DNR denies Levy Co. mining plan

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) denied the Edward C. Levy Co.'s 20-year plan to mine 300 acres near the headwaters of the Clinton River which essentially kills the controversial project and leaves officials of the multi-million Detroit-based firm with one appeal: a federal court battle.

"That's very good news," said Independence Township Supervisor James B. Smith. "We've done our homework and it's paid off.".

Norman Hyman, attorney for Levy, says he doesn't know if his client will appeal the decision, but that corporate officials were disappointed with the outcome of the four-year-long struggle.

The eight-page denial issued late Aug. 17 said the DNR might look favorably on the plan if:

•Levy is able to obtain a mining permit at the local level for land not zoned.formining.

•If it can be shown there's no "prudent or feasible" alternate site.

•And finally, if the county fails to purchase approximately 300 acres in that area it selected for inclusion with Independence Oaks County Park.

In late July local officials looked grave following a Michigan Environmental Review Board recommendation that the DNR approve the plan with stipulations.

Because it's rare the DNR acts opposite a MERB recommendation, Smith said he'd braced for approval of the plan. That would have still meant a court battle because the Army Corps of Engineers denied the plan two weeks earlier. A DNR denial adds more weight to the township's case should an appeal be filed. "(The decision) took a lot of guts on the (DNR division chief's) part," he said.

"Legally the DNR can't approve a plan for an illegal use, and Levy never came before the township to get a permit to mine, which he needs.


Florida developer Conrad Wagner has offered Pine Knob Investment Co. a \$2- to \$3-million loan to buy Borg Warner's interest in the Pine Knob golf course.

The property includes the two exclusive restaurants, the Hamburger Mansion and La Veranda.

Charles Collins, the trustee handling the bankruptcy in federal court, is expected to hear the offer Friday, Aug. 26. He has filed for borrowing power, according to his attorney Ronald Rose. Collins, who has full control of the \$30-million complex, does not have to consult Pine Knob partners Gary Francell and Joseph Locricchio on his decision, according to attorney David Howell who has represented the partners in the past.

Locricchio and Borg Warner attorneys could not be reached for comment.

Sources close to Pine Knob say rumors of the loan were heard as early as one month ago, and indicated the Florida developer's overture could mean similar future piecemeal investments in the music theater and ski hill.

The Springfield Township Board unanimously gave Olaffson a cluster option to build at its Aug. 10 meeting. He expects to break ground this fall.

The price tag for each home will be between \$40,000 and \$60,000, he said.

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State sued over senior housing

Determined to license his proposed \$30 million senior citizens complex, Clarkston Place, developer Hugh Garner filed suit last week against the State of Michigan.

In a show cause hearing Aug. 17, Oakland County Circuit Court Judge George La Plata ordered the state to show why it should not immediately issue a license. The state has 30 days to respond, according to Garner.

Garner's letter of intent to build senior housing at I-75 and Dixie Highway has been in state files for a year. When officials in Lansing announced his application would be reviewed comparatively with 13 others, Garner was at a loss for strategy and indicated early on he wanted to avoid a court battle. "I didn't want to take on the entire world, and this way the other 13 applicants are not involved," he explained the lawsuit. "I want the court to order the state to issue the license—or not issue the license. I'm very optimistic. I think the judge understands our plight."

The state agreed to review the applications jointly, acting on an attorney general opinion, which forces Garner to compete for the available 424 beds apportioned to northwest Oakland County.

On another front, the Independence Township Planning Commission tabled Garner's request for site plan approval Aug. 11.

Township engineers disagree with Garner on whether a 10-year or 110-year flood plan is required, he said.

Calls conflict-of-interest charge 'heresay'

Independence Township Supervisor James B. Smith has been cleared of conflict of interest charges regarding a proposed 53-acre development off Reese Road. The property abuts 40 acres owned by Smith.

"Although that's not the most important thing," Smith said. "The important thing is that the court upheld our 600-foot cul-de-sac limit."

Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Frank Mester called the conflict of interest charges "heresay" Aug. 17 and denied engineer Bernard Feldhauser's request for a 1,000-foot cul-de-sac.

Feldhauser represents Reese Development Co., owner of the proposed 17-lot, 3-acre minimum, subdivision.

New beginning

The Shindler Road name change to Woodland Trail is hailed as a "new beginning" by Joe Gorka, one of 12 homeowners on the rural road that gained state-wide attention two years ago when officials discovered a nearby toxic dump site.

At the Aug, 10 Springfield Township Board meeting, Supervisor Collin Walls announced no public hearing will be needed to rename the road as earlier thought.

"It's relatively routine from here on in," Walls said.

Nine of the 12 families living on the road in the township's southwest quadrant signed a petition to change the street name, wanting to eliminate stigmas associated with toxic waste.

"For the first time in a long time we have reason to be optimistic," Gorka said. "We have a solid handle on the problem, and feel others can learn from what we've gone through. We can be a model for other communities far as who to talk to and where."

"Now we'd like to start a new beginning." In 1981 the Department of Natural Resources indicated that despite clean-up efforts, high concentrations of toxic contaminants remained at the site off Shindler road, in Springfield and Rose townships. Detected in highly localized areas were high levels of PCB (polychlorinated biphenyls), a suspected carcinogen, and toxic metals like lead.

Attorney for the developers, Roger Canzano, maintains a cul-de-sac is the only way to economically develop the land and indicated the partners will appeal.

Smith, on record strongly opposing cul-de-sacs, denied Feldhauser's charges of conflict and said his 40-acre farm had been for sale long before the developers made their proposal.

"I really don't think all the evidence was considered and I really believe the township's cul-de-sac ordinance is unreasonable," he said.


On Aug. 10, the board unanimously approved purchase of a \$6,351 IBM Personalized Computer and \$1,100 worth of programs.

Cable TV head-in site chosen

Ending months of speculation, property behind Rademacher Chevrolet at M-15 and Dixie Highway has been selected as Independence Township's headin cable TV site.

According to Manuel Copado, commercial marketing director for Multi-Cablevision, the studio site will be elsewhere but should be within two miles of the head-in site for best reception.

Information from Multi-Cablevision, a division of Tribune/United, describes the site as "clean" for signals and says it has land contours that allow interference-free signals, a concern because of the number of microwave paths running through the township.

The company has struck a lease agreement with Rademacher Chevrolet to use the land.

In addition, officials are scheduled to appear Sept. 8 before the zoning board for a variance needed to erect a 100-foot tower. Structure height is restricted to 30 feet in the ordinance.

The head-in houses \$250,000 worth of electronic components needed to receive and send out signals, the transmitting tower and receiving dishes.


Since 1979 Levy sought to mine acreage adjacent to Independence Township's Clintonwood Park and Independence Oaks County Park.

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
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Go home and do something

Ho-hum.


IT WASN'T ALWAYS this way, you know. Several years back, it seemed like every birthday was a milestone, and the next one was always something to look forward to.

Then I think about countries I read about filled with conflict. Places where the guns are really loaded, where war isn't a game.


Places where the night quiet is broken by helicopter noise and grenade booms that signal danger.

Citizens of Walled Lake can breathe easier since the arrest and jailing of four people for playing peace games. Unfortunately, the situation isn't that secure Marquette.

There were also four people arrested near Marquette for playing peace games at the K.I. Sawyer Air Force Base. Their crime included kneeling and praying. But three of them were quickly released and, at this very moment, are free to wantonly kneel and pray in unsuspecting communities anywhere in Michigan or all of the United States. You should be on the lookout for them. police and prosecutors don't recognize a peace game when they see it. Instead, peace-game players are usually charged with trespassing.

PEOPLE ARE never arrested for playing war games, of course. That's because the war-game players are only practicing how to kill people; they never pretend to do anything worse, such as trespass. The twofold purpose of peace games is to practice for real peace and impress onlookers with a mighty show of pacificism. It is hoped that the onlookers will be so enamored, they will touch hands with the peacegame players and ask to join the game. this, they got 30 days in jail plus \$250 fines.

So, for a month, Walled Lake is a safer place to live. The candles and dye symbolized the Nagasaki victims who leaped into the river to ease the pain of their burns and turned the water red with their blood. It's too bad all those people were killed by an atom bomb, of course. But do we live in a civilized society, or don't we? When Williams executives look into their reflecting pool, they shouldn't have to see the debris of peace games. They should have to see themselves. WAR GAMES are much more socially acceptable than peace games. Sure, war games also leave debris behind. Sometimes that debris even explodes and kills bird-watchers. And it can't be denied that war games damage the environment and cost taxpayers millions of dollars. But at least war games don't trespass. War games provide the practice required if a nation is to have the capability of killing lots of people and frightening onlookers. War games are an integral part of a wise national defense policy. On the other hand, peace games are nothing less than a blatant, unforgiveable violation of this nation's "No Trespassing" signs. Don't you forget it. Also, remember what happened in Marquette and, for Christ's sake, be on the lookout for wanton kneelers and prayers.

Everyone knows what war games are. Militarytype people gather together to shoot guns and other eapons. Tanks and planes and aircraft carriers are often used. It's just a game, but participants must really pretend they're playing for keeps or it isn't any fun.

The twofold purpose of war games is to practice for real war and to impress onlookers with a mighty

for real war and to impress ontookers when a map s show of force. It is hoped that the onlookers will be so frightened, they will never raise a hand against the

war-game players. Peace games are not nearly as well known and popularly accepted as war games. In fact, people arested for kneeling and praying are never specifically charged with playing peace games because most Among the four peace-game players arrested at Walled lake were such notorious kneelers and prayers as a Catholic priest and a Methodist minister. A nervous public, leery of becoming enamored, was reassured when a newspaper photo revealed that police didn't take the two clergymen into open court without first chaining their hands together.

The minister and the priest, along with two women, had trespassed on property owned by Williams International Corp., a manufacturer of cruise-missile engines. To commemorate the 38th anniversary of the atomic destruction of Nagasaki ("One cruise equals 16 Nagasakis"), they put burning candles and red dye in Williams' reflecting pool. For


And sadder still when a school superintendent motivates his school board to acquiesce in paying your hard-earned tax dollars to a lobbyist.

"We have about 192 in the full football program," Wyniemko said. "That's in the junior varsity and the two freshmen teams also.


"We have a policy of not cutting any player. If they cut themselves, OK, but if they want to be on the team they will be.

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
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

"Lou liked me enough to give me his home phone number and let him know if I'd like to caddy for him again next year here," he said.





Mel Larsen, former chairman of the Republican Party and a state legislator for six years, enjoys a long friendship with Sitton.

"He is a good friend and certainly one of the most honest and frank people I've ever met in my life," Larsen said.

"He's as political astute as anyone I know, and on my inner-circle of advisors. He's a delightful man.'


Sitton laughs when asked if he's a staunch Republican.


