### Building Progresses at School; Hot Lunch Budget to be Cut

#### Completion Slated for Mid October Menus will be Re-evaluated

"Hopefully," by the middle of October, this steel skeleton will be framed and finished, boosting the Clarkston Senior High student capacity by five hundred. The additional forty-two thousand square feet, to the present school, will offer 23 working rooms.

Special features will include a language laboratory, a suite of three rooms, a fully equipped automotive shop, offering welding as a distinct course, also power mechanics. An additional art and drafting room will be included in the expansion. An electronics laboratory will be installed, plus rooms that will enable the subjects of retailing, salesmanship, and co-operative training to be taught.

Well placed centrally will be two large lecture rooms where groups of 95 or 150 students may congregate at one time. The Little Theater has had to be previously used for this purpose.

#### Special Education in County Schools

Expanded special education programs for this school year list 2,536 Oakland County children on classrolls and 8,962 in speech correction.

A report prepared by Oakland Schools for the State Department of Public Instruction shows an increase over last year of 152 children in special classes and 1,073 in speech correction.

Of the children in special rooms, 1,845 attend classes for educable mentally handicapped. Last year there were 1,726 children in classrooms of this type.

Classrooms for trainable mentally handicapped accommodate 145 children this year. Last year 128 trainable children were in public school programs. These classes, known as the Type B program, are located in Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Farmington, Oak Park, Pontiac, Royal Oak and Walled Lake.

Special education emerged from a two-year freeze last June when county voters approved a half-mill tax increase to provide classrooms and teachers for handicapped children.

School lunch room managers in Oakland County have most of the food cost worries of the average mother, plus one more: their budget for the rest of the school year will be \$50,000 less than planned.

Miss Vera Jehnsen, food service coordinator for Oakland Schools, said the cash reimbursement for school lunches in Michigan has been cut from four to three cents as of January 1st. Loss of the penny, she said, must be multiplied by the five to six million lunches that will be served in 28 Oakland County districts before school is out.

Michigan's share of the \$138,590,000 Federal school lunch appropriation is \$3,064,010 this year. A pay-out formula to encourage participation in school lunch programs has been remarkably successful. In the state some 83 million lunches will be served this year, a gain of more than 8 million over last year.

"More lunches will simply have to come out of the same amount

of money," Miss Jehnsen explained. Sharply rising food and labor costs add to the problem. The amount of surplus commodities available to schools has decreased.

Lunch prices are set by the school boards of each district so that the program is self-supporting. Minimum standards of nutrition are maintained to keep programs eligible for Federal reimbursement. Two ounces of protein — meat, eggs, fish, or cheese — must be served on each tray, along with a serving of vegetables and fruit, roll or bread, butter and eight ounces of milk.

School lunch supervisors work through a county-wide organization, the "Oaks," to purchase staples and canned foods through joint bids, to trade tips on kitchen efficiency and to exchange ideas on menus which have both eye and taste appeal for the students.

"We will re-evaluate our menus and watch our kitchen procedures more carefully than ever," Miss Jehnsen said. She concluded by echoing the housewife's solution to similar problems. "We'll maintain our quality, but will have to use less expensive cuts of meat."

Michigan Bell will start nine new telephone buildings during the year with twenty-two additions.

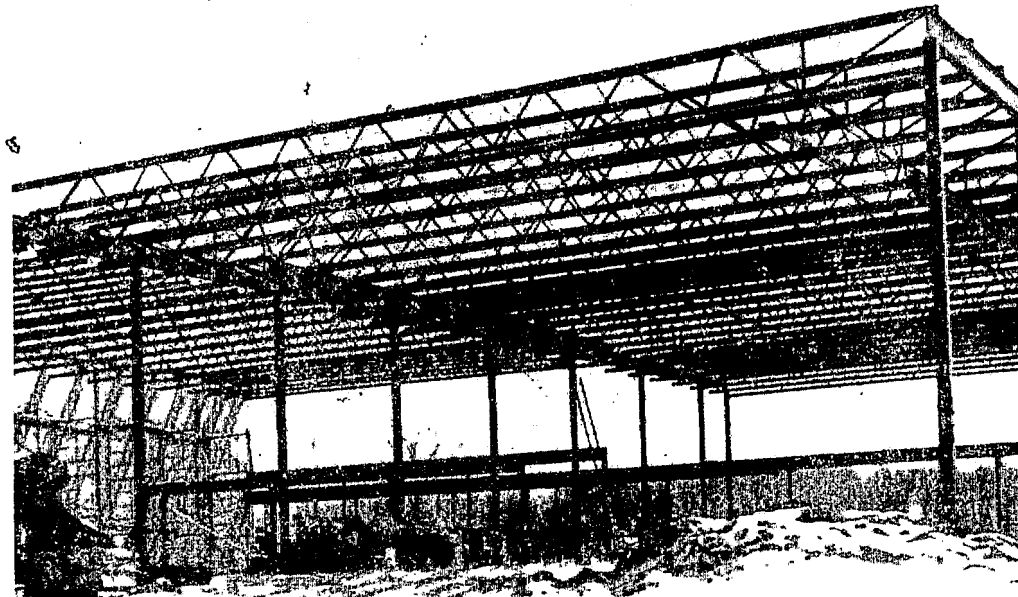
#### GM Announces Scholarships

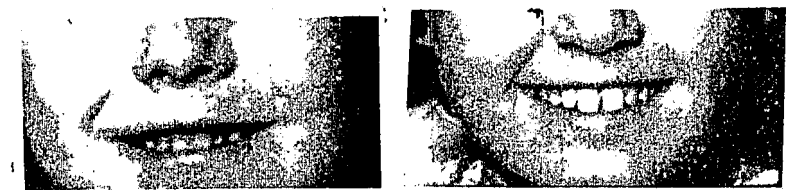
Parallel to his promotion to corporal was a transfer to Calumet, for Clayton L. Babcock.

**Recipe of the Week**

**PEANUT BUTTER BREAD**

2 C flour  
1/2 c sugar  
2 1/2 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 C chunk-style peanut butter  
2 Tbsp. butter  
2 beaten eggs  
3/4 C milk  
1/4 C jelly, melted  
1/3 C chopped peanuts  
Sift together dry ingredients. Cut in peanut butter till mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add eggs and milk, all at once, stirring only until flour is moistened. Spoon into greased 9 in. cake pan. Bake at 400 degrees, 20 minutes. Remove from oven and brush top with melted jelly, sprinkle with peanuts. Serve warm.

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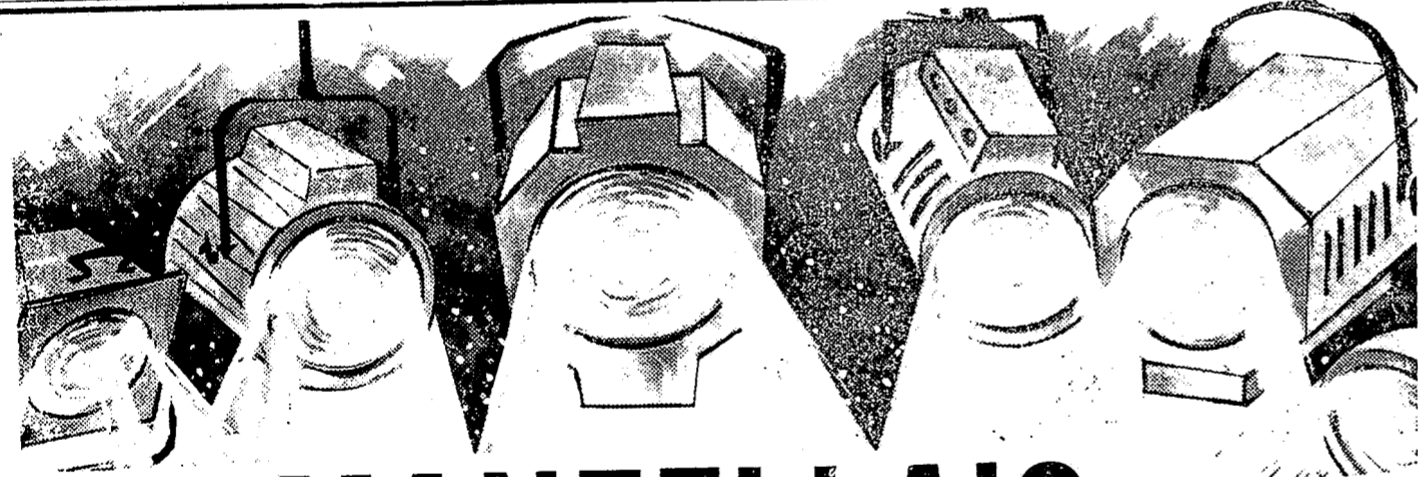
