Use Zip Code to Apply for License

Postmasters are urging patrons applying for their 1966 motor vehicle license plates to include their ZIP CODE in the space provided for on the 1966 application form. "Including the ZIP Code will greatly reduce the number of steps usually required in sorting and distribution of the plates by the Post Office under the old system. ZIP Code will, therefore, not only expedite handling of the 1966 plates but will also insure speedier delivery to the patron." Postmaster Elizabeth Ronk said.

The ZIP Code for Clarkston is 48016.

There will be no mail delivery on Veterans Day, November 11. However, the post office lobby will be open until 9 a.m. for those who wish to obtain mail from boxes at the post office. There will be no stamp sales.

Mail will be picked up and dispatched from all street collection boxes, according to postal officials at the Clarkston office.

Clarkston High Will Host MEA

The Clarkston High School will be the site of Michigan Education Associations Region 7 Science Conference on Friday, November 5. Mr. Ken Wolven and Mr. William C. Adams, teachers in the Clarkston School System have announced the following program for the day.

General sessions in elementary and secondary science; Dr. Leon McDermott from Central Michigan University will speak at the elementary session, and Mr. Theodore Phorte from Oakland Community College will speak at the secondary session.

There will be afternoon group meetings in elementary science with the following topics and speakers: "Extending the Classroom Into the Outdoors" with Mr. Donald J. Richards, Michigan Department of Conservation; "Astronomy Must be Involvement" with Mr. Bob Dunn, Cranbrook Institute; "Some Approaches to Teaching of Science" with Dr. Leon McDermott, Central Michigan University; and "Biologically speaking-What Makes You Tick" with Miss Marjorie E. Gaston, Oakland County Department of Health.

The secondary group meetings will discuss the following topics: "Modern Biology" with Dr. Robert Torch; "Preparing for College Physics" with Dr. Robert Williams; and "Preparing for College Chemistry" with Dr. Paul Tomblin. All of the men are from Oakland University.

Mrs. Cowen credited the out-

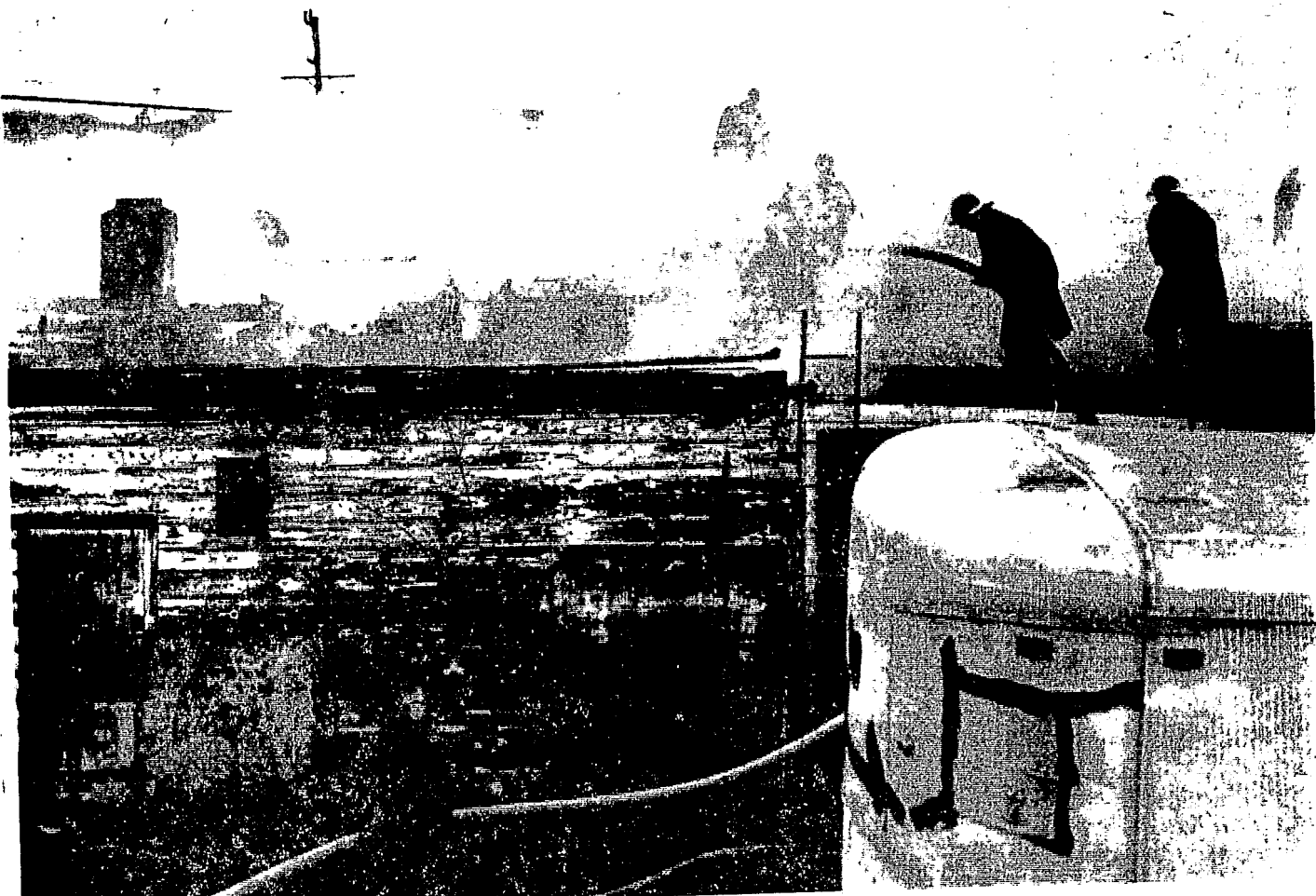

A Sunday morning fire at Green Lake Meats, Incorporated, 1245 Ortonville Road, Ortonville, caused extensive damage to the roof and walls of the building. Heat and smoke damage to the inside of the store was also severe.

The fire was discovered by an Ortonville businessman, Virgil Stanfill, who summoned the Brandon Township Fire Department at 11

a.m. Assisted by Independence Township Fire Department, the firemen fought the blaze for three hours. High winds, clocked at 50-60 miles per hour in Pontiac at 10 a.m. the same day, swept the flames the full length of the building.

"The iron-clad cooperation and efficiency of the two departments coupled with the existence of an

ample supply of water immediately available accounted for salvaging part of the building," William Buckingham, Brandon Township Fire Chief stated.

The business, owned by Ray and John Campbell, is insured. No estimate on the extent of damage to the building and contents has been made.

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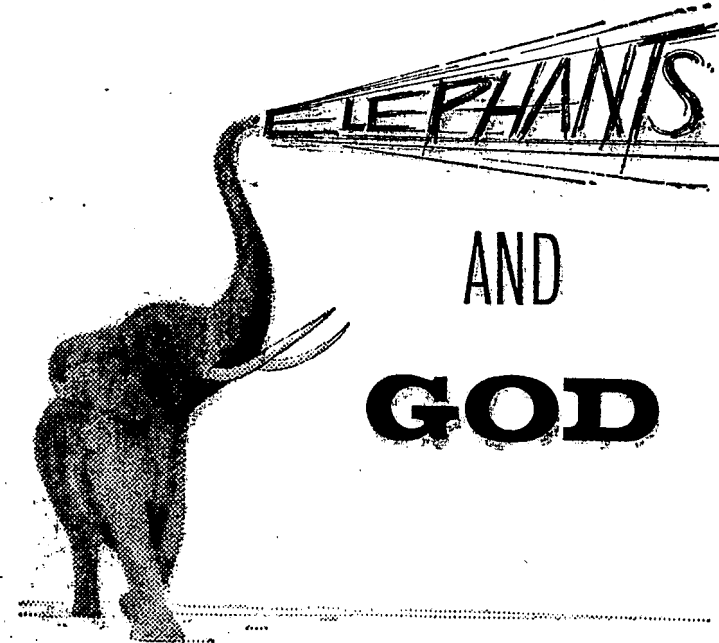

Recipe of The Week

- Boston Brown Bread**
 1 1/2 cup water
 1/2 package of seeded raisins
 2 Tablespoons shortening
 1 Cup of white sugar
 1 egg well beaten
 2 3/4 Cup flour
 1 teaspoon soda
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 1 1/2 Tablespoons of molasses molasses.
 1 Cup Walnuts.

Boil raisins in one and one-half cup of water for three minutes then let them cool. Cream in shortening and sugar thoroughly. Add well beaten egg. Sift flour, soda, salt and baking powder. Combine all ingredients and add molasses.

Add the mixture to the raisins and then add the vanilla and the walnuts. Stir well. Bake at 350 for one hour. Three of the number two tin cans are just the right size for baking containers.

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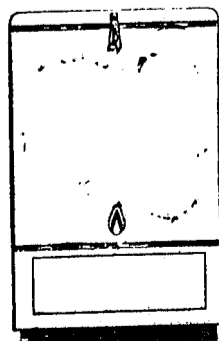
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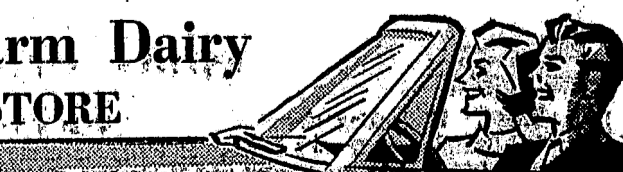

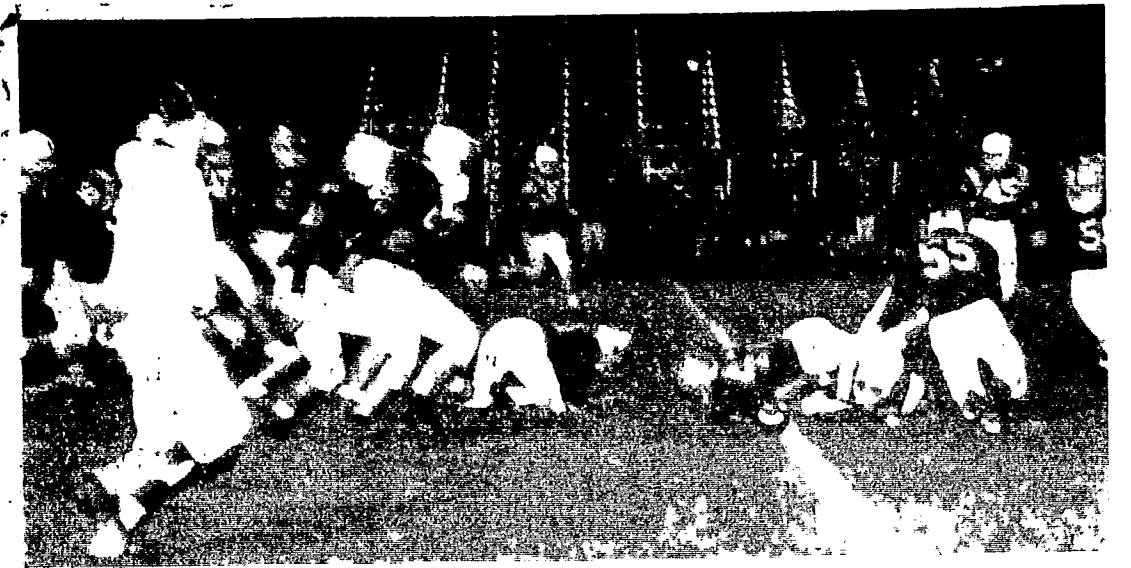
