Court OKs car racing

Independence Township lost its fight to stop Memorial-weekend racing at the Waterford Hills Race Track

The township suffered its second defeat May 25 when Oakland County Circuit Court Judge John N. O'Brien refused to end racing until track officials reapply for a township license.

According to track attorney Jeffery Heldt, O'Brien said he would not close the track without a trial

The decision allows racing on one of the track's biggest weekends.

"We are most gratified that the court has made so clear that our right to continue operating as we have for 25 years cannot be erased by the unilateral actions of the township board," Heldt wrote in a prepared statement.

"We have repeatedly told the board that what they could not accept from us, they must now accept from Judge O'Brien."

Township Supervisor James B. Smith said he was "shocked" by the court's decision.

"...It has unlimited noise and uses," Smith said.
"I think it was a bad judgment."

The track has not been licensed for the season which began May 14, and there's been no action in a lawsuit filed by the racing association in late May that asks the court to force a permit.

The suit attacks the ordinance as "ambigious...and overbroad" and says limitations in the law are "arbitrary" and "unenforceable"

The township suffered its first court defeat in late April when the judge allowed Waterford Hills Race Track to host a driver's school.

For more than a year, residents living next to the track have sought township intervention to ease the sound of racing engines and eliminate back-to-back racing weekends.

Alarm's on

Fed up with gas siphoning and battery thefts in the high school bus garage, Clarkston School officials installed an alarm in the fence surrounding the building on Middle Lake Road last fall.

It's been paying off.

On Wednesday the alarm resulted in the third arrest, and William Dennis, administrative assistant of auxiliary services, is pleased.

An 18-year-old Waterford Township man was arrested by deputies in a wooded area outside the fence May 25 and charged with attempted breaking and entering. Police discovered a hole cut in the fence.

"(The alarm) is making a difference," said Dennis, whose midnight surveillance inside the garage last fall ended with the arrest of two men.

"And we got two more over the Easter break. But the courts didn't do anything. They only made them pay the damages for cutting the fence, \$25 each plus court costs."

tax revenue to finance road repair.

A nice change, because the village's share has

been cut the past three years.

"We like the increase. Every little bit counts and we can sure use it," said Gar Wilson, director of the department of public works.

For the first quarter of 1983 Clarkston received \$5,193, up from last year's allocation of \$4,840 for the same period.

The increase is a result of gas and weight tax hikes approved last December, and a 3-percent increase in highway travel, according to figures released by the Michigan Department of Transporation.

Independence puts kibosh on recall meeting

The issue, says Janet Seifert, involves her right as an American to freedom of speech.

Independence Township Clerk Christopher Rose says there was some confusion between township departments, but a year-long policy was being upheld.

As coordinator of the Independence Township recall Gov. Blanchard petition drive, Seifert had rented Township Hall for a meeting for residents interested in working/on the project.

She had paid a \$25 rental fee at the township recreation department office and received a receipt that stated the purpose of the meeting.

Almost a week later on the afternoon before the scheduled meeting, she was informed the hall would not be rented.

Seifert called between 35 and 40 people to tell them not to attend the meeting.

And she made plans to go to the parking lot behind Township Hall to meet those who still thought the meeting was there.

About 10 people arrived.

So did a camera crew from TV-Channel 4 that had been at another recall meeting and had heard about the situation. They recorded the lock out at Township Hall and showed it on the news.

"Our little quiet group did get some statewide coverage," Seifert said, but she added that was not their intention.

"We're not here to cause any ripples and we will quietly go about our business. I am very quietly going to work for the same thing and now it's become an issue of freedom of speech and I do have a right to my opinion on this-this is the United States.'

Rental requests had recently become the responsibility of the township recreation department, said

The township policy, he said, is not to rent Township Hall to any group because rentals were creating conflicts when governmental bodies had to

"We haven't rented it to anyone in the past year that I'm aware of," he said.

Regarding the opinion that the decision not to rent was political in nature, Rose said, "Absolutely

"In 1982 the township Republican Club wanted to rent the building and we told them our policy was not to rent the building and they went elsewhere.

Wednesday night, the 10 people who met in the rain in the parking lot behind township hall continued on to the McCabe Real Estate office on M-15 near the Dixie Highway intersection.

After a brief meeting there, they went to a recall rally at Waterford Mott High School.

"If-this was a move to try to snuff the group they haven't done it," Seifert said. "If anything, they have given us more strength. It's given me more determination."

She was walking among Memorial Day parade watchers Monday gathering signatures, working toward the 1 million required statewide by July 1 to mandate a recall election.

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

Clarkston High School's Assistant Principal John Kirchgessner stood downwind of the gray barbecue smoke, coughing and fanning the air with a spatula.

Second Assistant Principal Jan Gabier stood upwind of the pungent air, deftly flipping seared Delmonico steaks on the open grill.

Principal Dom Mauti, head capped in traditional chef's hat, acted as overseer and lent a two-pronged fork to cooking the 80 pounds of beef.

As promised in the billing, "gourmet chefs" cooked the special steak lunch at Clarkston High School last week. Head cook Lee Funk lassoed the front office administrators for the job.

For \$1.50 students savored tender grilled steak, a pile of golden Tater Tots, fresh green salad and rich Black Forest cake.

The menu tipped the scales at 650 orders, 200 more than a regular lunch day, Funk said.

"I read in a food service magazine about other schools outside the state that cook steak for the seniors, and I thought why not do it for the others and see how it goes over," she said.

Inside the cafeteria students were lining up for this lunch.

Few brown-baggers could be seen.

"I need some steak sauce," said Sam Humphrey, struggling to cut the meat with plastic knife and fork on a foam plate.

Steve Hamelin, sat before two full meals.

"No, I don't usually eat two lunches, but then we don't usually have steak," he said.

Lorae Palmiter said it tasted just like home. Her mom's one of the cooks.

Peanut butter and jelly sandwich lunches will never be the same.

Inflation hits

School election fee up \$400

This year when Independence Township runs the elections for the Clarkston School District, there'll be higher price tag.

Four-hundred dollars more, according to township Clerk Christopher Rose, who said the increase is necessary to keep up with rising costs.

"We're not making any money on this, and we're not losing money. We're breaking even," he told the township board.

With no discussion at the May 17 meeting, the board unanimously approved the \$4,700 fee to cover election costs.

The school election is scheduled June 13.

Public hearing June 2

Tax increase

An increase in school taxes is the topic of a public hearing scheduled Thursday, June 2, at the Clarkston school district administration office building.

'It's designed to allow interested citizens to make testimony and ask questions related to the operational tax levy of the school district," said Superintendent Milford Mason.

The hearing is required by state law, commonly called "Truth in Taxation."

Based on the Headlee Amendment, the district can increase taxes as much as the Consumer Price Index, or 5.86 percent this year.

In taxes, the upper limit of the increase would be 1.8438 mills or \$1.84 for each \$1,000 of assessed pro-

If approved, the increase would put Clarkston school operational taxes at 33.33 mills, or \$33.33 for each \$1,000 of assessed property valuation.

At the meeting, Mason plans to explain the formulas that allow the tax increase.

The meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m. at 6389 Clarkston-Orion Road, Independence Township.

The school board is to vote on the proposed increase at its next regularly scheduled meeting June 13.

Village joins

For the first time in the history of the Mill Pond Association, Clarkston Village is becoming a duespaying member.

On May 23, the council voted 5-1 to contribute \$75 to the fourth-year herbicide and algicide treatment of the pond in downtown Clarkston and to pay \$10 in membership dues.

President Jackson Byers attributes the turnabout from past years of refusal to the four new council

"I think that did make a difference," Byers said. "That, and I think in the past no one ever emphasized the village was a property owner on the Mill Pond. With that in mind, they felt we had some obligation to the other property owners.

"And, our attorney assured us there was nothing improper with that action."

For the past three years Mill Pond Association mêmbers have requested the village's cooperation, but attorneys said a municipality should not get involved in a private organization.

Harry Radcliff, president of the association, said the first treatment is tentatively set for June 15 depending on the weather, condition of the weeds and receipt of a state Department of Natural Resources

permit.
This year's treatment is expected to cost \$2,500,

Township clerk wanted

Because we believe Independence Township Clerk Christopher Rose did an excellent job in his six years in the post, we also believe he's the best person to issue a plea for applicants as his resignation date nears.

The township board's job is to select a person to sit in the seat for the remaining one-andone-half years of his term.

Rose says he would like to see numerous people apply, and so far that hasn't happened.

"I think the more competition there is, the better the chances are for getting somebody just right for the job," he said.

The salary is \$31,644 plus fringe benefits including fully paid health, life and disability insurance, and pension.

Duties include running elections, taking minutes at board meetings, voting on a variety of issues at the meetings and administering payroll and bookkeeping for the township.

The only legal requirement is that the person be qualified to vote in Independence Township.

It would be helpful, Rose said, to have some background in municipal government and administration and in accounting matters.

And as one of three chief administrators for the township, it's important that the clerk be able to work well with people, he said.

"It's a very rewarding job in that you have

the opportunity to work with and for the people in the community," he said.

"It's rewarding when you can solve a problem somebody might be having. It can be frustrating at the times when you can't solve a problem.

Rose also has a few words of encouragement for those who are qualified in some areas, but not

He praises the competence of the township staff and their able assistance when he first became clerk six years ago.

And he notes that the township will cover expenses for workshops and seminars if the new clerk needs more knowledge in matters of finance.

Rose would like to see the township board select his replacement before his last day on the job July 1, so he can share what he knows.

Legally the board has until Aug. 14 to choose someone to fill Rose's shoes. If they do not agree on a replacement, a special election must be held.

We believe Rose's final act speaks for itself—his desire leave for his new post as town manager in Littleton, New Hampshire, knowing a good replacement has been found for township

We're going to miss him.


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

Things haven't been going so well lately. People I love have been getting sick and feeling pain. And dying. It hurts me. But it comes with the territory - the late-middle-aged territory where your contemporaries begin to slip away and only one person alive can remember changing your diapers.

The aches and losses caused by attrition are balanced, of course, by the newcomers - the children and grandchildren. But that isn't all laughs. The daughter I call Ferd recently had serious surgery. She is going to be fine, but for two miserable days she suffered more pain than her lucky father has felt, totaled up, in 56 years.

That's not right; it's frustrating. My children and grandchildren represent my immortality — something that shouldn't be messed with, if you'll excuse the selfishness. It is possible for moneymaking corporations to buy tax credits from unprofitable corporations. Similarly, there should be some way for healthy men to buy illnesses from their children and grandchildren.

That's why I'm such a simplistic peacentk, incurably opposed to anything more violent than a quiet argument. Just plain living requires so much sadness that can't be avoided, no matter what, it is ridiculous for people to hurt each other on purpose. A Children of Sales and August 1985

There was a sadness amid the frivolity at a baseball game the other afternoon. Once every year, I watch a Tiger game with some old poker-golf friends from the little town where I used to live. This year, Carl Weston wasn't there. He had a heart attack a few months ago and died, much too young.

Carl operated a shoe store and dressed up like a woman for the Kiwanis minstrel show every spring. He had a big smile and a nice word for everyone. When I think of him, I'm reminded of members of that poker-golf club who also died. Those deaths were an inevitable part of living and could be accepted and understood, even though they came too soon.

BUT I ALSO think of one of my dead friend's son, He was terribly wounded in Vietnam in 1969 and still must live in a hospital in 1983. And, also in 1983, wars are still being fought in Central America, the Middle East and dozens of other places. Some sadnesses shouldn't be inevitable, and they defy acceptance and understanding.

It saddened me to learn that a misunderstanding had caused my dear aunt such a bad time. But it was soon forgotten during the good time we had at dinner the next night. And I'll always be grateful for that dinner because Aunt Florence died a few days later.

IT WAS TIME. A long succession of illnesses had finally made living not worthwhile for the lovely Florence Gleason McCool. She was the aunt who looked so much like her oldest sister - my mother. Florence's late husband, Sam, was a newspaperman when she married him, and it was his example that led me into this business. I'm sure they're both in heaven anyway.

Now Aunt Madeline is the only one alive who remembers how sweet I looked in the maternity ward in 1926. (She sold me insurance when I was one day old.) That makes Madeline more precious than ever, and I intend to tell her that often.

So. The sadnesses, inevitable or not, wear away on the late-middle-aged columnist. But I know what to do about it. While my daughter is recuperating from surgery, someone must keep an eye on her 19-month-old daughter. I'm going to take a week off and teach Emily how to say "Grandpa."


"Clyde's been great for us," Olsen said. "We





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

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

When Marsha Vaughn accelerates into the curve on the Waterford Hills Race Track her 4-cylinder, bug-eyed, blue Sprite responds.

"I don't consider it dangerous," he said. "I've never had a problem, I stay within the limits of the car. The challenge is to stay in your limits and not exceed them."

"I can't find mine," Marsha laughed. "The car and I just got acquainted the first day of driver's

Gene recalls the early racing years when Marsha would look down on the track and say, "I can drive that fast. They're not going fast enough."

"The first day of driver's school was the hardest work I've ever done in my life," she said. "It breaks all the rules of the road. On the road you're told not to tailgate, don't speed up in the corners, don't drift, in the curves. On the track you tailgate 6 inches from the car in front of you, you speed up in the corners, and you have to get used to driving a different way."

Camaraderie is a big part of driving, according to Gene, and Marsha says that while the ratio of women to men drivers is small, they're treated no differently on the track.

"If you're in trouble, if your car breaks or you need a part, they're right there with it. If you've got a problem, they've got a problem. It's like family," Gene said.

"But out there on the track the men don't give you an inch. You're just another driver," Marsha said.

This season Marsha's driven two races, and Gene one.

"I got into it because all I was doing was putting air in the tires and making coffee runs. Gene encouraged me, and we bought the car," she said.

Gene drives a Mallock.

"Twenty years ago I was one of the first in this club," Gene said. "I raced for a long time, then we moved out of the state and I quit racing cars and got into racing motorcycles and boats.

"We moved back to Clarkston five years ago, and I wanted to start driving again."

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Safety checklist for mobile homes

The Independence Township Fire Department is issuing a furnace safety checklist to mobile home residents.

According to the Mobile Home Commission, two serious accidents involving mobile home furnaces have occurred in the past 90 days, alerting officials to the dangers of rusting chimney covers.

The covers break and lodge in the pipe, allowing carbon monoxide into the mobile home instead of out the chimney, poisoning those inside.

The fire department suggests mobile home owners have heating systems inspected by a reputable service person and offers the following safety

- •Vent system in furnace blower compartment and above furnace for rust or leaks.
- •Chimney cap above roof for rust, deterioratin or restriction.
 - •Fuel supply system for leaks or restriction.
 - •Clean or replace air filters.
 - •Clean and lubricate blowers and motors.
 - ·Check ducts and registers for dirt or restric-
- Proper setting, calibration and operation of controls and thermostat.
- •Combustion air openings for dirt, lint or other restrictions.
 - •Heat exchanger for scale, rust or soot.
- •Electrical wiring for frayed insulation, loose connections or shorts.

•Be sure furnace is fully cycled with thermostat. In addition, the department suggests the oil storage tank be checked for water or oil, and that worn nozzles and clean electrodes be replaced.

Gas furnaces should also be checked for dirt and other foreign matter.



Snapping turtle hunter wanted

So black caviar's your delicacy.

Or is it fresh truffles?

Perhaps a bottle of chilled champagne?

No, you say, nothing beats a cauldron of steaming turtle soup—if only you could find the turtle.

Look no further.

Ingeborg Thiemann's got the solution for your taste buds.

Fifty pounds of snapping turtle for the asking. Er, the taking.

You've got to catch them first.

Years ago two snapping turtles invaded the pond in her Brandon Township backyard.

They live 40 years, she said, and mature at age 15.

"I've watched the ducklings disappear one by one," Thiemann said, shaking her head sadly. "They paddle along behind the mother, then disappear.

"Once I watched a duck struggle and struggle to get away. It finally did—minus a foot I'm sure. Those turtles just wait below the surface of the water and wait for those feet to come dangling down."

Thiemann wants the turtles out of her pond so the muskrat, heron and other wildlife can live unthreatened.

But they're big, 2 feet in circumference and feis-

They've taken on her Great Dane.

"Have you ever seen an angry snapping turtle that's fighting. Their head sticks way out about a foot, and they can reach around almost to their tail. Five or six years ago my three dogs were outside barking like they'd cornered something. It was a snapping turtle, and their noses were all bloodied.

"The dogs wouldn't leave it alone, and it took almost an hour to get (the turtle) inside a bucket. They have tails like a dragon and are ferocious."

Thiemann knows snapping turtles can clean out a pond's fish population.

"And I've got just enough for the herons," she said. "I know (the turtles) are an important part of the food chain, people have given me that argument

"I don't buy it. I suppose they are important, but not here."

According to Pomeroy's Seafood Co. in Bloomfield, turtle meat's going for \$6 a pound.

There's \$300 worth of meat just waiting to be caught.

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

Kelly Haskins is bound for Haiti

She's going to build a school for the poor with Project Serve

Kelly Haskins is in for a summer full of sweat, hard work and more hard work.

The 15-year-old Springfield Township resident is leaving June 15 for a three-week trip to Haiti in the Caribbean Sea.

This is not going to be a fun-filled vacation.

She is going with a group of 110 high school students from America to help build a school for the underprivileged nation.

The group is called Project Serve and is sponsored by Youth for Christ.

"This isn't just a religious thing," said the Clarkston High School sophomore. "Haiti is the third poorest country. We are going to build the school for

Building the school is not going to be easy. They have to transport all the materials by plane and supply their own tools.

"They can only take one bag on the plane," said Kelly's mother Dawn. "All the room on the plane is going for the wood. And in that one bag they have to

Once in Haiti, Kelly can count on long, hard

days: Her day will start at 6 a.m.
"I won't start working until 7 a.m." and will quit around 5 p.m.; "she said; "I m not really used to hard work, but I look at it as a challenge."

Among challenges she will have to face are the heat and the diseases.

Haiti is 600 miles south of the Florida Keys with temperatures climbing toward 100 everyday.

The girls in the group will not be able to wear shorts or have their shoulders show.

'It's going to be hot down there," Mrs. Haskins said. "In Haiti they aren't used to seeing women in slacks, let alone shorts. They'll be able to wear cutoffs just below the knees and slowly cut more and more

There is no pay for the work and the trip isn't free. Everyone going must come upwith \$1,200 to

"The money goes for food, and the wood for the school, the flight down," Kelly said. "Right now I have about \$800. I still need \$400 with three weeks left. I've been going to businesses asking for help. Individuals have also donated. It's all tax deductible

Kelly decided only a month ago to go on the trip. Her orginal summer vacation plans were to visit her brother in California

"This is going to be a lot different than going to California and lying around for a while," she said. "I don't have any regrets yet, but once I'm down there I might think about it I won't regret it once I'm back here—I can always go to California.'
