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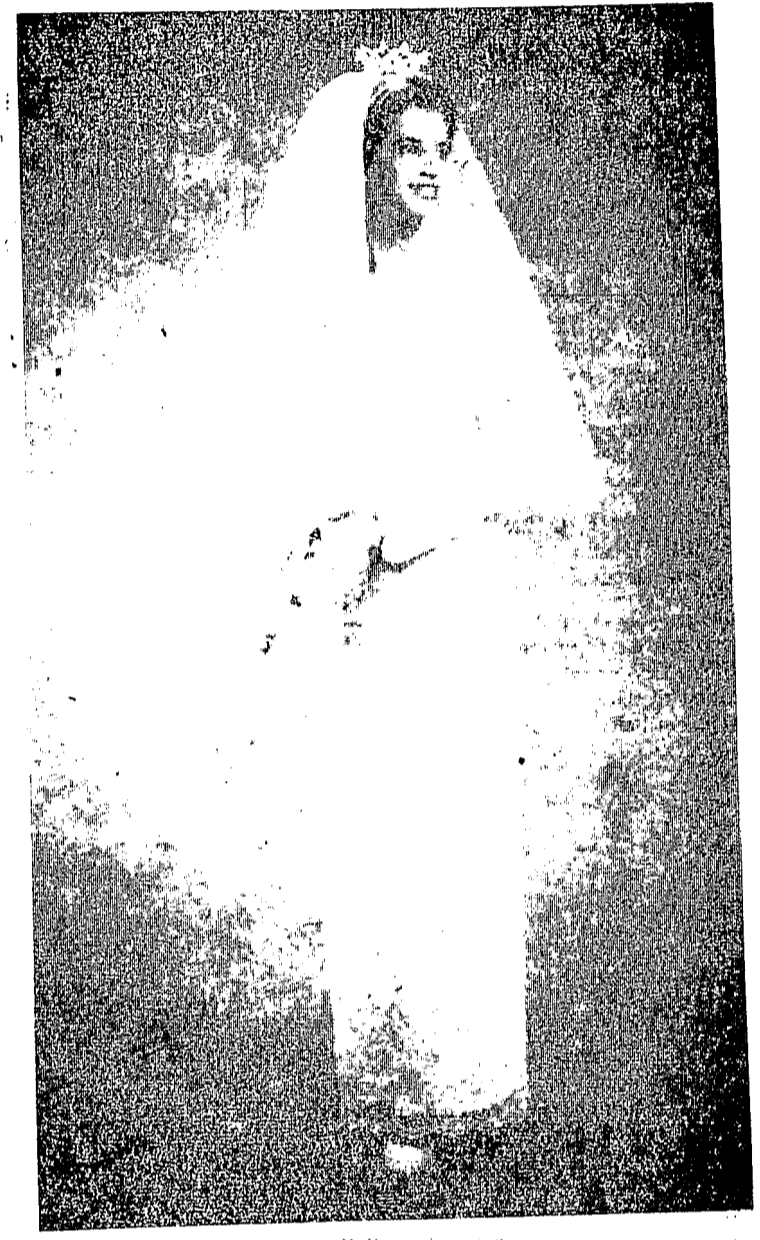

## Cool Weather Keeps Water Deaths Down

One hundred sixty deaths in 282 water accidents reported up through July 30 this year are 40 less than the 200 fatalities recorded in 372 mishaps for the same period in 1964, the state Police report.

The breakdown of 125 of the deaths on which official reports have been received included 44 swimmers or waders, 24 boat passengers, 21 boat operators, 21 who fell from bridges, banks, docks or piers, 13 who fell through ice, one skin or scuba diver and one who drowned trying to rescue another. Provisional information has been received on 35 other drownings. In addition, 118 persons have been injured.

The decreases in deaths and accidents are attributed to the generally cooler weather conditions prevailing this spring and early summer which have somewhat restricted water activities and also to increased emphasis on water accident prevention throughout the state.

Mr. Keith Hallman was appointed by the council to fill the vacancy left by John Witherup's resignation. Mr. Hallman was sworn in as Trustee by the Clerk.

A report on the control of diseased elm trees was given. The council is going to wait until reports from the Detroit program are given before any action is taken.

Harry Fahrner, representing the Junior Chamber of Commerce, was present to request permission for the JC's to operate concessions during the Labor Day Week End.

Moved by Goyette, "That the village support the JC's request to close Washington Street from Main Street to the West Alley and the electrical facilities." Seconded by Mahar. Motion carried. The JC's were instructed to obtain certificates of insurance from the owners of the buildings to be set up.

Police Chief Robert Phillips reported on police activities. Tickets are being issued in the Deer Lake Area and Mill Pond area for violations.

Several residents of the Deer Lake area were present to request stronger policing of the Beach in

the winter as well as summer to prevent litter from being thrown on the ice. The council reported that solutions to the Deer Lake area problems are still being studied.

Moved by Mahar, "That the Junior Chamber of Commerce be allowed to use the Village Hall for their monthly board meetings." Seconded by Goyette. Motion carried.

Howard Kieft, Village Engineer, reported on the blacktopping of the Middle Lake and Overlook Roads area. Trustee Cooper was to check with the Village attorney on the

village's obligation towards property owners who have had difficulty with levels of their driveways after these roads have been blacktopped.

Trustee Cooper was asked to check the technicalities involved with changing street names.

The clerk was instructed to present a proposed agreement for the village's participation in payment for work on Waldon road to the Village Engineer for study.

Moved by Wertman, "That the meeting be adjourned." Seconded by Goyette. Motion carried.

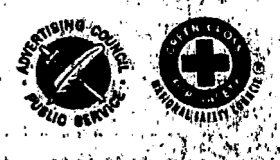

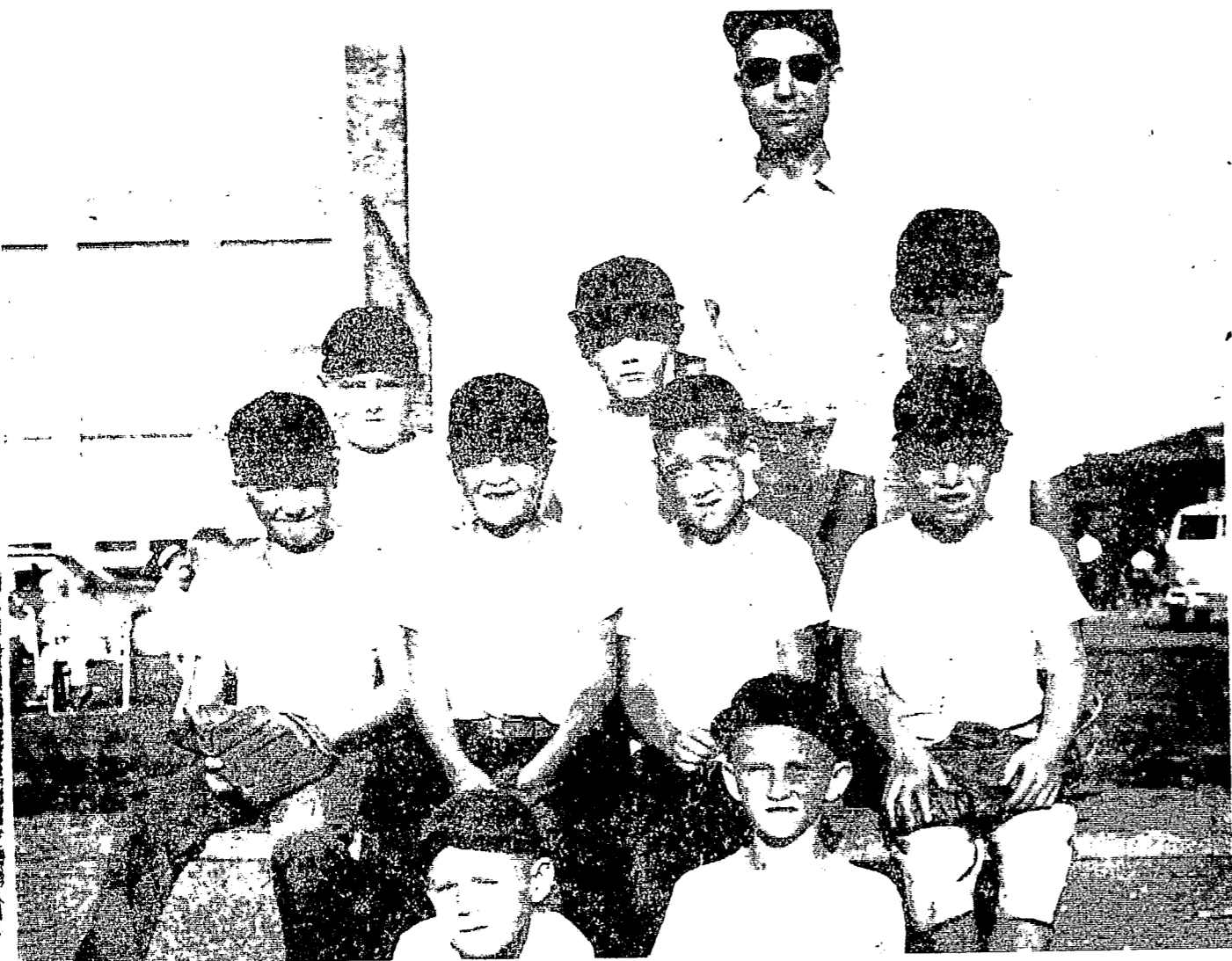

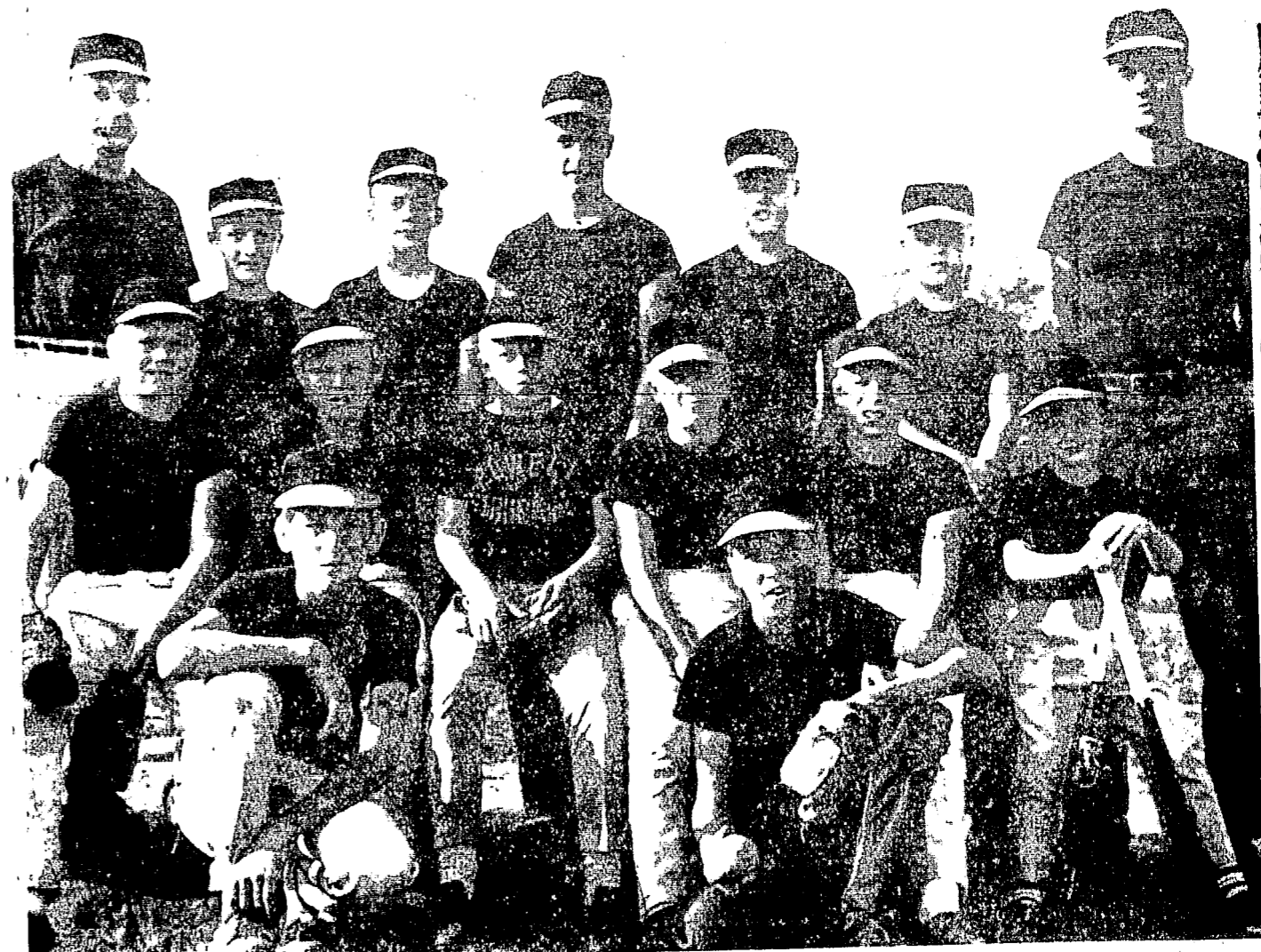

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## Local Teenager Wins Acclaim as Amateur Golfer

Rolling acres and freshly mowed grass would delight most children as an area in which to romp and play; but to Feather Frechette it has been a place of work and practice.

Feather, who has placed in more than a dozen golf tournaments throughout the United States, embarked upon her golfing career at the age of eight. It was at this time that her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Frechette, developed their land into the Clarkston Country Club where Feather has since spent endless hours improving her golf game.

"For a couple of years I just hit the ball around," the petite eighteen year old young lady remarked. "I didn't really take the game seriously until I was about 12."

It was at this time that Feather began developing her talent under the capable instruction of a professional teacher, Mike Dietz, at Indianwood Country Club. Now an avid golfer, her unending cycle of daily practice was to become a way of life for the young teenager.

Feather's faithful practicing began to pay dividends early as she began placing in junior golf tournaments. Among these early achievements were the National Junior Tournament, the Western Junior Tournament, and the State Junior Tournament.

More recently, her golf honors have come from tournaments at Tam-O-Shanter in Orchard Lake, Jackson Country Club (where she won consolation) and the State Championship Flight. In the last tournament she placed among the top eight, qualifying her for the quarter finals.

In the Pontiac Invitational Tournament last year, Feather and her partner, Francis Bertram, walked away with top honors. In 1965 they placed third in this tournament.

She and her partner, Harold Stewart, placed fourth out of 82 teams at this year's invitational game at Plum Hollow.

Though Feather is an only child, she has never lacked companionship.

On the course or at home, Feather is surrounded by her pet dogs. Her favorite, Horgan, is her most constant companion. The overweight mongrel waddles behind Feather for about five holes when he becomes too tired to continue the trek. However, on days that Feather takes the riding cart, Horgan will jump aboard and remain with his mistress for the complete game.

Feather's success at golfing and the fame that comes with repeated victories have seemingly left little effect on the pleasant teenager. Her unspoiled attitude and outgoing personality give little evidence of her unusual ability.

Life for her does not revolve completely around her well loved game of golf, however. During the past winter she took up skiing and has a general interest in all sports.

After spending her freshman year of high school at Oxford, Feather transferred to Rosarian Academy at West Palm Beach where for the next two years she pursued both golfing and her academic education. Feather graduated from the Bloomfield Country Day School this past June.

During these high school years, sports were her greatest interest, and she belonged to most of the athletic clubs. She was also a member of the choir.

Her future plans are not long-ranged. Next fall she plans to enter Northwood Institute in Midland where she plans to major in retailing and marketing.

"I'm undecided about professional golf," she stated. "There are so many pressures when you play for money."

However, she still has not completely ruled out professional golf and has a decided interest in teaching the game. But, for now, Feather is content with her world of golfing, sports, family, friends, and schooling.

Young people considering a golfing career might do well to heed Feather's advice. "Take lessons from a professional and practice, practice and practice."

## Family Facts

This is the time of year when mildew can be a problem. Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Home Economists remind homemakers that the mildew mold can flourish wherever it is damp, warm, poorly aired, and poorly lighted.

To prevent the mildew from forming in the first place, keep closets, dresser drawers and basements, and any other places where mildew is likely to grow as clean as possible. Soil on articles can supply sufficient food for mildew to start growing when moisture and temperature are right.

There are many ways to get rid of dampness in your home. The first is by providing adequate ventilation. Leave closet doors and dresser drawers open occasionally to keep moisture from gathering and to stir up the enclosed air. Drying the air by heating or a mechanical dehumidifier, or with chemicals that absorb moisture, are effective methods to prevent mildew formation.

To remove mildew stains from clothing and household fabrics, wash the article as soon as the stain is discovered. Dry the garment in the sun. If any stain remains, bleach with lemon juice and salt, or a diluted solution of household bleach.

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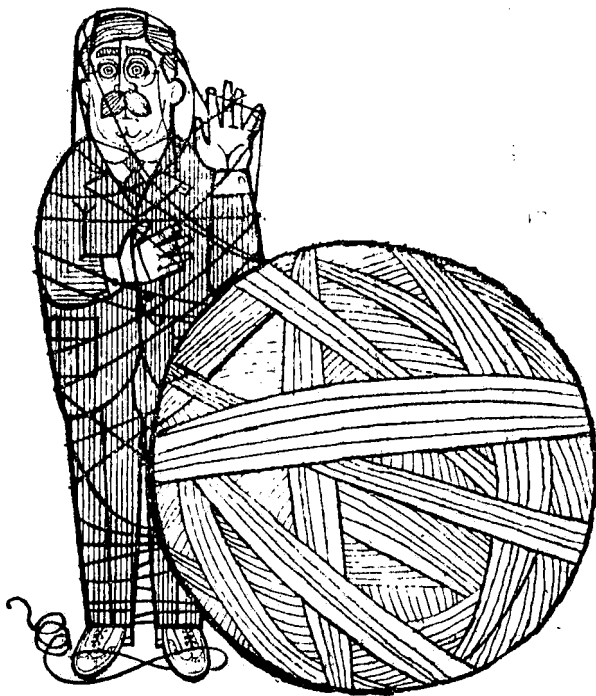
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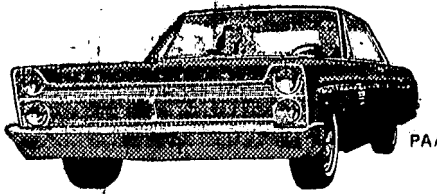
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
