Homes and apartments are needed desperately to house Clarkston school teachers before school opens this fall, according to Mr. George Barrie, Assistant Superintendent of Clarkston Community Schools. Mr. Barrie stated that the Board of Education usually receives many offers for rental property by early summer. However, due to a current rental demand, it is more difficult for teachers to obtain dwellings. Teachers are seeking furnished or unfurnished apartments or homes in Clarkston or surrounding areas that would be available before the fall term of school begins. Landlords wishing to rent or lease accomodations to teachers should notify the Board of Education, MA 5-1126.
