Saluting Independence Fire Department

National Fire Prevention Week Oct. 3-10

The volunteer fire department of Independence Township deserves the commendation of the community in a job well done during the past year. It seems appropriate that during this week of October 3-10, National Fire Prevention Week, a special tribute be paid to this thirty man unit.

Under the direction of Fire Chief, Donald Beach, the department has responded to over 300 calls in the past year. Equipped to handle nearly every emergency that might arise, the department boasts three pumper engines, two pick-up trucks specially built for fighting grass fires, one tank truck which doubles as an extra pumper, and one fully equipped rescue truck.

According to "Tink" Ronk, assistant fire chief, the equipment owned by the department is comparable to that of most communities of like size and population.

Firemen responded to calls when notified by radios placed in each of their homes by the township. This system has proved an effective

method of assuring fast arrival by the firefighters, who will go directly to the scene upon receiving their call.

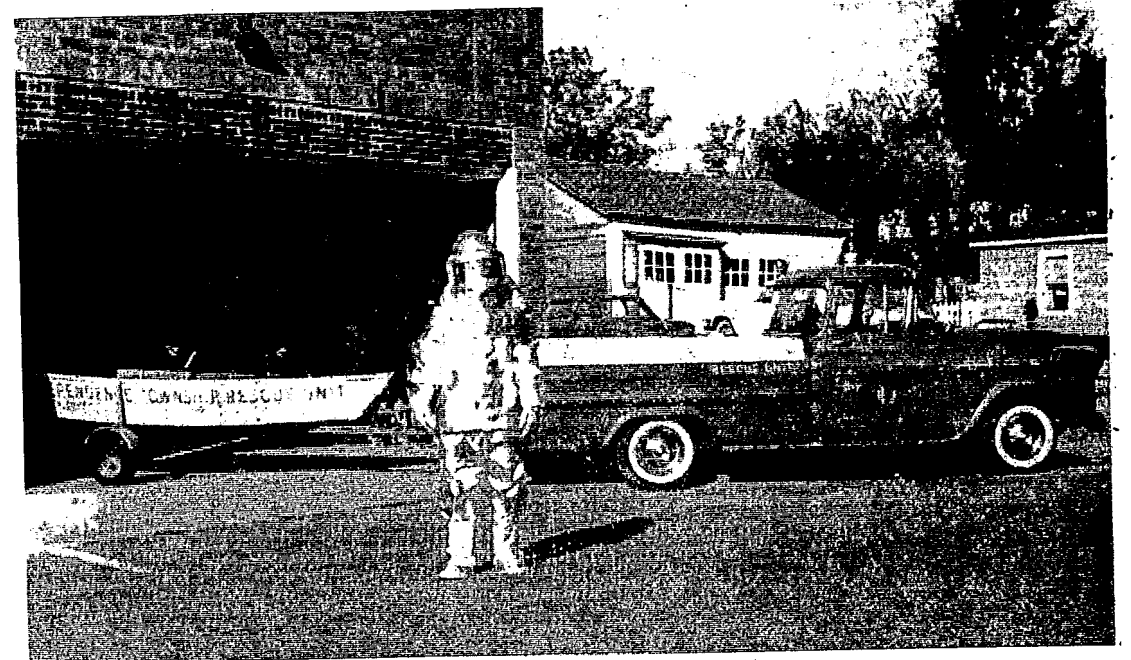
Each of the men on the Independence Fire Department has been trained on his own time at regular training meetings set up by the chief. During the last year these training sessions were set up twice monthly.

A volunteer department differs from a paid department in that each volunteer is trained to know all jobs ranging from driving and operating an engine to operating a resuscitator. In a paid department each man is assigned a particular job such as hose man, ladder man or driver.

Mr. Ronk stated that a paid department is definitely a future possibility for Independence Township. "When this will come to pass will depend largely on the rate of growth in the area," he added.

"The fire service at present is probably not quite as efficient as could be achieved with a paid department," he stated. "However, it is presently adequate for the Township needs. The difference it would make at this time would be too slight to merit a change," Mr. Ronk added.

The Clarkston News, noting the quick response and commendable team work displayed by the force at fires covered by this paper, join with the community in a salute to each of these men.

Clarkston Student Receives Letter of Commendation

Charles Pearson of Clarkston High School has been honored with a letter of Commendation for his high performance on the national Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT) given last spring. He is among 38,000 students across the nation recognized for scoring in the top two percent of students who will complete high school in 1966. The commended students rank just below the 14,000 Semifinalists announced last month.

John M. Stalmaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation said: "These students are being recognized for their outstanding performance on the qualifying test. There is a notable academic achievement."

"In a rigorous competition like the Merit Program, it is unavoidable that many fine students will miss being named Semifinalists by a narrow margin. Nevertheless, the student in this situation is very capable and deserves generous recognition for his distinguished effort."

"The Commended students have considerable ability, which should be developed through further education. They deserve every encouragement, and their promise is great. They represent an important intellectual resource which our nation needs."

Only the highest-scoring students in each state, the Semifinalists, remain eligible for further consideration in the Commendation advance no farther in the Merit Program, their names are reported to other scholarship-granting agencies and to the college they named at the time they took the NMSQT as their first and second choices. NMSC also reports home address.

OU Enrollment up 36 Percent

A 36 percent increase has pushed Oakland University's fall enrollment to 2458 this fall, according to Thomas Atkinson, registrar.

The jump of 646 students over last fall's total of 1812 is the largest experienced by the school, which opened classes or 570 students just six years ago.

State Police Records Show Rash of Independence Area Accidents

Two cars were damaged last Friday afternoon in an accident which occurred on Dixie Highway in front of Ritter's Market in a prelude of a weekend blighted with a rash of area accidents. Charles Allen of Holly lost control of his car while trying to stop for another vehicle making a turn. Mr. Allen's car struck one parked at Ritter's Market and owned by Robert Schliter of Pontiac. There were no injuries according to State Police records.

A third vehicle driven by Joy Stevens of Holly rammed the back of the Pettis vehicle pushing it into the Johnson car.

A hit and run accident, Saturday on Dixie Highway resulted in property damage to a car driven by John Kashmar of Owosso. Kashmar whose automobile was struck in the rear by an unidentified driver, was unable to furnish police with any information on the hit-run vehicle.

Sunday afternoon a car driven by Arthur Wilson of Drayton Plains, which was stopped for the light on Dixie Highway at M-15, was struck by a truck driven by William Hearn of Rochester. There were no serious injuries reported.

Sashabaw Road at Maybee was the scene of a three car collision Sunday afternoon in which two

girls were injured.

According to State Police records Connie Ramsey of Drayton Plains failed to yield the right of way at the stop sign on Maybee. Her car was struck in the right side by one driven by Donald Schneider of Clarkston. The impact caused the Schneider car to spin around and hit a vehicle driven by Raymond Hildreth.

Miss Ramsey and a passenger in her car Judy Gules of Clarkston were injured. Two other passengers in the Ramsey car, Carol Sedlowski of Drayton and Eva Hefferman of Clarkston escaped injuries.

I-75 near Sashabaw was the scene of an accident Sunday evening which occurred when a car driven by Vaughn Reasoner of Flint left the highway as he rounded a curve. The car which went into the median, flipped four times. Reasoner and a passenger, John Martin of Flint, were thrown from the vehicle. They were taken to Pontiac General Hospital.

New Radios for Local Police Force

The Clarkston Village Council has authorized the purchase of four radios which have been installed in village police cars and one new base unit. The new equipment makes possible the dispatching of a car within moments after a call is received.

Chief of Police Robert Phillips has stated that an all-out effort to enforce curfews will be undertaken by the local department during the month of October.

One Dead in Area Accidents

William Gilmore, 53, of Pontiac was fatally injured in one of three accidents to which the Oakland county Sheriff Department responded Saturday.

A passenger in his car, Wilford L. Taylor of South Dakota, 24, was taken to Pontiac General Hospital where a hospital spokesman reported his condition as satisfactory early this week.

The accident occurred when Gilmore lost control of his vehicle and struck a tree while traveling north on the Dixie Highway near Foster Road.

Witness' told Sheriff officers that the Gilmore car was traveling at a high rate of speed, whipping in and out of traffic prior to the collision.

Joan Marie Shepard, 25, was taken to Pontiac General Hospital following an accident which occurred Saturday at 1:45 a.m. Mrs. Shepard told Sheriff deputies her car pulled to the right and she was unable to bring it under control.

In another accident on Saturday, Everett McDowell, 5830 Andersonville Road was injured. The accident occurred in the village of Clarkston when Mr. McDowell struck a car parked on M-15. In a statement made to Oakland County Sheriff deputies, McDowell said that he did not see the vehicle until he hit it. The damaged car is owned by Helen Leak.

Crawley Among Honored

Representative Francis A. Crowley of Clarkston was among 9 State men to be a 1965 recipient of the statesmanship award plaques and citations "in recognition of distinguished service and dedicated effort to maintain the highest standards of patient care in Michigan's non-profit hospitals."

These honors were bestowed upon Representative Crowley during the mid-year meeting of the House of Delegates of the Michigan Hospital Association, made the presentation at the luncheon October 1.

Owen Pinkerman, director of the William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak and president of the Michigan Hospital Association, made the presentation at the luncheon October 1st.

Among the senators being honored are John E. McCauly (D-Wyandotte); Coleman A. Young (D-Detroit); and Milton Zaagman (R-Grand Rapids).

Other representatives singled out are Dominic J. Jacobetti (D-Nogans); William B. Fitzgerald (D-Detroit); William A. Boss, Jr. (D-Saginaw); Peter Kok (R-Grand Rapids); and Roy L. Spencer (R-Attica).

Independence Township To Be Represented In Genesee Utility Authority

The Independence Township Board passed a resolution to apply for membership in the Genesee Valley Utilities Authority at a regularly scheduled meeting held Tuesday evening. The utility, which was initially formed by eleven townships, controls board membership on a population basis. Independence will be allotted two members for a fee of \$50.00 each per year, according to Howard Altman Township Clerk.

The township previously withheld participation in the utility authority because they felt that an "escape clause" should be provided in the constitution and by-laws of the organization allowing any member, prior to contractual obligation, visualizing little or no benefits, to withdraw from the utility authority. The Township attorney, Paul Mandel, substantiated the position of the board in this regard which resulted in a change of the utilities authority constitution and by-laws, so that this clause is now provided.

At the request of Supervisor, Duane Hursfall, Howard Kieft Engineering submitted an estimate cost and outline drawing of a special assessment district of surface water drainage that would benefit a large portion of Clarkston Estates Subdivision located on the

East side of M-15, North of the village limits. Mr. Hursfall will submit the proposal to the county drain commission for observation and factual information should the special assessment district materialize.

November 30, was set by action of the board as the date for a special hearing regarding a street lighting district in Sunny Beach Subdivision, Sunny Beach No. 1 and No. 2, and Thendara Park. This district would be quite extensive including well over 1300 lots.

A board resolution called for official notice to be sent to Roy Brothers Gas Station on M-15 and U.S. 10, and Perry and Jones Auto Repair located at the corner of Sashabaw and Maybee roads. The notice will direct these business' to provide immediate arrangement for removal of the dismantled or partly dismantled vehicles that violate the township zoning and junk car ordinances. While instructions state that removal start immediately, it orders compliance with the ordinances be completed by the 30th of November, 1965, according to Howard Altman.

Also approved at the board meeting were two rezoning permits. Following the recommendation of the

planning commission 160 acres located on the East side of Reese between Rattalee Lake and Oak Hill were rezoned from residential No. 1 to suburban farms.

The planning commission's recommendation to rezone 11½ acres on the corner of Maybee and Clintonville on the east side of I-75 was also upheld. This parcel has been rezoned from suburban farms to residential No. 1.

Also discussed at the meeting was an agreement submitted by Donald White regarding the purchase of water from Waterford for the Independence Square Apartment complexes. Board members felt that the agreement as drawn and presented would amount to a contract between the townships of Independence and Waterford rather than an arrangement between Donald White and Independence. This being premature, the board directed that an agreement be first reached with Mr. White. Should this be accomplished, the township would be in a position to initiate an agreement with Waterford on the proposed water hook up.

Permit fees for electrical, plumbing and heating at the new Bailey Lake Elementary School were waived by action of the board.

Peace Corps to Test on Oct. 9

An opportunity for area residents to offer their abilities to the Peace Corps will come at 9 A.M., Saturday October 9, at the Federal Bldg., Room 1; E. Huron and Perry Sts. in Pontiac.

The opportunity is the Peace Corps Placement Test which is not passed or failed and you can't study for it. It measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language. If, for example, test scores indicate limited language acquiring ability, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English speaking area. The test is used by the Peace Corp only as a tool in the matching of Volunteers and jobs. The Peace Corps application is the most important indicator of suitability for Peace Corps service. It must be filled out and brought to the exam unless previously submitted.

Applicants should plan on about one and a half hours at the testing centers, unless they wish to take the Spanish or French language achievement test, which requires an additional hour.

Prevention Can Help Deminish Fire Deaths

Michigan's record loss of 282 deaths in fires in 1964 points up the need for year-round fire precautions, especially in the home, Det. Capt. Glenroy M. Walker, chief of the State Police fire marshal division at East Lansing, said in a Fire Prevention Week reminder. The week is being observed October 3-9.

Captain Walker said last year's experience again proved the home to be the most dangerous place for fire deaths. Of the 201 adult and 81 minor deaths, 144 and 66 respectively resulted from home fires.

Of the adult deaths, 72, the greatest number, were caused by smoking in bed or other careless smoking. Thirty-four child deaths resulted from playing with fire, matches, cigarets or from clothing catching fire.

Captain Walker listed these precautions:

Instruct family members not only

in fire safety practices but in an emergency evacuation plan which can be particularly important at night when many dwelling fires break out.

Keep matches and other fire-creating devices out of the reach of young children.

Avoid overloading electrical circuits and keep electrical appliances in good repair.

Make regular inspections of home and building heating systems.

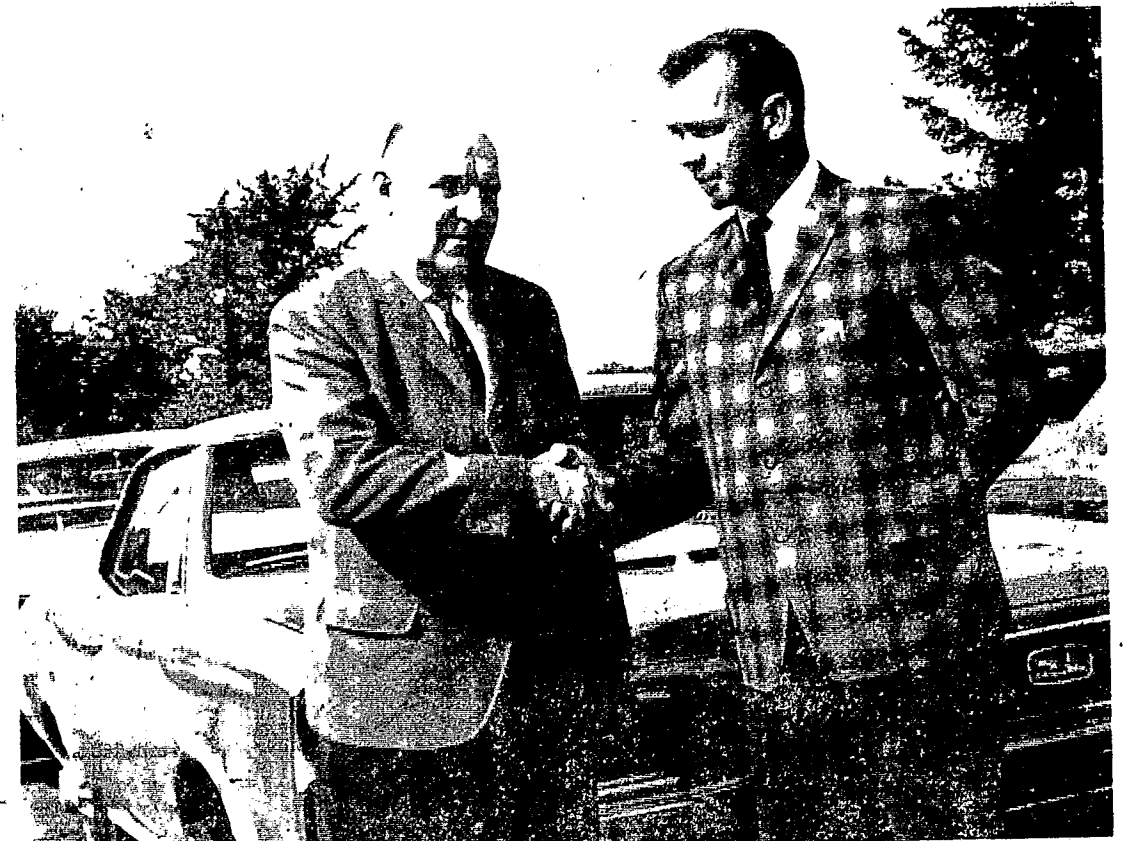
Properly dispose of combustible wastes.

Store paints, oils and other inflammable liquids in proper containers and lockers.

Be careful in the use of gas torches or other open flame devices.

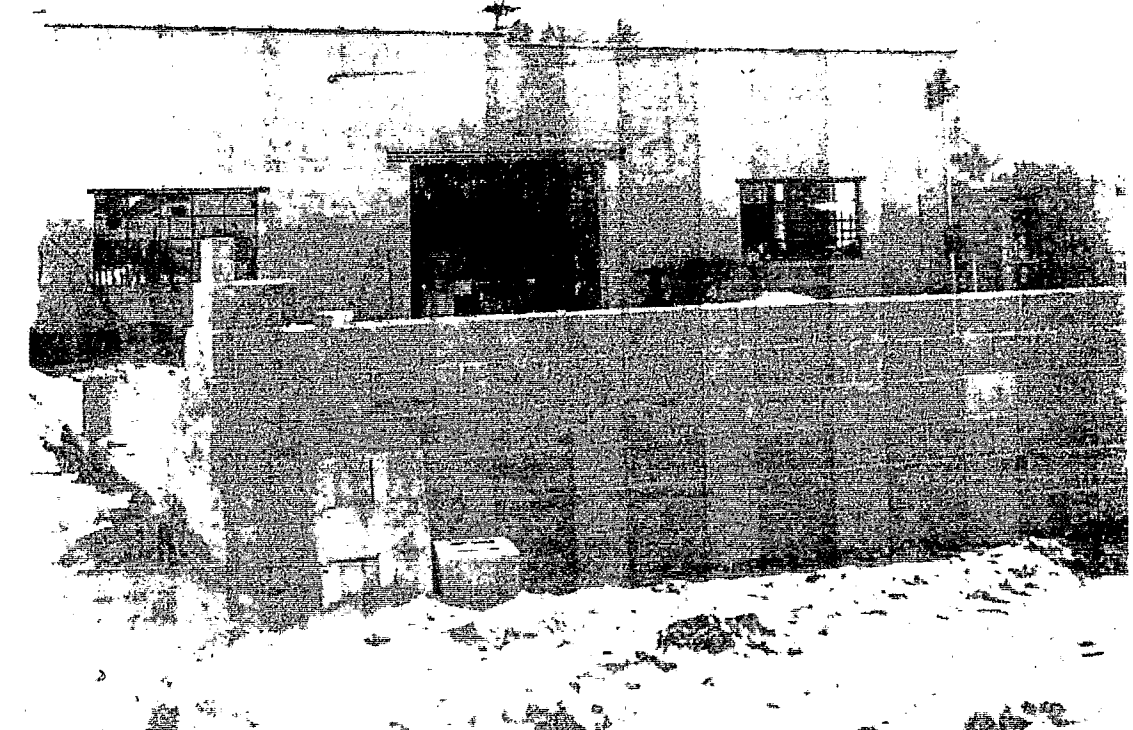
Guard against careless smoking. When disposing of matches or tobacco in any lighted form, be sure the fire is out.

- OATMEAL CAKE 1 C. oatmeal 1/2 c. boiling water 1 c. white sugar 1 c. brown sugar 1/2 c. shortening 2 eggs 1 t. vanilla 1 t. cinnamon 1/2 c. flour 1 t. soda 1/2 t. salt 1 T. cocoa Add hot water to oatmeal and let cool, combine all other ingredients, bake at 350 degrees until done, about 1 hour.

- FROSTING 6 T. melted butter 2/3 C. brown sugar 1/4 C. cream 1/2 t. vanilla 1/2 C. nuts or 3/4 C. coconut Spread on cake and broil until brown.

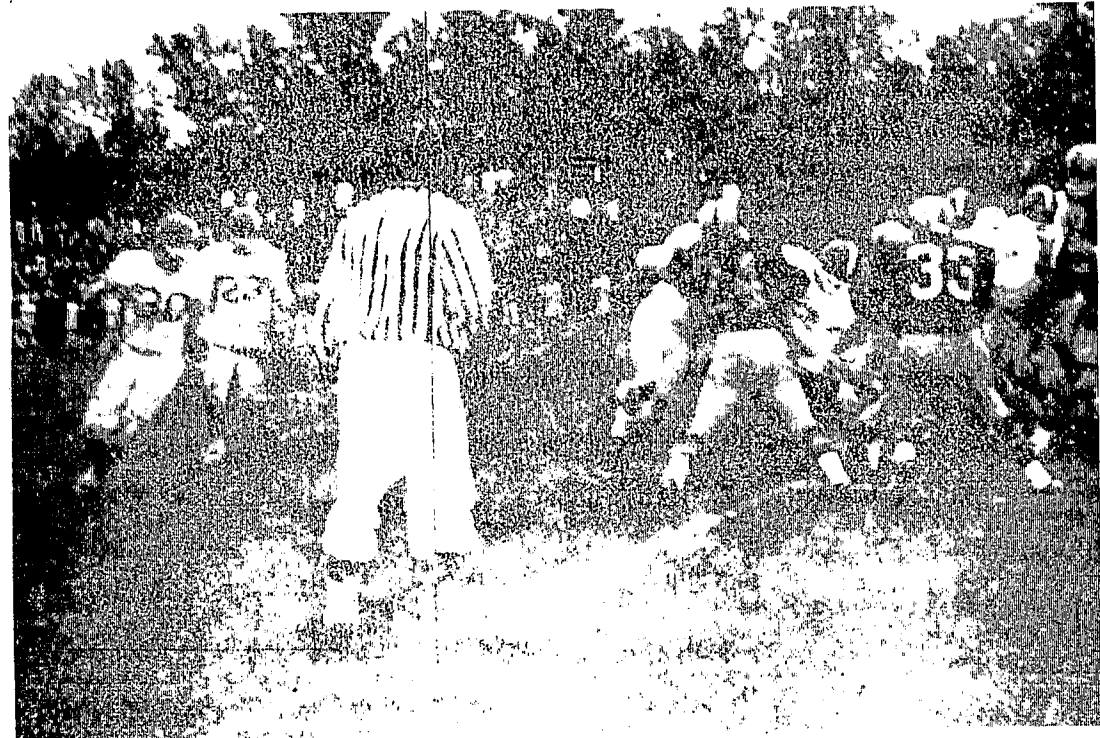
