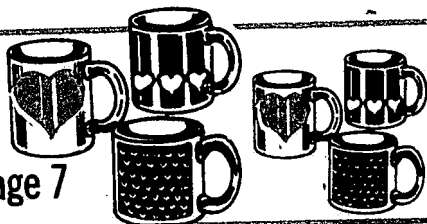

Heroes

Life-saving rescue

Neighbors working together saved the life of 39-year-old Jackie Price when fire spread through her Harvard Road house in northeast Independence Township two weeks ago.

Unconscious, overcome by smoke inhalation, she was pulled to safety from a back bedroom engulfed in flames.

Jackie remains in critical condition at the Ann Arbor Burn Center. Her husband Gerald, 40, has been transferred to Chelsea Hospital, Chelsea.

Clarice Humphrey lives three doors from the Prices and said the dog woke her with its barking.

"Someone yelled to call the fire department, but I think several people already had," she said. "When we got outside, one of the (Price's) sons (J.J., 11) was already outside.

"I went over to him and held him. He just watched. The other son (Kent, 19) was around the back of the house trying to get his mother out.

"The windows were blowing out of the house, it was covered in flames and when you looked through the windows you could see (fire) moving through the house."

According to Humphrey, flames had not yet reached the back bedroom.

"Someone yelled, 'Get a pickax or an ax,' and they started literally tearing a hole through the wall," she said.

"It was such quick thinking. They reacted so quickly. When the fire department finally did arrive, the hole was there. And the flames were coming into the bedroom when they finally got her out."

"I was so impressed with (the neighbors') actions, they literally saved that woman's life. It was lucky that (fire station) at Sashabaw was open—they were the first to arrive."

Responsible for the rescue are Denny Willett, [Continued on Page 2]

Smooth last day of school—almost

Administrators at the two junior highs and high school say the last day of school went smoothly, but Clarkston village's enforcement officer Charles Smalley disputes that.

In addition to traditional shaving cream fights, smoke bombs and water pistols, two high school students were injured in separate accidents.

A boy on a motorcycle reportedly broke a foot when he raced a car for a parking space at the high school—and lost.

And a girl driving down the entrance to Clarkston Junior High was the victim of a hit-and-run. She was treated at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac for head injuries.

On Tuesday downtown Main Street sidewalks were filled with squealing kids dodging traffic and spraying shaving cream as school doors closed for the summer, according to Smalley.

He said he tried to get cooperation from downtown merchants not to sell the shaving cream, succeeding with one store and failing with another.

"There were 100 to 150 kids downtown. It was a mess. They were spraying each other and passing cars and throwing water balloons," Smalley said. "I was afraid they were going to be hit by a car.

"And what else bothered me was when they were throwing balloons at a passing motorists, that they would get an older person with a heart condition. We could have had a horrible accident."

Smalley said he dispersed the crowd after threats to ticket for loitering and malicious destruction of property.

George White, assistant principal at Sashabaw Junior High, and Cecelia Weir, Clarkston Junior High's assistant principal, said their last day went smoothly.

And high school Principal Dom Mauti says all went well inside the school.

"Outside?" he laughed. "Outside we had some shaving cream. But we had a lot of help to keep things in order, two custodians and the grounds crew."

The Independence Township Fire Department reported extinguishing three grass fires along I-75, believed started by firecrackers.

Historic district residents to vote on ordinance

The committee reviewing re-implementation of the controversial historic district ordinance recommends the decision be left to the 174 homeowners in the historic district via mail vote.

Ballots are expected to be mailed in two weeks, according to village council Trustee Carol Eberhardt, chairperson of the seven-member committee.

"The committee did not like the idea of a pollster going to each house," Eberhardt said at the June 13 Clarkston Village Council meeting.

"They also felt strongly it should say something like, 'This is your last chance; speak now or forever hold your peace.'

"We felt people would be intimidated by a pollster coming to their door, even if it was a professional pollster. And you can't always catch the husband and wife at home, or they want to discuss it.

"This way they can have the (ballot) and we're

going to send a copy of the ordinance so they can study it and be sure on their decision."

The proposed ordinance still prohibits aluminum siding, Eberhardt said, but as with the first law, allows the applicant to seek a hardship variance from the historic district commission which approves all construction and repairs in the historic district.

"I think after all our discussions the committee felt this town is not ready for the ordinance," Eberhardt said.

"When it gets down to it everybody's in favor of preservation, but they're not in favor of giving up any of their rights to keep it. They're not willing to do that, and I'd be very surprised if the majority of homeowners in the district want the ordinance."

The law was on village book's for a year before the council repealed it last November, following a string of complaints from residents unhappy with the commission's decision-making, and complaints of the village council's inability to control the powerful body.

The law's repeal disbanded the commission.

Don Bookie, Chuck Bailey, Bill Jackson, Dan Otterbin, Mike Pettit and Gil Buhl.

But the neighbors are coming to the rescue long after the fire's been extinguished.

"They're taking turns taking care of J.J.," Humphrey said. "They're taking up a collection, buying him clothes. He stayed with the Bookie family first, now he's with the Crites. They had no immediate family to speak of.

"It's a neighborhood group effort."

According to Humphrey, the older son Kent and

his twin brother who's home on emergency leave from the United States Navy, are in Ann Arbor to be near their parents.

Neighbors point to Denny Willett as the principal man in the rescue, but he shuns the spotlight and says it was a group effort.

"I have the twins staying with me here whenever they're here. I tell them to come right in the door, use the phone, do whatever you need to like it was your own home.

"They have nothing. No house, no real family. It's real tough on them."

State asks postponement of senior complex

The state has thrown a stumbling block in developer Hugh Garner's path, asking to postpone review of his \$30 million senior citizen complex, Clarkston Place, while it looks at 13 new applications for other senior housing in northwest Oakland County.

Garner's letter of intent to build at I-75 and Dixie Highway has been in state files for one year.

He could now be forced to compete against the 13 new applicants for the available 424 beds apportioned to northwest Oakland County while applications are reviewed on a "comparative basis."

According to Edward James, chief of the division of health facility and planning for the Michigan Department of Health, the state must first certify a need for the development.

"It's a health care containment measure so we can be sure they won't be built and not be needed. Medicare and Medicaid reimburse some of the facilities, so we have to make sure the public's money isn't misused."

"We want to review them on a comparative basis to determine certificate of need."

James indicated the applications would be reviewed within two weeks.

Garner is angry and said postponement would mean delaying the project a full year.

"But the 13 new applicants show we're going in the right direction," Garner said. "All I want to do is build my project and they're putting me through all these hoops. I thought I was proposing a fine project with jobs."

"I don't want to take the state of Michigan on, but I will if I have to. They're changing the rules midstream."

James was surprised Garner felt "aggrieved" and said it will be at least two weeks before his department reviews the application.

"We have to make sure our decisions will be upheld, and we have an almost perfect record," he said. "We've probably been challenged 80 times, and only lost once."

State Rep. Mat Dunaskiss (R-61st District) is on Garner's side and is asking the committee to review the project immediately.

"Garner was willing to act on his investment three years ago when the economy was bad. Now that the economy is picking up, there's competition," Dunaskiss said.

"The state limits the amount of beds and has created a commodity and now all these other firms are competing for that. Philosophically it sounds good, however (the state) is changing the rules midstream, and I'm going to ask them not to do it."

Site board gets Stablex review OK

The Site Approval Board (SAB) for the proposed Stablex hazardous waste processing plant in Groveland Township can now meet to decide the fate of the plant.

Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson filed a restraining order in May against the SAB because he said there were illegal amendments to the application.

Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Richard Kuhn ruled June 16 the SAB must vote on the original application.

Patterson held a press conference last week to announce the judge's decision.

"Judge Kuhn's order is an overwhelming victory for this office," he said. "The stage is set for the board to vote on the site. The board director has been just short of being ordered to vote 'no.'"

In the court report, Kuhn said the only construction permit application that is valid is the original.

Kuhn's report said the original construction permit was lacking the proper hydrogeological and engineering reports and that the SAB does not have the authority to amend an application during its review.

Kuhn urged in the report that the SAB deny the application because it is "fatally deficient."

After the press conference, Stablex attorney Barry Yaker commented on the court case.

"We are back where we started," he said. "It's like we're back on April 27 waiting for the meeting the next day. We'll be there when the Site Approval Board reconvenes."

In a phone interview, Stablex General Manager David Wolf said Stablex was not a party to the court process and declined to comment on the ruling.

If the SAB denies the plant construction permit, Patterson said Stablex would have to wait a year before reapplying for the same location but could apply for a new permit at a different site any time.

"If the Site Approval Board approves the permit," Patterson said. "We'll take them to court and they'll not allow it. The legalities could tie Stablex up for some time."

The SAB plans to meet with the Attorney General before they set up a meeting to make a vote, said spokesperson Seth Phillips.

"We'll try to schedule a meeting after we talk with him," he said. "We'll see what kind of options the board has if any. The court order didn't set any formal timetable for a vote but my personal feeling is that it will be about a week."

After six years as clerk, Rose resigned his post to take the job of town manager in Littleton, N.H., and is scheduled to report for work there the first of July.

State board to review Levy's gravel mine plan

Again the state's looking at the Edward C. Levy Co.'s proposal to mine 300 acres near the headwaters of the Clinton River.

The plan is scheduled before the Environmental Review Board June 27.

The 17-member board of citizens and department heads could make its recommendation to approve or deny the plan to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) that day, according to Boyd Kinzley, executive secretary to the board.

"Mostly we're called to review environmental im-

pacts of projects. We make recommendations on policy, whether to accept it, change it or deny it. We may make a recommendation at that meeting, but I wouldn't want to speculate on what it might be. There are 17 different minds at work."

The review is to be held in the Baker-Olin West Building, 3500 N. Logan, Lansing.

Since 1979 Levy has sought to mine acreage off Clarkston-Orion Road abutting Independence Township's Clintonwood Park and Independence Oaks County Park off Sashabaw Road.

Levy's revised environmental impact statement issued late last year was seen as an improvement by the DNR.

It outlines the following:

- Mining 300 acres with 80 acres reclaimed for an "upland habitat," wetlands that don't exist now.
- Developing a 200-acre lake.
- Creating a 12-acre shallow wetlands area in the northwest.
- Developing, within the first five years, a township beach on a 12-acre lake next to Clintonwood Park, isolated from the rest of the mining operation.
- Including non-development areas outside the 500-foot buffer along the river.

Controversial lot split denied

Strict interpretation of the zoning ordinance resulted in a lot split denial for Kieft Engineering's James Scharl, representing Donald Nolta and Martin Brennan Jr.

The partners want to develop 240 acres into 10-acre parcels off Indianwood Road.

The low-density development and 60-acre wetlands dedeed to the Independence Land Conservancy were "trade-offs" for the hoped approval of the plan.

The township Zoning Board of Appeals approved the proposal and private road, with the stipulation the 60 acres be dedeed to the conservancy.

The plan was then denied by the lot split committee strictly interpreting the ordinance which said the landlocked 60-acres must have road frontage.

Scharl hoped to appeal to the township board but lost when it unanimously denied his request June 7.

His only options are to take the case to circuit court or to engineer a new development.

"That wasn't a private road as far as I'm concerned," said Clerk Christopher Rose after the meeting. "The ordinance says a private road must serve more than one parcel, and this one doesn't so as far as I'm concerned it's nothing more than a driveway."

"I also see problems with the width-to-depth,

road frontage and possible problems with the cul-de-sac and block link."

Scharl could not be reached for comment following the meeting.

Taxes on way

Look for summer tax collection bills to arrive in the mail July 7 or 8.

Following voter renewal of 5 mills for Clarkston Community Schools, Independence Township Treasurer Frederick Ritter says a total of 19.685 mills will be levied this summer, with 17.305 going to Clarkston schools, 2.3 to Oakland Schools and 1.5 to Oakland Community College.

A \$70,000 home assessed at \$35,000 or one-half the market value would pay \$605 to Clarkston schools, \$52.50 to OCC and \$30.68 to Oakland Schools, according to Ritter.

OCC is levying 100 percent of its millage this summer, instead of half.

By law the schools are allowed to collect no less than 50 percent but no less than 100 percent of the millage in the summer, Ritter said.

the opposite (south) side of the plane. It was like I'd taken two trips. Going over it was flat farmland as far as one could see on the north and west.

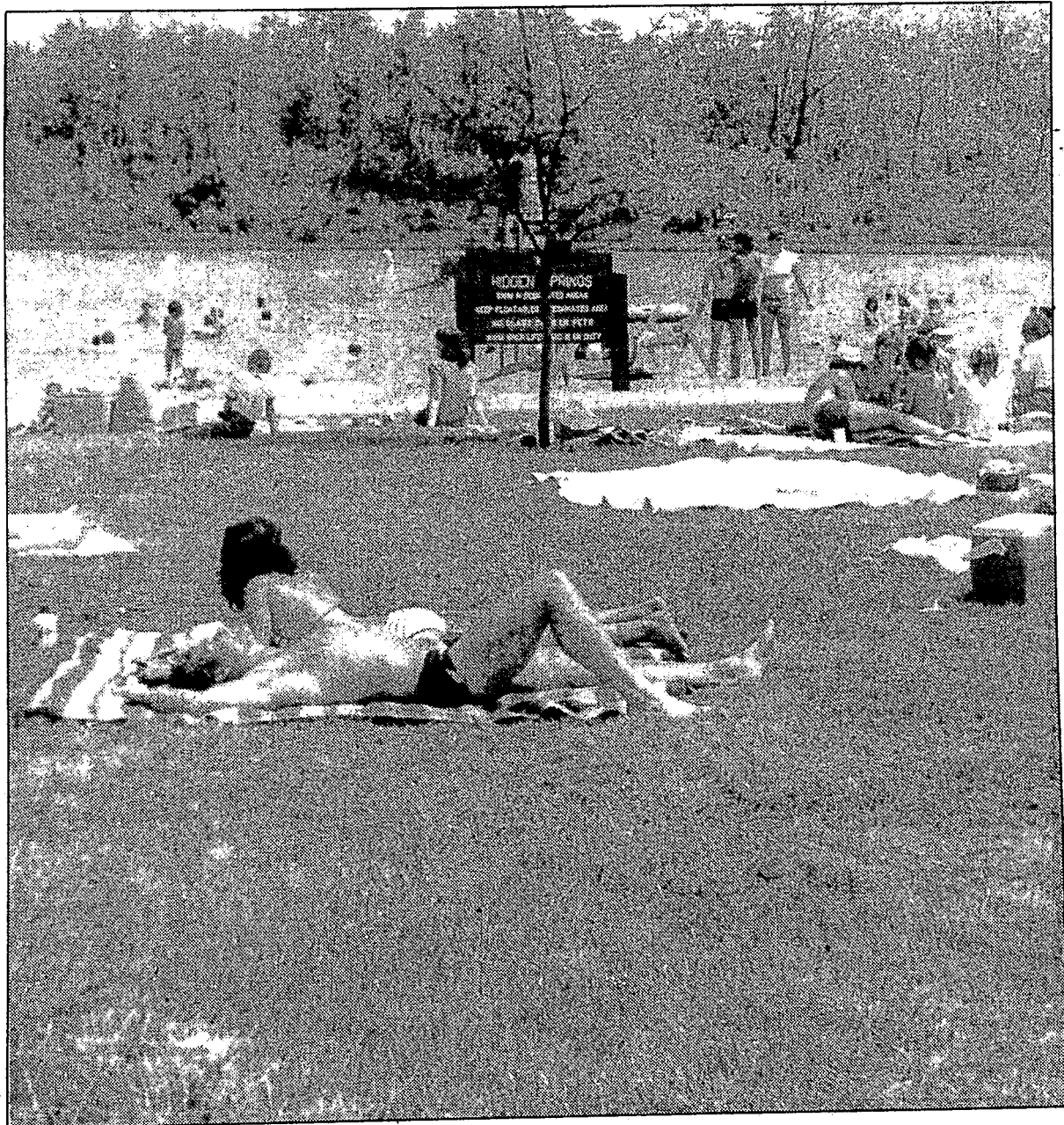
Coming back it came as almost a surprise to see the large number of lakes. Draw a line on a map east and west just north of Fenton and you'll have the lakeland/farmland divide.

I remember hearing the owner of Abram's Aerial Photography say he could tell one county in Michigan from the other from the air, each having it's own characteristics. He said the same about states.

I'm sure there are parts of Shiawassee and Genesee counties that look alike at their borders, but the short flight I took helped convince me Abrams was right.

I'll give it more thought on my next luncheon flight to Owosso.

Saving steps, Wanda immediately slid into the kitchen to get her newest anti-waste implement. It is a pencil-thin stick with several rubber prongs on one end. She bought it through the mail. Wanda buys everything through the mail so she can save the box it arrives in, in case she ever wants to send it back.

What you do is thrust the skinny spatula into the narrow bottle until it hits bottom and the rubber prongs, pointing upward, are pressed tightly against the interior of the bottle. Then you suddenly yank the skinny spatula out of the narrow bottle, causing the rubber prongs to emerge pointing downward.

drain study resurfaces

Independence Township Treasurer Frederick Ritter has applied for a \$500,000 federal grant to finance drainage improvements on flood-prone M-15 south of Clarkston Village.

While the improvements have been a priority with some township board members, tight budgets the past three years have precluded financing the costly repairs.

At the June 7 meeting Ritter told the board he'd discovered an available \$500,000 from the Economic Development Administration, part of the Department of Commerce, which could be used to make the M-15 drainage improvements.

"We only became aware of the money 10 days

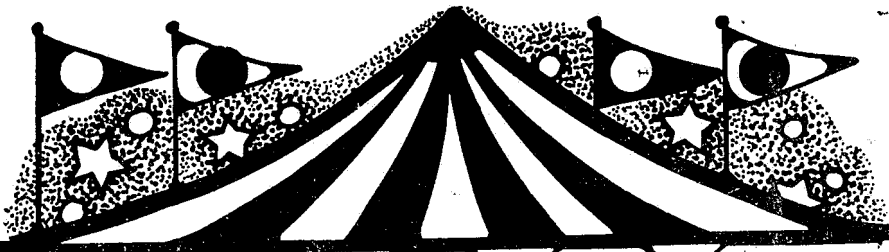
ago from (Congressman) Bob Carr's office, and I submitted a request for application," Ritter said after the meeting.

While it is a 50-percent matching grant, Independence Township is eligible for an 80-20 percent sharing because it's listed at 12-percent unemployment, Ritter said.

That would put the estimated cost for Independence at \$100,000.

At last review, Independence's share of the expense was estimated at \$120,000, or 25-percent of the cost, with the state paying 40 percent and the Oakland County Drain Commission paying 35 percent.

Trucks are no longer parking in a vacant lot on LaVon Drive, Springfield Township, thanks to the efforts of nearby residents.

The angry neighbors sought action at the Springfield Township Board meeting, and got it.

The lot on LaVon Drive off Dixie Highway near I-75 is owned by the Springfield Christian Academy and was being used by the Springfield Coney Island for parking.

Vance Moore of LaVon Drive said at the meeting June 8 that the lot is zoned residential and semi-tractor trailers were parking there overnight.

"The church put up some barrels last Wednesday, but I don't think that will stop the trucks," Moore said. "The trucks are parking on LaVon now. Right now with the barrels, we'll just have to take it one step at a time."

"It's taking away some of the property value in the area. We've gone to the county asking for no parking signs for the road and to beef up the patrol on the road."

Moore, the spokesman for the seven residents at the township meeting, threatened to sue the township, the church and the restaurant if the lot was not closed.

Supervisor Collin Walls said a letter was sent by the township attorney to both parties and the police informing them the lot was not following the zoning ordinance.

"The letter gave them the deadline of June 15 to either post no-parking signs or to fence the property off," he said.

Tim Vanaman, project director at Springfield Academy, was contacted after the meeting. The lot was used to help alleviate another problem, he said.

"They weren't renting it," he said. "There was a problem of trucks parking on the side of the road and people were complaining about that."

Vanaman said if the barrels didn't keep the trucks out of the lot, some form of fencing would probably be used.

The owner of the restaurant could not be reached for comment.

"When you lose in a tournament, you realize how much work you have to do to get better," Kelly said. "I want to keep going so I can beat that girl this year."

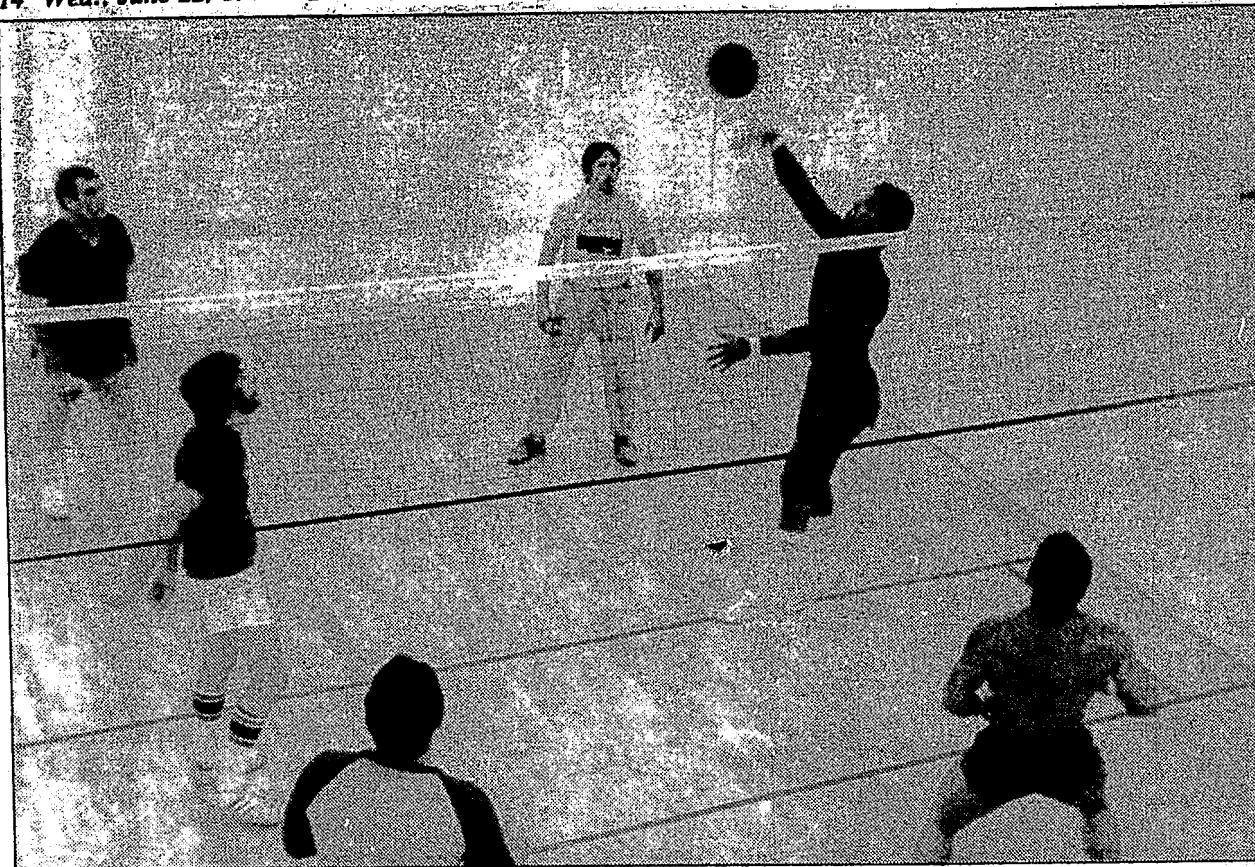

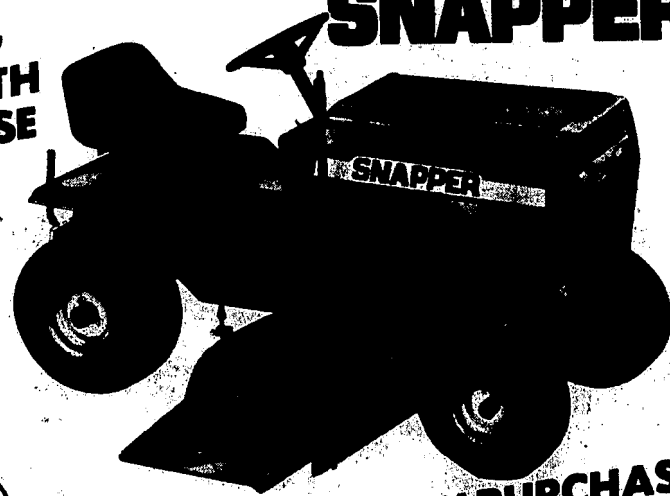

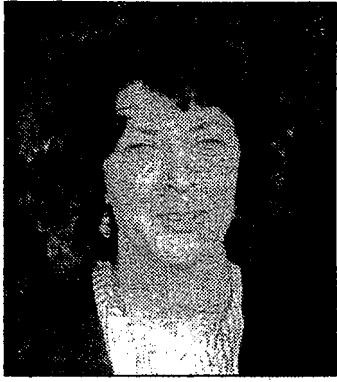
Wrapping up a successful first year as community education director for Clarkston schools, Kathleen O'Donnell's heading for Harvard.

"A major goal was to demonstrate that we could be self-sufficient and we could make a valuable contribution," she said. "We met the goal and we exceeded it."

The list of accomplishments is extensive:

- The first graduation ceremony for the 10 adult education graduates.
- An alternative high school program to address the needs of students who had difficulty succeeding in the regular program.
- The availability of computer classes for all ages through Texas Instruments.
- The highly successful Job Club to assist the unemployed with job-hunting skills.
- An increase in enrollment in adult education classes at the Northwest Oakland Vocational Education Center.

New science-related summer day camp programs for elementary and junior high school pupils. Employment (mostly part-time) for about 150 people.

Schools Superintendent Milford Mason shares O'Donnell's excitement about the program.

"Overall, we made more progress than I thought possible in the first year toward opening our education program and our schools up to the community, not just those who have youngsters in school," he said.

"We do know clearly that the program brought in more revenue than it expended and there will be a balance," he added. "It will assist general education."

The \$1,800 tuition for the Harvard seminar will come from the community education budget and O'Donnell will assume travel expenses, Mason said.

New park's purpose comes under debate

Trustee Larence Kozma is struggling to keep Maybee Road Park a neighborhood park—not one for Independence Township's organized ball leagues.

Kozma argued against allowing one baseball/softball, two soccer and one practice field for organized parks and recreation leagues, and wanted a field left "...for kids to play pickup ball when they want to, where they don't have to compete with the leagues."

Parks Director Timothy Doyle produced a plan for the 15-acre park on Maybee Road at the June 7 township board meeting.

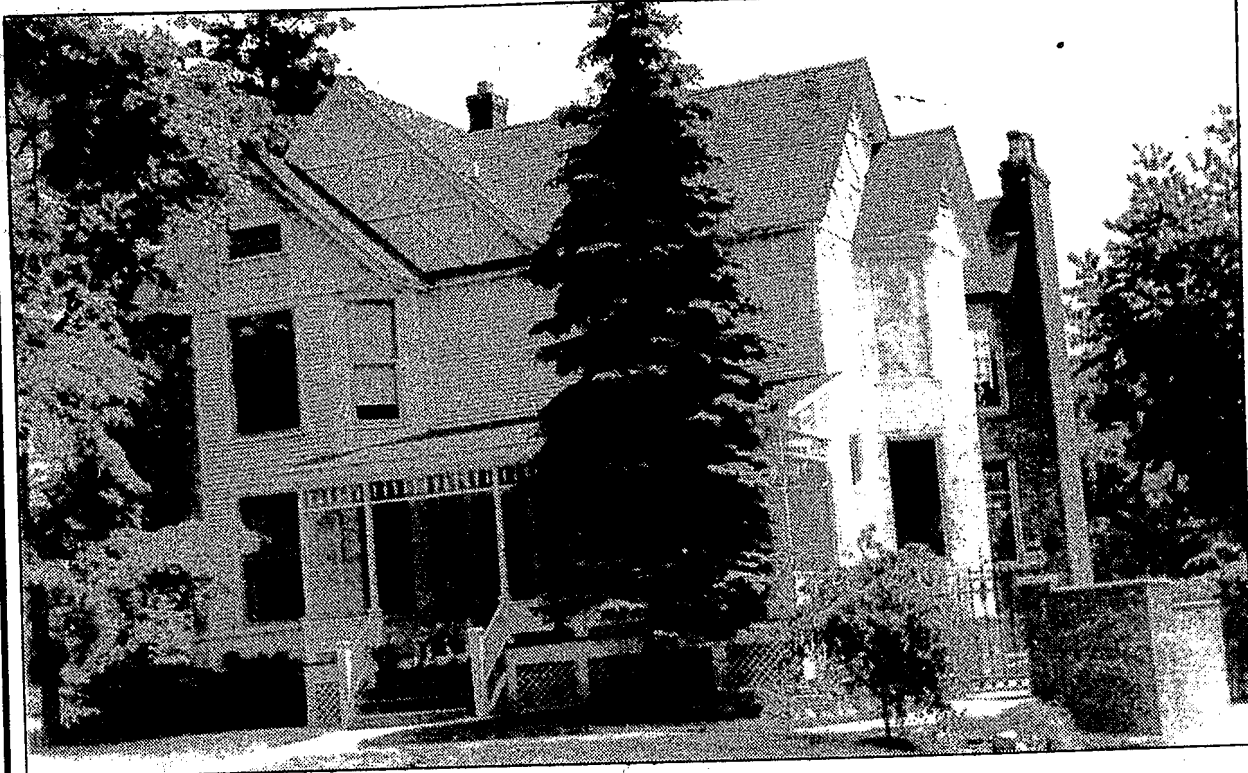
"I surveyed the people, and I know what they want," Doyle argued with Kozma. "They want a place in their neighborhood where they can take their kids to play ball, and not have to drive out to Clintonwood."

"Baseball and softball are good revenue producers. Right now we're supplemented with tax dollars, but if we're going to be 100 percent self-sufficient we need this park."

Kozma disagreed, and said his neighbors want to use the park now for picnics and informal games.

Doyle said he's closely followed the board's earlier directive.

After discussion, the board approved the plan, but not the use.

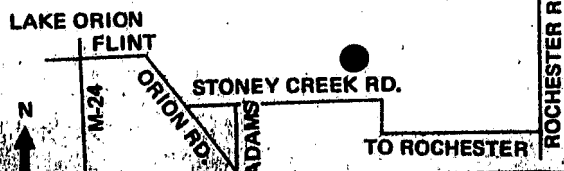

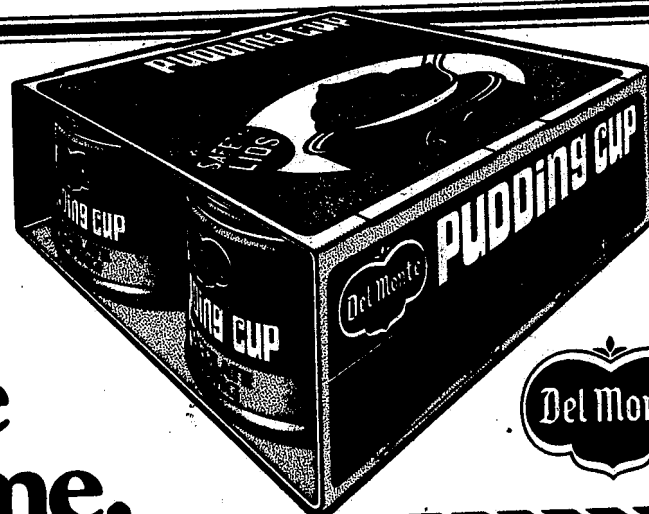

Fireworks:

Some are legal;
some aren't

A young boy fingers the small red-paper covered firecracker, looking around to see if he's watched. Lighting the fuse, his arm arches ready to throw the firecracker—but it explodes in his hand. He howls in pain. Firecrackers and other fireworks are illegal in Michigan.

Others aren't. State police offer the following tips and guidelines to keep July 4th safe and legal:

- Legal fireworks are toy paper caps, wire sparklers (size 14 or less), toy snakes, toy smoke devices, toy trick noisemakers, cone fountains and cylinder fountains.

- Illegal fireworks are those that send projectiles into the air, spin, twirl or emit an audible signal, excluding paper caps and noise makers.

Some safety tips for use with fireworks:

- Read label for instructions. Illegally manufactured fireworks rarely have instructions.

- Adults should supervise children.

- Light one device at a time.

- Only ignite outdoors, away from buildings and combustible materials.

- Do not tamper with the fireworks or use in a manner they're not intended for.

Last year in Michigan there were 219 reported fires caused by fireworks which caused \$142,461 in damages, according to police.

The U.S. Consumer Project Safety Commission reports that in 1982 there were 8,500 firework related injuries treated in hospital emergency rooms throughout the nation.

Newfound career:

First she learns, then she teaches horseback riding skills

Almost by accident, Bertie Lou Gentile fell in love with horses.

While accompanying her daughter on a Girl Scout outing at the John F. Ivory Farm in Union Lake in 1976, the 54-year-old mother of six had her first horseback ride.

"The other scout leader and I each had a horse," she said. "She didn't like it too much, but I did. At first I thought, 'Why would anyone want to trot on such a nice day when you could walk.' But I had so much fun, I just fell in love with them."

For seven years the Dark Lake, Independence Township, resident has been taking riding lessons. And for the last three years she's been giving them.

"I can teach any level of riding," she said. "Mostly I coach people who want to jump for shows. You have to be certified to coach—I started in 1980."

"One nice thing about this program is a lot of the people never really leave," she said. "One girl writes from college and wants to know when she can help out. It seems many of the coaches here started in the program young and never left."

The youngest riders are 6 years old, but in the regular classes the starting age is around 12.

Gentile remembers one girl who started when she was 10.

"When you coach these kids, you watch them grow up," she said. "She is 15 now and quite different than when she started. You become attached to them. They become one of your own children."

Only two of her children have taken classes at the horse farm.

Lisa, now 21 and living in Houston, introduced her mother to horses. Fourteen-year-old Joe Gentile started taking lessons last year.

"The program was really only open to girls

through the Girl Scouts," Gentile said. "I started a boys' program last year, and Joe joined up."

"Other coaches were telling me that all boys want is to ride fast, they don't want to learn about showing the horse. Well I found out that there is no difference in teaching them."

Gentile teaches classes every Wednesday and every other Sunday. She takes classes on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

"My husband is understanding about the time I spend here. But sometimes not so understanding," she said. "I love to ride. I love the horses. I'm teaching someone else what I love, and that is to love the animals."

County's building survey underway

Oakland County's Planning Division is keeping tabs on renovation and repair in downtown districts.

And it has firsthand familiarity with Clarkston. As part of a summer intern's project the department has sent surveys to 45 select property owners, some in the Village of Clarkston.

It is designed to determine present property use, what it was, who redesigned it, who was the contractor, how renovation was financed and what improvements were made.

"This information helps us when we sit down to help a community with planning. We're starting Oxford now and we just got done with Walled Lake,"

said Robert Nehall, summer intern studying architecture at the University of Michigan.

"For example, if we go into a community to help them improve their blocks, we can look at the history of a building and give them suggestions as to how they can make their downtown more viable, and what they can do to make the building as original as possible."

Nehall says the department takes photos, makes facade elevations, perspective sketches, building inventories, notes architectural character and determines how much work is needed to return the building to its original design.

Returns of the surveys have been slow, Nehall said.

Media aide retires after 17 years

Now finishing her career at Clarkston High School, Shrapnell believes the students are what made the job easier.

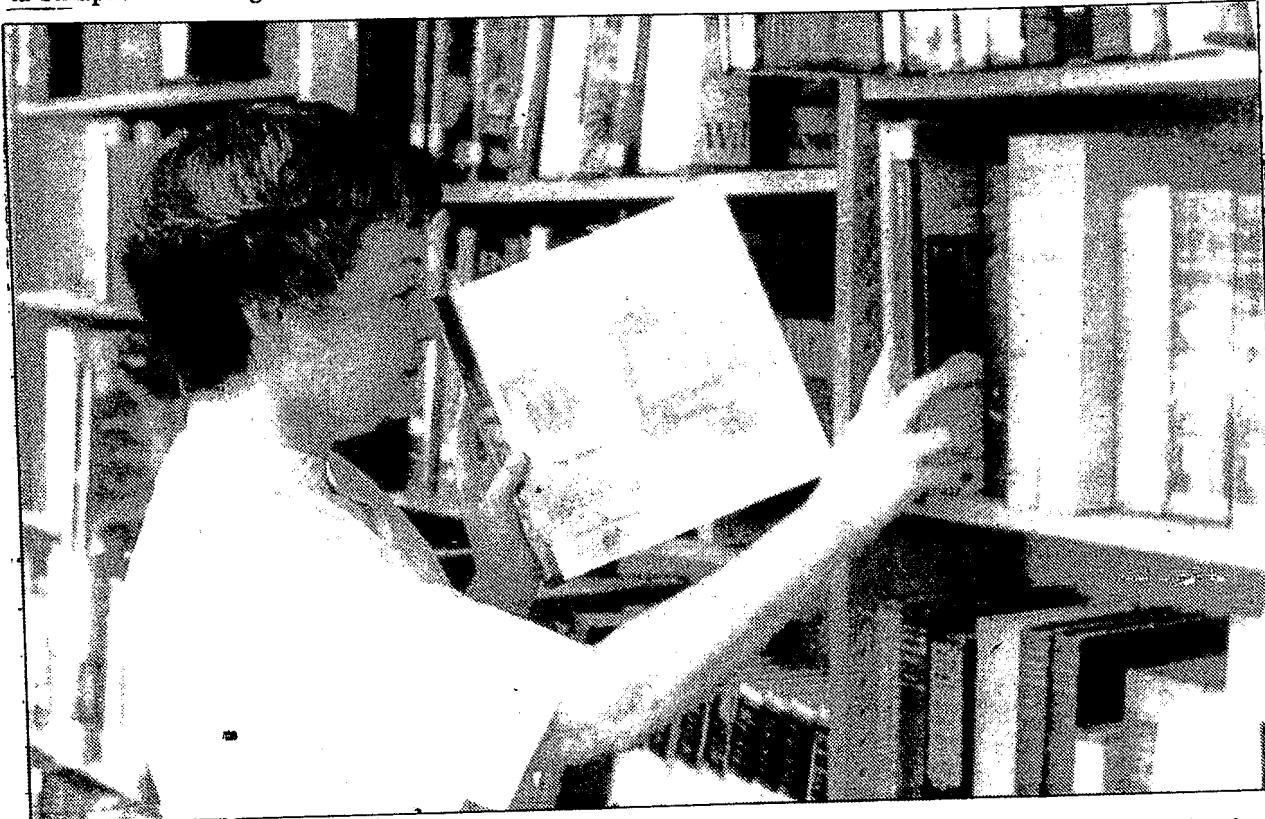
"That is what I'm going to miss the most," she said. "The young people, they're really great."

Dishwater, pie crusts and students

"Well, I'm involved in dishwater, pie crusts and students," chuckled Chris Kevern, food service instructor at the Northwest Oakland Vocational Education Center.

Chris is a graduate of Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant, where she earned a bachelor's degree in vocational education with a major in home economics and a minor in economics.

Prior to teaching in Clarkston, she taught home economics for three years in Waterford.

For seven years she was a teacher at Clarkston High School, where her quantity foods class ran a mini-restaurant once a week, planning, preparing and serving a luncheon for the faculty for a nominal fee.

Her guiding hands were behind the very popular dinner theater presentation at CHS.

For five years Chris and her students prepared and served a delicious dinner to opening night patrons of the high school musical productions.

"It was an opportunity for my students who could neither sing nor dance to make an important contribution to the success of the musical presentations, and they enjoyed it immensely," she said.

So did all of those who were diners.

At her present job at the voc-school, Chris spends her mornings teaching students baking techniques and her afternoons teaching dining room management.

An eye for beauty and a flair for the use of color are important aspects of food presentation, and Chris' expertise in these areas is reflected in the work of her students.

Because the voc-school maintains very stringent and high industrial standards of safety, sanitation and efficiency, students get actual hands-on working experience in industrial food service skills and volume work in an educational environment that is not available in their home schools, nor in most places of work.

"I try to stress the importance of hard work," Chris said. "I tell my students that in order to be a success in anything they must give completely of

themselves, even if their present occupation is only temporary."

Chris' own work is a reflection of her philosophy. During the school year, she and her students provide approximately 100 meals a day for area senior citizens, cater meals for special groups and provide excellent luncheon fare Tuesday through Friday in the vocational school's Northwest Inn.

Chris and her husband, Don, principal of East Hills Junior High School in Bloomfield Hills, chose to live in Clarkston because of the educational opportunities they felt existed here for daughters Sue, a chemical engineering student at Michigan State, and Barb, a foreign language student at Central Michigan University.

Chris has modestly said, "Everything I do, I do with the help of somebody else."

She has been "somebody else" for an untold number of Clarkston students.

Before 1979 Audrey Lau never put a paintbrush to canvas.

Now the 67-year-old widow sells her oil paintings at art fairs.

"I am not an artist," she says. "It's a hobby. I paint for fun."

But her work says otherwise.

Audrey admits that the three art fairs she's entered in the past two years have required applications with slides or samples.

And, she says with a smile, a man who's opening an art gallery in Farmington wants to include some of her work.

"I used to be a pretty good housekeeper, but forget it any more," she says.

She's too busy.

"You have to practice. I paint a lot of garbage, but it's like typing or anything else. If you don't practice you don't get better," she says.

She has some more advice.

"Anyone can paint. It can be taught. You have to be interested. I think the same thing's true from kindergarten on up."

Audrey uses a box of magazines kept in the room where she paints for suggestions—she'll use a barn or boat from a picture and then add ideas of her own.

"I've tried a few flowers and they don't do anything for me. I kind of stick to landscapes," she says. "One day when I get brave enough I'll go take some portrait-lessons just as a challenge."

Survey works as two-way learning experience

Myths were dispelled.

"My dad got 98 percent and I learned you don't get dumber as you get older," said Edie Boston.

There were surprises.

"On the United States, most of them missed the Mauna Loa Volcano (in Hawaii). They just skipped it," said Ronnie Williams.

There were funny moments.

"When the kids got to the harder maps you could see the look on their faces—'Oh, no!'" said Brad Warner.

And it was fun to do.

"The reason I liked it was because for once you get to be the teacher instead of other people and you get to ask them questions," said Craig Petty.

Conducting a survey that tested the geographic skills of over 200 people was a learning experience in itself.

Before the 28 North Sashabaw Elementary School reading pupils of Star Hauser gave the 65-question survey, they took the test themselves and scored 68 percent.

After giving the test to eight people, the pupils

took it again themselves. Class average jumped to 83.2 percent.

The survey covered locations of cities, countries, bodies of water and more in Michigan, the United States, the Americas and the world.

The assignment was to survey two people in each category, bring back the results and work as a class to determine an average.

The resulting graph illustrating average scores showed an increase in geographic knowledge with age:

- Elementary—48.4 percent
- Junior High—64.1 percent
- Ages 18 to 30—68.7 percent
- Age 31 and over—75 percent

The pupils were also assigned the task of writing a brief essay on "What I Learned from Taking a Survey."

Some of the children's survey results from eight people did not match up with the average of 200 replies and that, too, was noted in some of their comments.

"I learned that you were smarter in school. As you get out of school you keep forgetting. You're a lot smarter in school. I'm a lot smarter than my dad."

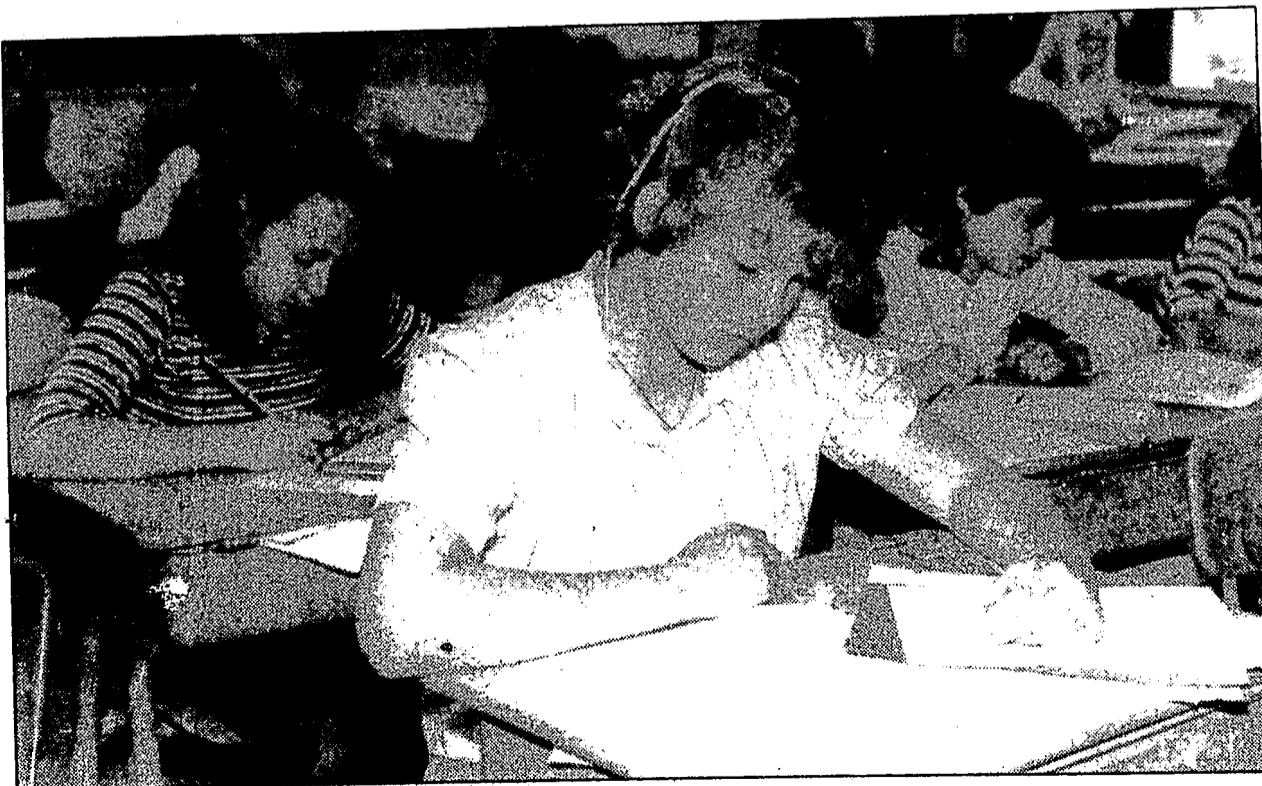
