Historic ordinance hearing date set

By Marilyn Trumper

Clarkston's Village Council has scheduled Oct. 28 as the public hearing date for opinions on the proposed historic district ordinance.

Residents living in the village's historic district can expect to see notice of the hearing in their mailboxes this week, said Trustee Gary Symons at the Aug. 24 village council meeting, stressing the hearing is limited to property owners in the designated

This, he said, is the residents's opportunity to speak out on formal adoption of the proposed ordinance, which will make it law.

If finally adopted by council the ordinance would require residents living in the historic district to first seek approval from a yet-to-be appointed five-member commission before remodeling, conducting major repair or demolishing any of their homes or outbuildings,

It will not, Symons has said, prohibit or require approval for painting, ordinary maintenance or repair, for parts of the ordinance have been redefined to clarify that question.

Council wound up ordinance drafting procedures in June and created the Historic District Committee, whose sole purpose is to make the final ordinance proposal to the state on the village's behalf and hold the public hearing.

The five-member committee is composed of Symons, village residents and historical society members Jennifer Radeliff and Susan Basinger and planning commission members, Chairman Ted Thomson and Jim McArthur.

The hearing is set for Oct. 28 at 7:30 p.m. Clarkston Village Hall, 375 Depot, Clarkston.

Approximately 100 homes in the village are located within the historic district, established last June when the area was admitted to the National Register of Historic Places.

100-mph chase ends in two-car crash on 1-75

An automobile chase encompassing two townships and exceeding speeds of 100 mph resulted in a high impact collision on southbound 1-75 under the Sashabaw Road overpass in Independence Township Friday, shortly before 2 p.m.

According to reports at the Oakland County Sheriff's Department (OCSD), a 34-year-old Flint man driving a Cadillac, sped past an OCSD on

routine patrol in Springfield Township near the Dixie Hiwhway interchange. The officer, Deputy Gary Spalo, gave pursuit and witnessed the Cadillac collide with a car driven by Gerald Patrick Ormistron, 58, of Farmington.

Deputy Spalo and Detective Kerry Krupsky, an OCSD deputy who was in the area and heard the report of the chase over the police radio, aided by a

passing citizen, Jerry Snead of Byron, were able to break out the front window of the Farmington man's burning car and pull him to safety.



Township to request second Deer Lake hearing

A handful of township residents were left speechless on the proposed Deer Lake Beach boat ramp controversy when the Independence Township Board made a surprise move at its Aug. 18 meeting.

Supervisor James B. Smith opened the floor to comment from those residents who felt they had not yet been heard on the issue, prefacing his remark by proposing a resolution from the board recommending the state's Department of Natural Resources (DNR) conduct a second hearing in October to discuss the safety and number of boats on Deer Lake.

Residents geared for debate fell silent as the board unanimously adopted the resolution.

According to Clerk Christopher Rose, the earliest the DNR can call the proposed second hearing is late September or early October.

Smith warned against confusing the proposed second hearing with the hearing scheduled for Sept. 3 at 7 p.m., Independence Township Hall, 90 N. Main,

Clarkston, where residents are slated to air views on the proposed boat ramp installation on Deer Lake Bech, not high speed boat traffic on the lake.

The proposed boat ramp at Deer Lake Beach stirred waterfront owners into action intent on blocking construction and arguing the ramp will enhance access to the lake, thereby increasing traffic.

Beverly Clemo of Church Street, asked board members to investigate marine patrol of the lake by the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

'That should give you a good indication of what their future plans will be on patroling," Clemo told the board.

Smith indicated plans were underway to post Exe plorer Scouts on Deer Lake to monitor activities.

According to Smith, the OSCD agreed to sponsor an Explorer Post for Clarkston, an arm of Boy Scouts of America, where young men and women interested in police and law enforcement work can explore such a career.

Council's on record, thumbs up for boat ramp

Clarkston's Village Council is going on the record with its about-face, and voted unanimously at its Aug. 24 meeting to notify the township and state Department of Natural Resources (DNR) that it approves the installation of the proposed Deer Lake Beach boat meeting (the DNR's public hearing scheduled for Sept. 3) and say so, Byers said.

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
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Knob moves to block Borg-Warner development

Borg-Warner Equities and Pine Knob Investment Co. are at loggerheads on future development of the Pine Knob Complex.

At an Aug: 18 Independence Township Board meeting. Gary Francell, co-owner of Pine Knob Investment, announced he would block development of Borg-Warner's proposed Pine Knob Manor East sub-

Borg-Warner: is seeking tentative preliminary plat approval of the development planed to be 65 single family homes on 15,000 square foot lots, 45 acres on a looped street off Waldon Road, parallel to Royal St. George, the access road to the Hamburger Mansion, condominiums, golf course and pro-shop.

This will not be a buffer between the commercial use," Francell told Board members, calling for multiple development instead.

I feel that this will destroy the concept of rural zoning and the total idea of what we've tried to do.

Bringing in more roads, cutting down more trees and topping hills will destroy it all—we'll have a bald mountain. Representatives of Borg-Warner were absent

from the meeting.

Independence Township on advice from its engineers, made no decision, tabling the matter until both parties submit master plans.

Township engineer Frank Biehl, of Hubble, Roth and, Clark, termed development at Pine Knob "piecemeal," and said it appears neither Pine Knob. or Borg-Warner know what the other is planning.

Biehl called for master plans outlining the complex's utilities like water, sewer and storm drains, and termed the absence of such plans "a major problem."

Supervisor James B. Smith pointed out a good

faith effort on the part of both parties meant an expeditious solution, and he queried Francell on when the township could expect to see a master plan of Pine Knob Investment.

'We'll put ours on the table at the same time, (as Borg-Warner)," he answered.

The Independence Township Planning Commission approved the plat when it was submitted in February.


The property is zoned multiple but Independence allows the construction of single family homes in a multiple zoned acreage as long as lot sizes meet the 15,000 square feet lot requirement.


It's no wonder the spray can went over so big so fast.

Only his advice is free



Lafely whenever a bunch of us is sitting around talking and the conversation turns to economics or to parking on HUD property, I always say the same thing: "There is no such thing as a free lunch."

I say this so people will know I'm no dummy.

Any dummy can explain the complexities of an economic policy that cuts rich people's taxes to make poor people happy. Any dummy can lecture on the economic implications of the fact that, despite the high cost of money, every store on the block is anxious to borrow millions of dollars in order to buy the Conoco station on the corner.

But that's humdrum stuff, and I leave it to the dummies. During economic discussions, I prefer to mostly listen and look wise, and when everyone else is done talking, I smile world-wearily and say: "Everything you've said may be true, but don't ever

forget that there is no such thing as a free lunch."
This is basic economics. Nothing is tree. Someone must always pay the lunch tab. But you knew that "No free lunche has become a cliche. Everyone uses it to explain the high price of highing. It's simply a shorthand way of saying wealth can't be redistributed without nicking the source of the wealth a diff

The trouble is that most people won brefuse to eat a free Junehneven though they know there's really you can.

no such thing. They figure if they don't eat it, somebody else will, so they'd better get theirs while they can. That's how dams are built, congressional votes bought and welfare families extended. Not many people will skip lunch just to save someone else from paying for it.

However, I'm not discouraged. When talking economics, I continue to say there is no such thing as a free lunch. Admittedly, my audience usually reacts skeptically, but sometimes they quit eating lunch to listen. Every little bit helps, speaking of cliches.

So my wife certainly wasn't surprised when, while we were discussing the economics of parking our car, I told her there was no such thing as a free lunch. She said I should tell that to HUD. It won't do any good.

MUD, sometimes known as the federal Departament of Housing and Urban Development, owns 1300 Lafayette East, the Detroit apartment building where we live. HUD took possession when the original owners pooped out on a government-guaranteed loan, forcing taxpayers to buy some more free lunches. Cur-rently, HUD is repaying the two parking levels in the high-rise basement, and hundreds of tenants must scramble for parking places on the street for eight weeks. Car thieves have welcomed the extra business:

Tenants in one-bedroom apartments are billed a monthly fee for basement parking, and naturally they don't have to pay while their cars are evicted. But, for tenants of the larger apartments, the parking fee is included in the higher rent, and HUD has decreed there will be no drop in rent while there are no parking spaces provided.

"The manager said our parking space is free," my wife explained.

That's outrageous, of course. There is no such thing as a free lunch. My rent covers the cost of the parking space. It is rediculous that people should pay

as much for no parking as they do for parking.

"The manager said if we didn't have a car, we would still have to pay the same rent," my wife said.

Oh, sure. No one owns a car these days. Everyone

rides, a horse. And even if I didn't have a car, would the parking space that goes with my apartment remain vacant, or would management rent it to someone else and give me the money? The answer is obvious There are no vacant spaces ? The to over

Parking spaces are the same as lunches. There is no such thing as a free one. Someone, somewhere, somehow, pays for it. At my apartment building, I am paying for a parking space, but I am not parking in it. Take a dummy to lunch. I'm available.

County oks sewer ownership

It's official-Oakland County now owns the sewer treatment plant it's been operating for years serving the Bavarian Village apartment and condominium complex off Dixie Highway near 1-75 in Springfield Township,

For the county, the complex developers, the property owners and Springfield Township, last week's vote by the county board of commissioners approving county ownership of the plant drew to a close a longraging dispute.

"I'm happy the ownership question is resolved," said Collin Walls, Springfield Township supervisor. "I just wish the county could have been more willing many months ago-it would have saved Springfield Township a lot of trouble.

"But certainly, this is better than having to go to

The ownership dispute arose when changes in state law and Oakland County's form of government led the county to opine that it could not legally own the complex. The complex developer, on the other hand, insisted that the county already held a deed to the plant.

A solution to the problem was to have Springfield Township assume ownership of the plant while the county continued to oversee its operation, but township residents gathered at a special electors meeting in June rejected the plan.

"This was an existing system that the county had operated for many years," said Milton Handorf, Oakland County director of public works.

This wasn't something we wanted to do, but since Springfield, Township had rejected ownership, we felt that somebody had to step in."

The prospect of raising \$650,000 to hang a 7-ton flag on the Verrazano Bridge in New York City doesn't phase Ernest May.

He became involved in the flag-raising efforts when President Ronald Reagan said it was time to "turn the page" and leave the memories of Vietnam in

"It's not too late," said May. "When President Reagan said, 'It's time to turn the page,' I was recovering from a heart attack and I thought, 'We can't turn the page until we turn it back first'.

May is at work planning a Vietnam Honors March in Lake Orion for Oct. 10. His plan is for Vietnam veterans to line the street and for supporters of their efforts to march past them carrying flags. After

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

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

But on the coaching staff? Just one new face in the group, and that's the way varsity coach Walt Wyniemko likes it.



Mortimore was still with the varsity following last week's football camp at Saginaw Valley State College, but is still "battling for a spot," according to Wyniemko.


"We feel we accomplished a lot of things as a team," Wyniemko said of the week at camp. "We put out whole offense together and we got to know each other better."







Admission is \$2.50 Saturday, \$4 Sunday or \$5.50 for both days. Free parking and picnicking grounds for spectators are available.

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



Mason defends raises to local business leaders

Clarkston Community Schools Superintendent Milford Mason took his case to local business leaders last week, defending the salary increases recently granted to Clarkston school administrators and nonaffiliated supervisory personnel.

Mason spoke at a membership meeting of the Business Association of Independence Township (B.A.I.T.) held at Spring Lake Country Club Aug. 19 and answered questions from the audience.

Following the question and answer session, B.A.I.T. member Harvey Craft, who had spoken against the salary increases, made a motion that the business association go before the school board requesting that the raises be revoked.

But the motion died when no one rose to second

"Harvey made his views known to me prior to the meeting, V said Tom Ritter, B.A.I.T. president. "He's entitled to his opinion, and I felt that meeting was the proper time and place to air it.

It's just that a lot of people in the business community don't have a problem with the seven percent raises. I'm a little surprised that nobody seconded the motion, but based on the feelings of the group I think it would have gone down."

Mason began his presentation by noting that some had charged that the pay increases, coming so soon on the heels of the millage campaign, was a case of "bad timing."

"I submit that under the circumstances today, at no point would the timing have been good," Mason said. "Why should we delay into September or October, when that will just look like we were putting it off?"

The need to submit a complete budget also required the board to act as soon as possible, he added.

"People have also said to me, 'You agreed to wage freezes.' A freeze was never mentioned. It would be foolhardy of me to say we're going to freeze wages,

and then turn around and not do it. I'd be signing my own death warrant.

What the administration did agree to, Mason said, was to take a smaller increase than the nine to 10 percent granted to the teachers. The seven percent increase granted follows that pledge, he said.

Even with the seven percent raise, Mason noted that his annual salary of \$49,787 ranks him 18th out of 28 districts in Oakland County.

"We are cutting costs," he said. "Our salaries for all administrators is going to be less this year than last year," he added, citing the elimination of the vocational education director position and the reduction of the athletic director's post to part-time.

"We've implemented a program that's saved money by cutting down our consumption of natural gas in the schools. But these are things the papers don't write about; or at least they don't elect to write about them."

Craft, however, asked if the raises didn't set a bad example for the rest of the school system employees.

"You've got to start at the top," he said, "If you don't start with the administration and freeze wages there, everybody else is going to want more."

When asked after the meeting if the salary increases to the administration could affect teacher contract negotiations next year. Mason declined comment.

But B.A.I.T. member Bob Olsen, responding to Craft, defended the wage increases.

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

New science experiments perk kids curiosity

"As the Sand Sinks Slowly on the Horizon." "Gone With the Wind." "Land Layer Delight," "Day and Night.'

They could be song titles or names of books. But instead, they are the catchy titles of scientific experiments geared to help kindergarten through ninth graders with learning disabilities learn scientific prin-

The project, called C.A.S.E. (or Classroom Activities in Science Education), is one of the most exciting to come from work at Oakland Schools, says Donald Place, a special education consultant with Oakland Schools who provides services to the public school system in Oakland County.

The idea, he says, was "to create, using low cost materials, some hands-on experiences for kids to make this stuff come alive."

In the summer of 1980, the C.A.S.E. packet was put together by a group of science and special education teachers and, last year, it was used on a limited basis across the country.

The response has been excellent, he says, and teachers in general education are also requesting to use the materials.

"They're saying, 'I teach sixth and seventh grade, but may I have one of those earth science packets? Wow, that's good stuff'."

This summer, while their pupils were on vacation, a group of teachers met at the Oakland Schools building in Pontiac and continued to perfect the materials.

One teacher, who helped put the projects together last summer as well, is Clarkston Junior High School instructor Chuck Keegan.

In addition to regular classrooms, Keegan teaches à science class to learning disabled students at CJHS. He was able to use many of the materials developed for C.A.S.E. last year.

He calls the projects "super." They supplement the regular curriculum and make teaching easier because all that is required is pulling a file and proceeding with the activity, he says.

Several criteria were used for forming the projects, says Keegan. "They had to be low cost, available, durable, simple to use and the projects have to be workable."

This summer, Keegan and three other teachers continued work with the experiments, perfecting them for use in the classroom.

"You normally don't have time to do this," he says. "It helps you for your year, taking this stuff back into the classroom with you."

One experiment was called "Blowing Your Top." A small, clay "mountain" with a peroxide and yeast mixture inside bubbled up and showed how land builds up around an errupting volcano.

The Difference?

The C.A.S.E. materials come in desk-size file

boxes with each topic in a labeled file folder. The science experiments will go out this year for testing in classrooms all over the county with materials needed for the experiments.

Work on other packets is underway, says Place.

In years to come, teachers working with disabled pupils will have assistance with language-arts, mathematics, vocational education and home economics as well as earth science, physical science, and life science.

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Connie Head's setting her sights on the Ice Capades

Skaters walking through the doors at Lakeland Arena in Pontiac slip into an allempowering cold, so thick it's wall-like.

The dampness numbs the legs. The chill is deep and a mist rises from the skaters' mouths as they move in spins and strides amidst a chorus of grunts and groans, spraying up ice when they slide to an immediate halt.

Skating at high speeds in and out of the half-dozen young women on the ice is 14-year-old Connie Head.

She's been on the rink for one and a half hours and has at least two and a half more to go. The rigorous routine which begins some days at 8 a.m. is a ritual.

Wear and tear has rolled up knap balls on her fuzzy burgundy leg warmers. Her skimpy yellow skirt keeps out very little cold—for that she relies on a white wool pullover sweater.

When Connie moves her white skates become a blur.

When at rest, her face and arms are flushed red, not from the cold, but from the work out, she says.

something else," Connie said. "I like to do double flips, because they're forward and I like to go forward—because I can see where I'm going."

She demonstrates a complicated series of turns and spins, than nonchantly throws a hand forward and says, "Like that."

"Right now I'm working on a double salchow. That's the one I don't like because it scares me. The way you have to turn and bring your leg and foot up into the air... well, it's hard because it really sets you off balance. I've been working to perfect it for two months," she said.

It's dedication that seems to make all the difference.

A year ago, Connie fell and broke her arm while practicing jumps.

"I came and skated then anyway," she said. When she smashed her finger in the door and the doctor said no skating for a month, "I

skated anyway," she said.

She answers. "Yes," when asked if there are just those mornings when she doesn't feel like

rising to skate, "...but only when I'm sick," Connie says.

The Zamboni machine cruises along the ice scraping off the top layer and squirting out water to form a smooth fresh surface for skaters.

The young women scurry to the dressing room for a break, and certain warmth.

"She works really hard at her skating all the time—and it paid off. She took fourth in tri-state last year," says Connie's coach, Joan Lissolo.

"That kind of dedication carries over into their everyday lives," he says of the daily practices. "Even if they quit skating they've learned that and know what it takes."

The Zamboni ice machine's done its work the ice's new layer is frozen and the young women skate out once again to the cold for more hours of practice.

Connie has two hours of figure eights ahead of her, she says, and they have to be done...and done again...and again until they're right.

Connie's been taking ice skating lessons for the past six years, and recalls her introduction to the world of ice with some amusement.

"It was a church New Year's Eve skating party—and I wore skates with two runners," she laughs.

Summer, fall, winter, spring, day in and day out, Connie skates, putting herself through rigorous routines.

After a work out the muscles ache, she's tired and the pressure to excell, to conquer, to perfect that move and technique is ever present.

"I really enjoy it, though. When you're out on the ice you don't have to think about anything except what you're doing. I've learned a lot—more from this coach than any other teacher," she says.

There is method and reason to Connie's steadfast determination for perfection. It's the reason she's on that ice at 8 a.m. It's the reason she takes criticism—and aims to perfect each move.

It is not the olympics, for a climb in that direction takes more money and time than she has or can give, Connie said.

"I want to skate in the Ice Capades," Connie said.

With six years of lessons behind her, does she ever fall—perhaps once a day?


"Yes, at least that," Connie laughs.

It appears paper straws are no more and have slipped away with other aspects of the '50s and '60s along with drive-ins and convertibles.


Paper or plastic?

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


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


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

They take their music seriously

It's far too early for the wool uniforms, but the music floating through the air each day marks the beginning of the season for the Clarkston High School Marching Band.

Although the students are dressed in the casual garb of summertime, the T-shirts, cut-off jeans and tennis shoes, they are serious about their music.

The group of about 90 spent the week of Aug. 10 at band camp at Clarkston High School. They worked on music, marching and team spirit 12 hours a day.

In the past, band members spent the week away from home at camp, rather than returning home each evening as this year, said Band Director Clifford Chapman.

"Having not gone away, we lost some of the social closeness that you get, but we accomplished what we set out to accomplish and that was the first third or one-half of our show," he said

The 11-minute show is the one football fans will see at half-time during home games this fall and the performance the band will put on during competitions with other schools.

"This year's kids that came to band camp were marvelous," Chapman said. "I think everyone on the staff feels it's definitely one of the nicest groups of kids we've worked with, very much in terms of self-discipline.

"We stressed discipline, the kind of discipline that keeps your mind on what you're doing and stresses that no individual is more important than the group," he added. "It's been an exceptional group in that respect."

Last year, the band was judged second place in all Class A schools in the state at the state championship competition, Chapman said.

Although he said it's too soon to make predictions on how this year's marching band will do, Chapman expects the best from his crew of marchers.

There are now 90 members of the band, and 20 more members are needed he said, particularly in the wind and brass sections.

Anyone who wishes to participate in the marching band can, said Chapman. The only requirement is that the ninth through 12th graders must be members of the concert bands in their schools.

"The only way they can't make it is not to attend," he said. "We find a roll for everyone to fill. You might say it's like a sport where no one sits on the bench."

All practices are held after school and competitions and performances are on weekends or evenings.






A ladder and microphone give Band Director Clifford Chapman the vantage point and the voice power he needs to guide the CHS Marching Band during camp.


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


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
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Bob Ward and 'crew'—riding high on the crest of nature's mighty winds

Gliding along the surface of the water with the wind whispering in the sails.

Blue sky above and glistening water below. That's Bob Ward's idea of heaven.

When the weather is fair and the winds blow briskly, Bob and his 15-year-old daughter Cathleen can often be seen out on the waters of Deer Lake, sail boat in the water, riding on the wind.

"The excitement of it—it's just really hard to describe the feeling you get," says Bob of his favorite sport and hobby.

"It's a thrill, and the boats are really fast. People don't appreciate the power the wind has got to be able to take a 500 pound boat and lift it out of the water."

Cathleen echos her dad's observations.

"It's indescribable," she says. "You're running—literally running with the wind. It makes me excited just to think about it because I enjoy it so much."

Bob's boat is a "shark" a sail boat that requires a two-man crew to sail. He jokes that daughter Cathleen is his "crew."

Racing events have taken the dad-daughter tandem from Grand Traverse Bay to Oscoda to New York State.

"I enjoy pleasure sailing, but the only way to learn and find out what you're doing wrong is to race against somebody," says Bob.

Whether it's being used for racing or leisurely pleasure sailing, the Wards' shark is always the focal point of family activity.

Bob, wife Nancy, Cathleen, 13-year-old Nancy and 8-year-old Robert all share a hand in the fun. The boat's been the scene of several water-bound picnics.

"It's a great family boat, because you can fit a whole slew of people on it," Bob says. "I remember having 23 people on board on Williams Lake once, just sailing around.

"We were pretty low in the water," he grins, "but we were sailing.

"Really, the only reason I stay in racing is because we can do it together as a family. If I had to race with just a group of guys, I wouldn't do it."

Father and daughter had their share of triumphs and disappointments in their racing career. Last year they won the regional competition, but this year just within the last month they encountered some familiar bad luck in the nationals held in New York.

"We've always been plagued with bad luck in the nationals," Bob chuckles. "I don't know what it is."

There's a great deal of skill involved in being a good sailor, he notes. Whether racing or pleasure boating, sailors are constantly monitoring the wind, adjusting their sails and moving their weight from one side of the boat to the other to use the wind to its full advantage.

A polished sailor in her own right, Cathleen remembers taking her first ride when she was 8 years old.

"I thought it was great right off the bat," she says. "I wasn't allowed to do much, but it was fun just to watch."

All the Ward children know how to swim—an indispensible skill for anyone into sailing.

"You can't have a fear of the water, because sooner or later you're going to go over," says Bob. "But it's a slow-motion thing—it's not just 'bang!' and you're in the water. A 500 pound boat isn't going to go over easy."

The threat of capsizing makes wife Nancy—the only non-swimmer in the family—a little wary of sailing. But with life jacket securely in place, the sensation of gliding on the water is enough to convince her to climb aboard.

"You just can't describe the feeling," she says.

Bob adds that accidents are rare, and that sailing is really one of the safest sports around.

"I've never seen any body get hurt. A few bruises are the worst I've ever seen happen." he says, scanning his 10 years of sailing.

It was back in 1971 when a neighbor, Brook Bennett, asked Bob if he'd like to help out on his two-man shark.

"He needed somebody to crew for him," Bob says. "That's how I got involved."

From that moment on, he was hooked. Two years later, he bought his own boat.

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
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
