Board Holds Hearing on Budget

Included with the regular meeting of the Independence Township Board Tuesday evening was a public hearing on the budget for the '65-'66 fiscal year. One adjustment was made. A transfer of \$2,000 from the revolving fund to the general account was necessary to balance the budget and allow operation within the anticipated income and allocated income of 1.32 mills from Oakland County.

An application for a special beer and wine license, July 31 and August 1, for the Oakland County Sportsman's Club was approved.

Several Clarkston Village council members were on hand to discuss the operation of the beach area on Deer Lake. Council members, John Witherup, Robert Wertman, Donald Cooper, James Huttenlocher and James Mahar asked the Township Board to consider means of participating in the control and operation of the beach area.

According to Clerk Howard Altman, the Township, because of obvious liability commitments incurred by participating in this joint activity, requested that the village submit their proposal so that such consideration could be turned over to the township attorney for his study and consideration.

Township officials showed no indication of committing themselves until it is clearly established what the responsibilities would be for those involved.

The three proposals that were listed as to the operation of the beach were: (1) That it be a joint operation, (2) That the village lease the property to the township, and; (3) That an authority be established for the operation of the beach.

It is anticipated there will be further discussion concerning the beach after a study by the township attorney.

Restraining Order Issued Against Local Business

Independence Township had a restraining order issued against Paul Eghigian of Sashabaw Road for operating or attempting to operate a gravel pit on the corner of Stickney and Sashabaw Roads.

Eghigian appeared before Circuit Court Judge Clark Adams Tuesday. The hearing was re-scheduled for July 26.

Gravel operations are not permitted in the township although the board is working with the planning consultant in an effort to find a means of controlling such operations.

Fire Crackers Cause Three Local Grass Fires

The Independence Township Fire Department answered three fire calls during the Fourth of July weekend all of which were caused by the illegal use of firecrackers.

A grass fire on M-15 a quarter of a mile south of Hadley Road, was extinguished before the fire department's arrival. Children using firecrackers were blamed for the blaze.

Other grass fires which were a direct result of the misuse of firecrackers were at Holcomb Rd. and on Rattalee Lake Road. A total of 700 yards of property were burned in these two fires before they could be extinguished, according to the Independence Township Fire Department records.

State Police Accident Report

Failure to heed a red light at the M-15, U.S. 10 intersection resulted in a two car collision in which two persons were injured July 3, according to State Police records.

Injured were Kathleen Aldrich and Linda Aldrich of 6431 Church, Clarkston. Mrs. Aldrich was traveling south on M-15 when a vehicle driven by Lyman Sink of Owosso struck her car after failing to stop for a red light. Mr. Sink who was not injured, was ticketed for disregarding a traffic signal.

A Clarkston youth, Gary U. Shreves, 5401 Sunnydale, was ticketed for traveling at a speed too fast for conditions after he collided with a Waterford Township police car driven by Officer Ray Wilhelm of Drayton, July 2. Shreves was traveling north on Frembes when he ran a stop sign ramming the police car which was traveling east on Waldon. Officer Wilhelm and his passenger, Waterford Township Supervisor, James Setterlin of Drayton, were both injured and taken to the Pontiac General Hospital by Coats Ambulance, according to State Police records.

County Employers Being Interviewed for Youth Jobs

Board Holds Hearing on Budget

Managers of 15,225 business and industrial companies are being asked to check their current and anticipated needs for employees.

David Soule, Oakland Schools director of vocational education, said the queries are to help determine the kind of vocational and technical training that shall be planned for the youth of Oakland County.

Employers of more than 100 people are now being interviewed in person by representatives of school districts. The mailed questionnaires, printed on sheets that can be fed directly into data processing equipment, are being sent

to companies with fewer than 100 employees.

"Firms will not be identified in any published reports," Soule said. "Answers on the questionnaires will be used for statistical analysis only."

Employers will be asked the average number of people employed in various job categories, the educational and experience requirements of the jobs.

They are also being asked if the local supply of qualified employees in various categories is adequate, or whether there are too many or too few qualified persons available.

The future of varying occupations will be indicated in employers' answers to their prediction of expansion or decrease in the expected rate of employment in different job categories through 1970.

Soule said the questionnaires will be processed and findings will be made public later this summer.

Teachers Need Homes Before Fall Term

Homes and apartments are needed desperately to house Clarkston school teachers before school opens this fall, according to Mr. George Barrie, Assistant Superintendent of Clarkston Community Schools. Mr. Barrie stated that the Board of Education usually receives many offers for rental property by early summer. However, due to a current rental demand, it is more difficult for teachers to obtain dwellings.

Teachers are seeking furnished or unfurnished apartments or homes in Clarkston or surrounding areas that would be available before the fall term of school begins. Landlords wishing to rent or lease accommodations to teachers should notify the Board of Education, MA 5-1126.

In Washington they attended lectures, made special tours and had background talks with Congressman Billie S. Farnum and other officials.

One Accident Mars O.C. Sheriff Holiday Records

Oakland County Sheriff Department records show a near accident free holiday weekend for Independence Township. A one car collision in which a Clarkston man, Joseph Yuchasz, was injured mared the record at the onset of the heavy traffic weekend.

The accident occurred on Clarkston Road near Eston, July 2, when Yuchasz apparently lost control of his vehicle which hit a tree and overturned. He stated that while he doesn't really remember exactly what happened, he thinks he may have fallen asleep. Sheriff Department records show that Yuchasz's automobile was traveling too fast.

Committee Offers County Booklet

The Leagues of Women Voters in Oakland County publication "Know Your Oakland County Government" are now available and being distributed to all interested persons in the area. The booklet is unique in that it contains over-all information on the subject.

The publication contains current information on the structure of Oakland County government, its duties, services, and method of performance. The scope of the survey is indicated in areas which cover the history and growth of Oakland County, the structure and function of county government, how county government conducts internal affairs, the administration of justice and law enforcement, voting and election information, and facts about finance, education, public health, public welfare, public works, and planning.

In 1963, six leagues in Oakland County - Birmingham-Bloomfield, Ferndale-Pleasant Ridge, Oak Park-Huntington Woods, Pontiac, Rochester, and Southfield - undertook the study of county government. A study committee was organized at the county level, chaired by Mrs. Donald Hildum of Rochester, to facilitate the study with the intention of publishing its findings.

The leagues in the county believe that by publishing and distributing the booklet, they are serving the area citizens with factual information about Oakland County that is meaningful. When and if a decision on county home rule has to be made, information on the existing structure and function of county government will help citizens better judge any proposed changes in their county government. Mrs. Hildum commented, "With county home rule being a very current issue, it

is most difficult for citizens to resolve whether or not they wish to implement home rule for Oakland County. The contents of the booklet may be helpful to citizens so they can better assess the function or county government."

Interest in the publication is evident by the number of requests for copies from businesses, from schools for classes in civics, from local governmental officials for reference use, and from many interested in-

dividuals. Immediate distribution of the booklet will go to all township, village, city, and county officials, to all participants of the Oakland County Forum, to all league members in Oakland County, and all libraries who request them.

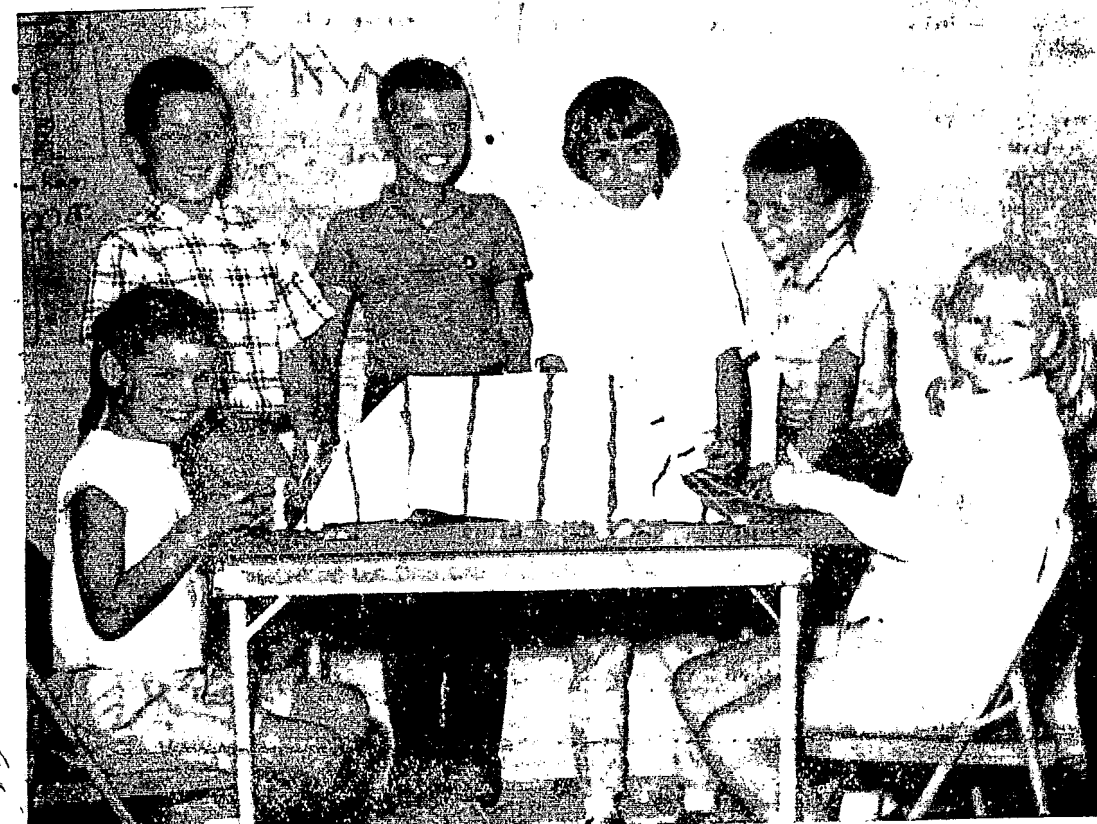

Volunteer Workers Help Make Church School Success

Supervised play periods, refreshments, song fests, interesting handicrafts and Biblical stories, are the ingredients which entice hundreds of area vacationing school children back into classrooms for various church and Bible schools.

One such school just completed at the Clarkston Methodist Church had an average daily attendance of 135 pupils. Realizing that unlike public schools the youngsters attend only if they have the desire, teachers must plan a schedule that will capture the interest of the most active child in order to be successful. Planning for this two week session begins in mid-winter with volunteer workers giving hours of time and effort to insure an effective church school ministry.

Over 25 workers staffed the

Clarkston Methodist Church school which was held June 21, through July 2. The school was divided into departments with each department handling two public school grades. Lead teachers heading the departments were aided by as many helpers as needed to assist the number of pupils enrolled.

A theme was chosen and all of the morning activities were geared around it. Even during game time the theme was evident and children were given the opportunity of putting into effect the lessons they learned during class periods.

One of the vital departments of the Methodist Church School was the nursery. Under the direction of Mrs. Lytle Rae, and with the assistance of Mrs. Don Cameron, Mrs. Richard Christiansen and the 8th

grade girls Sunday School class preschoolers having a parent working in other departments were entertained and cared for.
