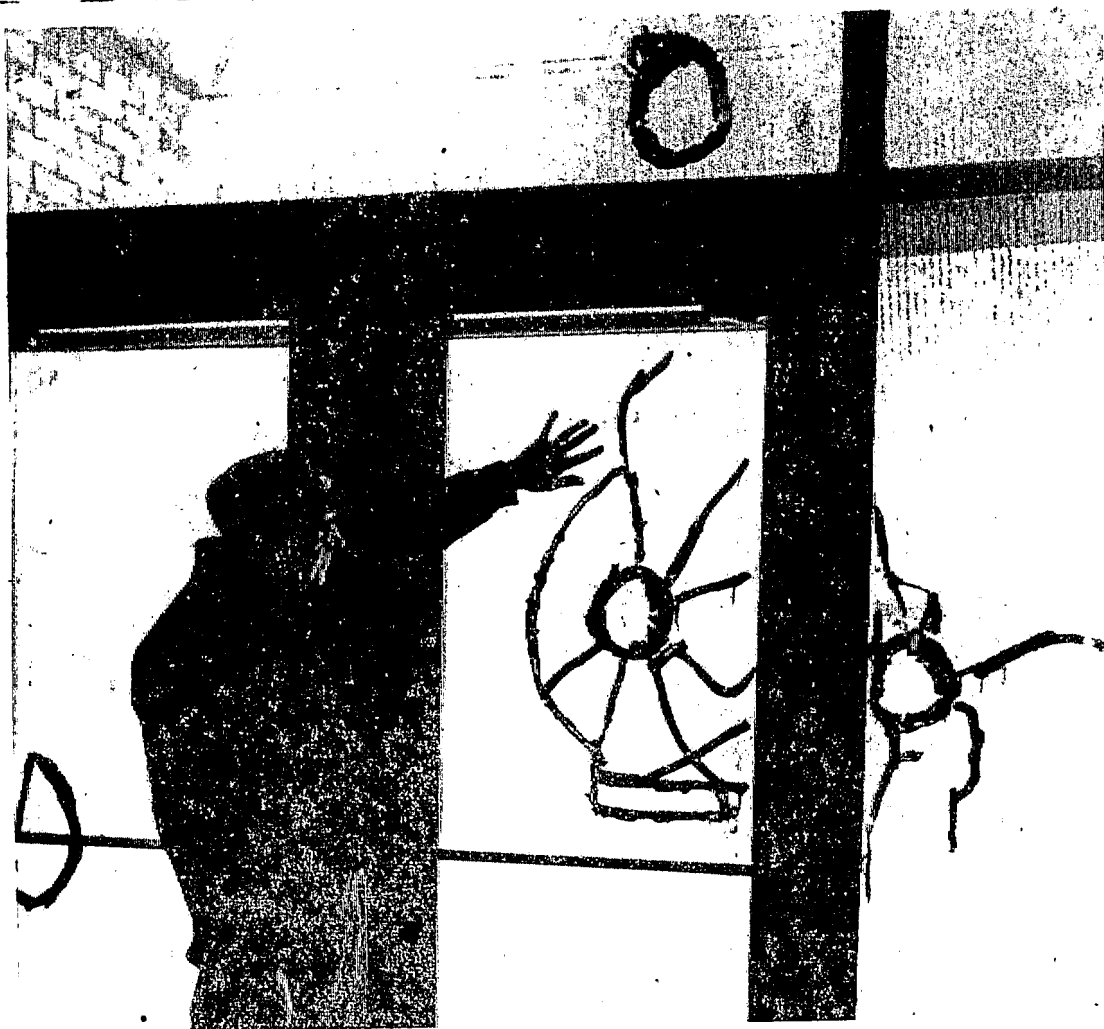

Vandalism at Clarkston School property has cost area tax payers \$1600 since the beginning of the 1965 fall term. The latest of these acts occurred Tuesday evening at the Clarkston Elementary School when six plate glass windows were broken. The windows are located at entries in the back of the building.

Mr. Floyd Vincent said that the destruction took place after 8 p.m. In the past, offenders have proved to be minors (in at least one case

a 10 year old child). Clarkston School officials have stated that they will make every effort to trace the offenders. Any one with information should contact the Superintendent's office.

Bill Cobb is Appointed Independence Assessor

William C. Cobb of Eevee Road, Clarkston, was unanimously appointed Township Assessor by action of the Board of Trustees in Tuesday's Township meeting.

Cobb, a carpenter by trade, replaces the deceased James M. Gardiner.

While weighing the candidates under consideration to fill the post vacated by the late Mr. Gardiner, the board felt Cobb has the background and necessary qualifications for the job.

Duane Hursfall, Township Super-

visor, said he felt the appointment of Cobb was a logical one. In his recommendation he described the new assessor as "very conscientious."

Due to previous commitments, Cobb is not expected to take office until the first part of December. His appointment affords a \$6500 annual salary.

In other business, a preliminary plat for Cranberry Lake Subdivision was approved on recommendation of the Township Planning Committee. A water request was waived to a future hearing.

Pontiac Man Killed In Arab Accident

John Walker of Pontiac died of injuries sustained in an automobile accident November 8 at I-75 and the Holly overpass in Springfield Township.

The accident occurred when Walker's automobile left the highway, struck a guard rail and pillar, then spun into the road and was struck by a car driven by Timothy Ford of Baldwin Lake. Mr. Ford was not injured according to State Police records.

There were no fatalities in an accident on Dixie Highway near Oak Hill Road in Groveland Township November 9, according to State Police records. Calista McDaniel of Holly told police officers that he pulled onto Dixie Highway in front of a car driven by Alan D. Evans of Pontiac. Evans was unable to avoid the McDaniel vehicle.

A similar accident on the Dixie Highway near M-15 November 14 resulted in property damage to the automobile involved. A car driven by Vernon Latham of 5700 Plumings Lake Road, Clarkston, pulled from the A and P parking lot onto the Dixie and struck by a car driven by Henry Vaden of Pontiac.

A deer and a horse were the cause of two separate accidents according to police records.

In one incident Richard I. Wallen of Flint struck and killed a deer on I-75 near the Davisburg overpass.

Alfred Wiggins of Pontiac struck a horse on Clarkston Road, Nov. 12. The horse, which belonged to the Risinger Double D ranch, was not seriously hurt, according to Oakland County Sheriff Department records.

Michigan's Horton Tresspass Law prohibits hunting on roads or highways in farmland areas, according to the Conservation Department. It also prohibits hunting on any farmlands or farm woodlots, or within enclosed lands of a hunting club, without permission of the owner or person leasing such lands.

Roy Hauesler Accepts Chrysler Corp. Appointment

Roy Hauesler has been appointed chief engineer - automotive safety at Chrysler Corporation. It was announced today by B. W. Bozian, vice president and director of engineering.

Hauesler had been automotive safety engineer for Chrysler since 1955 when the company became the first in the industry to establish such a position.

In his new position, Hauesler will continue his responsibilities for providing guidance for the company's vehicle safety efforts in the areas of product planning, research, engineering and styling.

In his new position, Hauesler will continue to report to H. R. Stedling, executive engineer - technical staff operations, Engineering Office. He will remain on the General Services Administration's advisory committee which is developing federal automotive safety standards for government purchased vehicles.

Hauesler joined Chrysler Corporation in 1934 and held various engineering positions in fuel systems development, engine performance analysis and military vehicles design and development until 1955 when he was appointed automotive safety engineer.

He is a graduate of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, receiving an engineering and business administration degree in '32.

School Bus Vandalism Solved

A hearing in Juvenile Court has been scheduled for four minor boys in connection with the vandalizing of Clarkston school buses last week according to State Police records. The boys, who are 10, 12, 14 and 15 years old, apparently climbed the fence surrounding the school buses which are parked in an enclosed area behind the athletic field. Removing several fire extinguishers and flares from the buses, they proceeded to spray the solution in the grass and set off the flares.

Mr. Floyd Vincent, assistant superintendent of Schools said that while most of the equipment has been recovered, damages and replacement costs will be approximately \$300.00.

1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 cup light molasses
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon allspice
2 cups chopped walnuts
2 cups mixed candied fruit
2 cups raisins
Combine date filling from mix packages with hot water in large bowl. Add crumbly mixtures, eggs, baking powder, molasses and spices; blend well.
Fold in nuts and fruits thoroughly. Pour into greased and floured 10 in. tube pan. Bake at 325 degrees for two hours or until toothpick stuck in center comes out clean. Cool; wrap and store in refrigerator.

**Austin Farm Is Designated
A Centennial Farm**

A visit at the Ellison E. Austin farm, 8660 Kier Road, recently designated a Centennial Farm is comparable to stepping into the pages of history. Convenient modernization of the 130 year old home has failed to dispel the charm and intrigue of days-on-the-farm in a century gone by.

Mrs. Austin, who came to the farm as a new bride in 1938, appears to have accomplished her goal. "To do my very best as a homemaker, wife, and mother." Evidence of her accomplishments is everywhere.

Undertaking the job of modernizing their home was one of the first projects of the Ellison Austins.

Modern plumbing and convenient kitchen facilities were installed. The spacious rooms were carefully renovated without maring the original "American Colonial" architecture of the home.

Throughout the house the original twelve pane windows became centers of interest. A mirror separates two of these windows in the family dining-room, an interesting focal point of the home.

Closets have been added and the original wood shed has been converted to a utility room, adding to the convenience of homemaking. All of the remodeling was done

by the Austin's with Mr. Austin supplying the labor while Mrs. Austin stood by as a consultant and designer.

Life in this century-old home has been remarkably unaltered by the modern trends surrounding it. The art of home preservation of foods, necessary to the survival of our ancestors, has been well mastered by Mrs. Austin and her 15 year old daughter, Beryl. Both have numerous ribbons from state and county fairs for their artistically preserved foods.

"We live simply, as did our parents and grandparents, depending mainly on our land and cattle for our material needs," Mrs. Austin said.

The nine room home is adequately heated by a coal-wood burning furnace, fired mainly with wood cut from the property by Mr. Austin and his sons.

The Austins have four children, Loren, 22; Duane, 18; Beryl, 15; and Mark, 5. Farming the present 179 acres of land is a family project, with all participating.

The farm was designated a centennial farm by the Michigan Historical Commission. Located in Groveland Township, the farm has been in the possession of the family since 1865. The original 80 acres and home was purchased in that year by the grandfather of the present owner from William W. and Martha Knox for a sum of 3,100 dollars.

**Buying - Preparing and
Cooking the Turkey**

For each generous serving of roasted whole turkey (you may need more than one serving per person) allow 3/4 to 1 pound of ready-to-cook weight for birds weighing less than 12 pounds; 1/2 to 3/4 pounds for birds weighing 12 pounds and over. Use this table:

servings needed	turkey lbs.
4 to 10	4 to 8
10 to 20	8 to 12
20 to 30	12 to 16
30 to 40	16 to 20
40 to 50	20 to 24

For each serving of roasted turkey - quarter or half, or braised drumsticks or thighs cut from large birds, allow 1/2 to 3/4 pound of ready-to-cook weight.

Unstuffed frozen turkeys should be almost completely thawed (until they are pliable) before cooking. Do not thaw commercially frozen stuffed birds before cooking.

Thawing Frozen Turkey.

The refrigerator is the best place to thaw. Thaw birds in their original wrappers. To shorten the time, turkeys sealed in watertight wrappers may be thawed in cold water. Do not use warm water. Change water often, allow from 2 to 6 hours depending on size of package.

Or thawing may be started in the refrigerator and finished in cold water.

Frozen turkeys should be cooked soon after thawing.

Roasting preparations 10 Steps

1. Remove thawed turkey from bag, rinse, and pat dry.
2. For roasting unstuffed bird rub inside with salt (about 1/4 teaspoon per pound). Do not salt if bird is to be stuffed.
3. If stuffing is to be used, allow one cup per pound of turkey.
4. Fill neck cavity lightly, but do not pack. Fasten neck skin to back of turkey with skewer.
5. Stuff body cavity lightly. Do not pack, since stuffing will expand while cooking.
6. Tuck legs under band of skin at tail or tie with heavy

string; when 2/3 done, cut skin or string to free legs.

7. Fasten wings to body, using skewers or string.

8. Brush entire bird with shortening, oil or melted butter. For deeper color, 2 teaspoons paprika may be added to melted shortening.

9. Roast as desired at 325 degrees F. 20 minutes per lb.

10. When turkey is done, remove from oven, cover tightly with aluminum foil, and allow to stand about 20 minutes for easier carving.

A meat thermometer insures cooking turkey to just right degree. Insert it so that bulb is in center of inside thigh muscle or thickest part of breast muscle. Be sure that bulb does not touch bone. On whole turkeys the thermometer will read 185 degrees F. when bird is done.

If no meat thermometer is used, move drumstick up and the leg joint should give readily or break if done. Or press drumstick meat between fingers; meat should be very soft when done. Do not pierce meat with fork.

Turkeys need the proper care and handling in the home. There are two ways to prevent spoiled turkey! Keep it hot or keep it cold. Most turkey spoilage is the fault of improper handling such as allowing turkeys to stand at room temperature several hours after cooking. Turkeys should be refrigerated whenever there is an extended time between cooking and eating. Stuff the turkey just before roasting.

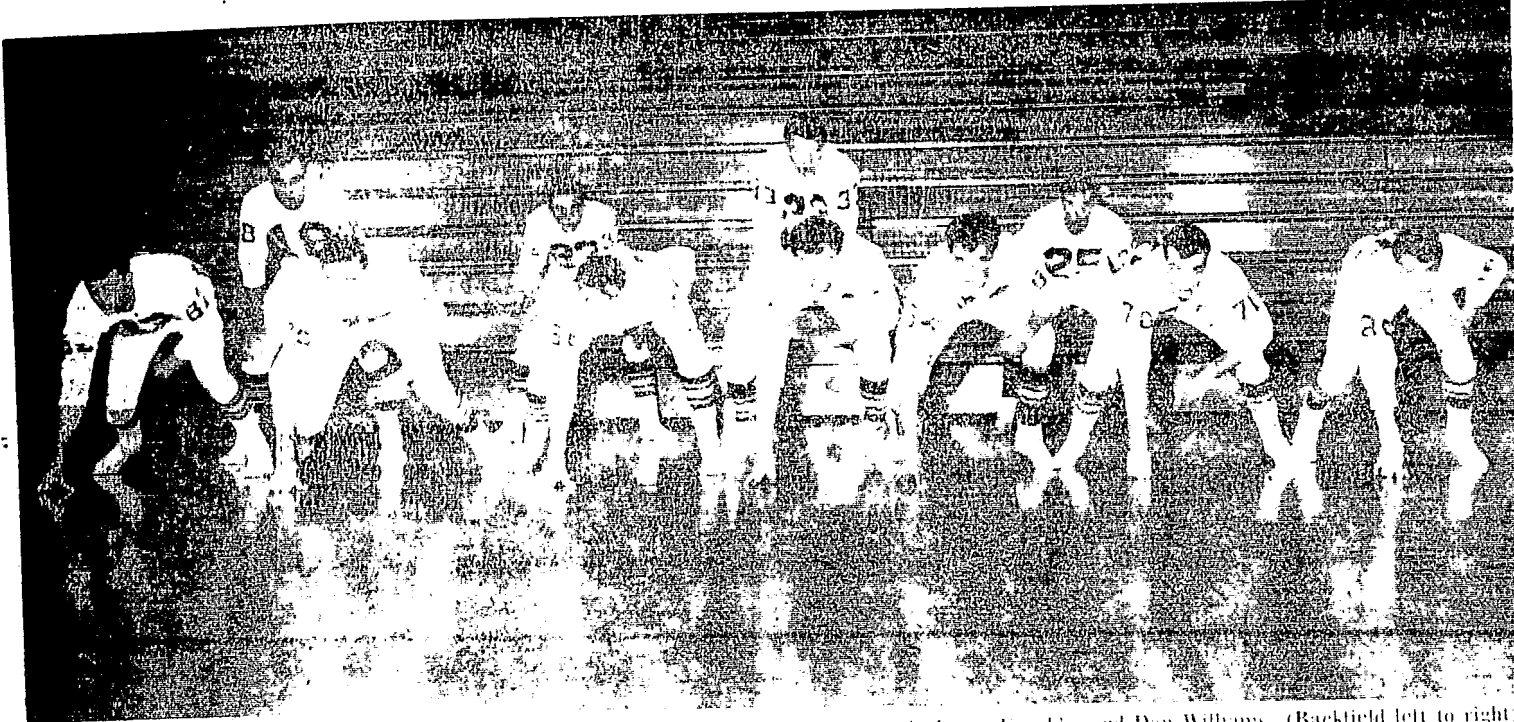

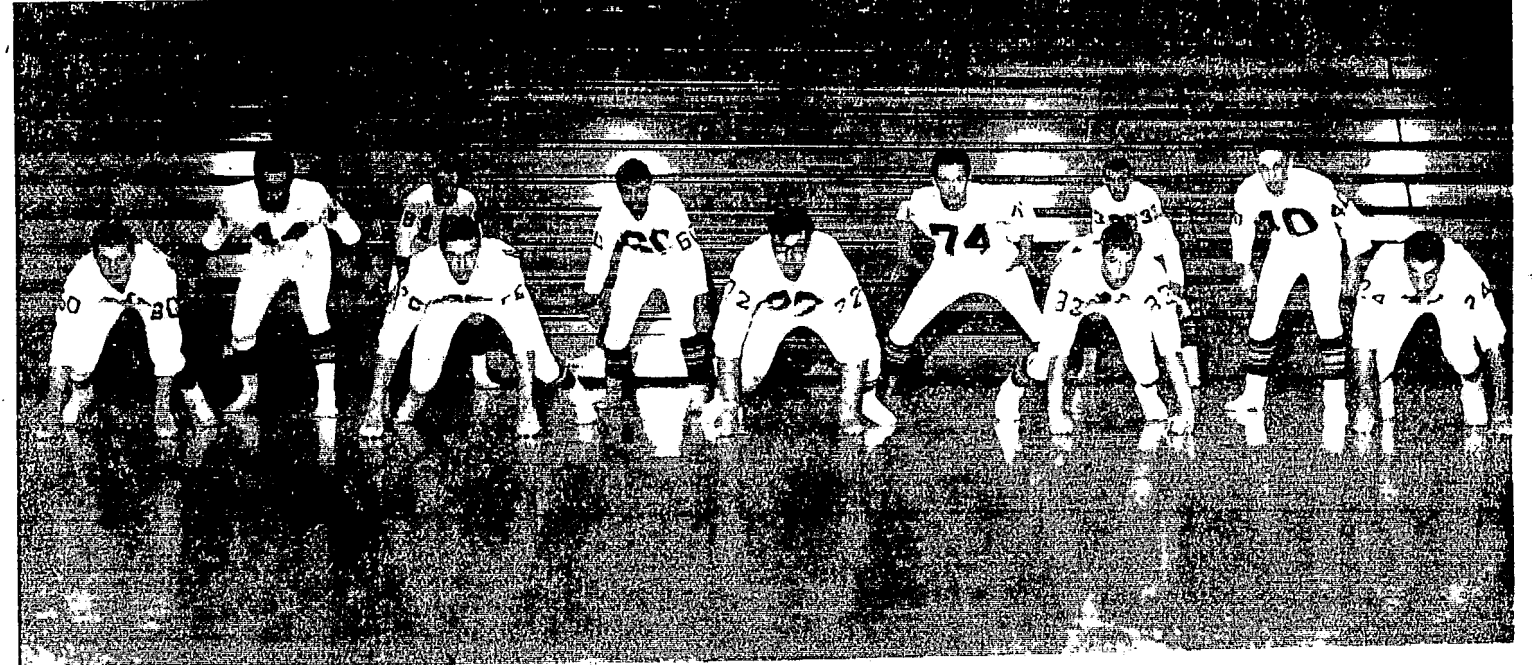

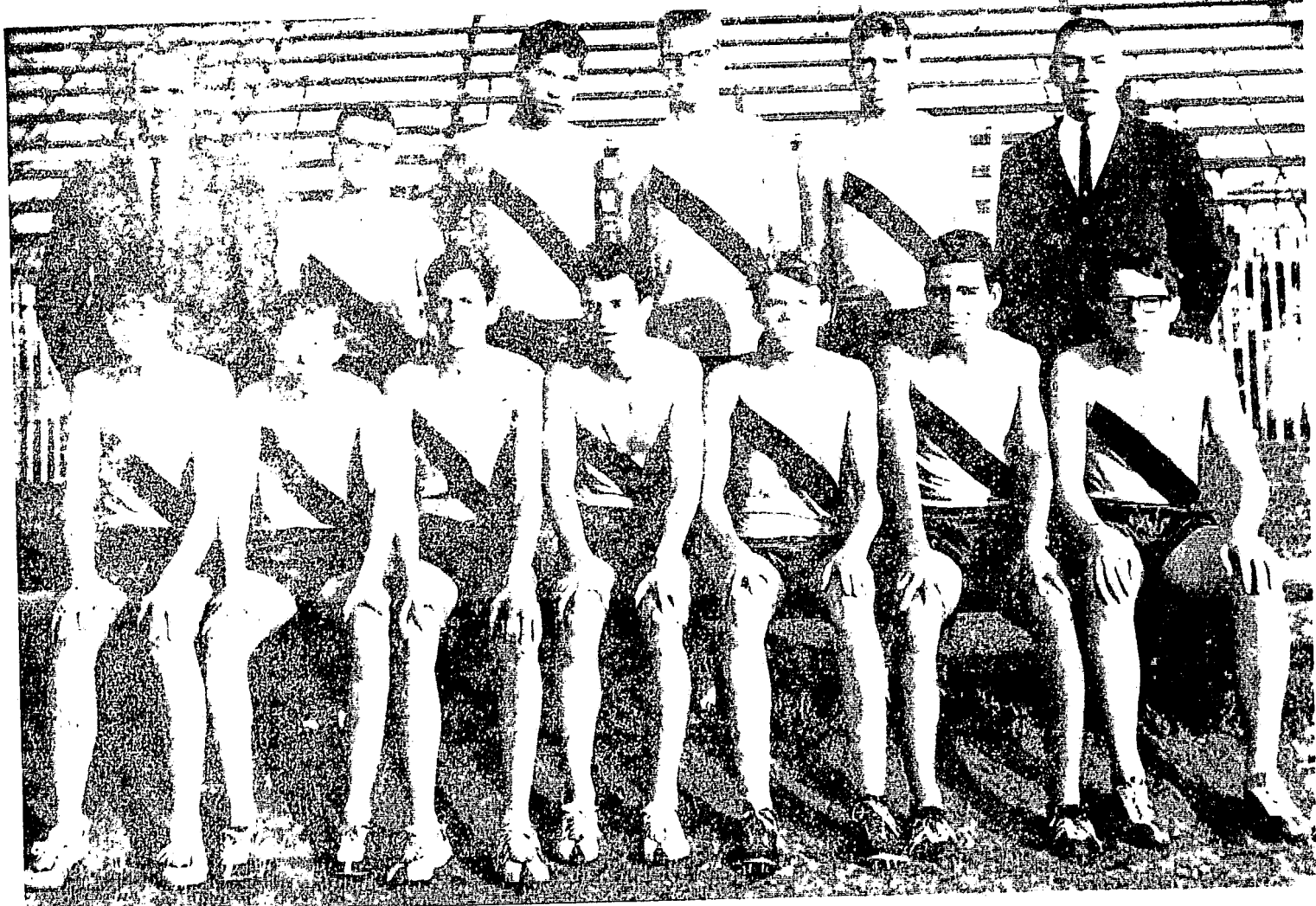

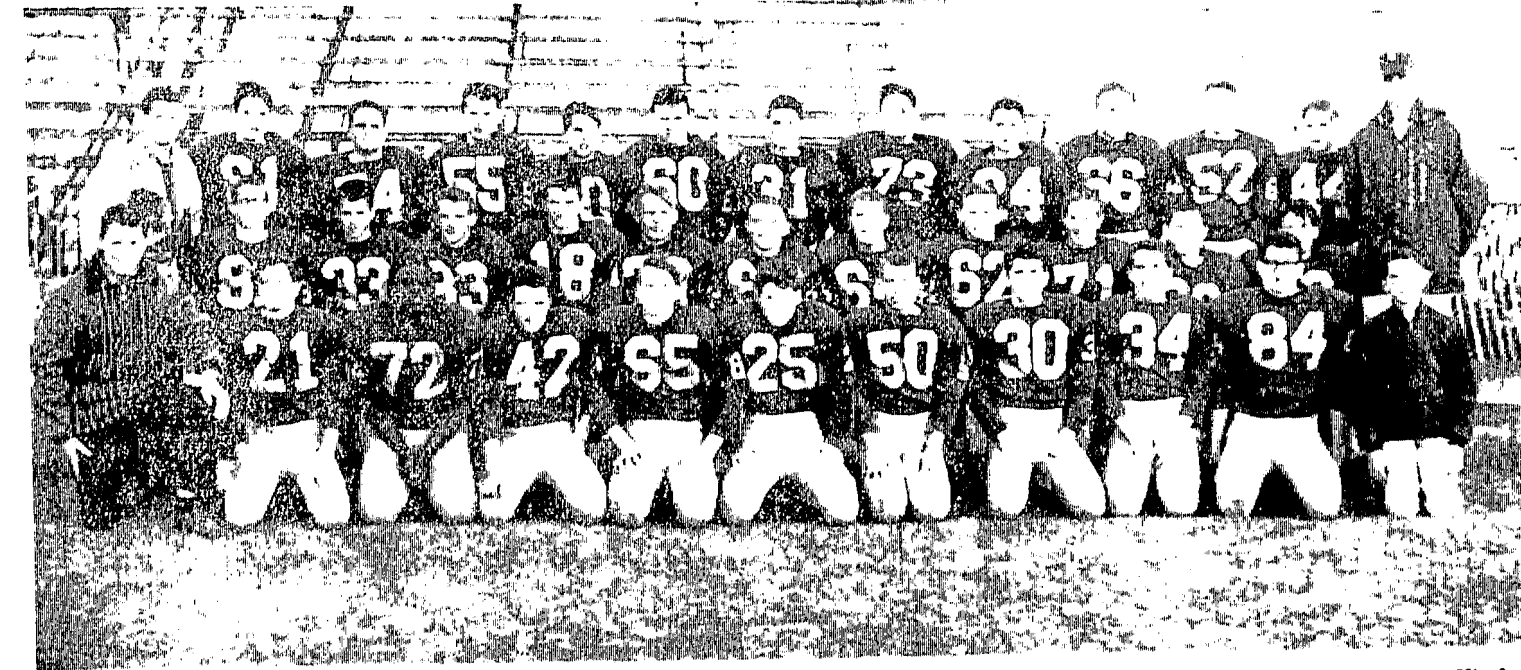
