

Women join in suit against school

They charge misrepresentation; PBI attorney dubs suit 'cheap crap'

Seven women, two of whom are Clarkston-area residents, have filed a joint lawsuit in Oakland County Circuit Court against Pontiac Business Institute's Oxford School of Business, charging the school misrepresented itself to students.

The school's attorney, Dennis' L. Carmichael. alled the suit "cheap crap" and "nonsense at the highest level," and refused to respond to the allegations, as did the school's President Howard Weaver.

Kathleen Warren and Dawn Drake, both of Independence Township, join women from Oxford, Lake Orion, North Branch and Lapeer alleging they were told credits from the school would transfer to other colleges, but, according to Warren, they would transfer only to Oakland Community College.

The suit also alleges the women did not receive the quality of education they expected. Instead, according to Warren; classes were combined with little or no lecturing.

The former students charge they expected an associate's degree upon graduation, but learned they would receive an associate in commerce certificate. which is five hours less, said the women's attorney. T. Gordon Scupholm II of Bloomfield Hills.

Warren said incentive to enroll in the school in June of 1980 was sparked by the understanding she

would receive an associate's degree in six terms or 54 weeks, instead of two years as in a community college.

"One of the school's directors said I must have misunderstood at the time when I questioned it later." she said. "I didn't and neither did the other girls who thought they were getting an associate's. When I found out I wouldn't get the degree, in my fourth

"I feel I've wasted my time and money," she said. "As a secretarial school, I think it's pretty decent, but for that you only need certain skills. The rest of it (the school's academic classes) I think are pretty much a waste of time."

According to Warren, her summer accounting class was in a room shared with mathematics and data processing classes, and involved no instructor's lectures, because verbal discussions would distract other students.

Instead, she said, students worked out of books and completed assignments given by instructors.

Scupholm said the women are asking the court -for a return on their investment, which for Warren ex-

Pontiac Business Institute's attorney negated the

"It's nonsense at the highest level," Carmichael said. "This school has been historically a fine school for the past 80 years and never has a suit been filed—this is the first.

"I'll rigorously defend it. It's silliness and nonsense on the part of those people. We don't make the kinds of statements they're alleging," he said.

Amusement park plans still on for Pine Knob

Co-owner Joseph Locricchio says he's waiting for 'opportune moment'

Plans for "The Wonderful World of Pine Knob" are still on the drawing board and any announcement to the contrary is "premature," says Joseph Locric-chio, co-owner of Pine Knob Investment Co.

In May, when officials of Pine Knob Music Theatre held the annual meeting with Independence Township residents, theater General Manger Joel DeShane indicated plans for the amusement park had been shelved.

"Mr. Joel DeShane has no knowledge beyond the

music theater of what goes on in my business," Locricchio said. "Plans for The Wonderful World of Pine Knob are at best delayed—not shelved—not forgotten. I have my zoning and the right to do what I

The proposed 12-ride amusement park on 2.5 acres will be developed "at the opportune moment," Locricchio said.

Last summer Locricchio operated one ride, the Himalayan, outside the theater before and after con-

certs. Independence Township spent two months encouraging him to submit revised final site plans of the proposed amusement park, ticketing Locricchio for each day the ride illegally ran.

In August, Locricchio finally submitted the required information and the Himalayan operated for the remainder of the music season and was then disassembled for the winter.

The ride is absent this year, "because I didn't want it," Locricchio said.

450 apply for 65 jobs

June 30, the advertised first day of interviewing and application taking, had in excess of 200 applicants, said Judi Roberts, director of personnel and communications.

Into the second day, applications had totaled 450 to fill approximately 65 positions, she said.

"When I arrived the first day at a quarter after nine, there were 75 people already lined up at the door. Some waited four hours for an interview and the ad said to appear between 11 a.m. and 5 p.m.," she

Most of those standing in line were Clarkstonarea residents, according to Roberts.

"One of the questions we ask involves transportation," she said. "A majority of those questioned said, 'Oh, if something happens to my car, I'll walk to work. I only live five minutes away."

The restaurant plans a late July, opening which is contingent upon transfer of the liquor license, said John Wood, vice-president and general manager of Harris Machus Enterprises.


When the sign was stolen June 10, Pill's flood light and siding were also damaged. At the time she termed the theft a "graduation prank."

Dale S. Wilder, Whoopee Bowl owner, dies

Dale S. Wilder, owner of the Whoopee Bowl in Springfield Township, succumbed to cancer July 3. Wilder, 72, had lived in Springfield Township

about 34 years.

In 1947, when he and his wife, Marguerite, and daughter, Donna, arrived in the township, they made plans for a recreation area at the site where the Whoopee Bowl now sits.

They named it the Whoopee Bowl-a place to have fun—and began working on their dream. But the ice-cold springfed lake worked against the resort plan, and gradually what began as a resort, and then became a bait business turned into what the Whoopee Bowl is today, Donna said.

"He always said the Whoopee Bowl was a "Whatever he could do place people could go for people, he'd do.' where they could get

something they couldn't get someplace else." Donna

While the business does a large volume of trade it items like mufflers and polyurethane foam, the goods run the gamut from marbles and bumper stickers to nuts and bolts.

But the underlying theme of the Whoopee Bowl perhaps best describes her father, Donna said.

'He wanted something for people who couldn't afford to go out and buy new," she said. "It goes along with the way he was always helping people—he was a rock on the outside, a marshmallow in the middle."

Along the way, the Wilders cared for seven foster children from Mexico whose family they met during their yearly trips there before a fire destroyed the original Whoopee Bowl in 1965. Actingments to man

The children were helped to learn English and to prepare for better jobs before they returned to Mexico, Donna said.

"He was just a very caring person," Donna said. "Whatever he could do for people, he'd do."

After the fire in 1965, some of that help came back to Wilder as he rebuilt the business without benefit of insurance for the buildings or the contents.

"He started out from scratch," Donna said: "The people who had been supplying him in the past, they all helped him out as he had helped them?

Three years ago, the home her father had designed was built alongside the business on Dixie Highway. The grass-covered roof attracted interest, not only because it looked different; but because it was energy efficient.

The savings in energy had not prompted its construction. however, Donna said, but rather it was her father's love of animals.

"That was a dream of his that he had for 30 years," she said. "He always enjoyed animals He always dreamed of having a grass roof where the deer

Despite her father's death, the Whoopee Bowlshall stay open, with Don Hopson continuing as its

(Hopson) moved in with us when he was 13 he's been with us over 30 years now," Donna said. "He's the manager, and especially over the past year, he's taken full charge."

Mrs. Wilder and Donna and her husband Orval will also continue to assist with the business, she said.

The memorial service for Dale Wilder was held July 7 at the Lewis E. Wint Funeral Home and enfombment followed in Ottawa Park Cemetery, Independence Township.

Wilder was a member of the Davisburg Rotary. Club and a veteran of World War II.

He is survived by his wife, Marguerite; daughter, Mrs. Orval (Donna) Marlowe of Clarkston; seven Do you want it told and sold? News want ads tell and sell foster children in Mexico; brother, Clifford Wilder of





Davisburg facelift feasible --- Walls

To renovate or not to renovate—in downtown Davisburg, that is the question.

The answers were generally positive at a special meeting held last week at Springfield Township Hall, where residents and businesspersons gathered to listen to a county plan to renovate and restore downtown Davisburg. 🧬

"It's now in the hands of the business community," said Collin Walls, Springfield Township supervisor. "There was an awful lot of information given to them in a short period of time—the thing now is to give everyone time to absorb all that information and decide if the advice is worth pursuing.

Walls prompted the county study of Davisburg last year when he contacted Phil Dondero of the Oakland County Planning Commission to request ideas, for improving Davisburg's appearance and economic climate.

... The county responded with the study presented to township officials and residents at two special meetings June 20 and 27 at Springfield Township

Included in the county's plans are the installation of underground utilities, more greenery and landscaping and gas light style street lighting. Building facade renovation and improvment, along with a change to parallel from perpendicular parking on Broadway (Davisburg's "main street") were other key elements in the county's plan.

Each individual business owner would be responsible for the cost of the improvments to his or her building, said Walls, although the township is currently investigating the possibility of low interest loans or historical preservation funds available through the federal government to assist in the plan.

The program remains entirely voluntary, depending on the decision of the building owners, Walls

Neighbors living around the home housing six developmentally disabled adults voiced concern over the behavior of one man, charging he screamed and yelled, broke windows, kicked walls and ran around outside yelling and screaming.

According to Cornelison, the house will have a new resident to replace the man who's left, but he could not say when.






Between 10-minute quarters, Coach Larry Mahrle goes over a little strategy with his players. Although Southfield held the upper hand in last





An administration change in the midst of the 1980-81' fiscal year hasn't affected finances in Independence Township government as the firm of Doeren Mayhew & Co. of Troy reports a clean audit.

According to Clerk Christopher Rose, the township's assets total \$17.7 million, of which \$10 million is designated for sewer lines and equipment.

"They (the auditors) said we're no longer a 'small township', we're 'big business'," Rose said. "They also said it was a well-run, clean audit and that there were no problems; that we're in fine-shape."

Coping with kids

Father's involvement is important to children

"My father worked afternoons in the shop," remembers a young woman of her teenage years. "As a result; we only saw him on the weekends and my mom ran everything.

This is not an unusual situation in a city where many people have jobs in automobile plants and often. are placed on shifts that effectively keep them cut off from their children and their children's day-to-day

Sometimes it is almost as if the father forgets he has children.

The young woman who's father worked afternoons recalls, "Once I had to go to the hospital and my father took me. He had forgotten my birthdate :

and he wasn't much help in completing the records. He couldn't remember what grade I was in at school.'

Fathering to be decisive in a young person's life must involve a certain amount of time. It is all well and good to say that a dad offers quality involvement not necessarily quantity; but the amount of time must be sufficient so the young person feels the impact in his life.

If a father is going to be any help at all in assisting his child to grow up to be able to confront a bewildering variety of new experiences; he must be

The father's biggest role may be as a represen-

tative of the authority and rules of society. Absent authority is no authority.

A father who is forced to work a shift that does not allow for daily contacts with his children must somehow plan to intevene in their lives in some other manner. Telephone calls and notes might be one alternative to actual face-to-face contact:

It is usually through activities that fathers deepen the relationship with their children and not only bring about a positive impact on their lives but make lathering more joyful.

Even if a dad is a weekend father only, activities can be crammed into a weekend which can vitalize the relationship between father and child.

Patience is the key to housebreaking puppies

In response to several requests, I have prepared a project in dog training for families over the summer. Feel free to contact me with problems and successes. There will be three articles in the series.

If you are on the market for a puppy, or begining a training program, it is helpful to realize the important development stages for a puppy and to know or find out his environment at key periods so you can better understand his responses.

The critical periods are:

- 1. Birth to 20 days
- From: 20 days to 49 days. From 49-80 days 🚉
- From 49-80 days
 From 12-16 weeks

During the first period, the pup is totally dependent on his mother and human stewards for survival. Warmth, food, and sleep are the essence of this period.

The second period is critical, because the senses are developing. Interaction with littermates is crucial. It is paramount that puppies be gently socialized and played with by humans and become a part of human socialization.

We find our maltese pups, who are so little, first learn to identify us by our feet, because we tower so over them! They are overjoyed at the foot of a known human, a little hesitant with strangers feet until they hear reassuring words.

The third period is the real formation of the man-dog relationship. The pups must receive as much individual attention as possible. A dog confined to a kennel and not observed or loved during this period can have permanent personality damage. A dog between eight and 10 weeks should not receive harsh. discipline, but only affirmation-praise for right. It also should not receive innoculations during this two-week

The fourth period from 12 to 16 weeks is when

formal training should begin - serious firm expectation without cruelty or rage. Patience is the key. The reward for you is a well-mannered dog and for the dog love and caring is the goal!

The first phase of training is house breaking. Dogs are creatures—of their environment. Whatever world you show them, that is what they will believe in.

The best thing you can do for your puppy is clean up quickly—they are animals of habit, Cleanliness is the way to get to your dog without yelling, hitting, or threatening to take him to the pound.

If caught in the act, say no and carry him outside. Stay with him. If he relieves himself, praise him.

Dogs are den animals and like a clean den just

When you are away, confine dog to small bathroom or kitchen or dog crate.

Next, set up a schedule for you and your dog. Remember to let him out when he wakes up from his

If you are at home: 7 a.m., walk. 7:30 a.m., feed. 7:45 a.m., walk. Fifteen minutes play in kitchen. Confine in crate or in bathroom. Noon, walk, 15 minutes of play, confine. 4 p.m., feed, walk, 15 minutes of play, confine. 7 p.m., walk, 15 minutes of

play, confine: 11 p.m., walk, confine.

If you work: 7 a.m., feed, walk, play in kitchen while you eat. 8 a.m. (just before you leave), walk. confine. 6 p.m., walk. 6:20 p.m., feed, walk. 6:40 p.m., play in kitchen 30 minutes: 7 p.m., walk, confine: 11 p.m., walk, confine overnight.

When the dog relieves himself on walks and keeps play area and confined area clean, you can increase play time. Do not rush. If he backslides, return to schedule for one week.

Remember, you want the puppy to loathe being dirty, so clean any accident thoroughly. If he soils your kitchen during play time, he has been out too long, or he did not do what he was supposed to do outside. Put puppy in crate until next scheduled walk.

Remember, praise him when he goes outside. Do not expect perfection. Dogs do learn from their mistakes, and your regularity and patience.

Baked Chicken Breasts Supreme

6 whole breasts, halved and boned

- 2 c sour cream
- 1/4 c lemon juice 2 t celery salt
- 2 t salt
- ½ t pepper
- 1¾ c dry bread crumbs (for crisper chicken, use corn flakes)
- ½ c butter
- ½ c shortening
- 2 t garlic salt

Rinse chicken breasts and wipe well with paper towels. In large bowl, combine sour cream with lemon juice, celery, salt and pepper. Add chicken to sour cream mixture and marinate in refrigerator overnite.

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees. Remove chicken from sour cream mixture and roll in crumbs, coating well. Arrange in large shallow baking pan. Melt butter and shortening. Add garlic salt. Spoon half over chicken. Bake uncovered for 45 minutes. Spoon remaining butter over chicken, and bake 10 to 15 minutes longer or until chicken is tender and nicely browned.



Urban Cowboy

Riding the bull's easy, says Mike Smorto



A native of New Jersey, Mike and his family moved to the Clarkston area about a year ago. It was after getting a job at AW's Rodeo in Waterford that Mike had his first ride on the mechanical bull.

It was about a year ago that 19-year-old Mike Smorto sauntered up to the mechanical bull at AW's Rodeo in Waterford for his maiden ride.

"I saw 'Urban Cowboy,' " says Mike, referring to the John Travolta film that introduced audiences to the hair-raising sport of mechanical bull riding. "I thought I'd give it a try."

One year after his first brush with the bucking bronco of the barroom finds Mike headed for Columbus, Ohio, to compete in "Screamin' Willies' First Annual Grand National" regional championship bull riding contest.

Last month at the equivalent of the state championship held at AW's, Mike emerged victorious to qualify for the Columbus event. And success at the regionals will send him on his way to the national finals.

"Endurance and balance," says Mike when asked what it takes to be a good rider. "You've got to be able to move with the bull to say on."

The sport is not without its risks. In Tennessee, a rider was hurled from the bull, landed on his head and ended up permanently paralyzed from the neck down.

With a grin, Mike relates how his mom said the rosary while she watched him in the state competition at AW's last month.

But he dismisses the dangers with a shrug. "What happened in Tennessee was the

operator's fault," says Mike.

Operators can set the bull at any of 13 "levels" depending on the experience of the rider, he explains. The Tenessee rider never should have been allowed to ride at the maximum level, he says.

"Some bars just like to throw people," says Mike. "But I've never seen anyone get hurt here (at AW's). Really, it's not that dangerous."

Even so, riders must sign a release form before riding, and the thick foam cushion surrounding the bull indicates that not every rider finishes in the saddle.

"It's habit-forming," Mike grins. "I started doing it just for fun, and it's good exercise, too.

"You've got to really psyche yourself up before you start and concentrate on what you're doing to win."

Most competitions are decided on point totals, Mike says. Two judges award a maximum of 25 points each based on form and style—riders are not allowed to touch any part of their body or the bull with their free arm, for example.

"It started as just a fad, but now it's really becoming a sport," he says.

Encouraged by his success at the mechanical bull, Mike is considering trying his hand at the real thing in the near future—live rodeo.

"Of course, my mom isn't too happy about that," he grins.

"I remember talking to Louie when he was in high school—he said he didn't know if he could stand all the long years of intense study it takes."

But being a doctor presented the opportunity to work with people and help people. And there was also the fact that Lou Jr. owed his life to a doctor who successfully operated on him as an infant.

He made his decision, and today both he and his brother are fulfilling their goals.

And like most physicians, Lou Jr. and Joe are finding themselves solicited at parties and social gatherings for a little free medical advice.

"They hear health complaints just like I hear telephone complaints," chuckles Lou Sr., a staff manager at Michigan Bell's downtown Detroit office.

The Lessards' two daughters, Cathy and Judy, majored in political science and resource development, respectively. Cathy, the eldest, gets the credit for starting the family tradition of attending MSU.

"She really liked the way the campus looked," says Marian. "I think the fact that the capitol is right there in Lansing influenced her, too. She's always been very politically minded—

when the children were growing up, we took several trips to Washington and I think it kindled an interest in how the government is run."

Cathy's interest in politics has extended all the way to a few tries at public office. Twice she ran as a candidate for state representative in Republican primaries, once in the Lake Orion and Oxford area and once in the Lansing area.

She also served as a Congressional intern in 1968 for congressman Jack McDonald, answering phones, opening letters and meeting a lot of people in government.

"Some people say there's no point writing to your congressman, because they don't look at their letters or surveys anyway," Marian says, picking up a picture of her daughter behind a pile of mail atop her desk in Washington.

"Well, Cathy told us that she knows different," she laughs.

Judy is the nature lover in the family, enjoying the country atmosphere and scenic mountains of the American west. She's also fond of horses and riding.

"Judy had been out in Wyoming and Montana on a government resource study," says Lou Sr. "But now both she and Cathy are working together for a real estate firm in Okemos, Mich."

All four of the Lessard children graduated from Clarkston High School, and the family are long-time residents of Independence Township.


They bought the property near Clarkston High School 33 years ago, Lou Sr. built the family home there himself, and the Lessards moved in in 1953.

"We had three children at the time," Marian says, "and we decided we didn't want them to go to the Pontiac schools. We were looking for a community where they could walk to school every day."


Today, the children are gone. But as they all live nearby, the visits are frequent, the memories are happy and the family is as close as ever.

but as Marian notes, "We're really such a close-knit family and we have so many things from our children around us, we feel like they're still here."




