## Township To Reduce Property Taxes

Townships and cities in Oakland County were authorized this week to reduce the total property tax levy by two cents per thousand dollars of equalized assessed valuation. Independence Township will be among the townships receiving the tax cut according to Howard Altman, Township Clerk.

Dr. Kenneth W. Brown, deputy superintendent of Oakland Schools, said a combination of actions by the state legislature made it possible for the intermediate school district to reduce its 1965-66 budget request for local taxes from \$346,873 to \$298,873.

In May, Oakland Schools requested and got a tax allocation of 14 cents per thousand dollars of equalized assessed property valuation. Later in the month legislative appropriations for state aid added \$70,000 more than had been expected from that source.

The budget adopted by the inter-

mediate district on July 22 included \$105,000 to extend auxiliary services to non-public schools as provided by Senate Bill 108.

The bill, slightly amended, was signed by Governor George Romney the next day. Amended wording listed services to be offered and "other services as may be determined by the legislature." The wording on which the Oakland Schools board originally acted was "such other auxiliary services as may be offered to public school districts."

Listed services offered by Oakland Schools and remedial reading services include National Defense Education Act testing services, as well as clinical and consultative services for handicapped children.

Speech and psychological clinic services are included in the special education budget, Dr. Brown said. These services will be extended to non-public school children on request.

Guidance testing in the 7th, 9th and 11th grades, and reading clinic facilities and consultant services for reading teachers are covered in the general budget. These can be offered to private and parochial school children for an estimated \$14,000 a reduction of \$61,000 from the anticipated cost of extending all Oakland School offerings to non-public schools.

A second budget amendment, not influenced by re-wording of Senate Bill 108, added \$13,000 for expansion of the social studies department. An Assistant and additional clerical help for Dr. Myles Platt, director of social studies, will be provided. The net change in the face of the budget was \$48,000.

Oakland Community College has received approval for participation in the College Work-Study Program in the amount of \$76,140 from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Dr. John E. Tirrell, OCC President, announced today.

Full-time students may obtain jobs on the College campus at \$1.25 per hour for a maximum of 15 hours per week.

Students participating in the program must be from a low-income family or be in need of the earnings from such employment in order to pursue a course of study at the College.

Employment opportunities include general clerical, data processing, custodial, grounds maintenance, and cafeteria work.

The program will be administered by Arthur W. Jalkanen, Dean of Student Personnel.

## 1965 Goal Set At \$5,650.75

Prior to the official opening of the United Fund Campaign, October 14, Independence Township women are busy with preparations for the 1965 Drive.

Mrs. James Cowen of 6170 Overlook Drive, Chairman of last year's

campaign, has been re-appointed Residential Chairman of the Women's Campaign for the Township. Under her direction, area chairmen met last week at the home of Mrs. Vincent Bronsing, 8846 Thendara, Clarkston, Chairman for Area II.

Others present were Mrs. Harry Horsch and Mrs. Richard Johnston, co-chairmen for Area I, Mrs. Glenn Bernor, Area III Chairman and Mrs. Louis Lessard, Chairman of Business Solicitation. As in previous years, Independence Township is divided into three areas, the areas into 31 districts, a chairman in charge of each district. Last year, 200 women volunteers from this community, the equivalent of a small army, were organized to achieve the goals of the United Fund.

The majority of the area chairmen have served in previous campaigns and are alert to the challenge of the United Fund effort and the necessity of spirit and teamwork to a successful campaign. "At our initial meeting, stated Mrs. Cowen, we mapped out the groundwork for the weeks ahead. We are pleased that a number of the district chairmen already have been named. We expect to have our organizational set-up complete by August 17, at which time District Chairmen from Pontiac, Waterford, Independence, Lake Orion and Lake Angelus areas will meet for an Orientation Luncheon at Kingsley Inn."

"Independence Township residents should be very proud of their tremendous response to last year's campaign," Mrs. Cowen stated. Exceeding their goal by 41 per cent, they ranked highest of any district in the Pontiac area," she added.

Mrs. Cowen is confident that the response of the township in this year's campaign will see the goal requirements of \$5650.75 once again met.

Funds received through United Foundations efforts are disbursed through various organizations thru which needy Independence residents were aided during the last year.

Area scout troops were among those who received a substantial amount of support from UF as did the Independence Township Recreational Department. First Aid, water safety classes, bloodmobile and home nursing were also made available to the area through UF efforts. Needy families were aided by family service, child guidance clinics, St. Joseph Hospital Clinic, and the Michigan Cancer Foundation. Each of these services will be provided once again this coming year as Independence Township families respond to the UF appeal.

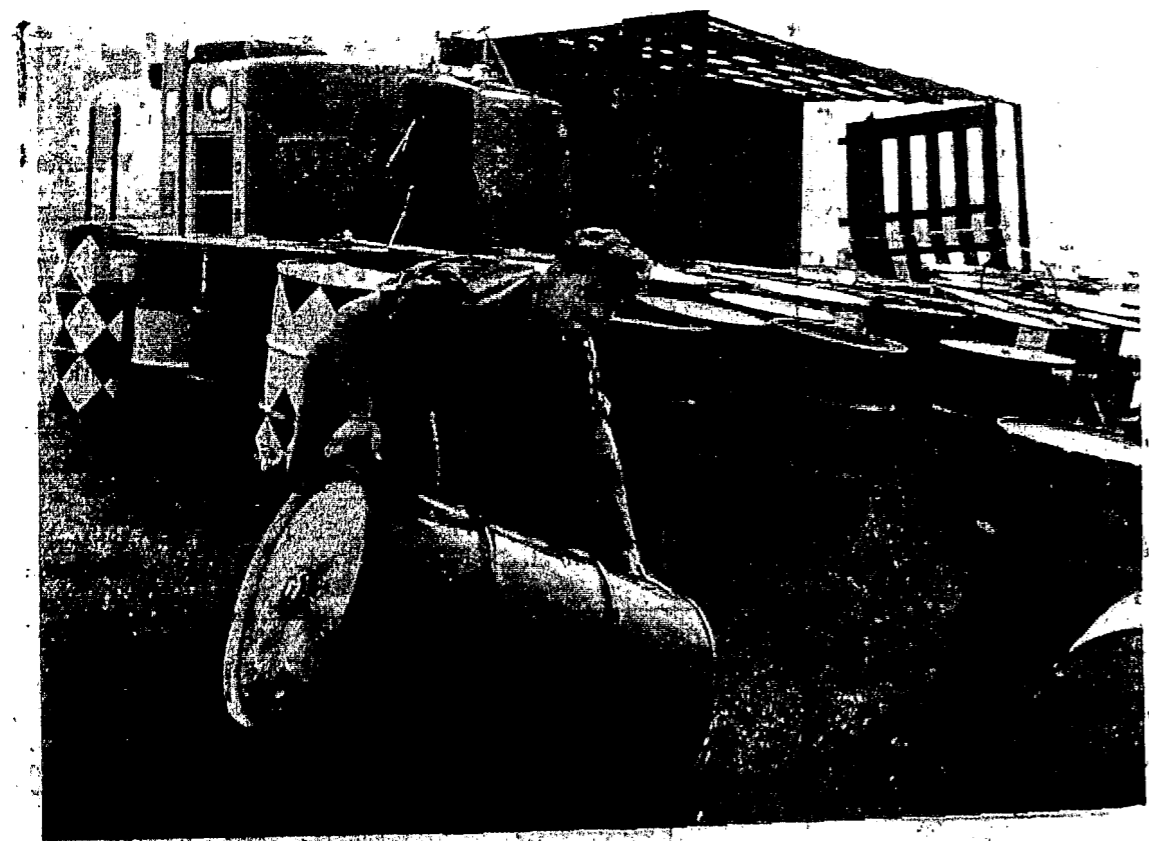
There is no charge for admission and the public is invited.

## State Fair to Hold 15th Annual Service Sunday, August 29

The Michigan State Fair's 15th annual Sunrise Service will feature as speaker Judge Luther W. Youngdahl of the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, one of America's leading Christian laymen.

Held in co-operation with the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches, the service will take place in the Music Shell at 8 a.m. Sunday, August 29, Religion Day at the State Fair. All persons will be admitted to the Fairgrounds free until 8 a.m.

Judge Youngdahl will be making his third appearance as a Sunrise Service Speaker. He opened the series in 1951 when he was Governor of Minnesota. He was enthusiastically received, and State Fair officials brought him back in 1953. Judge Youngdahl is a great champion of youth, a strong friend of education, and a firm believer in "honesty and humanity in government." He also believes that "the nation which fails to give integrity to the home will ultimately pass into oblivion."

He has a long record of service in such organizations as the Boy Scouts, the YMCA, and the PTA. He is a vice president of the American Bible Society, and a member of the Board of Adjudication of the Lutheran Church in America.

He was named Lutheran of the Year in 1959 and Washington's Layman of the Year in 1955. In 1962 the University of Minnesota presented him with its Outstanding Achievement Award.

The State Fair opens Friday evening, August 27, and runs through Labor Day, Monday, September 6.

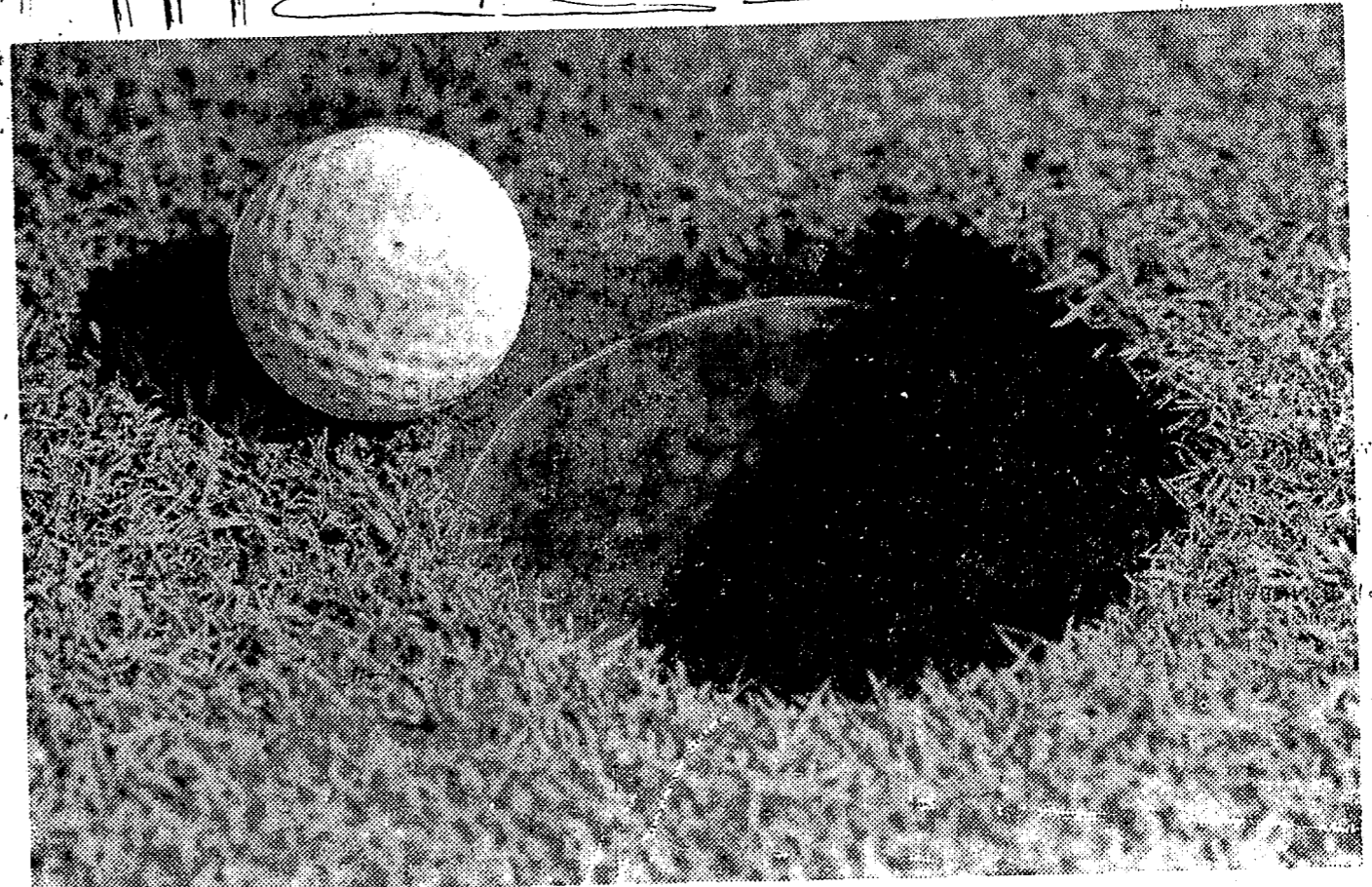

## Recipe of The Week

Mrs. Ermal Fender of Allen Road has offered the following recipe as an especially delicious way to prepare spare ribs.

**INSIDE BBQ SPARE RIBS**  
2 sides of spare ribs

2 medium onions  
1/2 C. catsup  
1 C. water  
1/2 t. chili powder  
1/2 T. Worcestershire sauce  
2 T. vinegar  
1 t. salt  
1 T. sugar  
1 t. dry mustard  
Cut ribs into serving pieces; combine rest of ingredients into sauce, cover in pan; bake for 2 hours at 375 degrees; uncover for the last 1/2 hour.

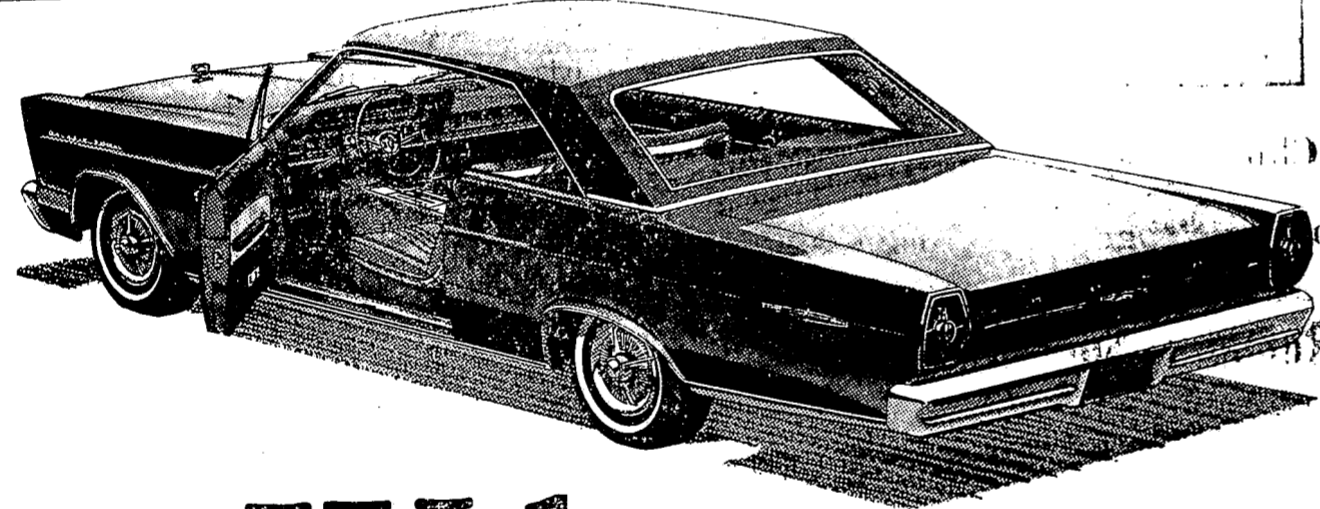

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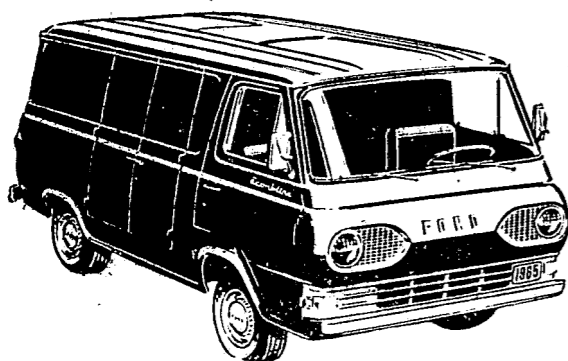

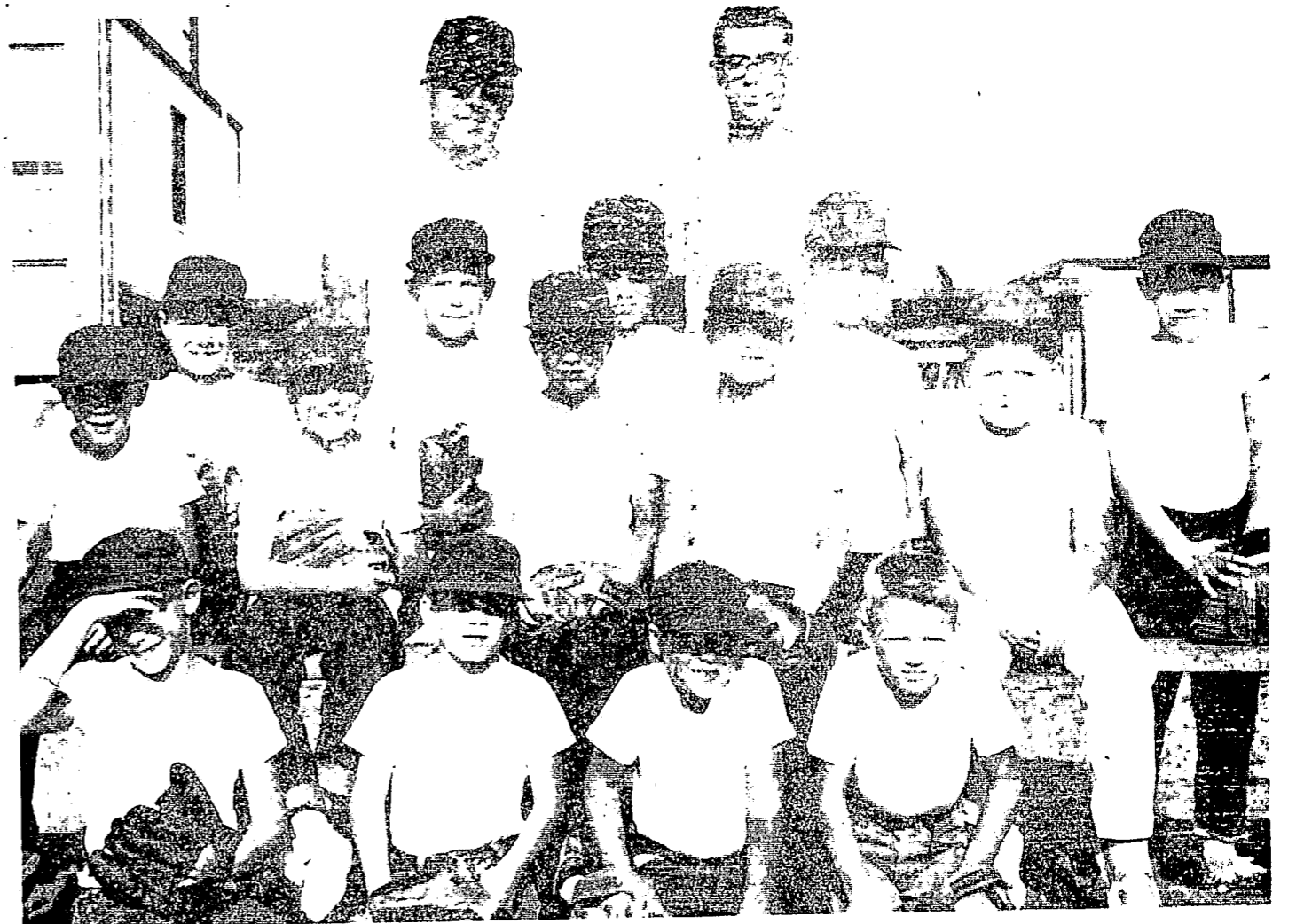

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## Bad Drivers — Beware

If you are one of a tiny number of "chronic bad drivers" in constant trouble with your driving and running up points or getting into other trouble, you had better mend your ways because the Michigan Department of State has declared "open season on you."

A four-point program against these "incorrigibles" was outlined by Secretary of State James M. Hare who ordered the "crackdown."

"Something has to be done to curb this hard-core of bad drivers," Hare said. "We decided on a 'tough' approach."

Hare said that it involved only 10,000 of the state's more than 4 1/2 million licensed motorists, a "minuscule one-quarter of one percent."

The Hare crackdown involves these actions:

(1) Rigid minimum actions for accumulated points. Where officials heretofore had an option on actions, penalties are now sharper, more defined, and tougher. For instance, a 17-pointer now automatically receives a 10-day suspension on his first re-examination. Before, the driver improvement official could have permitted this driver to continue driving if, in his judgment, circumstances warranted it.

(2) Obtaining records from the

state police which would help shape and determine the severity of the penalty. Some drivers have records which are dotted with drunk driving, assaults, and other criminal actions, Hare charged. He said he was hopeful that something could be worked out with the state police on this matter.

(3) Notifying local law enforcement officials of action taken against bad drivers and asking these

officials to "keep an eye on these offenders to see that they do not drive during their suspension or revocation periods. Hare said that one of the major problems was that an estimated 50 percent or more of all suspended or revoked motorists drive anyway, and "enforcing penalties is the toughest part of our entire DI procedure."

(4) The positive identification of the "alcoholic personality" and "referral to a clinic, official agency organization or private physician for medical help."

Hare pointed with pride to the general effectiveness of the point system, which he said works with more than 99 percent of all motorists. He said that since 1958, some 300,000 re-examinations had been held involving 225,000 individual drivers.

"You can deduce that a mere five percent of all drivers are never in trouble with their driving and that the first re-examination is effective," he noted. "The real chronic offenders . . . the persons who are back for two or more re-exams . . . constitute only a fraction of this five percent."

He said that this year, more than 80,000 warning letters would be sent to drivers with seven to 11 points. These are being produced on the computer for faster output and more accuracy. Records of all drivers against whom any action is taken, seven-pointers and above . . . are being computerized for studies and fast updating.
