## Building Progresses at School; Hot Lunch Budget to be Cut

# Completion Slated Menus will be Re-evaluated

#### for Mid October

#### **Special Education** in County Schools

Expanded special education programs for this school year list 2,536 Oakland County children on classrolls and 8.962 in speech cor-

A report prepared by Oakland Schools for the State Department of Public Instruction shows an increase over last year of 152 children in special classes and 1.073 in speech correction.

Of the children in special rooms 1,845 attend classes for educable mentally handicapped. Last year there were 1.726 children in classrooms of this type.

Classrooms for trainable mentally handicapped accommodate 145 children this year. Last year 128 trainable children were in public school programs. These classes, known as the Type B program, are located in Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Farmington, Oak Park, Pontiac, Royal Oak and Walled Lake.

Special education emerged from a two-year freeze last June when county voters approved a half-mill tax increase to provide classrooms and teachers for handicapped child-

School lunch room managers in Oakland County have most of the food cost worries of the average mother, plus one more: their budget for the rest of the school year will be \$50,000 less than plan-

Miss Vera Jehnsen, food service cordinator for Oakland Schools, said the cash reimbursement for school lunches in Michigan has been cut from four to three cents as of January 1st. Loss of the penny, she said, must be multiplied by the five to six million lunches that will be served in 28 Oakland County districts before

Michigan's share of the \$138,590,000 Federal school lunch approbation is \$3,064,010 this year. A pay-out formula to encourage participation in school lunch programs has been remarkably successful. In the state some 83 million lunches will be served this year, a gain of more than 8 million over last year.

of money," Miss Jehnsen explained. Sharply rising food and labor costs add to the problem. The amount of surplus commodities available to schools has decreased.

Lunch prices are set by the school boards of each district so that the program is self-supporting. Minimum standards of nutrition are maintained to keep programs eligible for Federal reimbursement. Two ounces of protein - meat, eggs, fish, or cheese - must be served on each tray, along with a serving of vegetables and fruit, roll or bread, butter and eight ounces of milk.

School lunch supervisors work through a county-wide organization, the "Oaks," to purchase staples and canned foods through joint bids, to trade tips on kitchen efficiency and to exchange ideas on menus which have both eye and taste appeal for the students.


"We will re-evaluate our menus and watch our kitchen procedures more carefully than ever," Miss Jehnsen said. She concluded by echoing the housewife's solution to similar problems, "We'll maintain our quality, but will have to use less expensive cuts of meat."







Although their experiences are related in a light humourous vein, other letters to their parents have shown the struggles and sometimes difficut times of the young English teachers.

#### Christmas in a Far Away Land

Although is seems impossibly soon, the Christmas season has come again. You are all running around buying presents, going to parties, giving parties, fixing the tree, and generally being Christmassy, while we are still here in Farah. This is the time of year that we best remember how it is back home, and think most of our friends. Farah is colder this year. only about 70 degrees during the day, so we can remember the brisk weather you are experiencing. We are still in the middle of Fall, with the trees turning, and a few leaves are on the ground. Our garden is full of lettuce, tomatoes, peas, etc. We're dreaming of a White Christmas, THE THE PARTY OF T

We've gotten Christmas cards from many, and they are a delight to us and a curiosity to our friends and students. Both pictures and snow are a rarity to our students, and every card has either a reproduction of a painting or a snow

scene. We are kept busy explaining the concept of Christmas, but are carefully hiding all Santa Claus cards - that's just too difficult to explain.

Self Made Furniture Makes Comfortable Farah Home:

Our physical surroundings and situation have changed only slightly since last year at this time, but our relationship with the town have changed drastically. We have added some furniture to our housea dining table, a few small shelftables, constructed from our shipping crates, a new bookcase, full of Farsi books which we can't read, two prayer rugs, gifts from our friends, and a windlass for our well, which I built myself and which is our pride and joy. The house is still quite bare by American standards, but a source of wonder, and, I sometimes think, amusement to our friends.

We are both teaching more, with an adult course for me, and a girls' course for Betty, and a weekly English Club with the better students for both of us. I'm teaching 36 hours, and Betty 25. They

now let Betty out an hour earlier every day, so that she can come home and cook for me. They think the idea is hilarious. They are also amused at all the carpentry work I do myself, but are beginning to notice that we live more comfortably because of this. If we can modify the idea that manual labor is degrading, we may have accomplished something worthwhile.
