Swim Pool May Hit Ballot

Dr. L. F. Greene, superintendent of Clarkston Community Schools, recommended "That the board of education seek permission to bond up to \$600,000 for purposes of erecting and equipping an indoor swimming pool attached to the existing Senior High School".

VOLUME 37

The recommendation was made during a regular Board meeting Monday evening.

Explaining the recommendation Dr. Greene explained, "I have cause to believe that the Board of Education is to be petitioned to place the swimming pool issue to referendum . . ."

Other issues recommended by Greene and passed by the Board to be included for referendum at the June 13 annual election are

"That the \$37,224.82 remaining in the 1954 debt retirement fund. since all obligations were paid May 1, 1964, to be transferred to the Building and Site fund for purpose of constructing a physical education running track on the existing football field and the black topping of Elementary parking lots and driveways at Sashabaw and Bailey Lake Schools.

"That the Board of Education ask for a five mill increase in operation revenue for a period of ten-

"That the Board of Education seek approval to bond up to \$2.500, 000 for the purposes of acquiring additional sites and improvement of same, building new schools and erecting additions to existing

schools and furnishing and equipp-

Dr. Greene further suggested that the Board take immediate steps to call any outstanding bonds permissively available, thereby reducing the debt retirement reserve to "0" if possible.

According to Greene, his recommendations would not cause an increase in total tax rate of more than \$1.00 per thousand of State equalized value.

"Any future building requirements over and above those already proposed in this report (prepared by Dr. Greene, George Barrie and Floyd Vincent) can still be erected without an increase in the debt retirement tax rate," Greene con-

Property damage aspects of the new Motor Vehicle Accident Claims Fund works "exactly like a \$200 deductible insurance plan."

The statement was made by Secretary of State James M. Hare in an effort to clarify some apparent misunderstandings concerning this phase of the new law.

"Only claims over \$200 can be filed. Amount payable is only that over \$200, not the entire amount. For example, if an accident caused



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sults in damage to a car of \$250, only \$50 could be claimed and re-

covered from the Fund." Hare said the property damage clause in the law was put there along with other amendments by the Legislature last Fall.

"In the original law, all claims both personal injury and property damage . . . were goverend by a \$50 deductible clause. But that was changed when the Legislature adopted several recommendations made by Governor Romney and the insurance industry ostensibly toclose some of the loopholes in the originally-passed measure and insure its solvency."

The Secretary of State said he was only too aware that many persons involved in minor collisions with uninsured drivers would not be able to collect for property damage from the Fund because their claims would be under the minimum \$200 collectable amount.

"Concept of the Fund is to protect persons from financial hardship because of death, injury, or extensive property damage, and that's the reason for the \$200 property damage limitation."

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



The National School Lunch Pro gram was put into effect to encourage school children to eat more nutritious lunches.

It is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture through the State Departments of Education and each local school district signs an agreement for the operation of individual lunch programs.

In return for maintaining the standards set in the School Lunch Agreement, the schools receive cash and food assistance.

Lunch Programs are a service maintained for the benefit of the students. Other school personnel are eligible to participate in the lunch program, but no Federal funds or foods assistance is allocated for adult lunches.

It operates on a self-supporting basis which means food costs, labor costs and other expenses accrued in its operation are paid for by income derived from the program. WHAT IS A "TYPE A" LUNCH?

Student lunches, in order to be eligible for reimbursement must contain as a minimum:

a. ½ pint fluid whole milk. b. 2 oz. edible protein (meat, fish, cheese, etc.).

c. 34 cup serving of two or more fruit and/or vegetable. d. One slice (or equivalent) of

enriched bread or roll. e. 2 teaspoons butter or fortified

margarine. This is approximately 1/3 of the students daily nutritional require-

WHAT ABOUT THE COST? Student lunches are priced as low as possible, yet still maintain a fiancially solvent program.

Prices for adult lunches and milk must be higher to cover the costs involved as there is no additional money received for service to adults.

Because adults pay more than students does not mean they should receive larger portions. Size of portions is determined by the costs involved. Larger portions for adults would increase the cost to the adult. WHY VARIANCES FROM SCHOOL TO SCHOOL AND DISTRICT TO DISTRICT?

Local school district policies vary. People vary and people plan and execute the school lunch program. The physical facilities, kitchen layout and equipment, location of the serving area and dining room may determine (or limit) the program in a .school.
