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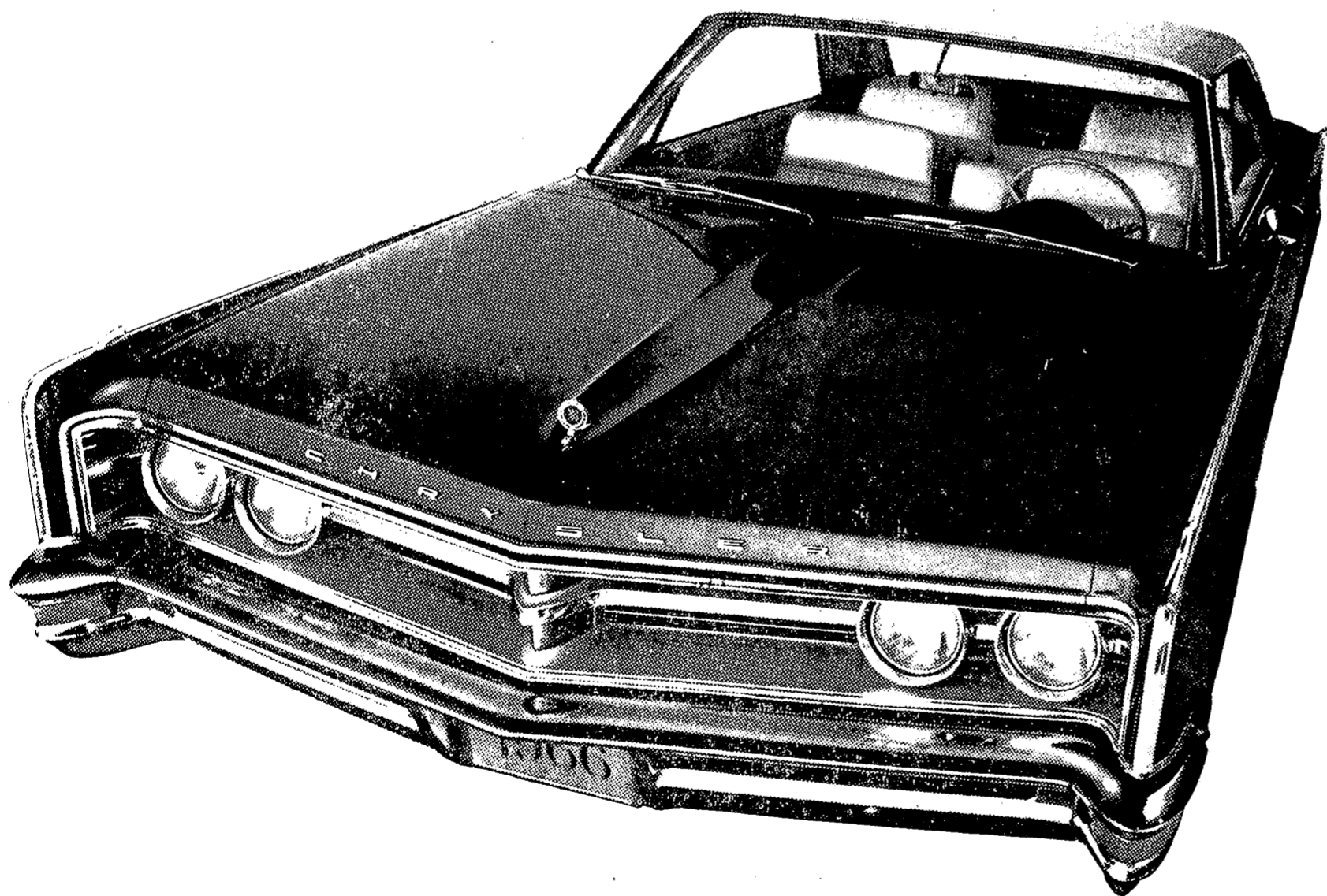


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What's Up At C.H.S.

ICE SKATING RINK SITES CONTINUING TO EXPAND:

The Waterford Township Recreation Department is happy to announce that two more ice skating rinks have been added to the list of ice skating locations. One is on Hatchery Road at the fish hatchery and the other at Riverbank and Motorway in Elizabeth Lake Estates.

Other locations are as follows: Behind Covert School, 1150 Scott Lake Road, LaCota Street off Scott Lake Road, Lorberta Lane (sewer plant), Highland Estates (off M-59) next to church, Waterford Village School, Steffens Street off Andersonville Road, Drayton Plains Ball Park, Dixie Highway behind A & W Root Beer Stand — this location is lighted 5:30 - 10:00 p.m. every night that the ice rink is in skating condition.

All of the above rinks were reflooded Tuesday night and should be in excellent skating condition. The Ice Rink slated to be built at McVittie School is still under construction and as yet is not ready for the skaters. Watch this publication for the announcement

of its opening. The rinks are available free of charge. These rinks will all be maintained as long as the weather permits.

Ice skating lessons will be held on Tuesday and Fridays at the Highland Estates location for elementary school aged boys and girls starting January 25, cost \$1.50 for 5 weeks instruction, two days per week, one hour per day.

ICE HOCKEY LEAGUE TO BEGIN:

The first organizational meeting for Ice Hockey League will be held Monday, January 24 at 7:30 p.m. in the Community Activities Building of the Recreation office.

The Waterford Township Recreation Department is in the process of trying to start an ice hockey league but is having trouble finding qualified personnel to head the league. Interested persons may apply at the Recreation office.

There is a position for a Hockey League Director, who would be paid an hourly salary. Volunteer helpers are also needed to help

with the boys. If adequate help is not obtained the Hockey League will not be offered this year.

Know Your Michigan Law

(This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of any law upon their private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

Injuries suffered by any child under 17, which have or may have been inflicted by a person responsible for the child's care, must now be reported by the examining physician to both prosecuting attorney and state department of social welfare. Such reporting is now possible for the first time under Michigan's new "battered child" law (Act 98, PA 1964).

Law enforcement and welfare personnel have long shared with the medical profession the knowledge that many so-called accidental injuries to infants are deliberately inflicted by parents or guardians. Until passage of the battered child law, however, officials were helpless to act, because of legal prohibitions forbidding doctors to disclose any information made known during physician-patient contact. The new law, by releasing the doctor from secrecy, makes it possible to establish the nature and cause of adult-inflicted injuries to children.

to prosecute the adults responsible, and — most important — to remove the child from the custody of the adults who inflicted the injuries.

Already several such physically abused children have been placed with foster or adoptive parents under the 1964 battered child law. These include a small adopted girl whose parents tried to improve her homework by whipping her more than a hundred times in a single session. Several others, including some reported by the Crippled Children Commission, are under investigation by state and local officials. But for some, it is too late. An infant boy of thirteen months was reported "dead on arrival" at the hospital. His head and body were covered with infected lesions resulting from neglect. Reporting authorities were not sure whether immediate cause of death was malnutrition or from internal injuries. Including old and new fractures they are sure, however, that his brothers and sisters ought to be in the custody of adults able and willing to provide proper care for children.

Unfortunately, this case is not unique. The new law, for the first time, makes it possible for the law to help the physically abused child.

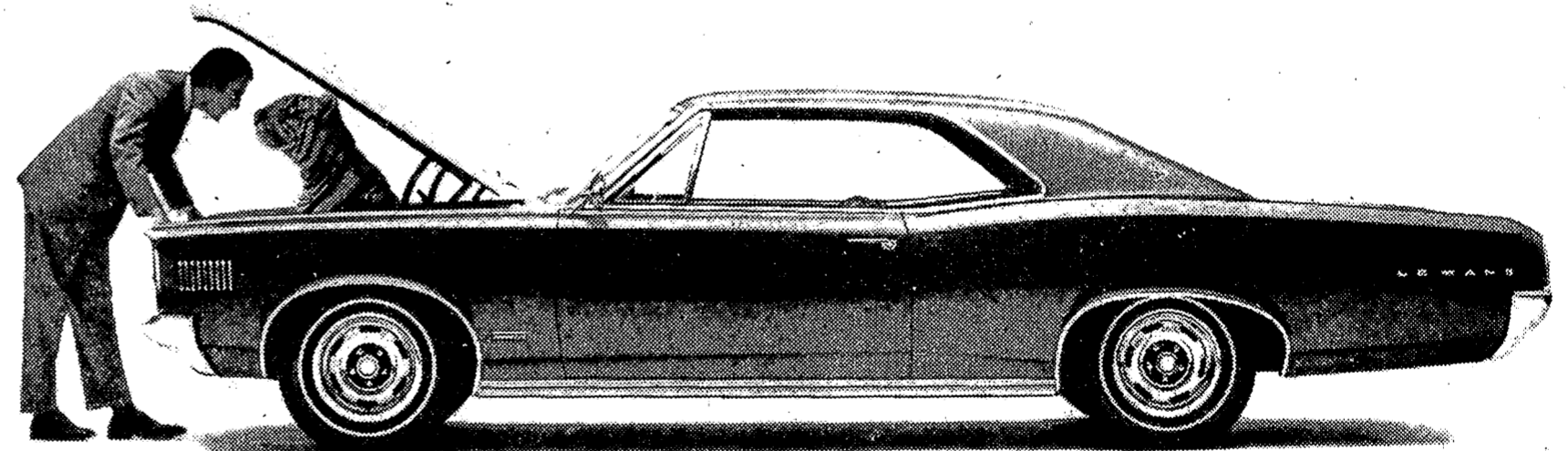

Treasury Department Gives Tips on Returns

News Received on Area Servicemen

When and Where

You are required by law to file your income tax not later than April 15, 1966.

File your tax return with the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Detroit, Michigan 48226. If your tax return indicates money is owing, make checks payable to "Internal Revenue Service."

Any tax that is owed must be paid at the time you file your income tax return.

When the tax return is completed be sure to attach a Form W-2 for each employer shown on the in-

come tax form. Double check your arithmetic for accuracy. Sign the return . . . If it is a joint return, both husband and wife must sign. Drop the completed tax return in the mail.

Do it early — Don't wait till the last minute!

The Internal Revenue Service says "first come, first served" on refunds. Be one of the first!

Do I File

Read these instructions and you can determine if you have to file an income tax return.

Every citizen of the United States, and every alien resident of the United States who is under 65 years of age and who had gross income of \$600 or more must file a tax return. If you are 65 or over on December 31, you must file an income tax return if your gross income was \$1,200 or more during the year.

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When children are subject to the same filing requirements as all other Federal taxpayers. A person under 21 years of age must file an income tax return if his gross income for the year amounted to \$600 or more.

If you had more than \$600 of gross income, and income tax was withheld from your wages, you should file a return to see a refund of the tax withheld.

If in doubt about the filing requirements, telephone your local Internal Revenue Service Office.

Which Return

The 1040A is the card-type return and is the easiest to prepare. Of course, everyone is not eligible to use this simple return.

The first restriction on the use of the 1040A is the amount of gross income. You can use the 1040A if you had wages, subject to withholding, of less than \$10,000. Your income from interest, dividends or wages not subject to withholding may not exceed \$200 in order to use the 1040A. If any combination of the above income adds up to \$10,000 or over, you may not use the 1040A, but must use Form 1040.

The instructions which accompany the form you are required to file gives all the "do's" and "don't's" on its preparation. Read the instructions and if you still have a question, telephone your local Internal Revenue Service Office.

Joint or Separate Return

M married persons have a choice in most cases of filing either a joint or separate return. To file a joint return, both husband and wife must be either an American citizen or a resident alien at all times during the taxable year. You do not file a joint return merely including your wife's income in your return — both of you must sign it.

A joint return can be filed on either the Form 1040 or the Form 1040A. Read the instructions to see if you are eligible to file the 1040A since everyone cannot file it.

Married status is determined as of the last day of the taxable year to determine your marital status. If your husband or wife died during the year, you are considered married. If an executor or administrator has been appointed, the surviving spouse and the executor or administrator must sign the return. Otherwise, the surviving spouse will sign and

indicate that he or she is the surviving spouse, such as John Jones (Surviving Spouse).

If a refund is due when one spouse is deceased, secure a Form 1310 from the Internal Revenue Service. Attach the completed Form 1310 together with a copy of the certificate of death to the return.

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




