## Swim Pool May Hit Ballot

Dr. L. F. Greene, superintendent of Clarkston Community Schools, recommended "That the board of education seek permission to bond up to \$600,000 for purposes of erecting and equipping an indoor swimming pool attached to the existing Senior High School".

The recommendation was made during a regular board meeting Monday evening.

Explaining the recommendation Dr. Greene explained, "I have cause to believe that the Board of Education is to be petitioned to place the swimming pool issue to referendum . . ."

Other issues recommended by Greene and passed by the Board to be included for referendum at the June 13 annual election are:

"That the \$37,224.82 remaining in the 1954 debt retirement fund, since all obligations were paid May 1, 1964, to be transferred to the Building and Site fund for purpose of constructing a physical education running track on the existing football field and the black topping of Elementary parking lots and driveways at Sashabaw and Bailey Lake Schools.

"That the Board of Education ask for a five mill increase in operation revenue for a period of ten years.

"That the Board of Education seek approval to bond up to \$2,500,000 for the purposes of acquiring additional sites and improvement of same, building new schools and erecting additions to existing

schools and furnishing and equipping same."

Dr. Greene further suggested that the Board take immediate steps to call any outstanding bonds permissively available, thereby reducing the debt retirement reserve to "0" if possible.

According to Greene, his recommendations would not cause an increase in total tax rate of more than \$1.00 per thousand of State equalized value.

"Any future building requirements over and above those already proposed in this report (prepared by Dr. Greene, George Barrie and Floyd Vincent) can still be erected without an increase in the debt retirement tax rate," Greene concluded.

Several Clarkston Jaycees attended the April Board of Education meeting and requested the Board's opinion and help in placing the swimming pool issue to the public for a vote.

Since that time Dr. Greene, Floyd Vincent and George Barrie prepared a detailed report on the present and future needs of the school district.

The report was read to Board members. Dr. Greene made his recommendations and they were passed unanimously by the Board.

The board now awaits an official petition for a swimming pool from the Jaycees.

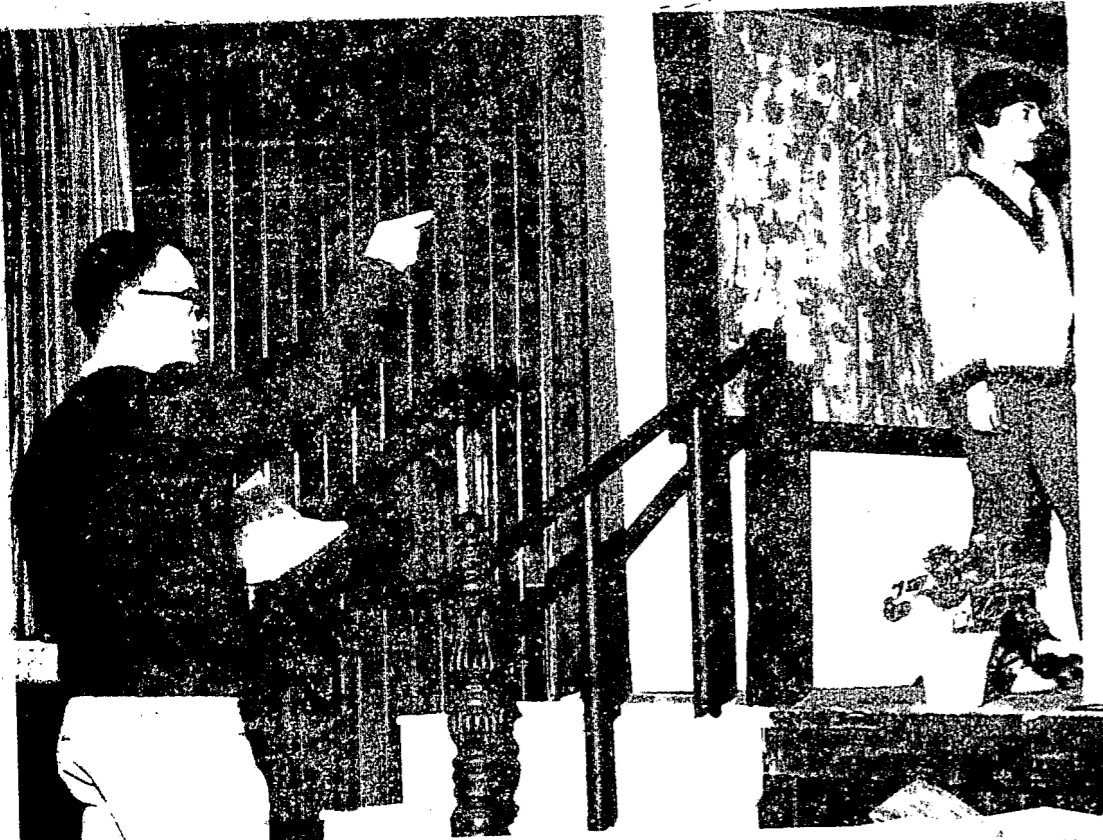

## Animal Toll Is High on State Highways

More than 100,000 animals and birds were killed on Michigan's state trunkline highways in 1965, the department of state highways estimates.

The report, compiled by the maintenance Division of the Highway Department, is a projection of the actual count taken on roads in Ionia County.

According to Martin O. Toole, assistant to the maintenance operations engineer, a road patrol is assigned to pick up dead animals from the trunklines about every other day.

The patrol keeps a tabulation of the number of each kind of animal or bird picked up.

Raccoon lead the statistics in Ionia County. Over 500 of them were killed in 1965 compared to 46 deer, 203 squirrels, 112 pheasants and one goose. Many other animals and birds in the county, including turkeys, foxes, dogs and cats.

Toole said that the ratio of one animal to another would vary according to regions of the state.

"This year, he said, there would be a lot less raccoon and a lot more pheasants killed on the trunklines than the Upper Peninsula."

Dear Mom

We were glad to get your letter, and to get the tape, also. The tape was fun, hearing all these voices.

We're both just as we left Farah. We came up here to get Betty checked out for her kidney infection (all cleared) and got ourselves snowed in, so we probably won't leave till Tuesday.

It's very relaxing, no teaching, and food nice house - we're staying with the Czazas again. Did you send that letter to Pat? She's interested mainly in underwear and children's clothes - so if you have any spare pages you might send them.

Time flies. We suddenly found a ride back to Farah, as soon as the snow cleared off the roads.

We came back with the Kopels, a PC III couple now finished and touring Afghanistan in a Volkswagen camper. They brought us to Farah, and got caught by an unseasonable downpour, which stranded them.

They were planning to stay 1 day on their way to Herat and Iran, and stayed Wednesday evening to Monday morning. The roads still aren't good.

We just got word that they made it to Delavam, 70 miles away, in only 7 hours. Now they're finally on their way home. They're going to write us from various points along the way and tell us how the roads are.

If you're serious about getting a sabbatical, think hard about meeting us in Europe. Betty has persuaded her parents to meet us in Rome in April or May '67, and it would be fun to have you too - there, or later someplace else. Let us know what you think.

Congrats! You raised a smart kid (if I were there, you'd punch me).

Make sure you pass these letters around. We're swamped, after being so far away so long, we received everything at once, and 6 month exams are coming up next week.

You sound as if you're still keeping up your pace. Everyone here is fascinated by the idea that American women work, and think it's amazing that a woman could get an important job.

Did you send that letter to the Czazas just to the N.Y. APO number? If you put Afghanistan on it, it may have gotten lost, or it may still be on the way. They haven't received it as of 2/20.

Betty and I have our jobs for this summer pretty well sewed up. I'll be earning about double PC for teaching 20 hrs, a week with no homework (here 36 hours and lots of homework) and Betty will be getting about 4 times PC as a secretary for USAID. We may even be able to save some money if we can find reasonable housing. Everything in Kabul is tremendously expensive, but at least we won't lose money while waiting to go to India.

We've found out we can buy our car tax free in Karachi, so if shipping dates can be fixed our plans are beginning to jell.

We're already thinking about packing, and qualling at the thought. We'll have to decide what to send home, what to take with us, and what to give away or sell here or in Kabul.

Will have to take enough household things to last us in Kabul, and plan clothes for a long time ahead. We're going to try to talk to the next people who come down here, so they'll at least have a head start, but it's going to be rough. We've built up such a following that there will be resentment of them taking our place but we'll do our best to smooth that over.

Yes, by all means put a coat of natural oil on our wool things, and if the cost isn't too much you might consider sending the gloves back. Woli M. I'm sure will replace them.

Alternately, just trace one of the gloves and make a left hand tracing of the same size and just send them with a letter explaining what happened. They are nice gloves, but not very expensive, so don't go to any cost.

We received a letter from Paul and DP. Paul is still doing too much, and enjoying it.

DP and M'hou seem to be getting a lot of fun out of life, if they don't collapse first.

We'll write them soon, but meanwhile give them our love. We're thinking of making another tape ourselves.

Yes we have more slides. We just sent some of the poorer ones, because we were afraid of losing them, and having no replacement.

We have about 250 more here. We're really feeling spring with warm air and a big mug of daffodils that D conned out of the public garden. We're revelling in the best season of the year and every thing in our garden is almost ready to eat. Of course we can't tell if the beets are ripe. We're not farmers - "Who's not a farmer?" B.

P.S. Could you get us a road map of the Middle East from AAA?

## Watch for Rabies Infection, It Could Be Fatal

What can you do to protect your family against rabies? This might seem to be an abstract question, but if your child was suddenly bit ten by a stray dog, you certainly would want to know. Well, the time to find out what to do in such an emergency is right now - not after the fact.

A rabid dog, for instance, may act only sick and confused, or may not have any obvious symptoms until just a few hours before it dies.

Rabies is spread by the saliva of an infected animal entering a break in the skin of a healthy animal. The sick animal may or may not inflict the injury that allows the infection.

Just handling a rabid animal is enough to cause infection if some of his saliva gets into an open wound. While the disease can be communicated directly from wild-life to man, the more usual chain of infection it follows is from wild animals to domestic animals to man.

Now, if any member of your family is involved in an animal bite incident, here's what you should do without hesitation:

First, identify the animal that

inflicted the bite so he can be watched and checked.

Second, apply first aid by washing the contaminated area thoroughly with soap and water for fifteen minutes; then apply antiseptic and a bandage.

Third, take the victim to a doctor right away. You need the doctor's professional advice.

Fourth, report the incident to the local health officer, and the local dog warden.

Fifth, and last, the animal should be confined, and observed for the next ten days. If the dog's illness was not rabies, he will survive. Otherwise he will die, and a study of its brain will make diagnosis clearer.

Another precaution you can take right now, is to see that your pet dog is immunized against the disease to break the chain of infection.

And teach your children to stay away from wild animals, and sick and injured animals of all kinds - especially bats that may be on the ground.

## PD Claims Must Be \$200

Property damage aspects of the new Motor Vehicle Accident Claims Fund works "exactly like a \$200 deductible insurance plan." The statement was made by Secretary of State James M. Hare in an effort to clarify some apparent misunderstandings concerning this phase of the new law. "Only claims over \$200 can be filed. Amount payable is only that over \$200, not the entire amount. For example, if an accident caused

by an at-fault, uninsured driver results in damage to a car of \$250, only \$50 could be claimed and recovered from the Fund." Hare said the property damage clause in the law was put there along with other amendments by the Legislature last Fall.

"In the original law, all claims... both personal injury and property damage... were governed by a \$50 deductible clause. But that was changed when the Legislature adopted several recommendations made by Governor Romney and the insurance industry ostensibly to close some of the loopholes in the originally-passed measure and insure its solvency."

The Secretary of State said he was only too aware that many persons involved in minor collisions with uninsured drivers would not be able to collect for property damage from the Fund because their claims would be under the minimum \$200 collectable amount.

"Concept of the Fund is to protect persons from financial hardship because of death, injury, or extensive property damage, and that's the reason for the \$200 property damage limitation."

This week Student Government elections were held to choose next years president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer.

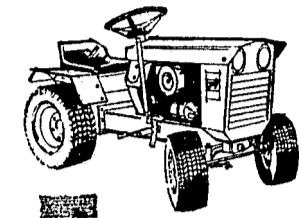

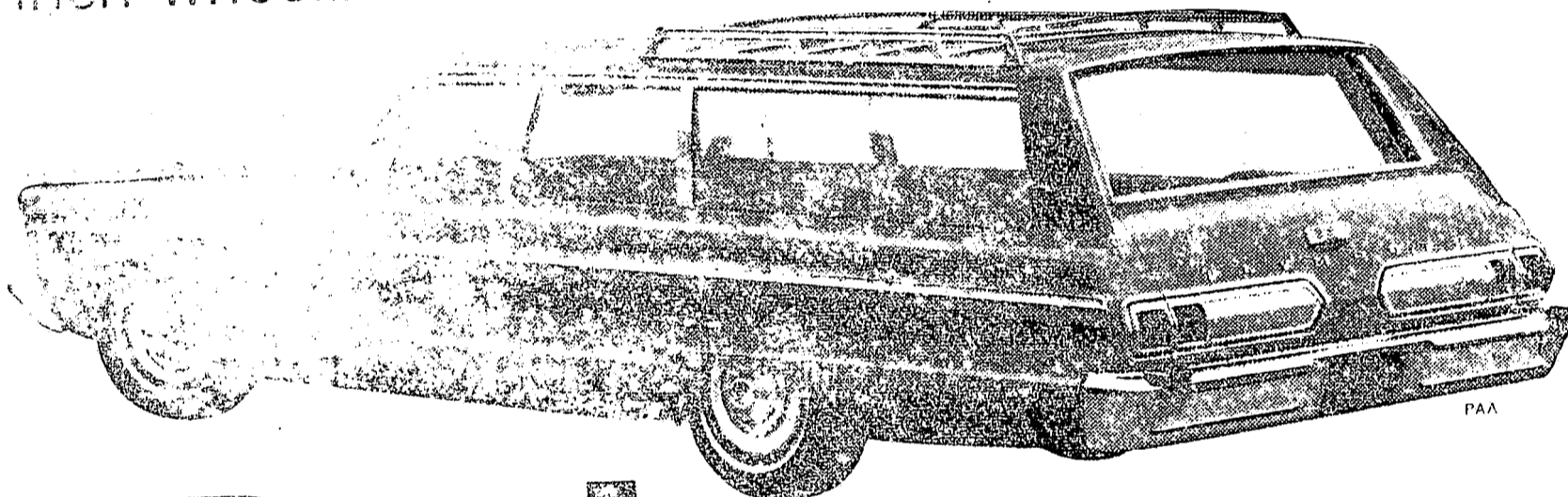

## The National School Lunch Program

The National School Lunch Program was put into effect to encourage school children to eat more nutritious lunches.

It is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture through the State Departments of Education and each local school district signs an agreement for the operation of individual lunch programs.

In return for maintaining the standards set in the School Lunch Agreement, the schools receive cash and food assistance. Lunch Programs are a service maintained for the benefit of the students. Other school personnel are eligible to participate in the lunch program, but no Federal funds or foods assistance is allocated for adult lunches.

It operates on a self-supporting basis which means food costs, labor costs and other expenses accrued in its operation are paid for by income derived from the program.

WHAT IS A "TYPE A" LUNCH? Student lunches, in order to be eligible for reimbursement must contain as a minimum:

a. ½ pint fluid whole milk.

b. 2 oz. edible protein (meat, fish, cheese, etc.).

c. ¾ cup serving of two or more fruit and/or vegetable.

d. One slice (or equivalent) of enriched bread or roll.

e. 2 teaspoons butter or fortified margarine.

This is approximately ½ of the students daily nutritional requirement.

WHAT ABOUT THE COST? Student lunches are priced as low as possible, yet still maintain a financially solvent program.

Prices for adult lunches and milk must be higher to cover the costs involved as there is no additional money received for service to adults.

Because adults pay more than students does not mean they should receive larger portions. Size of portions is determined by the costs involved. Larger portions for adults would increase the cost to the adult.

WHY VARIANCES FROM SCHOOL TO SCHOOL AND DISTRICT TO DISTRICT? Local school district policies vary.

People vary and people plan and execute the school lunch program.

The physical facilities, kitchen layout and equipment, location of the serving area and dining room may determine (or limit) the program in a school.
