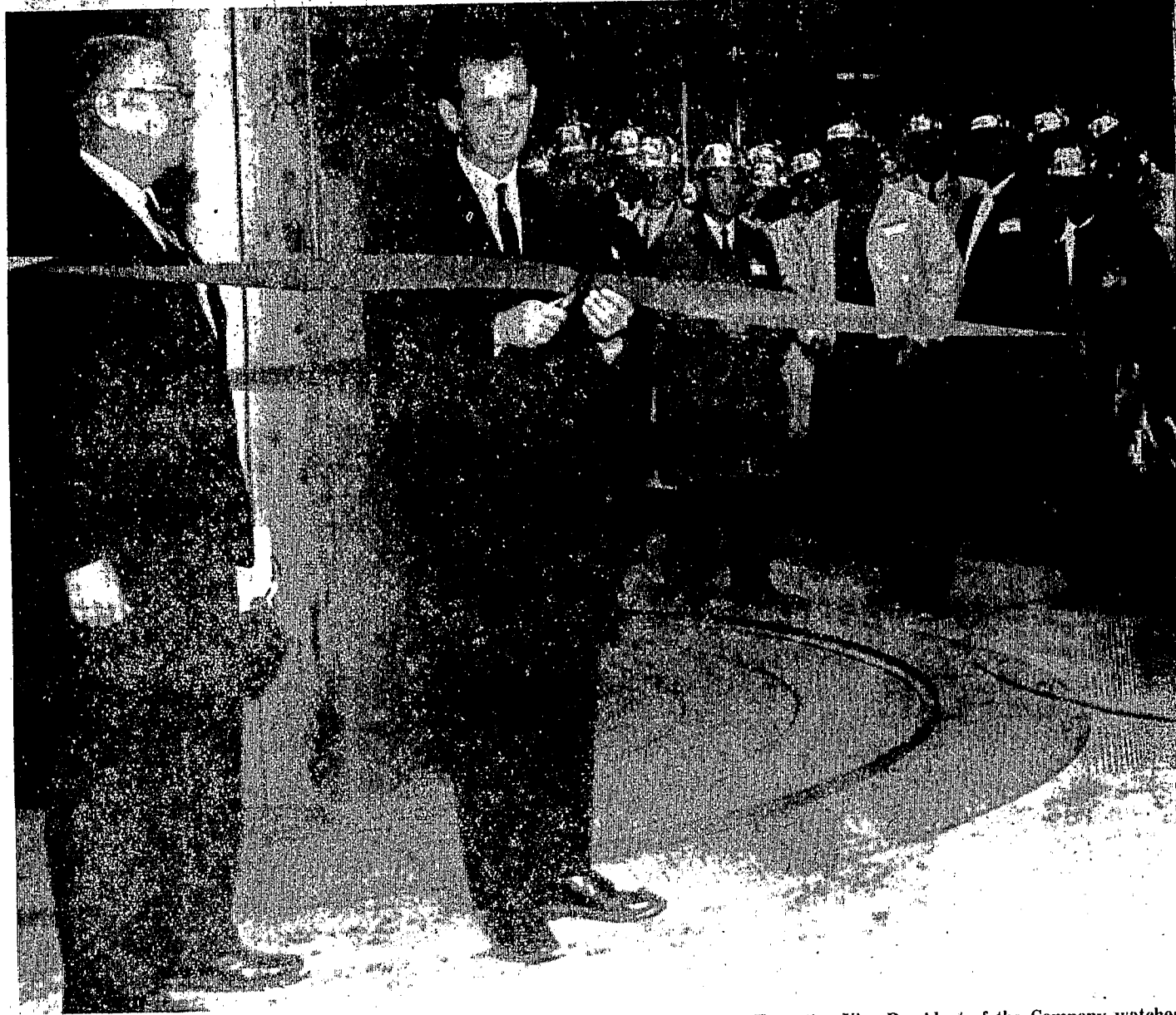

Michigan's Lt. Gov. Milliken Guest Speaker at Affair

A dedication ceremony, officially opening the Price Brothers Company multi-million dollar concrete pressure pipe plant at Clarkston, was held Thursday, October 7. Michigan Lieutenant Governor Milliken, George Bingham, Sanitary Engineer, Wayne County Road Commission, and Lois Schimmel, Commissioner of the Detroit Water Board were guests speakers for the event.

Local and county officials were among the guest who witnessed the ceremony. Welcoming the speakers and guests was Harry S. Price, Jr., Executive Vice President of Price Brothers.

After the ceremony the guests were taken on plant tours followed by lunch and golf matches at the Waterford Hills Country Club.

Price Brothers is no stranger to Michigan industry. Although the home office of the firm is now in Dayton, Ohio, it was established in Michigan in 1899. Since 1953 the firm has invested over 10 million dollars in Michigan. During 1965 they will invest an additional million dollars in expanding the sewer pipe operation. The new concrete pressure pipe plant will employ almost 200 people by the end of 1966.

Executive Vice President, Harry S. Price, said that the company decided to expand in Michigan after a careful study of markets and industrial areas. Pipe from the new plant is being used on Detroit's Lake Huron water project, which eventually will serve more than three million people in the Detroit-Flint area. Another current project is supplying twenty six miles of 54 inch pipe to bring water from Lake Michigan to Wyoming, Michigan; and the company was low bidder on part of the Saginaw-Midland water

1965 United Fund Women Begin Campaign Today

A small army of 200 dedicated women begin calls to area homemakers and local businesses today seeking contributions to the Pontiac Area United Fund Campaign in Independence Township.

Before the end of the ten-day drive, according to Mrs. James Cowen; Chairman, every resident will be given the opportunity to contribute to the fifty-five youth, health, recreation, family, child care and research agencies serving Independence Township through this one effort.

The goal objective for these services has been set at \$502, which is the amount raised last year. "We know that costs to agencies for increased demands for service and community growth warrant increase contributions," Mrs. Cowen stated. "We are hopeful of meeting our share as a community toward the total goal of the Pontiac Area United Fund goal of \$875,000."

"A directory of the fifty-five services available to area residents will be given to every homemaker. It includes a brief description of the type of service and location of each agency," Mrs. Cowen announced. "By distributing these directories, we hope to perform a community service as well. Many people do not know where to go when help is needed."

Service statistics compiled by United Fund agencies indicate that Independence citizens are using the services provided. Last year the Independence recreation program received \$1100.

Additionally, those served in Independence include 454 Boy Scouts, 625 Girl Scouts and Camp Fire Girls, Big Brothers, 3; Catholic Social Services, 18; Family Service, 30; Oakland Child Guidance, 11; Michigan Children's Aid, 4; Visiting Nurses, 10; Salvation Army, 82; St. Joseph's Hospital Clinic, 44; Michigan Cancer Foundation, 7. The American Red Cross aided 24 cases totaling 72 persons, conducted 12 first aid and water safety courses issuing 240 certificates, released 66 pints of blood. The value of the

School Board Approves

Purchase of New Tow Truck

The Clarkston Board of Education met Monday night, October 11. All members were present including an MEA (Michigan Education Association) member in the audience.

The Board approved a number of things to be invoked in the immediate future. Those of significance include an approval to pay the "construction fund" bill and an authorization to purchase a new tow-truck. In addition Frank (Tink) Ronk was appointed to serve the community school's "Tenure Committee."

The "Tenure Committee" is a group of individuals selected from the faculty of their respective schools for the purpose of rendering harmony between the board of education, school administration and the faculty who have served their school and the administration of the same school for a period of three years.

Friction can derive and inevitably does from conflicts over school policy, personal prejudices and other problems. The committee's purpose is to foster a conducive atmosphere where employee and employer can work more cooperatively. Mr. Ronk's position gives the board a liaison with the committee.

A new GMC tow truck costing \$8,378.86 will ingratiate the maintenance crews of the Clarkston Community Schools in the very near future. The truck couples a Canfield cab on a GMC chassis, adding twenty two additional inches to the present obsolete, sixty inch wheelbase 1957 model and is capable of doing the "toughest" of jobs.

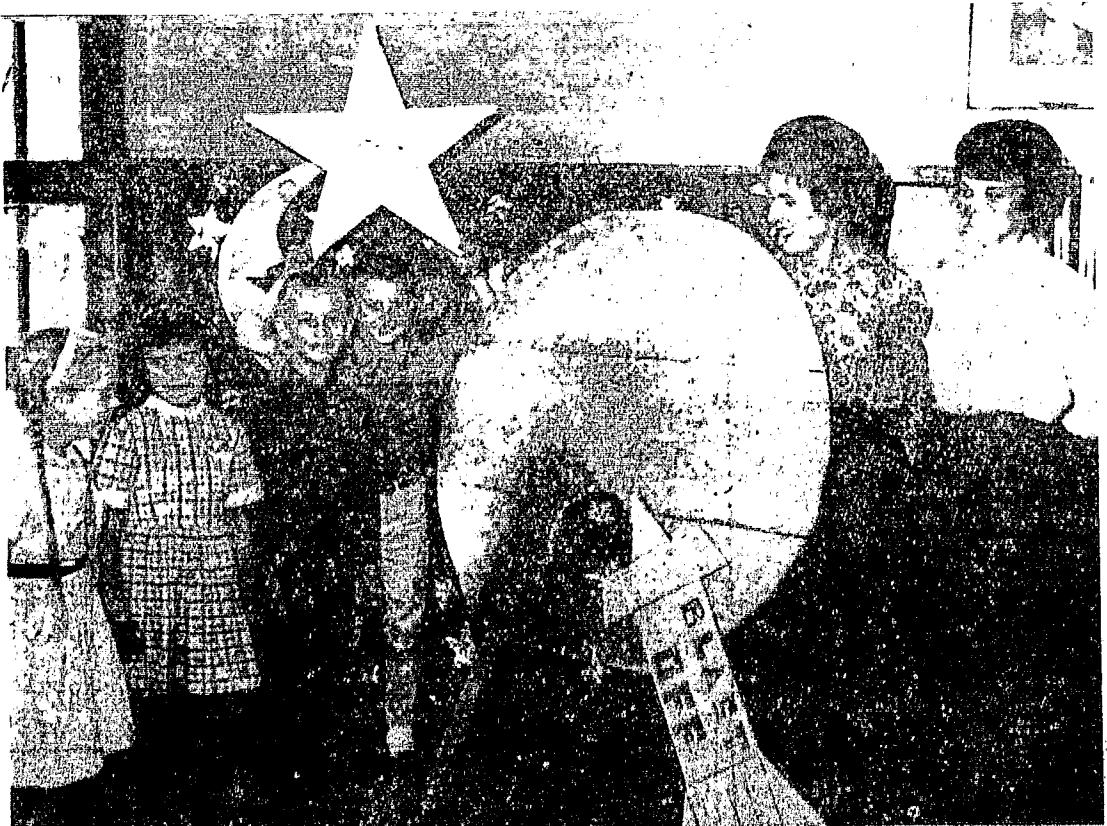

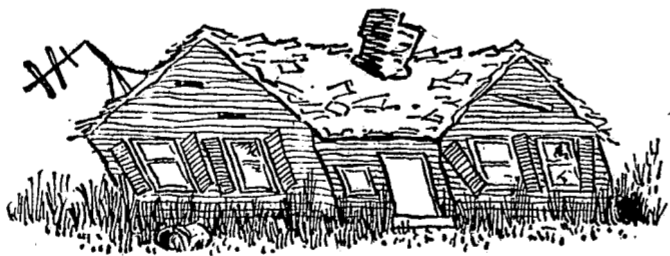

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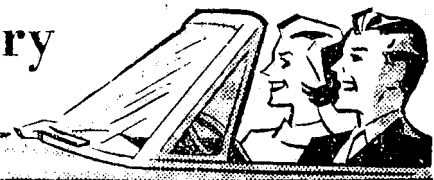

An informal time of refreshment will follow the meeting with the kindergarten mothers in charge. Parents of all Sashabaw students are urged to attend.

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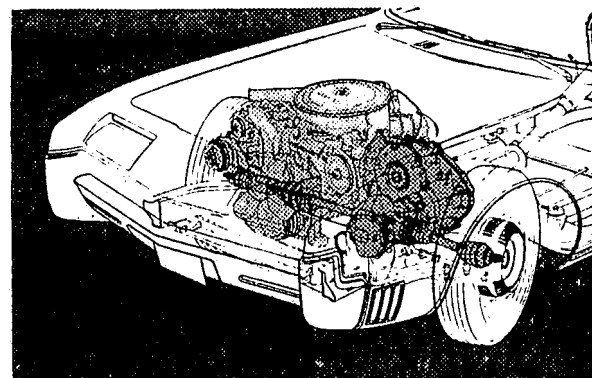

Civil Air Patrol on Practice Civil Defense Exercise

October 9th and 10th Michigan Civil Air Patrol personnel with mobile units, aircraft and other equipment needed to be self-sustaining, joined Michigan Civil Defense Officials for the annual Practice CD/CAP Exercise.

Michigan State Police Captain Jack Namrava, Deputy Director of Civil Defense and William Powell, Civil Defense Coordinator, stated that this annual Civil Defense Exercise was to test the Civil Air Patrol capabilities of mobility and flexibility in the event of natural or man-made disaster.

The main base of operations was Kellogg Field, Battle Creek, Michigan with a satellite base at Bay City. Other CAP units throughout the state stood by at airports and other points of assembly awaiting instructions. CAP units were alerted by radio and telephone.

CAP Mission Coordinator Col. John Issitt, assisted by Lt. Col. Gordon Rose, directed the units in surveying the simulated disaster conditions outlined by Civil Defense. Communications Officer Major Tom Dickenson was in constant radio contact with fixed HF and VHF stations manned by CAP operators. Land Rescue Teams in mobile units with VHF equipment were directed to check on conditions and report.

While the original problem assigned to CAP by Civil Defense was to survey and relay disaster conditions due to tornado touchdowns, Civil Defense later put all CAP personnel on a "nuclear alert" and then assigned the survey and monitoring or radiological "fallout" to CAP.

Evaluation of the test will be made by the officials of Civil Defense and by an Air Force Evaluation Team composed of Capt. James McCarthy USAF and T/Sgt Gerald Casperson USAF of the USAF/CAP Liaison Office, Selfridge AFB, Michigan.

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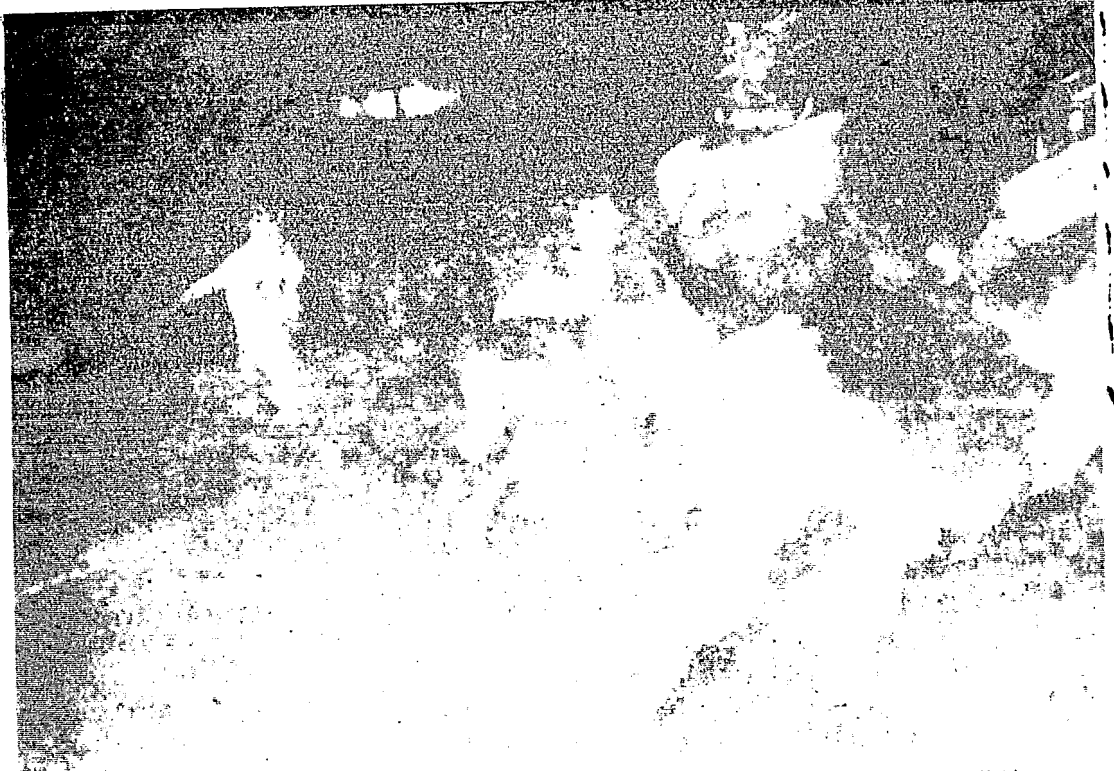
