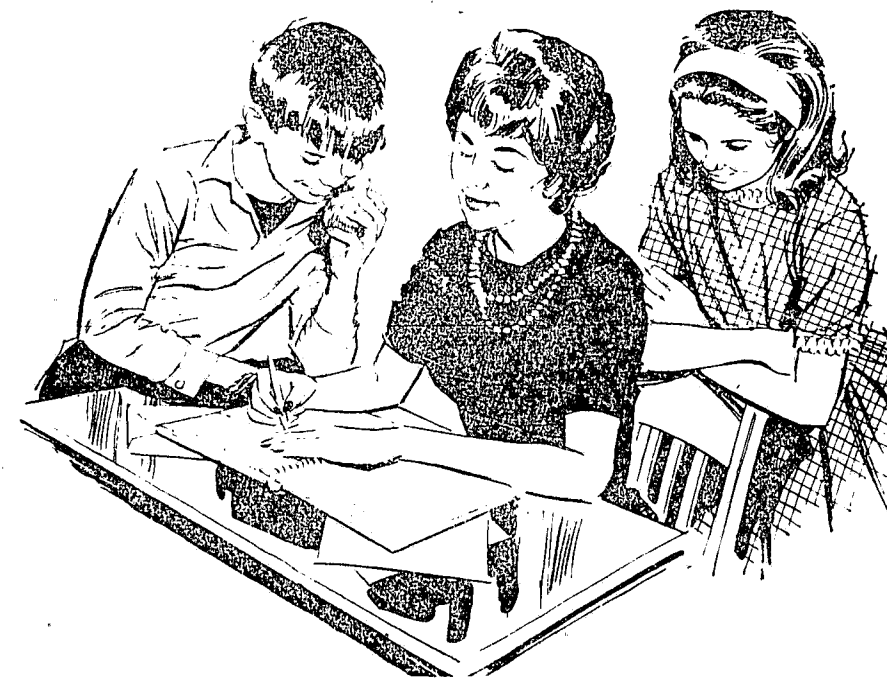


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Construction Bids Awarded

The State Highway Department today announced low bidders on 20 construction projects in 20 counties at a total cost of more than \$12,709,000.

Of a total of 37 previously advertised bids, 16 were withdrawn from the bid letting because federal funds might be withheld. A State Supreme Court decision last month struck down laws permitting the State Highway Department to control encroachments on right-of-way such as billboards. The Department is seeking new legislation.

Oakland County work included the bridge demolition and reconstruction of M-150 (Stephenson Highway) crossing Red Run Creek in Madison Heights. Completion date - Oct. 1, 1965. The bid was awarded to Max R. Frisinger of Ann Arbor at a cost of \$32,941.

Oakland and Wayne Counties: -- 0.607 miles of grading and drainage

structures, concrete pavement with curb and gutter for service roads, interchange ramps, approaches, two bridge structures, one pump house and utility alterations on I-75 (Fisher Freeway) from Remington north to Berhard in Detroit and Hazel Park in Wayne and Oakland Counties. Completion date - July 31, 1967. There were 4 bids. Low bidder: L. A. Davidson, Lansing, \$4,626,487.

Knife and Dart Ordinance

Section 1. A switch blade or self-opening knife is hereby defined as a knife containing a blade or blades which can be opened by depressing a button, pressure on the handle, release of a spring or other mechanical contrivance.

A dart is hereby defined as a pointed weapon or stick thrown by hand.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation or association to sell, offer for sale, keep, possess, use or loan any switch blade or self-opening knife as hereinabove defined. Provided: That the prohibition of this section shall not apply to any one-armed person in possession of such a knife in connection with his living requirements.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, offer for sale, give away or loan to any minor under the age of twenty-one years any dart or knife except for educational purposes, i.e. boy scouts or girl scouts.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to be in possession of a knife with a blade more than (3) inches in length in any of the streets, alleys, parks, boulevards, or other public property in the Village of Clarkston or other private property generally frequented by the public for purposes of education, recreation, amusement, entertainment, sport, or shopping.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person under the age of twenty-one years to be in possession of any knife, dart or instrument of any description that could be used for cutting or stabbing, in any of the streets, alleys, parks, boulevards, or other public property in the village, or other private property generally frequented by the public for purposes of education, recreation amusement, entertainment, sports, or shopping, provided, that this section shall not apply to any person under twenty-one years of age being in possession of any such knife when it is used or carried in good faith as a tool of honest work, trade, business, sport, or recreation, or when used or carried in good faith as equipment related to and required for any legitimate sport, recreation or youth character building program (boy scouts, girl scouts, etc.) when actively engaged therein or actively engaged in going to or returning from such honest work, trade, business, sport, recreation or youth character building program.

Section 6. Any police officer of the Village may and it shall be his duty to arrest without delay any person found violating any provision of this ordinance.

Section 7. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, be guilty of a misdemeanor and be subjected to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

Section 8. The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be severable and, if any phrase, clause, sentence, or section of this ordinance, is declared invalid by the Courts, said invalidity shall not affect the remainder of the ordinance, it being the legislative intent that all remaining provisions, or parts of provisions, shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 9. This ordinance is hereby declared necessary for the preservation of the peace, health, safety and welfare of the people of the Village of Clarkston.

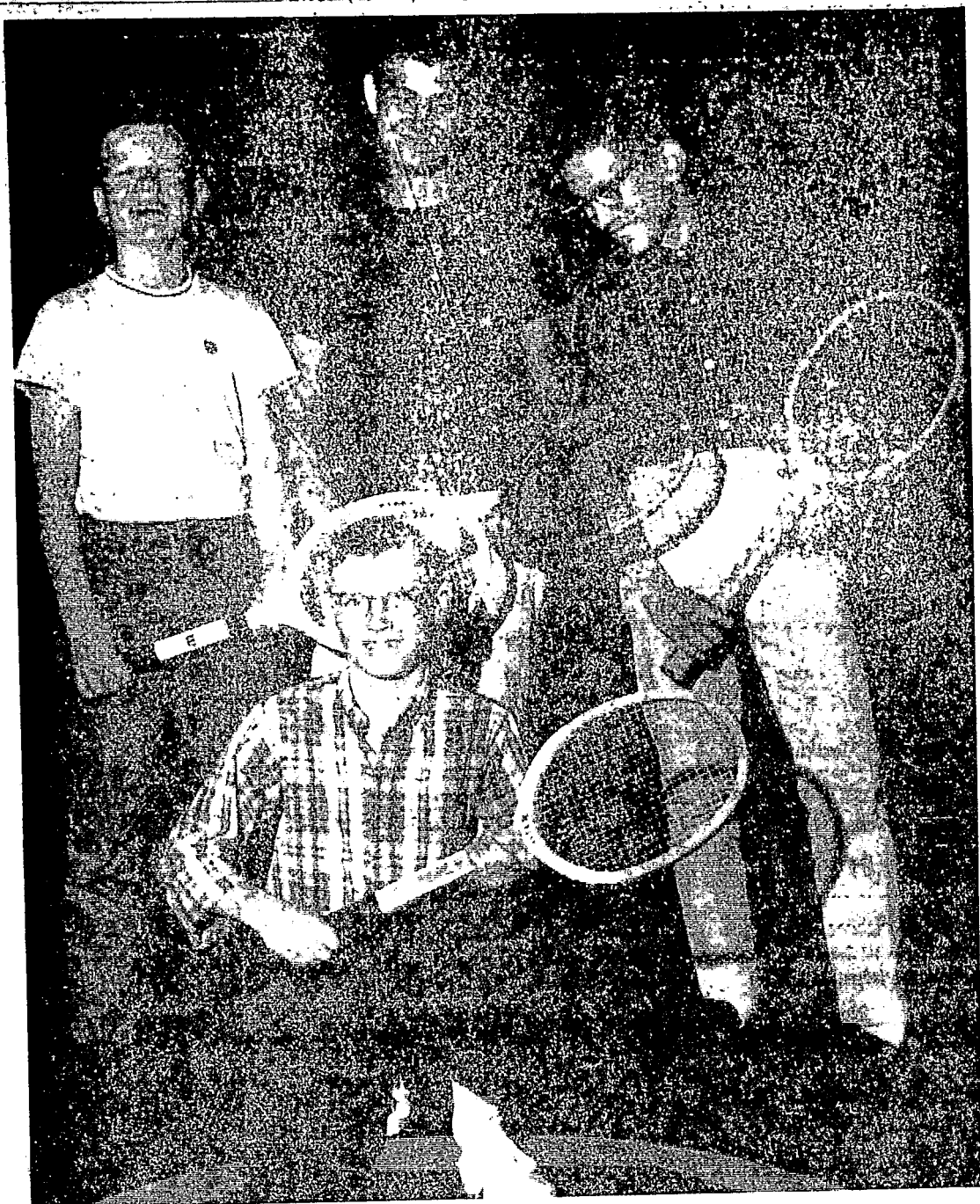

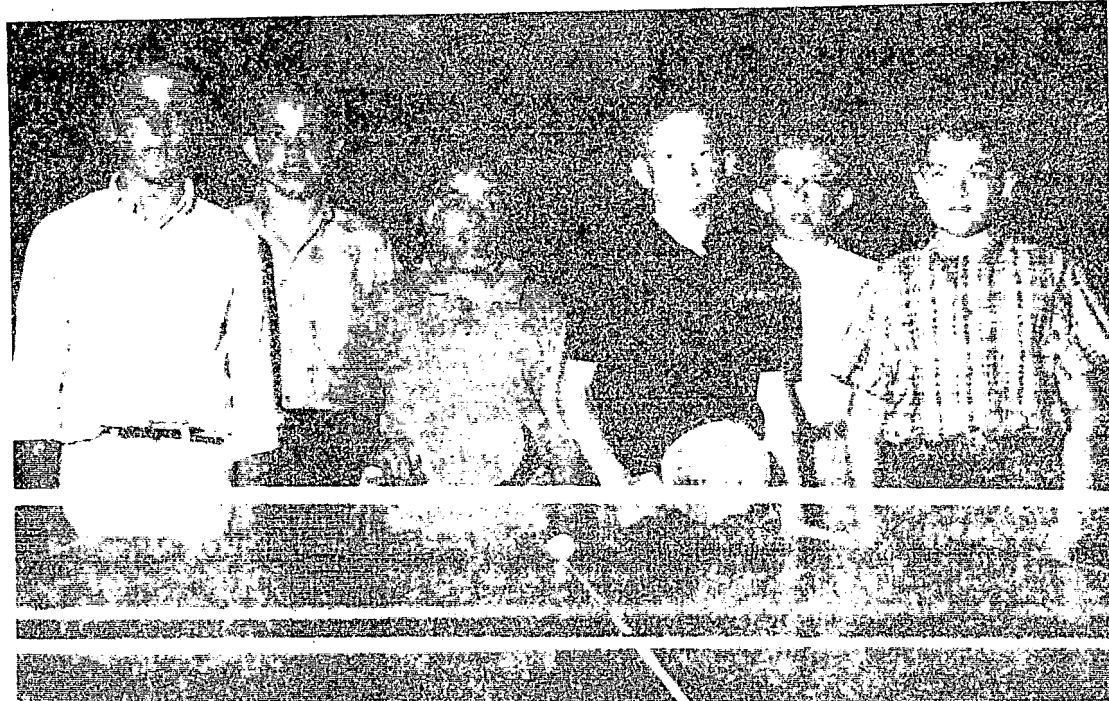
