Register to Vote Before Deadline

The final date for registration for the Clarkston Village election has been set for January 24. Qualified electors may apply for registration at the home of the village clerk, Art Pappas, 55 West Washington, from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. on the deadline date. The official announcement was made by Mr. Pappas.

Electors unable to personally apply for registrations due to physical disability or absence from the village, may secure duplicate registration cards from the clerk's home prior to January 24. These cards require the signature of notary public.

Registration for the village election is separate from the Township, State or National elections. Only residents residing in the village for thirty days or more will be qualified to vote. Unregistered persons are not entitled to vote.

The village election is scheduled for March 14. According to Mr. Pappas there are presently 283 registered electors in the village.

Income from Tips Must be Reported

Recent amendments to the Social Security Act require employers to include in employment tax return "cash tips" reported to them by employees on and after January 1, 1966. A. M. Stoepfer, District Director of Internal Revenue for the state of Michigan advised today.

The Internal Revenue Service will begin issuing revised Forms 941A during February, 1966.

1965 Annual State Police Report for Michigan

With Michigan's population at 8.2 millions, one means to help problems in 1965 was legislative authorization of 200 more troopers to raise the State Police authorized strength to 1,459. Recruiting is now underway.

Two new State Police Posts with skeleton staffs were established at Calhoun county and Iron River in Iron county, bringing to 56 the number in operation.

State Police activities for the year included more than 12 million miles on traffic patrol out of a total department mileage of nearly 21 million. Officers made 196,000 traffic arrests, 20,000 non-traffic arrests, and apprehended 6,300 juvenile traffic offenders and 6,000 delinquent minors. Troopers arrested 65,000 motorists, inventoried 107,000 cars, issued 269,000 oral warnings to drivers, and made 181,000 property and 31,500 liquor inspections.

Provisional 1965 figures indicated 232 persons died and 235 were injured in 534 water accidents. Compared with the year before, deaths were down 5%, injuries increased five and accidents were reduced by 72.

Eight persons, three of them children, were killed and 540 per-

sons injured in 575 rural school bus and related type accidents in the state in 1964. Compared with 1963, these were increases of five in deaths, 121 in injured and six in accidents.

Michigan's 88,175 fires in 1964 claimed 282 lives, both totals setting new annual records, and causing property damage. The per capita loss was \$7.04. Compared with 1963, there were nine more deaths included four firemen, the first such loss since 1961, 197 other adults and 81 children.

Property Damage in Three Accidents

There were no serious injuries in area traffic accidents last week according to Oakland County Sheriff Department and State Police records. There were, however, three property damage accidents involving one minor personal injury reported to these offices.

Roger Coleman, 19, of 7639 Bridge Lake Road, Waterford, lost control of his car January 6, on Dixie Highway, South of I-75. Coleman told Sheriff officers that he swerved in an attempt to avoid a vehicle without lights parked on the highway. His car came to rest in a ditch.

Six occupants of two cars involved in a head on collision, January 8, miraculously escaped injuries. Truman Smith, 4915 Pelton, Drayton Plains, told State Police that his car went into a skid after he applied the brakes when an unidentified driver pulled into the roadway ahead of him. Smith's car went out of control on the snow covered road, colliding with a car driven by Betty Woods, 6219 Eastlawn, Clarkston.

Vonniebelle Giacalone, 13316 Ember Road, Davidsburg, received minor injuries after her car was struck by one driven by Andrew Nelson of Saginaw. The accident occurred on Dixie Highway near M-15, January 8.

Sheriffs Investigate Four Recent Area Larcenies

Sheriff Department Deputies investigated four incidents of larceny occurring in the Independence Township area last week.

Numerous tools were stolen January 3, when thieves broke into a tool shed at the construction site of the new addition to the Clarkston High School. Richard Wallace Construction Company officials told Sheriff Detectives Gaedt and Bills that welding sets, gauges, torches, hose and five shovels were among the items taken.

Articles valued at \$765 were stolen when thieves broke into the Rosco Astbury residence, 4700 Circle, January 6. Two walkie-talkies, a tape recorder, and \$5 in cash were taken from the home

according to Oakland County Sheriff Department records.

Deputies Whitlock and Dolby are investigating the crime.

Vern Lambert, 10260 Crosby Lake Road told Sheriff Detectives that a rotoliller was stolen from his residence sometime in November. The report was given to the Sheriff Department on January 6 and Detectives Whitlock and Dolby were assigned to investigate the incident.

Skis, binders, and poles were stolen from the Mt. Holly Ski Resort on January 7, according to a complaint made by Charles E. Speights. Speights placed the value of the articles at \$155.50.

School Board Approves the Purchase of Four Busses

The purchase of four coach-type school busses was approved at the regular meeting of the Clarkston School Board held Monday. The busses, featuring an 80 passenger seating capacity, will replace the outmoded seven year old, 60 passenger vehicles. Each bus will cost \$44,110, or a total of \$160 more than the last purchased price of a similar unit.

The School Board approved the preliminary plans for the new elementary school to be located at

Maybe and Pine Knob Roads. According to Dr. Green, the board is hopeful that they will be ready to accept bids in late February or early March. The new building along with the existing Sashabaw School, will provide a complete elementary unit to serve the portion of the district in which they are located.

A petition from cafeteria employees requesting recognition as bargaining agents was approved by action of the board. This is the fifth group of school employees to be recognized as bargaining agents this year. Bus Drivers, Custodial Association, and School Secretaries were officially recognized in December. The recognition of the CEA as the bargaining

agent for teachers was approved in November.

A date for contract negotiation was set between CEA and the Board of Education at the Monday meeting.

A correspondence was received from the Michigan Association of School Boards requesting that a representative be appointed from the Clarkston School Board to act as legislative chairman for the Clarkston Community Schools. Arthur Rose Jr. was appointed to this position.

Mr. Rose's function is that of liaison between the local unit and the State. His duties include coordinating materials, both legislative and political, and reporting his findings to the local board.

In other business, Mrs. Henry Brendle, 8809 Lakeview and Mrs. Alex T. Stewart, 6065 Sunnyside, were appointed to the board of canvassers. The appointments were approved upon an official request from the Independence Township Board of Trustees.

A salary schedule for bus drivers was accepted upon Superintendent Green's recommendation. The three year contract sets a starting wage for these employees at \$2.00 per hour. This base rate is graduated by 10 cents an hour per year until the maximum wage of \$2.40 an hour is attained.

U. S. Air Force is Looking for "Shaggy" Recruits

Sergeants Smith and Hines, local Air Force Recruiters, announced today that the Air Force is recruiting qualified dogs from civilian life for training as an Armed Forces Sentry Dog. The Air Force Sentry Dog School, at Lackland AFB, Texas, trains dogs for the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, as well as the Air Force.

Qualifications for needed dogs are: male or spayed female German Shepherds (females must be spayed for at least 90 days), between one and five years of age, weighing at least 55 pounds, and must measure at least 22 inches at the shoulder. Although the dogs need not be pedigreed, they must meet general physical and temperamental standards of the breed.

The Air Force will purchase standards, or at the option of the owner will accept dogs as donations. Interested owners should contact "The USAF Dog Branch, Base Procurement, Lackland AFB, Texas," for further information.

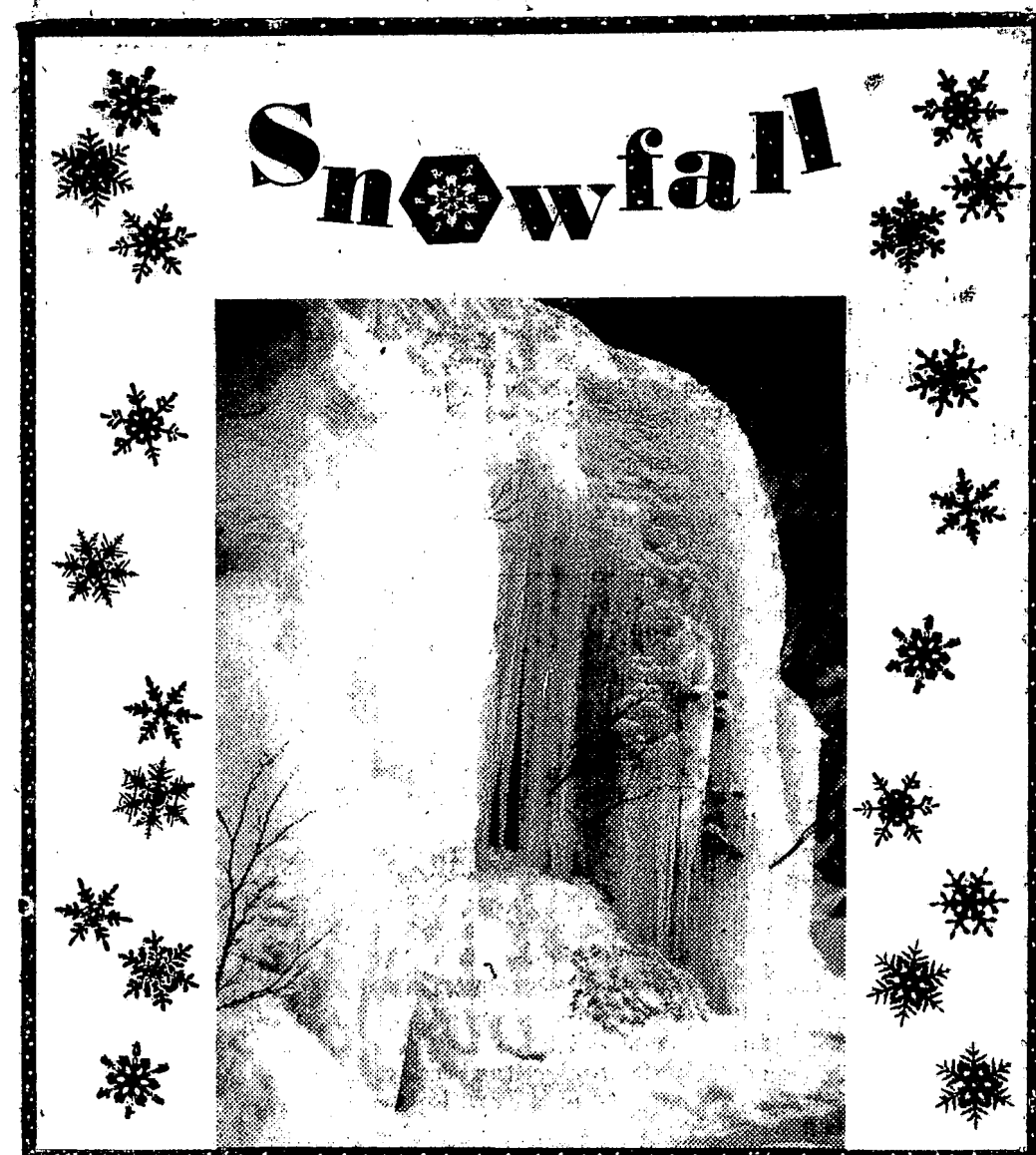

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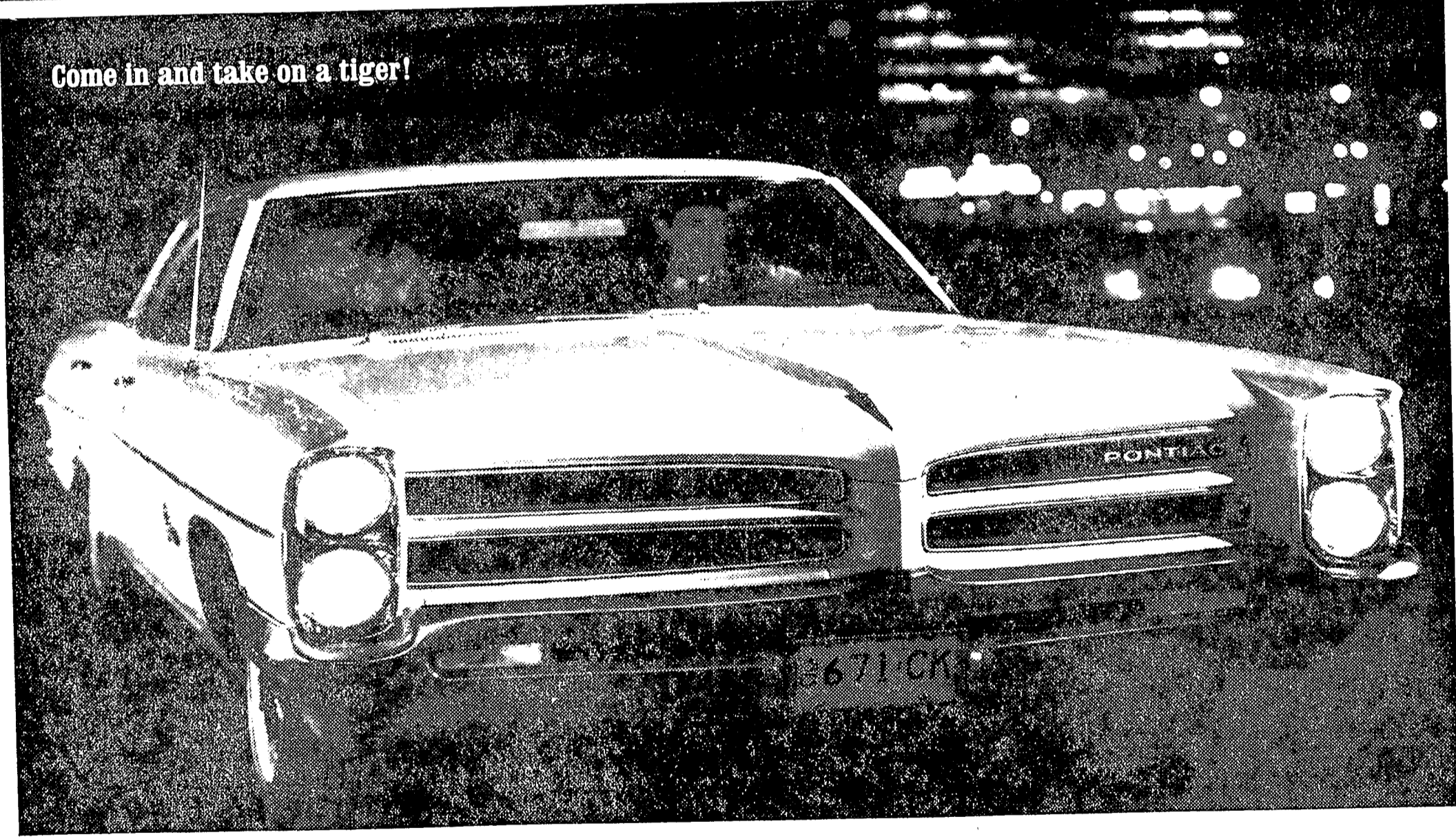

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

Wolves Split Weekend Series

Clarkston divided their weekend series by defeating Clarenceville on Saturday 83-75, but lost to Northville 74-63 on Friday.

In Friday's game it was a case of muscle. The referee's took the philosophy, "Contact but no harm," and this turned the basketball game into a minor football tussle. Players were sprawled all over the floor chasing after loose balls and when a player went up for a lay-up shot he had to be careful because he might find himself stuck on the wall by the opposing player. However in the 2nd half, the officials changed their tactics and the contest had some resemblance of a basketball game.

Although the game was rough, it was an exciting match to watch. The first quarter was close as both teams traded baskets. Northville led 24-18 as Inslund for Northville and Eife of Clarkston traded one basket after another.

When the first half ended 41-29, Inslund of Northville began to get some help from his buddies both in rebounding and in scoring. Inslund had 15, Steve Evans a 4-14, Jim Zart had 6 and Mark Cushing added 4. But Clarkston had to depend on Dan Eife for everything and had little help from his teammates. Eife had 16 points which was better than half of the Wolves' 29 points.

In the third quarter the Wolves gained one point on the Mustangs, but it proved to be a last-inning quarter as Eife picked up two more fouls and the Wolves couldn't hit the hoop as they had to stare from the outside because of Northville's zone defense. Mark Cushing of Northville took up some of the slack in scoring 4 pumped in 10 points, whereas Eife still had to carry the Wolves by himself and

added 8 points. At the 7:12 mark of the fourth quarter Dan Eife picked up his fifth foul and the big gun for Clarkston had to go to the bench. Mark Richard Clarkston's tall-st player came off the bench and started the crowd with his fine play. Mark had 10 points and also had 5 assists. Five rebounds, Mike Madison had four and all added seven more but it wasn't enough as Northville was hot from the free throw line. They made only one field goal in the last period, but hit on 4 out of 21 free throw attempts.

Dan Eife led the scoring with 22 points, Mark Richard had 12, Mark Erickson 9, Mike Madison 7, Rod Allen 6, Tom Allen 4, Randy Neeson 3.

The Northville JV team featured the Clarkston JV team 80-48 as Northville threw up a 2-21 zone defense and Clarkston couldn't hit the hoop. Kurt Maslowski led the junior Wolves with 17 points and Eric Hood was next with 7 points.

The Clarenceville vs. Clarkston game was played on Saturday and before a sparse crowd and Clarkston came out on top 82-75.

Clarkston concentrated on playing basketball and did a fine job of it as they beat a good Clarenceville team. This CV team had a bunch of seniors and they could shoot the eyes out of the basket. The Wolves would build up a 12 or 14 point lead but Clarenceville would come charging back and narrow the gap to 1 point. The ability of Clarkston to hit the free throws proved to be the difference. They hit on 12-15 in the 1st quarter, 1-10 in the 2nd, 4-6 in the 3rd and 11-15 in the 4th quarter. The Wolves attempted 46 free throws and made 33 of them for 72%. Dan Eife himself had 23 attempts and hit on 16.

In the first quarter Dan Eife set some sort of record as he hit

on 20 points and everybody was wondering if he would break the scoring record. But in the 2nd quarter he hit a dry spell. However, Mark Erickson (top from the J.V.) made 3 of 6 shots and Rod Allen made 4 of 6 free throws. The score read 44-37 in favor of Clarkston at the half way point.

In the 3rd quarter Mark Erickson delighted the crowd with his fine shooting as he too can shoot the eyes out of the basket. Mark took only 5 shots and made 4 of them. Eife was held to 6 points and the game remained close.

It was the free throw stripe that kept Clarkston ahead of CVille as 11 out of 19 points were scored via the free throw stripe. Clarkston had a 10 point lead but with 3 minutes to go CVille narrowed it to 7 points and the crowd came alive. A 2 minute later Eife faded out of the game and CVille was only behind by 5 points. CVille's Hawkins had a great chance to almost even the score but he missed on three straight free throws. He made 10 field goals, but when the pressure was on he couldn't make the free throw. Whereas in the closing minute of the game Rod Allen hit on 2 out of 2 and Mike Madison made 3 out of 4 to recover the lead to 10 points and with a deep sigh of relief Clarkston was home free with a 83-75 victory. Clarenceville's fine little guard Neel made one more basket but it was too late. The CV guard scored 23 points even though for some strange reason set out more than 1 quarter of the game.

Dan Eife led all scorers with 26 points. Mark Erickson added a much needed 19 points, Randy Neeson 8, Rod Allen 8, Tom Allen had 7, and Mike Madison had 5.

Clarkston's JV took it on the chin again and was defeated 68-44. Bob Palladino came off the bench in the 4th quarter and led the team scoring with 11. Kurt Maslowski added 8 and Eric Hood had 7.
