Sheriff protection now full-time

Emergency calls for police assistance in Independence Township should now be directed to the Oakland County Sheriff's Department (OCSD) 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The number to call is 858-4911.

The two local police officers resigned from their positions Monday to join the OCSD and the contract increasing the township's OCSD coverage from four to six deputies was signed last week, said Supervisor Whitey Tower.

The township police department is winding down now and is to be officially disbanded Feb. 2.

"Back records will have to be gone over with the county to pick up back cases, warrants, etc. It could be upward of 800 cases," Tower said. "The girls are working on it to have it in some shape to send to the county.

"Everybody's been geared here," Tower said. "It's quite an involvement. You have so many mechanics in dumping a department."

Charles Kimbel, director of township police services, is to remain on the job until Feb. 2.

There are no lay-offs anticipated of the remaining police department staff with the exception of Kimbel, although Kimbel could continue to be a member of the township's police reserve unit that the township board voted to maintain, Tower said.

The animal control officer and one dispatcher are to be maintained under the township Department of Public Works and continue to provide service Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Residents with animal complaints can call the same number as in the past--625-8600.

The other full-time employee is to be transferred to another

department.

"At most it might cause some problems with part-time help," Tower said. "It will all work out

hopefully for everybody's best."

Citing economic reasons and displeasures with split police coverage formerly provided during the day by the local department and during the evening by the OCSD, the township board voted 4-3 last month to disband the local police department.

Tower, who voted against dissolving the local department, said he remains displeased with the change.

"I still feel that we had the

best services with combined and I think it's going to be obvious," he said. "Now I'm the only complaint person left."

"We have set up a complaint

procedure," he added. "They will have to go through the county. Some people not happy with the way it went are now registering complaints."

...But politics linger on

Political pressures continue to surround the dissolution of Independence Township's police department.

The latest turmoil involves changing the location of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department (OCSD) substation from Colombiere Center, Big Lake Road, Springfield Township, to the police services building adjacent to Independence Township Hall on Main Street, Clarkston.

For the time being, the police services building will continue to house the local animal control officer and dispatcher as well as the township reserve police unit, said Supervisor Whity Tower.

There are also problems because of limited parking facilities, he said.

"The statement came out yesterday that they (the OCSD) weren't willing to move at this time," Tower said. "It's their choice at this time not to (use the building)."

Without positive encouragement to move, the OCSD will stay put at the Colombiere location, said Capt. Billy Nolin of the OCSD.

"We don't want to jam ourselves in a building where they don't have the room," Nolin said. "If and when (the township) vacates the building, we would move in.

"Our sentiments are we're real comfortable where we are. We have access to all areas," he added. "Why cause problems by going someplace else?"

Nolin also said the OCSD was

told there was a problem with parking space, and the county would need room for about six cars.

Treasurer Frederick Ritter, who made the original motion to disband the local department, finds the situation upsetting.

"There isn't a parking problem," he said. "That's just an excuse that's been fabricated by people who don't want the county to move in, because they really don't like the idea of not having a local department."

Ritter said he would like to see the township reserve unit moved to the lower level of township hall that was vacated when the township senior citizen center was opened, and animal control should be moved to the public works department, of which it is to be a part.

"You have to look at your benefit ratio," Ritter said. "What's more important-dispatching an animal control officer and dispatching 16 reserve officers maybe two nights a week or making the building available for around-the-clock protection from the county?"

"I can't see housing the county out of Springfield when we can house them here and get 60 percent additional coverage at no extra cost," he said.

If the OCSD was housed next to township hall, in addition to the six officers paid for by the township, four more would be working out of the building and a command sargeant would spend some time at the office, Ritter said.



Funds earmarked for park, paths

The majority of the proposed \$120,200 Community Development budget for Independence Township has been earmarked for recreational projects.

The township board approved the budget in a 5-2 vote on Jan. 8. The figures will be submitted to the Oakland County Community Development office for approval and then to the federal government for the final okay.

(All but \$24,000 of the budget is to be spent in Census Tract 3, located in the southeast section of the township, the area determined by the 1970 United States Census to have the lowest average income.

Census Tract 3 which meaures about three square miles includes the Woodhull Lake Subdivision, the location board Ombers have said at previous meetings should benefit most from the Community Development funds.

"I don't think we're directing money in that low income area. said Trustee William Vandermark. "Some of the dollars will benefit Woodhull, but not as much money as I feel is desirable."

At least half of it is directed toward that census tract," disagreed Trustee Jerry Powell. "To say we're not helping the Woodhull Lake area is just not accurate."

Objections to using Woodhull Lake's name in connection with discussion of the Community Development grant were made Woodhull resident Donald Wald of Jerome Boulevard.

"Everyplace says Woodhull Lake--low income. There's no low income there," he said. "What it looks like in the newspapers is that's a slum area.

Suggestions for spending. money in Woodhull were made by Roger Mulherin of Glenalda eet, also a resident of the subdivision.

There are places on Clintonville Road and Woodhull Drive "where you could break an axle," he said, and he requested gravel or paving where the two roads meet Sashabaw Road.

Mulherin also requested money for additional street lights and for dust control.

The proposed Community Development budget approved by the township following:

property Park acquisition--\$30,000. The land

under consideration is 10 to 14 acres north of Maybee Road and east of Sashabaw Road. Projected cost of the property is \$110,000 or less and the board discussed spending Community Development money not yet spent from the past three years and also additional money from the 1981 allotment.

path •Safety construction-\$20,000. Combined with \$30,000 now in revenue sharing funds earmarked for safety paths, the total should allow construction of approximately one mile of sidewalks in Census Tract 3.

•Senior citizen center improvements--\$20,000. Items Development funds the county is

discussed for the expenditure included \$11,000 for asphalting the parking lot and \$26,000 for an elevator chair lift to make the top floor barrier-free. The paving must be completed this year, so the remainder of funds will probably be saved until the cost of the elevator chair can be covered.

·Fire station addition Road sta-(Maybee tion)--\$30,000. The amount is to cover part of the projected \$70,000 cost to make an addition to the station that serves the Census Tract 3 area. Plans are in the works to request the rest of the money from Community

with projects deemed worthwhile.

•Road improvements in Census Tract 3--\$16,200. According to discussion, the money is to be used in the Woodhull Lake area.

•Planning and management fees--\$2,000. The amount is to cover any engineering costs for

•Contingencies--\$2,000. The sum is set aside to cover any cost overruns on projects.

Disagreement over the need for more parks resulted in "no" votes cast by trustees Rudy Lozano and Michael Thayer.

"I don't think this township absolutely needs another park,'

splitting between communities Lozano said. "I feel there are other priorities right now other than to continue to expand our park property."

> A door-to-door survey was made in eight subdivisions nearby the proposed park off Maybee Road, said Timothy Doyle, parks and recreation director.

> "We go ahead and survey 700 and some homes--542 respond, 500 says yes and 42 says no. Doyle said. "Part of the Community Development's Act main contention was to have a project 10 years from now where you have something to show for that money."

Trucker Don Sinclair was driving past the northbound I-75 rest stop in Springfield

Township early Friday morning to transport gasoline pumped was sent to the scene to check when he spotted a familiar truck.

The semi-truck trailer capable of holding 9,000 gallons of gasoline had been reported stolen from Refiners Transport and Terminal Corp., Melvindale, early Thursday morning.

Sinclair, who drives a similar truck for the company, stopped to investigate.

Sinclair figured the truck travelled about 100 miles judging from the amount of gasoline gone from the truck's tanks.


Mileage fees were raised by 50 cents to \$1.50 per mile one-way to the hospital for residents and \$2 for non-residents.

Yearly membership dues are \$12. There is no loading fee for members and mileage one-way to the hospital is \$1 per mile.

HVA is staffed by volunteers, including an Emergency Medical Technician, who receive \$5 for each ambulance run in order to qualify for workmen's compensation, and she is the only HVA employee paid a salary, Merrill said.

Gasoline prices caused the largest increase in expenses, accounting for \$4,595 in 1979 Th an expected increase of 20 percent in 1980, she said.

Becoming a magician takes plain hard work, says 15-yearold Scott Bell.

The young magician devotes some 10 hours a week to practicing his craft.

And when he appears at birthday parties, picnics and cub scout meetings, his diligence have off

"It's always hard for me to do my first trick. After that, I'like it," he said. "I like seeing the people—the expressions on their faces. I like entertaining people."

Scott goes all out for his shows—dressed in a blue tux-edo, top hat and white golves, he performs a routine of at least 15 to 20 magic acts, working behind a dragon-covered stand.

The Clarkston High School tenth grader is the son of Archie and Jeannette Bell of Marconi Road, Independence Township.

His interest in magic began with his uncle, Bill Bell, who is a semi-professional m a g i c i a n, Scott said.

About three years ago, his mother bought Scott some magic tricks of his own.

"I liked them, so I've kept on doing it," he said.

A four-day magic convention in Colon has helped Scott's interest grow.

"You get to meet Blackstone Ir., the magician, and magicians from all over the world," he said, and there are showrooms and lots of magic tricks for sale.

The hobby is expensive and Scott's parents have helped him with costs. He plans on finding a job as soon as he's old enough to drive and he also supplements

He's very popular on the babysitting circuit, entertaining his young charges with magic tricks.

Scott has also started giving magic shows for youngsters for a fee. He charges \$20 an hour.

He reads a lot of books about magicians in addition to spending hours preticing new routines.

A big event in the Bell house is a family magic show by Scott and his uncle around Christmastime when about 16 people gather for a two-hour presentation.

Scott's parents are pleased with his achievements.

"We're really proud of him," said his mother.

"I think it's great," said his father. "It's good for him and he's so natural doing it."

Nutritious gathering attracts seniors

Food preparation can be a hassle for people whose children for grown or who live alone.

"There's a lot of company," said Bea Brewer of Flemings Lake Road, Independence Township. "We came over here vesterday just for lunch and we

started playing cards. You know what time we got out of here? Four or five o'clock!"

"Most of the people who come, it really isn't the food, it's the company," said Ken Clair of Brandon Township.

"Where it helps a lot of people, it might be the only full meal they get. They may not bother to fix a meal, just a sandwich or something," he added. "It's here available for them."

The only request made of the lunch-goers is that they call in for reservations, preferably a week in advance, although that is not a firm rule.

Frequently, people call the morning of the lunch and ask if they may join in, Kirk said.

"I usually order a few extra in case somebody comes along like that," she said.


Even senior citizens on special diets can participate in the program, she said.

"We'd like to really build it up," Kirk said. "If we have more people coming out, they'll see the facilities we have and join in on some of the other activities."





The fans were practically hanging in the rafters at the Clarkston High- School gymnasium Friday night, anticipating a real barn-burner as Clarkston's Wolfpack and the Rochester Falcons met in a showdown contest for first place n GOAL.

But while both teams brought 4-0 league records into the game, the Wolfpack exposed the Falcons as more pretenders to the throne, taking an easy 43-22 victory.

The score represented the lowest offensive output of the season for both teams as Rochester emphasized ballcontrol and delaying tactics from the opening tipoff.

Indeed, half the first quarter had ticked away before either team put points on the board.

"That's the third strategy that other teams have tried against us," Clarkston coach Gary Nustad said later. "They've tried to press us and wear us down, but our stamina has held up."

"They've tried to box Tim (Clarkston star center Tim Mc-Cormick) in by playing him man-to-man while playing a zone against everyone else, but that hasn't worked because the other kids scored."

Rochester's tactics, while novel, met with a similar lack of success.

'That's the first time anyone

Chris Ribant and Ron Jenkins led Rochester with four points. No member of the Falcons snared more than a single rebound in the team total of three.


Despite his team's tenth straight victory without a loss, Nustad remained cautious about the rest of the season.







During his three-year-long sojourn, John had jobs as a cook


He now has two jobs—selling real estate for Century 21 and cooking three evenings a week at the Old Mill restaurant, Waterford Township.

"It turned out they were all friendly and they knew my parents," he says.


John is aware of the changing social and political climate facing his generation, having done a study on changing l styles while in college.

Coping with kids

Diary tells why teen turned to drugs



Cindy M. allowed us to have this diary at the beginning of her treatment.

In her own words, and with little comment needed for us, it. dramatically indicates some of the turmoil adolescents feel and Why they may turn to drugs.

'My life is screwed up! I admit I'm not straight and don't do all that is expected of me.

'I want to be myself! I'm sick and tired of being ignored, hit, velled at and shoved around like a piece of crap! That's what I feel like: crap! That's when I turned to drugs.

"Once I was off drugs for three months and I wanted them back so bad! My life was rotten and my problems unbearable, but I forced myself to stay off the

dope.
"Well, I turned back to them after I ended up in the hospital because of my nerves. The doctors didn't say it was nerves, but they didn't say it wasn't either."

"Besides, I know my own life and all the bull...that has gone on and keeps going on. I know why I turned to drugs...to get my mind off of this f---ing life of mine!

"I want to leave this house and these people, 'Don't run from your problems," I keep telling myself. 'Don't run, it'll make things worse in the long run.' But, I want to so bad.

"I want to live with my dad. He cares about me. He loves me. "My mom doesn't care. At least she never shows it or tells me.

Sure, sometimes she buys things for me; lets me eat and sleep. But not live!

'She never says 'good work' or 'I love you' or anything in between all that. All she does is bitch about things I do wrong.

The more she bitches, then the more I do wrong and the deeper I get into drugs. The more dope I have and the more I do wrong, the more she bitches.'

"It's a bad cycle. I've tried to talk to her. It's impossible! She starts yelling.

"If I trust her with something personal...I mean she just doesn't understand me and because of that she yells, which only makes things worse. Then she yells because I don't trust her with my problems.'

"I've just read over what I wrote. It's sad. Damn, damn sad. If only somebody knew the help I need...somebody professional. Somebody who could get me away from this.'

"But, I'm scared. I don't know where to go for help or where they're at or, well, I'm just plain scared!"

"I love to be high."

"In a way, I guess it's like running from my problems. But, I guess somehow it's different."

"It gives me the comfort I need without me leaving home.'

'I would explain it better if I understood it. All I know is that I need somebody to listen to me




