The volunteer fire department of Independence Township deserves the commendation of the community in a job well done during the past year. It seems appropriate that during this week of October 3-10, National Fire Prevention Week, a special tribute be paid to this thirty man unit.

Under the direction of Fire Chief, Donald Beach, the department has responded to over 300 calls in the past year. Equipped to handle nearly every emergency that might arise, the department boasts three pumper engines, two pick-up trucks specially built for fighting grass fires, one tank truck which doubles as an extra pumper, and one fully equipped rescue truck.

One Dead in **Area Accidents**

Crawley Among Honored



Clarkston Student Receives Letter of Commendation

Charles Pearson of Clarkston test scores, anticipated college High School has been honored with a letter of Commendation for his high performance on the national Merit Sscholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT) given last spring. He is among 38,000 students across the nation recognized for scoring in the top two percent of students who will complete high school in 1966. The commended students rank just below the 14,000 Semifinalists announced last month.

John M. Stalmaker, president of the National Merit Schoarship Corporation said: "These students are being recognized for their outstanding permformance on the qualifying test. Theirs is a notable academic achievement.

"In a rigorous competition like the Merit Program, it is unavoidable that many fine students will miss being named Semifinalists by a narrow margin. Neverthless, the student in this situation is very capable and deserves generous recognition for his distinguished

"The Commended students have considerable ability, which should be developed through further education. They deserve every encouragement, and their promise is great They represent an important intellectual resource which our nation needs."

Only the highest-scoring students in each state, the Semifinalists, remain eligible for further consideration in the Commendation advance no farther in the Merit Program, their names are reported to other scholarship-granting agencies and to the college they named at the time they took the NMSQT as their first and second elloices. The order was issued to prevent the discharge from causing unlawful pollution of ground waters in the area.

As required by law, a statement had been filed with the Commission describing the proposed waste.

The order requires that all sanitary sewage be disposed of into the ground in such a manner and by means of such facilities that the discharge will not injuriously affect public health or commercial, domestic and industrial water supply

In addition, no facilities necessary for compliance with the order may be constructed until plans have been submitted to the Commission's Chief Engineer and approved by the State Commissioner of

Independence Township To Be Represented In Genesse Utility Authority

The Independence Township Board passed a resolution to apply for membership in the Genesee Valley Utilities Authority at a regularly scheduled meeting held Tuesday evening. The utility, which was nitially formed by eleven townships. controls board membership on a population basis. Independence will be alloted two members for a fee of \$50.00 each per year, according to Howard Altman Township Clark.

The township previously withheld participation in the utility authority because they felt that an "escape clause" should be provided in the constitution and by-laws of the organization allowing any member, prior to contractual obligation. visualizing little or no benefits, to withdraw from the utility authority. The Township attorney, Paul Mandel, substantiated the position of the board in this regard which resulted in a change of the utilities authority constitution and by-laws. so that this clause is now provided.

At the request of Supervisor, Hursfall, Howard Kieft Engineering submitted an estimate cost and outline drawing of a special assessment district of surface water drainage that would benefit a large portion of Clarkston Estates Subdivision located on the
