Ronk and Funk will each fill a four year term of office beginning July 4. They will fill the vacancies left by Hicks and retiring Board of Education President Keith Leak.

Following his victory Monday, Ronk stated, "I would like to thank all the voters in the school district for my election and the trust they have placed in me. I will work to the best of my ability to fulfill that confidence." Funk, the second winning candidate, commented, "I wish to express my appreciation to those who voted for me and will endeavor in the next four years, to justify the trust placed in me. I would like also to say that I was pleased to see the passage of the one-half mill tax for special education.
